1. Fairfield University, Egan School of Nursing and Health Studies

- a. Fairfield University is requesting a 6-month temporary waiver for Alexandra Curry, BSN, RN as a clinical instructor for NURS 4332 Transition: Professional Nursing Practice for the Spring 2022 semester. This request will not exceed the 10% outlined in the Regulations. Ms. Curry will be providing clinical instruction to six senior level students on a medical surgical unit at Stamford Hospital. Alexandra earned an Associate in Science in Nursing from Norwalk Community College in May 2015, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Western Governor's University in May 2018 and is matriculated in the Master of Science in Nursing, Nursing Leadership at Fairfield University with an expected graduation date of May 2022. Ms. Curry will be oriented to the clinical instructor role by Katie Piqueira, MSN, RN and at the clinical site by the Unit Manager of the medical surgical unit. Alexandra's clinical experiences include staff/charge nurse at a long-term facility, and staff/charge nurse on various medical surgical units at acute care hospitals.
- b. Fairfield University is requesting a 6-month temporary waiver for Diana Harris, BSN, RN as a clinical instructor for NURS 4325 Medical Surgical Nursing II for the Spring 2022 semester. This request will not exceed the 10% outlined in the Regulations. Ms. Harris will be providing clinical instruction to third semester accelerated second degree students on a medical surgical unit at Stamford Hospital. Diana earned an Associate in Science in Nursing from Norwalk Community College in May 2010, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Chamberlain College of Nursing in May 2013 and is matriculated in the Master of Science in Nursing, Nursing Leadership at Fairfield University with an expected graduation date of May 2022. Ms. Harris will be oriented to the clinical instructor role by Katie Piqueira, MSN, RN and at the clinical site by the Unit Manager of the medical surgical unit. Diana's clinical experiences include and staff/charge nurse on rehabilitation, orthopedic/neurology/joint replacement units at acute care hospitals.

2. Porter and Chester Institute (PCI)

PCI is requesting the approval for the appointment of **Holly Breault**, **RN**, **BSN**, **MSN** as the Practical Nursing Director as of 01/17/2022. Ms. Breault earned an Associate of Science in Nursing from Three Rivers Community College on 06/02/2001, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Kaplan University (Purdue University Global) on 03/25/2011 and a Master of Science in Nursing from University of Phoenix on 06/20/20216. Her educational experiences include clinical instructor for University of Connecticut and Northwestern Community College, and Academic Program Manager RN-BSN at Post University. Ms. Breault's clinical experiences include staff nurse in Emergency Department, trauma and cardiac rehabilitation units at acute care hospitals, school nurse, camp nurse, occupational health nurse and staff nurse at flu clinics.

3. Saint Vincent's College at Sacred Heart University:

Saint Vincent's College at Sacred Heart University is providing notice of a teach-out for the Associate Degree in Nursing Program. On 01/05/2022 the faculty, staff and students were notified of the teach-out and that St. Vincent's College will no longer be accepting new applications. A summary of the course schedule and teach out plan was provided to the Fall of 2024. Sacred Heart University will maintain all vital records for students in St. Vincent's College, the university website details the specific steps for requesting transcripts and provided the person by title, name and address responsible for providing transcripts and references for students. There was also an update on their Corrective Action Plan.

4. Stone Academy:

Stone Academy is providing notice that they will be terminating the Practical Nursing day program at the West Haven campus. The program will end by 12/31/2022 although the timeframe for teaching out may be extended due to students needing to repeat courses and the availability of clinical sites. The faculty, staff and students will be notified immediately in writing of the teach out plan, the Campus Director will speak with each student cohort to address and questions or concerns, and the Practical Nursing (PN) Site Administrator and PN Program Administrator will be available to meet with students to discuss individual concerns. Stone Academy provided information on the safe storage of vital program records and the person by title, name and address responsible for providing transcripts and references for students.

5. Southern Connecticut State University (SCSU):

SCSU is requesting the approval for the appointment of Maria Krol, DNP, MSN, RN-NIC-ACUE as the Chair of the Nursing Department as of 01/18/2022. Dr. Krol earned an Associate of Science in Nursing from the University of Bridgeport on 12/24/1989, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a Master of Science in Nursing on 08/2006 from Sacred Heart University, and a Doctor of Nursing practice on 08/29/20215 from Oakland University. Her educational experiences include clinical instructor for Yale University School of Nursing, University of Connecticut CEIN Program, Nurse educator for Bridgeport Hospital School of Nursing, RN Clinical Coordinator for Stratford High School, and Assistant Professor, Associate Professor then Undergraduate BSN Program Director at SCSU. Dr. Krol's clinical experiences include staff nurse at a nursing agency and for a homecare company, assistant nurse manager for a newborn intensive care unit (NICU), nurse case manager and diabetic nurse educator at an acute care hospital and staff nurse in NICU, maternity and pediatric units and an acute care hospital.

6. Lincoln Technical Institute (LTI), 5-year study:

Review of the hard and/or electronic copies as provided, including the five-year study, catalog, and student handbook binders.

- a. The following were **provided** in the Self Study Report (SSR) and the Supplementary Binder:
 - i. <u>Preamble/Accreditation:</u> per section 20-90-46(b) (2)(3)(4) and section 20-90-55 (a) (b).
 - ii. <u>Criterion 1:</u> The philosophy and objectives of the nursing education program are developed by the nursing administrator and faculty and provide a framework for the development, implementation and evaluation of the program. Section 20-90-48 (a)(4);(c) (1) (4).
 - iii. <u>Criterion 2:</u> The nursing education program outcomes are consistent with the philosophy and describe the competencies of the graduate. Section 20-90-48 (c)(2)(3).
 - iv. <u>Criterion 3:</u> The administrator of the nursing education program meets the qualifications as stated in the regulations. Section 20-90-51 (a)(b)(1).
 - v. <u>Criterion 4:</u> The nursing education program shall have its own administrator who reports directly/indirectly to the controlling body of the parent institution, has authority and administrative responsibility for the program. Section 20-90-48 (a) (1-4).
 - vi. <u>Criterion 5:</u> The faculty of the nursing education program meets the qualifications as stated in the regulations. Section 20-90-51 (a)(b)(1)(3) (A-C).
 - vii. <u>Criterion 6:</u> The faculty of the nursing education program contribute to the criteria for admission, progression and graduation of students, are on site for all clinical experiences when direct nursing care is given and maintain a student ratio that is adequate to attain the objectives of the program. Section 20-90-48 (a)(2).
 - viii. <u>Criterion 7:</u> Qualified students are admitted in compliance with state and federal regulations regarding antidiscrimination. Section 20-90-48 (d)(1).
 - ix. <u>Criterion 8:</u> Written policies for admission, readmission, advanced placement, disciplinary measurements, graduation are established and implementation by the faculty and, with licensure requirements, are given to the student upon entering the nursing education program. Section 20-90-48 (d) (1-5).
 - x. <u>Criterion 9:</u> Written policies for student counseling, guidance, health safeguards and admission physical exams are established and given to students during the admission process. Section 20-90-48 (d)(6).
 - xi. <u>Criterion 10:</u> Students can participate in program development by evaluation of faculty, curriculum, clinical sites, and graduate evaluation survey. Section 20-90-48 (c) (4).

- xii. <u>Criterion 11:</u> The curriculum content is developed, implemented and evaluated by the faculty and program administrator; meets requirements and hours stated in the regulations; and is actualized through learning experiences which are appropriate to the objectives of each course. Sections 20-90-48 (a)(4) & 20-90-55 (a-c).
- xiii. <u>Criterion 12:</u> The curriculum is systematically evaluated to determine success by NCLEX pass rate of at least 80% of students taking the licensure exam upon their first attempt, graduate and employer surveys that reflect competencies of graduate, and graduate follow-up evaluations at least every three years. Sections 20-90-47 (b)(2)(A) & 20-90-48(c)(4).
- xiv. <u>Criterion 13:</u> Record keeping policies and procedures for the nursing education program comply with regulations. Section 20-90-49.
- xv. <u>Criterion 14:</u> The resources, facilities and services needed for the nursing education program are provided by the parent institution. Section 20-90-50 (a)(b).
- xvi. <u>Criterion 15:</u> The faculty selects and evaluates the health care entities to ensure that they meet for the needs of the nursing education program. Sections 20-90-48 (a)(4) & 20-90-50 (b).
- xvii. <u>Criterion 16:</u> Written contracts with health care entities define the responsibility of the faculty to select, guide and evaluate student learning activities. Contracts are reviewed annually and renewed at least every three years. Section 20-90-48 (b) (1-2).
- b. The Department visited the LTI Shelton campus on 11/09/2021. The tour was led by Anne Simko, Nursing Director of the Shelton campus, Patty Delucia, Corporate Dean of Nursing and Dr. Deborah Little, Program Administrator and Assistant Corporate Dean of Nursing. The campus is on a bus line, has adequate parking and visitors are greeted by a receptionist in a large waiting area. The Nursing Director 's office included lockable file cabinets, current textbooks, reference books, equipment with an adequate area to meet privately with faculty and/or students, the Program Administrative Assistant's office had lockable file cabinets, and the Day & Evening Clinical Managers shared an office with adequate area to meet privately with faculty and/or students. The Business office contained an adequate number of student uniforms, textbooks, laboratory and information technology packets. There were three large classrooms with desks & chairs, a ceiling mounted projector, large viewing screens, computer, white board, and displays of student poster presentations. In the hallways between the classrooms were eye catching bulletin boards specific to the areas of study in each practical nursing student term (1, 2, 3 & 4), faculty office hours, nursing history, LTI responses to student concerns, requests for tutoring, constructive suggestions and student resources. There was a large, shared nursing faculty office with lockable cabinets, computers, a printer, textbooks, and reference books. The nursing laboratory contained multiple large tables &

chairs, beds, a bassinet, overbed tables, bedside tables, 4 standard adult manikins, 2 baby manikins, one high fidelity simulation manikin, Personal Protection Equipment (PPE), medication carts, isolation carts, wheelchairs, recliner chairs, crutches, IV pumps, feeding pumps, linens and many other supplies to meet the needs of the program. During the tour a term 2 student group was observed in the laboratory area demonstrating urinary catherization skills and/or completing on-line work. There was a classroom where the prospective nursing students would take the Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) preentrance exam. There were also multiple restrooms and an elevator.

The tour continued on the second floor and included a large dining room with seating areas, vending machines, a refrigerator and microwave. There was one large classroom with desks & chairs, a ceiling mounted projector, large viewing screens, computer and white board. There were offices for Career Services and the Registrar, and a library/resource room with multiple computers as there are digital resources/references and many hard copy textbooks & references available. There were also multiple restrooms and an elevator.

I observed a portion of a term 4 class with approximately 35 students and the topic was legal & ethical issues in nursing. The instructor used lecture, written word, clinical examples and welcomed & encouraged student participation. I then met with this student group to discuss their experiences as a student in LTI's Practical Nursing program and the students did not share any concerns and/or issues.

Review of program meeting minutes, quality improvement projects, clinical site agreements, virtual clinical experiences, laboratory skills checklists, readmission minutes, curriculum meetings, complaints and grievances and randomly selected faculty & student files were completed during the campus visit .

c. Clinical observations:

- Shelton campus, day group was observed on 11/04/2021 at a long-term care facility with four students at a term 4 (completing term 3 clinical hours) and one clinical instructor.
 - The students arrived promptly, two were dressed appropriately in the LTI uniform and all four had LTI identification badges. The instructor did not have a LTI identification badge.
 - 2. Pre-clinical conference included "walking rounds" with the students and the charge nurses and a discussion of patients that could be assigned (to the students). One student was assigned to shadow the APRN wound consultant during her rounds in the facility.
 - 3. The instructor verbally communicated the student assignment with the charge nurses, the charge nurses provided current patient information/report to the instructor and students.

- a. The instructor discussed with the students the clinical assignment tasks including obtaining vital signs, assist with meal delivery and set up, morning care including bathing, personal hygiene needs and observe facility staff administering medications and/or completing treatments. The instructor also discussed the necessary paperwork that each student must complete including a nursing progress note and the clinical activity tool.
- 4. The students were observed reviewing the patient hard copy medical records as the instructor and/or students did not have access to the patient electronic medical records (including the individualized nursing care plans). One student was observed asking the charge nurse to review a patient's electronic medical record.
 - a. Interview with the facility Director of Nursing (DNS) identified that he was aware that the school instructor and students did not have access to the electronic patient medical records.
- 5. The students were observed obtaining vital signs and providing their patients with assistance or total care with bathing, personal hygiene needs, assistance with breakfast and lunch were respectful, pleasant, informative in consistently providing patient education and followed infection control standards.
- 6. One student was observed shadowing the APRN wound consultant.
- Review of the assigned patient medical records failed to reflect a written consent document allowing the student to provide care and services.
 - a. Interview with the facility DNS identified that each patient consented to have a student work with them as part of the admission to the facility paperwork and the completed paperwork is in the patient's electronic medical records.
 - b. Interview with the Director of Admission and review of the facility admission paperwork failed to reflect that a patient could consent to have a student provide them care & services as that was not part of the admission paperwork.
 - c. Interview with two patients identified that they were agreeable to having a student provide them with care & services.
- Observation of the instructor discuss with each student their
 patient's unique care needs, care and services that the student had or
 will be providing and how they "advanced the patient's plan of care"
 that day.

- 9. The instructor was observed to consistently check in with each student, provide ongoing guidance/direction and update them with changes to the assignment and/or needs of the unit.
- 10. Review of the "LTI Weekly Clinical Evaluation" tool that was being used by the instructor identified that the student would be evaluated on "demonstrates the ability to accurately assess client's physical and psychosocial findings and correlate with client diagnosis".
- 11. The post-clinical conference included discussions with each student about the care and services provided and/or observed.
- ii. The New Britain campus evening group was observed on 11/10/2021 on a sub-acute unit at a long-term care facility with three students at a term 4 and one clinical instructor.
 - 1. The students arrived promptly, dressed appropriately in the LTI uniform with LTI identification badges.
 - Pre-clinical conference included discussion that the student chooses a
 patient, ensures that the patient and/or responsible party has
 consented to have a student, performs all care, meets with the
 charge nurse for a report, formulates a plan of care and writes a
 nursing progress note.
 - Once the patients were chosen, the instructor verbally communicated the student assignment with the charge nurses and the charge nurses provided current patient information/report to the instructor and students.
 - 4. The students were observed reviewing the patient hard copy medical records and the electronic medical records with instructor including the Medication Administration Records (MAR), the Treatment Administration Records (TAR) and the nursing progress notes. The instructor was not aware if she or the students had access to the patient care plans in the electronic medical records.
 - The students were observed obtaining vital signs and providing their patients with assistance or total care with bathing, personal hygiene needs, completing a patient evaluation and were respectful, pleasant, informative in consistently providing patient education and followed infection control standards.
 - a. One student was observed obtaining vital signs and not following standard precautions.
 - 6. The instructor was observed to consistently check in with each student, provide ongoing guidance/direction and update them with changes to the assignment and/or needs of the unit.
 - 7. During a discussion about patient bracelets, standard precautions and disposable of medications that were not administered one student

- was not aware of the location of the facility policy and procedure book.
- 8. Review of the medical records and observations of care identified that one student failed to administer oxygen as ordered and one student crushed medications absent a medical provider order (the student did not administer the medication upon Department inquiry).
 - a. Both students were observed discussing and updating the charge nurse on these events.
- 9. Observation of one student administering medication to one patient in accordance with the medical provider orders and the medication cart was left unattended and unsecured in the hallway.
- 10. The post-clinical conference included brief discussions with each student about the care and services provided.

Fairfield University wishes to petition the State Board of Examiners for Nursing for a temporary 6 month waiver for Alexandra Murphy Curry in order to enable her to serve as a clinical instructor for the spring 2022 semester. We propose that Ms. Curry provides adult medical surgical clinical instruction at Stamford Hospital for six traditional senior nursing students in their NURS 4332 Transition: Professional Nursing Practice course.

Ms. Curry holds a BSN degree from Western Governor's University and is currently completing her MSN at Fairfield University with an expected graduation date of May 2022. Ms. Curry currently function as a full time registered nurse at Stamford Hospital/Hospital for Special Surgery Collaborative Joint Replacement Center. The candidate's education, along with her clinical experience, are appropriate to support the requirements of the NURS 4332 Transition: Professional Nursing Practice course.

Rose Iannino-Renz DNP, FNP-BC, CWS, CHSE and Kathy Saracino MSN, RN, CWOCN CHSE are the course coordinator and are responsible for the coordination of the NURS 4332 clinical. Prof. Katie Piqueira MSN, RN will mentor Ms. Curry to the role of the clinical instructor for the first half of the spring semester. If approved, then Ms. Curry would take over leading the group on March 8, 2022. Ms. Curry will meet with the unit manager at Stamford Hospital on the medical surgical floor to be oriented to all unit specific policy, procedures, and protocols before clinical commences.

Currently, Fairfield University has one permanent waiver for Professor Susan Reynolds. Approval of this waiver still leaves us far below 10% of the overall number of nursing faculty.





DESCRIPTION:

This capstone course addresses provision of holistic, evidence-based care to patients and families in a variety of health care settings. Students have the opportunity to work as a member of the health care team with an individual agency preceptor across the course. The focus is on fostering student growth in clinical judgement and leadership development to promote autonomous professional nursing practice within the clinical setting. Students develop a Capstone Project based on an identified learning need, for the patient, the patient's family, or for the nursing staff.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Demonstrate effectiveness in planning and providing holistic evidence-based nursing care for diverse individuals and populations.
- 2. Create an environment for the provision of care within clinical microsystems with attention to quality, safety, information systems and health care ethics.

- 3. Use clinical judgement, and ethical decision-making based on nursing science, related theory, and current evidence, to inform the delivery of care across the lifespan.
- 4. Participate in inter- and intra-professional communication and collaboration in partnership with individuals and populations to deliver evidence-based, patient-centered care.
- 5. Translate knowledge from research, benchmarking, quality improvement and other relevant sources into practice to address health related problems.
- 6. Synthesize knowledge from the humanities and sciences in developing and providing care that is guided by the values of altruism, autonomy, human dignity, integrity, global citizenship, and social justice.
- 7. Demonstrate professional growth, through the cultivation of self-awareness, responsibility, accountability, creativity, leadership and commitment to lifelong learning.
- 8. Advocate for patients, consumers and the nursing profession through involvement in the political process, and health/patient care policies and practices.

EVALUATION:

The student will receive a number grade for assignments, projects, and ATI tests. A Pass/Fail grade will be given for clinical and simulation. To receive a final letter grade, the student must receive a passing grade in clinical and simulation. All students must receive a final grade of at least 77% to pass the course.

CLINICAL PERFORMANCE EVALUATION

The Clinical Instructor, Agency Preceptor, & student will participate in the student's clinical evaluation. This will take place at both the mid semester and a final evaluation at the end of the semester. The Clinical Instructor will assign the pass/fail grade for clinical performance. Students who have more than one clinical instructor, will have both complete an evaluation tool.

- 3. Clinical experiences are arranged by course coordinators and clinical placement coordinator. Placements cannot be changed once hospitals have been notified of student list.
- 4. Ryerson Simulation will count as 10 hours of clinical and your ATI review course will count for 8 hours = 168 total hours.

Any hours that are missed will need to be made up in order to pass the course. PLEASE- be aware of the need to social distance and use PPE during your out of class time to limit any exposure to Covid-19.

5. Transition class time does not count as clinical hours.

Clinical Orientations:

Orientations at each hospital vary. Your clinical instructor will contact you for this schedule. Orientation may be required by a facility before you can begin any clinical hours. Hospital orientation can be counted as part of your total hours.

- 1. Record all hours on the attached documentation sheet to be signed off by the PRECEPTOR & submitted to blackboard by last day of classes.
- 2. Students are required to attend an orientation at their site, if requested by hospital. These hours may be counted toward total hours.
- 3. Arrangements for missed clinical days must be made with the student's Preceptor, with notification of the clinical faculty. Vacations/travel plans are not acceptable reasons to miss clinical. Outside jobs must be notified that clinical takes priority in scheduling. Several clinical rotations are on weekends. You will be informed of this well in advance to notify any employers of work conflicts.
- 4. The student must notify the PRECEPTOR, faculty member, & the unit if the student is going to miss clinical at least one hour prior to the start of the student shift. Failure to do so will result in a Critical Incident Form unless the instructor judges that there are unusual circumstances. Students who do not adhere to this procedure exhibit unprofessional behavior and may be barred from the clinical setting. Unprofessional behavior may jeopardize the student's ability to pass the course.

<u>TEXTBOOKS:</u> There are no required textbooks for this clinical course, only the uWorld 90-day subscription. **Do not activate** the uWorld until directed in class. First assignment will not be due until January 30th.

It is expected that students already have acquired the American Psychological Association, <u>Publication Manual</u> (latest ed., Washington: APA; <u>www.apa.org</u>) and that this format will be used in all papers/projects. It is expected that the student will bring appropriate reference manuals to be used as resources, such as manuals on medications, laboratory & diagnostic tests, nursing diagnosis, patient teaching, nursing care plans, specialty area texts, NCLEX review.

PROCEDURES FOR CLINICAL PERFORMANCE EVALUATION

I) CLINICAL REFLECTION LOG (CRL): Self-Directed Learning Objectives

A) In order to foster a life long attitude of responsibility for professional development, the student will keep an ongoing Clinical Reflection Log. Students will email their weekly CRL to their clinical instructors weekly on a date determined by individual instructors. Average length is ½ page. Students who do not submit documents in a timely manner exhibit unprofessional behavior and may not successfully complete the course

- B) The weekly CRL consists of 3 learning objectives
 - 1) The purpose of the <u>objectives</u> is to help the student become self-directed & define what the student expects to achieve in this course.
 - a) All objectives should be written in behavioral (clearly measurable) terms, i.e. "I will educate one client on their discharge meds this week," "I will attend medical rounds once this week."
 - b) Objectives should be realistic & relevant to the particular setting.
 - c) Objectives should reflect goal attainment and increasing growth in the transition from student to practicing professional nurse.
 - d) The objectives will assist the clinical instructor to support the student's educational growth. Throughout the semester, the objectives should address either the course objectives and/or the concepts of communication, critical thinking, decision making, collaboration, and therapeutic interventions. The student can make use of the sub-objectives listed in the clinical evaluation tool, or utilize more specific, concrete objectives, such as:
 - organized management of a multiple, patient assignment;
 - competent performance of selected procedures;
 - identification of resources e.g. rehabilitation programs, patient teaching materials, consults to other team members;
 - specific medication management;
 - improvement in oral and written communication;
 - enhanced opportunities for critical thinking:
 - identification of aspects of patient care that can be delegated
 - examination of the literature related to evidenced-based nursing care

- 2) The CRL offers the student and the instructor an opportunity to reflect on student outcomes.

 The instructor may provide intermittent feedback on the CRL, but the CRL itself is not graded.
- 3) Students should save the electronic CRLs in a folder to be used as a resource for their graded Clinical Reflection Paper (CRP).
- 4) The first CRL, due first week of clinical.
- II) CLINICAL CONFERENCES: The instructor will schedule clinical conferences every week during or at the end of your clinical shift, or at a determined day/time for students in 1-1 experiences. Student attendance is mandatory.
- III) CLINICAL PERFORMANCE EVALUATION BY THE INSTRUCTOR & THE PRECEPTOR:
 A grade of pass/fail will be earned based on the achievement of course objectives as stated in the syllabus.
 Unsafe clinical practice and/or the failure to meet any ONE objective represents failure in clinical performance.
 The clinical evaluation tool will be used for this evaluation. A mid-term and final evaluation are to be completed. The midterm evaluation must be turned into the clinical instructor no later than the 5th shift worked.
 Regardless of the letter grade earned, the student must pass all course objectives to pass this course.
- IV) SELF-EVALUATION: The student will evaluate his/her success in meeting objectives using the clinical evaluation tool prior to meeting with the clinical faculty at the midpoint of the semester, and again at the <u>final evaluation</u>. If the student demonstrates clinical weaknesses that need to be addressed at midterm, the course coordinator will be notified, and the student and instructor will create a plan of remediation for successful completion of the course objectives.

V) GRADED ASSIGNMENTS: CLINICAL REFLECTION PAPER (CRP)

- A) This assignment represents a dynamic assessment of the student's transitional experience. The CRP should address whether the student has achieved the course objectives. The CRP should be organized according to the course objectives and to key nursing concepts, including *communication*, *critical thinking*, *decision making*, *collaboration*, and *therapeutic interventions*. While the weekly CRLs (student's weekly objectives) should be incorporated in the paper, the student should aim to move beyond specific weekly objectives and focus on the comprehensive nature of the clinical experience. This assignment enables the student to become self-directed and responsible for the student own development as the student make the transition from student to professional nursing. It will also help to increase the student's interpersonal effectiveness by soliciting from the preceptor the type of support the student need to effectively accomplish effective personal learning.
- B) The CRP will consist of the student's ongoing learning objectives, self-evaluation, and a summary of overall professional growth. The CRP should include areas of needed growth and evidence that the student has taken steps to address those needs. The student uses the weekly logs to identify examples from student's experiences that epitomize the best of nursing practice and health care delivery. The student might also identify changes that might improve nursing practice and care delivery on the student's unit.
- C) A paper is to be completed addressing the evaluation criteria with supporting references using **APA** format. Students should organize the paper into categories that reflect either the course objectives or the nursing concepts described above.
- D) This paper will be worth 25% of the student course grade, to be submitted to the student TRANSITION FACULTY as early as it is ready; the final deadline is noon on April 27, 2022. For each day late, 5 points will be subtracted from the student final grade. If the student has been late in

submitting the student weekly objectives, or if the student does not attend clinical conferences, the instructor may deduct points- per rubric. <u>Papers are graded by clinical instructors in second half (bridge students will complete this assignment at end of group clinical- March 9th.)</u>

VI) GRADED ASSIGNMENTS: CAPSTONE TEACHING PROJECT

The purpose of the Capstone Teaching Project (CTP) is to encourage the senior student to evaluate his or her clinical environment in terms of learning needs, for the patient, the patient's family, or for the nursing staff. The student will identify a learning need, <u>based on the staff suggestions and guidance</u>, as well as the advice of the <u>clinical instructor and the support of the unit manager</u>. Once the learning need is determined, the student will devise learning tool to share with the unit staff. It can be a brochure, poster, in-service, or a new method of communication. Examples of previous projects will be made available to students. Students will present to either their current clinical group, virtually via zoom to Dr. Renz/Prof Saracino. Students not in a Thursdays clinical will also present at Fairfield University as part of the Innovative Research Symposium (April 21st).

- A) Select a project valued and approved by the staff. The preceptor & the nurse manager often have excellent ideas. The clinical project must be started early in the semester; the student should arrange to meet with the clinical instructor/unit manager once potential ideas are discussed. The clinical faculty must approve the student project topic within 3 shifts of starting clinical.
- B) The student will present the project orally to the nursing staff prior to the last day of clinical for this course and again at the School of Nursing (see below). This project will be worth 40% of the student course grade,
- C) The CTP will be described in a poster presentation and 1-page abstract using the evaluation criteria listed in this syllabus. The rationale for the chosen learning need should be supported with at least five current references (within the last 5 years) from the scientific literature, (i.e. why is this learning need important or significant to identified population). The poster and abstract should be composed in APA format. The learning need should be clearly identified. The poster will be presented at the University on Thursday, April 21st, 2022. Late posters will not be accepted and will earn a grade of "zero." All posters will be printed through Fairfield Univ graphics dept—no paper posters will be accepted. Printing times may vary, so completed work will need to be sent and returned in time for the April 21st Innovative Research Symposium. This date will be provided by the printing office.
- D) When the poster is presented for the University, students will submit to blackboard a copy of the abstract, list of references, and a copy of all slides on the poster. Individual instructors may also request an e-mailed or hard copy. It is recommended that you create all materials for the poster in a manner that they can be reproduced for copies. The poster and abstract must include all grading criteria and be in APA format. (See rubric for grading attached).

VII) UWorld

- A) Students are required to have purchased a 90-day uWorld package. DO NOT ACTIVATE until we discuss in first class.
- B) Students must complete 100 practice questions each week. Due date/time to be determined in first class. <u>Do not reuse questions</u>. STUDENTS WILL NOT RECEIVE CREDIT FOR ANY REUSED QUESTIONS.
- C) Question completion is part of your final grade- not for accuracy, but for completion. This assignment makes up 15 % of your final grade.

- D) You can set up your 100 questions any way you prefer. uWorld gives you the option to set up your practice tests by # of questions, nursing topics, NCLEX groupings. You may do in smaller increments- i.e. 20 questions for 5 days, 15 questions for 7 days, 50 questions for 2 days. Schedule is up to you and your learning style. Building up to one session of at least 100 questions at a time should be a goal by the end of the semester.
- E) You must complete 100 questions each week over 12 weeks. You cannot front load and get all 1200 questions done in January. The goal is to use what you are learning in clinical to help you with your questions.

VIII) NCLEX PREPARATION TESTING

All students will be required to take required standardized exams in preparation for state boards. There will be proctored exams 2 times during the semester. A Med/Surg ATI and comprehensive predictor will be administered. The mock NCLEX exam (comp predictor) will be scheduled in April; attendance is mandatory for all exams. A three-day on-site NCLEX review course, conducted by ATI staff is scheduled for last week of classes and first reading day- dates TBD maybe May 2-4. Attendance is mandatory. Daily review times are 9:00am – 4:00 pm. Students will receive an hour lunch break each day. If review course conflicts with a core class, student will be excuse to attend class, then should return to ATI review. PLEASE NOTE- if you attend all 3 days, you get a guarantee to pass NCLEX. If you do not pass on your first try, you will be entitled to a free review. You MUST sign in each day to prove attendance.

Policies Regarding Clinical

Transportation

Students are responsible for their own transportation to and from the various facilities used for the practice of nursing, as well as any parking expenses incurred.

Attire

The following is considered to be neat, professional, comfortable and congruent with the standards of dress and appearance that reflect professionalism and represent Fairfield University to area hospitals and community agencies.





An individual student's calendar is based on his ner initial enrollment into a degree seeking program or on the date studies are resumed following readmission to the University. This schedule results in two overlapping calendars

referred to as "cycles"). The two overlapping calendar cycles designate months corresponding to Chamberlain's summer, fall and spring semesters.

The academic credit unit is the semester hour. A semester credit is defined as a minimum of 16 contact hours of lecture or online learning activities with an associated 32 hours of out-of-class student work, 32 contact hours of laboratory or 48 contact hours of clinical instruction/practice/producting. 24 contact hours of graduate practicum/fieldwork for MPH, 64 contact hours of practicum for the DNP Healthcare Systems Leadership specially track and 83 hours of out-of-class fieldwork for MSW. Courses with zero academic credits are designed to support students and therefore are exempt from the Credit Hour Allocation policy. One contact hour is defined as 50 minutes of attendance in lecture, laboratory or clinical instruction/practice or participation in the learning activities. Lab and clinical section credit hours are integrated into the course. Up to five additional contact hours are added per graduate practicum course for conferencing and documentation. course for conferencing and documentation.

Course Identification: Courses in the 100 series are primarily for undergraduate freshmen, 200 series are primarily for undergraduate sophomores, 300 series are primarily for undergraduate juniors, 400 series are primarily for undergraduate seriors. Courses in the 500 and 600 series are primarily for graduate fixed students and the 700 series are primarily for doctorate level students.

Grade Point Average (GPA): A student's Grade Point Average (GPA), based on a 4.0 scale, is computed by dividing total quality grade points by total credit bours, for wricing grades "A", "A-", "B+", "B", "B-", "C+", coursework completed in September 2020 or later.

Semester Honors: Deart's List and Honor Roll are awarded for undergraduate students. Full-time students with a semester GPA of 3.5 or above are eligible for the Deart's List Full-time students with a semester GPA between 3.0 and 3.49 are listed on the Honor Roll. Students who earn a grade of "D","F", "WF" or "I" in one or more courses, including transitional studies coursework will not be eligible for honors offing that semester. For the purpose of semester honors, transitional studies coursework does not count toward full-time status.

Honors at Graduation: Latin honors are ewarded for bachelor's degree graduates who have completed a minimum of 60 credit hours in residence with a GPA of 3.3 and above. Honors are computed on the basis of all college work applied toward the degree and taken in residence at Chamberlain University. Summa Curn Laude, the highest honor, requires a CGPA of 3.8 or above. Students with a CGPA between 3.5 and 3.79 will graduate Magna Curn Laude, and those with a CGPA between 3.3 and 3.49 will graduate Curn Laude. President's Honors will be awarded to BSN students with a CGPA of 3.5 or above, and have less than 60 credit hours in residence. A student who has graduated from a doctorate or graduate programmust have completed an infimum of 30 credit hours in residence. Doctorate and graduate degree students with a CGPA of 4.0 will graduate with the designation "With High Distinction" and those with a CGPA from 3.85 to 3.99 will graduate with the designation "With Distinction" As of July 2012, all coursework completed (including the last semester of study) will be included in the calculation of graduation honors.

Eligibility to Re-Enroll: Any undergraduate or graduate student who interrupts their academic studies for six consecutive sessions or more must request readmission. A person seeking readmission must complete and submit an application for admission and meet all admission requirements in effect at the time of readmission. - 5. Demonstrate inter- and intra-professional communication and utilize collaborative skills to deliver patient centered care.
- 6. Design plans of care based on culturally sensitive and ethically sound nursing judgment in the evaluation of patient outcomes.

### **Course Requirements**

The goal for this course is for students to integrate theory with clinical practice. The student must pass the clinical component of the course in order to pass the entire course. Attendance is mandatory for class and clinical. All students must receive a final course grade of 77 to pass the course.

#### **Teaching Strategies**

Lecture via innovative technology, discussion, case studies, practice questions, clinical experiences including simulation, clinical reflections, nursing care plans, and post conferences.

## I. Course Assignments:

- A. <u>Assigned readings</u> will be from required textbooks from CoursePoint Plus and online ATI book. Mastery of this information as it relates to the nursing process is essential to the academic preparation of the professional nurse. The class will focus on management of disorders encountered in the acute care setting. It is important to review physiology and assessment prior to lectures. The due dates for readings are on pages 13-16.
- **B.** ATI Testing: There are four practice ATI tests to be completed are: 1) RN Pharmacology Online 2019 A; 2) RN Pharmacology 2019 B; 3) RN Nutrition 2019 A; 4) RN Nutrition 2019 B. These practice tests can be **completed earlier** than the due dates on pages 11-12. These practice ATI tests are to prepare you for the Proctored ATI tests for Pharmacology and Nutrition. Names of students who receive a Level 1 or Below Level 1 on a proctored ATI test will be sent to ATI Coordinator and Administration. If a student is found to have a total of two or more proctored test scores at a Level 1 or Below Level 1 the student must set up a meeting to meet with the ATI Coordinator or Administration to discuss performance and remediation prior to the end of the semester. The grading rubric is on pages 11 and 12.
- C. <u>PrepU Quizzes</u>: <u>CLASS CODE</u> is 581E407A
  Chapter quizzes will be due by **April 29**th at 8PM with a minimum mastery level of 4.
  Each quiz will be worth 10 points.
- D. <u>VSim Case Studies</u>: There will be two <u>Surgical VSim Case Studies</u> due by <u>April 29th at 8PM</u> (you will need to do both the Pre and Post Test). Each Pre/Post Test <u>Surgical VSim Case Study</u> will be <u>worth 10 points</u>. The Post-Test requires an 80%.
- **E.** <u>Class testing:</u> includes three in-class exams, two in-class ATI proctored exam, and a cumulative in-class final exam. Each test will be 60-70 questions and the final test will be 100 questions which are similar to the NCLEX type of questions.
- **F.** Evaluation: Your evaluation of the class is valued. An on-line link to the IDEA evaluation will be available on the course Blackboard.

### Attendance

Class attendance - Students are expected to attend and participate in all classes. Attendance will be tracked. In classes with participation grades, class participation includes attendance in class, involvement in class discussions, and on-time completion of all required assignments for both class and clinical (if applicable). *Missed classes or failure to come prepared may affect your grade*. If unable to attend, please notify the course coordinator by e-mail prior to the start of class you are missing.

#### **Exams**

Exams must be taken on the scheduled day on Blackboard. If you do not have a working laptop, please contact Course Coordinator prior to the date/time of your test.

Requests for taking tests at times other than specified in the syllabus will only be granted under extreme circumstances and must be made in writing prior to the test date. Travel, vacation, employment, elective procedures/surgeries, or other commitments are not acceptable reasons to miss an exam. Failure to adhere to this policy may result in a grade of zero.

Students who must miss a test must notify the Course Coordinator by email no later than 7:00am on the day of class. Considerations for missed tests include a medical or family emergency, and documentation from a healthcare provider is required. The Course Coordinator will make the final determination as to whether a missed test can be excused. If the student will require a make-up test, the course coordinator will determine the test date and time. The student will receive a zero grade for failure to make up excused tests within an appropriate time frame.

#### II. Clinical Experiences & Assignments:

Clinical experiences provide the student with opportunities to apply the nursing process, including: 1) patient assessment, including diagnostic procedures and laboratory data; 2) pathophysiology; 3) nursing diagnoses, appropriate short-term goals, collaborative and independent nursing interventions, with emphasis on pharmacological therapies; and 4) evaluate patient outcomes.

Under the supervision of the clinical instructor, students will participate in all aspects of clinical, including change of shift report, provision of nursing care, implementation of nursing interventions, medication preparation and administration, and post conference. The student is encouraged to seek out new learning experiences. At the discretion of the clinical instructor, senior students may spend two clinical days observing two of the following areas: intensive care unit, emergency department, operating room and/or another clinical unit.

Attendance in clinical is mandatory including pre and post conferences.

#### Clinical/simulation

Clinical/simulation attendance is mandatory. Conduct and appearance in clinical agencies and the simulation Center should be in accordance with professional nursing standards and the EGAN School of Nursing and Health Studies undergraduate nursing program policies at all times. The EGAN School of Nursing and Health Studies uniform is required for each clinical day and simulation. Students are expected to wear their uniform every time they are at a clinical agency even if they are only picking up a badge or dropping off paperwork. Students are responsible for calling the clinical instructor if unable to attend a scheduled clinical experience. Informing classmates regarding an absence is not sufficient.

Missed Clinical (in-patient and on-campus) Days: Absences will be reviewed by the course coordinator and clinical instructor and make-ups will be permitted only with their approval. Travel, work, elective procedures/surgeries, and scheduled appointments are examples of unexcused absences and make-up of clinical hours will not be permitted. Missed clinical days must be made up with your instructor before the end of the course. All clinical hours must be complete in order to pass clinical, and therefore, unexcused absences will result in a failed clinical component of the course.

A passing grade of 80% on the medication calculation test must be achieved to prepare and administer medications during the clinical rotation. Students who do not achieve this grade on the medication test will be asked to make an appointment with the faculty member in the Learning Resource Center to review their calculations prior to taking a makeup test.

- A. Clinical Evaluation Tool: The clinical evaluation tool and interpretive guidelines for evaluation will be used for the student evaluation. In order to successfully pass clinical, students must score 2 or higher for each sub-objective. Written midterm evaluations will be completed the week of February 26th. If an instructor deems that more practice in clinical skills will assist a student in meeting clinical objectives, that instructor may refer the student back to the Learning Resource Center for further assistance in mastering clinically related knowledge and skills.
- B. Clinical Objectives: A grade of pass or fail will be earned on whether achievement of clinical objectives has been met. Students must pass the clinical portion of the course in order to pass NURS 4325/5325. Students who fail the clinical portion of the course will automatically fail NURS 4325/5325, regardless of their classroom performance. Unsafe or unethical clinical practice and/or the failure to meet any one clinical sub-objective represent failure in clinical performance.
- C. Reflective Journaling: The core pathway of rhetoric and reflection is conducted through reflective writings of clinical practice. The purpose of the reflections is to critically reflect on experiences in class participation or clinical practice, and to question biases, preconceptions, and assumptions. The goal is to develop new thinking and to demonstrate growth during the semester. It is not to document specific events or activities that transpired on the unit for a particular day. Reflections should be presented clearly and with relevance to the field of medical/surgical nursing. It is expected that you will describe how the experience contributed to your understanding of self, others, and/or course topics. Also, include how the experience connects to past experiences or materials form other courses. The eight (8) weekly reflections and a final reflection at the end of the course are required to meet this course requirement.

### Weekly Reflections – Total of 7 weekly reflections to be completed

- 1. These reflections should be no longer than one page
- 2. Upload to Clinical website on Blackboard to your clinical faculty beginning the second week of clinical
- 3. Reflections are due the end of the day following the student's clinical day (Wednesday for students in Tuesday clinical; Thursday for students in Wednesday clinical; Saturday for students in Friday clinical).
- 4. Please write about:
  - a. One situation from the past week you wish to examine.
  - b. Think about the context of that situation and what you were thinking.
  - c. What assumptions did you make about the situation?
  - d. How did you decide on your nursing care/actions?
  - e. How will this knowledge impact your practice for the following week?

# End of the Semester Reflection - Due April 22, 2022

- 1. This reflection will be two pages, double-spaced with 1-inch margins.
- 2. Upload to Clinical website on Blackboard
- 3. Please write about the following:
  - a. Ways I have grown this semester in the following areas: 1) Personally2) Clinically 3) Professionally and 4) Communication Skills
  - b. Challenges I have faced this semester
  - c. Goals I have for next semester in Transition: Professional Nursing Practice
- D. Full Nursing Care Plans: Four (4) full nursing care plans are to be completed during the semester. The template for these care plans can be found on pages 18-24 of the syllabus. In each of these care plans, the concept map must include the top 4 patient problems. In addition, each care plan will have a medication template (see page 24) for every medication the patient is on. All nursing care plans will be graded pass/fail and must be done to the satisfaction of the clinical faculty in order to pass clinical. Deadlines for care plans will be set by clinical faculty.
- E. Simulation: All students will participate in one clinical day of simulated patient scenarios with the Director of the Robin Kanarek Learning Resource Center and Simulation Center. The patient scenarios will include the following cases: renal, gastrointestinal, and neurological disorders. An assignment of the scenarios is to be submitted to your clinical faculty that morning of the clinical simulations. Due the next day is a reflection of your experience to be uploaded on the clinical website (see page 17 for more details).

F. Medication Therapy: On the clinical unit, the student should bring a small drug reference text to clinical or access online resources before approaching clinical instructor to dispense medications. Students should consult with their clinical instructor regarding the hospital based resources for medication information and administration protocols and procedures. The student is expected to demonstrate knowledge of: both generic and trade names, drug classification, physiologic actions, expected therapeutic responses, common side effects, parameters used to assess therapeutic response and common side effects. Drug references on personal digital assistant devices/phones are not to be used on the unit during patient care.

### III. Overall Rules for Missed Assignments:

- A. Class assignments: Students are expected to attend all online classes. Online tests must be taken on the day they are scheduled. Students who need to miss a test must notify the Course Coordinator by e-mail, no later than 7am on the day of class. The Course Coordinator will determine whether a missed test in class can be excused. Acceptable excuses for missing class or tests include <u>acute illness or family emergencies</u>. The student will receive a zero grade for failure to make up missed tests within an appropriate time frame.
- B. Clinical assignments: Clinical is 7 hours for 12 clinical experiences between Janaury 18 April 29, 2022. Student emergencies that prevent attendance at clinical must be addressed with your clinical faculty; the student must contact the clinical faculty prior to the beginning of clinical. Makeup for a clinical missed will be arranged by the clinical faculty in consultation with the Course Coordinator the week after the final clinical week.

#### Introduction

St. Vincent's College was acquired by Sacred Heart University in September 2017. At that time, all students in the associate degree in Nursing and the LPN articulation program were transitioned to Sacred Heart University. Since 2017 the program has faced numerous challenges including declining enrollment, retention, and substandard NCLEX pass rates.

The program was placed on conditional approval from the State of Connecticut Examiners for Nursing in May 2021 for a NCLEX pass rate for the class of 2020 of 77%. NCLEX pass rates are not available for the graduating class of 2021, however, college estimates do not predict a passing rate at or above 80% for that class. (Updated Corrective Action Plan included.)

Enrollment faced a decline of 55% in fall 2021, 40% in spring 2022, and as of December 2021, applications for fall 2022 admissions were down by 48%.

On Friday December 3rd, 2022, the Sacred Heart University Board of Trustees voted to approve the teach-out of the program. On January 5th the Board of Visitors for St. Vincent's College, faculty and staff were notified of the teach-out. This same day all currently enrolled and deposited students were notified via their official university email that St. Vincent's College will no longer be accepting new applications to the associate degree in nursing program and the program will be in teach-out. Email and hard copy letters were sent to all known alumna announcing the teach-out. (See attached letters and emails of communications.) On January 6th, calls were placed to the Board of Examiners for Nursing and the Accreditation Commission for

Education in Nursing to officially announce the teach-out. Once the students currently enrolled in the program have graduated, the program will be discontinued.

#### **Teach-Out Plan**

Sacred Heart University will teach-out all enrolled and deposited students in the associate degree in nursing program. In May 2022 it is anticipated that 118 students will graduate from the nursing program. All students, including those who are graduating, those newly enrolled, and those deposited but not enrolled, were notified via their official student emails that the program would be moving to a teach-out. Students were informed that all courses will be taught until the final student has graduated from the program. Admission to all program tracks was ceased on December 15, 2021, and notifications of such were posted to the website. Students who are premajor will have three semesters to complete pre-requisite courses prior to the Fall 2022 semester; the final semester Nursing 101 will be offered. Given the repeat policies of the program, it is anticipated all students currently enrolled in pre-requisite courses will have ample opportunity to complete required pre-requisite courses. (Below see teach-out plan by enrollment and program type; Traditional, Accelerated, LPN Articulation program.)

In the event that a student must step out of the program for personal or health reasons, that student will be offered the course as soon as the student returns. "Last time course is offered" in table below, is based on all students completing the course in that semester.

The program was placed on conditional approval from the State of Connecticut Examiners for Nursing in May 2021 for a NCLEX pass rate for the class of 2020 of 77%. NCLEX pass rates are not available for the graduating class of 2021, however, college estimates do not predict a passing rate at or above 80% for that class. (Updated Corrective Action Plan included.)

Enrollment faced a decline of 55% in fall 2021, 40% in spring 2022, and as of December 2021, applications for fall 2022 admissions were down by 48%.

On Friday December 3rd, 2022, the Sacred Heart University Board of Trustees voted to approve the teach-out of the program. On January 5th the Board of Visitors for St. Vincent's College, faculty and staff were notified of the teach-out. This same day all currently enrolled and deposited students were notified via their official university email that St. Vincent's College will no longer be accepting new applications to the associate degree in nursing program and the program will be in teach-out. Email and hard copy letters were sent to all known alumna announcing the teach-out. (See attached letters and emails of communications.) On January 6th, calls were placed to the Board of Examiners for Nursing and the Accreditation Commission for

Education in Nursing to officially announce the teach-out. Once the students currently enrolled in the program have graduated, the program will be discontinued.

#### **Teach-Out Plan**

Sacred Heart University will teach-out all enrolled and deposited students in the associate degree in nursing program. In May 2022 it is anticipated that 118 students will graduate from the nursing program. All students, including those who are graduating, those newly enrolled, and those deposited but not enrolled, were notified via their official student emails that the program would be moving to a teach-out. Students were informed that all courses will be taught until the final student has graduated from the program. Admission to all program tracks was ceased on December 15, 2021, and notifications of such were posted to the website. Students who are premajor will have three semesters to complete pre-requisite courses prior to the Fall 2022 semester; the final semester Nursing 101 will be offered. Given the repeat policies of the program, it is anticipated all students currently enrolled in pre-requisite courses will have ample opportunity to complete required pre-requisite courses. (Below see teach-out plan by enrollment and program type; Traditional, Accelerated, LPN Articulation program.)

In the event that a student must step out of the program for personal or health reasons, that student will be offered the course as soon as the student returns. "Last time course is offered" in table below, is based on all students completing the course in that semester.

#### Faculty/Staff Support

Faculty need for academic year 2022-2023 has been based on current enrollment. It is estimated that in AY 2022-2023, there will be a need for three full time faculty members and the chair. These faculty members will cover didactic, skills lab, simulation, and advisement. Our current adjunct faculty will continue to provide support for clinical placements. Sacred Heart University is fortunate to have two colleges of nursing. Though the associate degree in nursing program is teaching out, the Davis and Henley College of Nursing will continue to offer the BSN through DNP. The dean of that college has pledged faculty support for didactic course coverage at St. Vincent's College should the need arise. It is anticipated that there will be no more than 15 students completing courses in AY 2023-2024. Faculty need will be determined for AY 2023-2024 in the spring of 2023. As of this date, Tammey Dickerson has agreed to continue as the Chair for Nursing until the end of the teach out and Leslie Youngblood will continue next year for NUR 101 and NUR 270 courses. Remaining decisions are anticipated to be completed in March 2022. (See faculty table below.)

Sacred Heart University employs a team of nursing clinical coordinators and contract/compliance coordinators. There is no plan to phase out the current contract/compliance coordinator who supports the nursing program, as they cover all programs in the college. In the event the clinical coordinator leaves the university, support will be shared between the clinical coordinator of the Davis and Henley College of Nursing at Sacred Heart University and St. Vincent's College. Should the current clinical coordinator transfer to the David and Henley College of Nursing, the position will be shared between the two colleges until all students are taught out. There are currently three administrative assistants in the college for 250 students. As numbers of students decrease, administrative coverage will be transferred to other assistants in the college.

St. Vincent's College is located on the main campus of Sacred Heart University. The following resources are available to all St. Vincent College students and will remain unchanged: designated financial aid officer for part-time students, designated career officer for part-time students, and access to the Jandrisevits Learning Center including all tutoring and learning support through that division. All current IT support for students and faculty will remain unchanged. St. Vincent's College currently has a designated Student Support Coordinator. That position will remain in place throughout fiscal year 2022-2023. Given the small number of remaining students beyond that time, student support will be provided by the staff of the Jandrisevits Learning Center.

#### Introduction

The St. Vincent's ADN program is on Conditional Approval until further BOEN review in June 2022. Conditional approval was granted by the CT BOEN following submission of detailed corrective action plan. The following is presented by way of follow up to the corrective action plan and desire to show evidence of continued support for the students currently progressing toward program completion during the teach out of the program.

Presented next is Part II of the corrective action plan. Identified issues and challenges have been categorized as related to Faculty, Curriculum, and/or Admissions. All follow up actions have been identified following the strategy outlined in the plan.

## Corrective Action Plan Follow Up:

Part II: May 2021 Improvement Plan

#### STRATEGIES IN PROCESS

Updates to the strategies in use from Corrective Action Plan.

#### **FACULTY**

- All full-time faculty are required to complete *Test Development and Item Writing CE* course (17.5 contact hours) through NCSBN.org prior to Fall 2021 to improve test quality and rigor and to better align with NCLEX standards.
  - o 6 full-time faculty have taken the NCSBN Test Development and Item Writing CE course.

- o All exams and finals are reviewed by the Chair of Nursing.
- Test and item analysis for all exams and finals are reviewed with Chair of Nursing.
- Planned 2-day faculty development in August 2021: Day 1 on test development and alignment with SLOs; Day 2 on test analyses to be conducted in partnership with ExamSoft psychometrician consultants.
  - Test blueprinting and analysis literature searches conducted and reviewed with full-time faculty.
  - o Test blueprinting reviewed during faculty development.
  - o Blueprints requested for all exams and final exam.
  - ExamSoft Video with item analysis shared with and reviewed with the full time faculty.
  - Literature regarding item analysis discussed and reviewed with written parameters for ongoing item analysis to strengthen item and exam rigor.
  - Item writing and test analysis have been reviewed during faculty development including articles, video, and practice opportunities.
  - Access to NURSE Tim Faculty Development subscription for all full-time and adjunct faculty.
- Planning underway for additional faculty development specific to clinical adjunct and full-time faculty to ensure continuation of didactic rigor in clinical setting (formulating improved clinical judgment questioning, enhancing clinical post-conference learning activities, etc).
  - o Review and revise clinical assignments to align with CLOs and didactic content.
  - o Clinical adjuncts have access to Blackboard and course materials.
- A standardized NUR 101 Clinical Faculty Toolkit being developed with structured learning activities that are aligned with syllabus and lab schedules to be included as part of planned post-conference.
  - Standardized weekly lab experiences for NUR101 students.
  - Thompson Essential Health Assessment text book with weekly assignments added to NUR101 curriculum.
- Faculty meetings will be increased from monthly to bi-weekly with increased emphasis on students' performance/scaffolding learning, teaching methods, and managing/advising at-risk students.
  - o Full-time Nurse Faculty meetings occurred bi-weekly for FA2021.
  - Weekly Outcome/Curriculum meetings were held. These were attended each week by all full-time faculty due to the number of new faculty members. This was done to enhance new faculty learning and assimilation to SVC and the teaching role.
  - Development, adjustment, and alignment of policies and procedures to enhance student success, manage at risk students, and encourage faculty development were components of the weekly meetings.
- All faculty will have one in-class and one lab/clinical evaluation per year conducted by the chair or the dean.

- Some class and clinical evaluation was conducted, remainder to be conducted SP2022.
- Course evaluations are reviewed and discussed with full-time faculty with didactic course load.
- All adjunct faculty will be evaluated in the clinical site, a minimum of one time per academic year, by their respective faculty course leaders.
  - o Adjunct faculty were evaluated at the clinical site by the Chair of Nursing and the Clinical Coordinator (RN). The remainder to be done SP2022.
  - o Adjunct faculty evaluations were completed by every student. The evaluations will be analyzed and summarized for review with each adjunct professor.

#### **CURRICULUM**

• FlexLearn, a curriculum redesign to enhance the online delivery of course content for onground delivered courses, which has been shown to engage adult learners in a more interactive format, implementation starting Fall 2021 and a transitioned roll-out. Faculty training began in Spring 2021 and will continue during Summer 2021 with support from the SHU Center for Excellence and Innovation in Teaching (CEIT) experts to be maintained year-round.

Fall 2021: FlexLearn start with NUR 101

Spring 2022: FlexLearn start with NUR 123 and NUR 124; continue with new NUR 101

Summer 2022: FlexLearn continue with NUR 123 and NUR 124


Students presently in NUR courses will have their progression tracked and students at risk will meet with faculty, tutoring, student success co-ordination, and submit a success plan.

#### Timetable for Teach Out of the PN Day Program

As indicated by the last Expected Grad Date (11/19/2022), we expect that the program will end by 12/31/2022. During this teach-out, the day program will continue to be overseen by the PN Site Administrator, the Clinical Supervisor, and the PN Program Administrator. Inventory of needed supplies and equipment will be maintained as usual. The timeframe for teaching out the day students may be extended due to students needing to repeat courses and the availability of clinical sites.

#### Pathway for Students

Stone Academy will provide the required courses for students enrolled in the Practical Nursing program as outlined in the Stone Academy Catalog. Students who fail a Practical Nursing course will be able to retake each course one time.

#### Communication Plan

The Campus Director will inform staff and faculty of the teach-out plan immediately. Details of this teach-out plan will be shared to ensure that the message is clearly communicated and the details of the plan are understood by all parties.

The Practical Nursing students will be notified in writing of the teach-out plan. Students will be informed that all courses will be offered to allow them to successfully complete their program. They will also be given available options in the event of the failure to pass a Practical Nursing course.

Additionally, the Campus Director will speak with each Practical Nursing cohort to address any questions or concerns. The PN Site Administrator and PN Program Administrator will be available to meet with students to discuss any individual concerns.

#### **Governing Principles**

A well-formulated set of rules is required to govern a teach-out, which are provided in this document. However, there will always be exceptional cases that must be addressed; and students may require a more detailed interpretation of these rules. In those instances, the student may ask to present a case for consideration. The PN Site Administrator, PN Program Administrator, and Executive Vice President will honor the request for a meeting to render a decision or suggest an

optimal solution that does not diminish academic standards and will confer as needed to maintain fairness and uniformity of decisions.

#### **Authority and Accreditation**

Stone Academy will be diligent in maintaining accreditation and authorities associated with the delivery of higher education and financial aid during this teach-out.

Diploma granting authority will continue to rest with the Accrediting Bureau of Health Education Schools (ABHES).

#### **Records Retention**

Stone Academy takes seriously its obligations to preserve information relating to litigations, audits, and investigations. This policy provides guidance, review, and retention of student documents for academic and financial aid records received or created by Stone Academy.








#### MEMORANDUM OF DECISION

I

#### Procedural Background

On October 1, 2021, the Department of Public Health ("Department") filed a Statement of Charges ("Charges") with the Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board"). The Charges allege violations of Chapter 378 of the Connecticut General Statutes ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") by Donna Duncan ("Respondent") which would subject Respondent's registered nurse ("R.N.") license number E37186 to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17 and 20-99(b). Board ("Bd.") Exhibit ("Ex.") 1.

On October 1, 2021, the Department filed a Motion for Summary Suspension Order ("Motion") with the Board. Bd. Ex. 2. Based on the allegations in the Charges, and the affidavits and reports attached to the Motion, the Board found that Respondent's continued nursing practice presented a clear and immediate danger to public health and safety.

On October 20, 2021, pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 4-182(c) and 19a-17(c), the Board ordered that Respondent's R.N. license be summarily suspended pending a final determination by the Board of the allegations contained in the Charges ("Summary Suspension Order"). Bd. Ex. 3.

On October 21, 2021, the Summary Suspension Order, Charges, and a Notice of Hearing ("Notice") were transmitted to Respondent's email address of record, dmd4550@yahoo.com. (Bd. Ex. 4), and mailed by first class mail to Respondent's address of record, 110 Sherbrook Drive, Goshen, CT 06756-1907. Bd. Ex. 5.

The Notice informed that a hearing was scheduled for November 17, 2021.

The hearing was held on November 17, 2021 as scheduled. Respondent was neither present nor represented by counsel at the hearing. Transcript ("Tr.") p. 3. Attorney Aden Baume represented the Department. *Id*.

At the hearing, the Department moved orally on the record to deem the allegations admitted. Tr. pp. 4-5.

Given that the record is devoid of any evidence that the Department's October 21, 2021 email to Respondent email was not delivered, the Board granted the Department's motion to deem the allegations admitted. Tr. p. 5.

Following the close of the record, the Board conducted fact finding.

Each member of the Board involved in this decision attests that he or she was present at the hearing, or has reviewed the record, and that this decision is based entirely on the record, the law, and the Board's specialized professional knowledge in evaluating the evidence. *Pet v. Department of Health Services*, 228 Conn. 651 (1994).

#### II

## **Allegations**

- 1. In paragraph 1 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on April 17, 2019, the Board ordered a Consent Order ("Consent Order") in Petition Number 2018-761 that placed Respondent's registered nurse license on probation for a period of three (3) years. Such disciplinary action was based on Respondent's abuse and/or utilization of alcohol to excess.
- 2. In paragraph 2 of the Charges, the Department alleges that said Consent Order became effective on May 1, 2019 and required Respondent, in part, to:
  - a. attend therapy and provide quarterly reports;
  - b. attend support group meetings and provide quarterly reports; and/or
  - c. submit to observed random urine screens for drugs and alcohol.
- 3. In paragraph 3 of the Charges, the Department alleges that in or about September 2020 to present, Respondent failed to attend therapy and/or submit therapy reports.
- 4. In paragraph 4 of the Charges, the Department alleges that in or about November 2020 to present, Respondent failed to attend support group meetings and/or submit support group attendance logs.
- 5. In paragraph 5 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on or about December 10, 2020, and/or December 21, 2020, Respondent's urine screens tested positive when she failed to submit to a random urine test when requested to do so by the screening monitor.
- 6. In paragraph 6 of the Charges, the Department alleges that from approximately December 21, 2020 to the present, Respondent failed to submit to random urine screens.
- 7. In paragraph 7 of the Charges, the Department alleges that the conduct described above constitutes violations of the terms of probation as set forth in the Consent Order and

subjects Respondent's license to revocation or other disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17 and 20-99(b).

#### Ш

## Findings of Fact

- 1. On October 21, 2021, the Summary Suspension Order, Charges, and Notice were mailed via first class mail to Respondent's address of record on file with the Department and transmitted to Respondent's email address of record on file with the Department. The record is devoid of any evidence that the email was not delivered to Respondent. Respondent had reasonable and adequate written notice of the hearing and the allegations contained in the Charges. Bd. Ex. 4, 5.
- 2. Respondent did not appear at the hearing and was not represented by legal counsel. Tr. p. 3.
- 3. Respondent did not request a continuance nor file an Answer to the Charges.
- 4. The factual allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 6 of the Charges are deemed admitted and true. Tr. pp. 4-5.

#### IV

#### Discussion and Conclusions of Law

The Department bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence in this matter. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Department sustained its burden of proof with regard to the allegations contained in the Charges.

Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99 provides, in pertinent part,:

- (a) The Board . . . shall have jurisdiction to hear all charges of conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession brought against persons licensed to practice nursing. After holding a hearing . . . said board, if it finds such person to be guilty, may revoke or suspend his or her license or take any of the actions set forth in section 19a-17. . . .
- (b) Conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession includes, but is not limited to, the following: . . . (5) abuse or excessive use of drugs, including alcohol.

Pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b), the Board is authorized to discipline the license of a nurse who fails to conform to the accepted standards of practice of the nursing profession.

Failure to conform to the accepted standards of practice of the nursing profession includes, but is not limited to, abuse or excessive use of drugs, including alcohol.

Since Respondent did not file an Answer, the allegations are deemed admitted. *See* Conn. Agencies Regs. § 19a-9-20.

In April 2019, the Board placed Respondent's license on probation for three years due to her admitted abuse and/or excessive use of alcohol and its effect on her ability to practice nursing. Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1A, pp. 2-3. The terms of Respondent's probation included, among others, random urine testing for drugs and alcohol, participation in therapy and the quarterly submission of therapy reports, and attendance in support group meetings and the quarterly submission of reports associated with such attendance. Dept. Ex. 1A, p. 2.

While Respondent has completed 19 months of the three-year probationary period (*Id.*), the record establishes that Respondent has complied intermittently with the terms of her probation. In her investigative report, the Department monitor reported that Respondent's therapy reports were late and a report had not been submitted for the month of September 2020. The Department's monitor further reported that Respondent did not submit her support group attendance log for October 2020 and, on December 10, 2020 and December 21, 2020, Respondent failed to submit to random urine tests when requested to do so. The Department monitor concluded in her investigative report that as a result of Respondent's inconsistent compliance with the terms of her probation, Respondent has violated paragraphs B1, B1(3), B1(5), 3C and 3G of the Consent Order. Dept. Ex. 1A, Dept. Ex. 2A, and Dept. Ex. 1C, p. 2.

The record further establishes that Respondent informed the Department via the drug screening monitor that she no longer planned to submit to random urine tests after November 16, 2020. Dept. Ex. 1A, p. 3; Dept. Ex. 2A. Moreover, there are no therapy or support group attendance logs from November 2020 to the present and no urine screen tests results from December 2020 to the present. *Id*.

¹ The probationary terms mandated, among other terms, the following requirements: 1) Respondent was mandated to submit to observed random urine screen for drugs and alcohol. In 2020, Respondent's second year of probation, she was required to submit to two observed random urine screens per- month;; 2) The terms of probation specified that if Respondent failed to submit to a urine sample when requested to do so by her monitor, the missed screen would be deemed a positive screen; 3) Respondent was required to ensure that therapy reports be provided to her monitor during the entire probationary period; and 4) Respondent was required to attend support group meetings on an average of 8 to 10 meetings per month and submit quarterly reports to the Department during the entire probationary period. Dept. Ex. 1A, Dept. Ex. 2A, and Dept. Ex. 1C, p. 2.

The record establishes that the screening monitor called Respondent for random urine drug screenings on November 16, 2020, December 9, 2020, and December 10, 2020. Respondent informed the screening monitor that she planned to retire from the nursing profession. Respondent failed to submit to any drug screenings after November 16, 2020. Dept. Ex. 1C, pp. 2, 14-18. The record further establishes that the Department contacted Respondent by email on November 16, 2020, December 10, 2020, and December 11, 2020, in an effort to offer her opportunities to comply with the terms of her probation. Dept. Ex. 1C, pp. 2, 4, 6, and 11.

In a letter dated December 24, 2020, the Department monitor informed Respondent of her non-compliance with the terms of her probation. Dept. Ex. 1B.

The record establishes that on August 16, 2021, Respondent renewed her R.N. license.. With no other details, Respondent stated on the license renewal questionnaire that she "had retired from the profession." Dept. Ex. 2A. Respondent's R.N. license is scheduled to expire on September 10, 2022.

Given that Respondent is no longer communicating with the Department monitor, and is in violation of her probationary terms, the Department cannot monitor Respondent's sobriety. Accordingly, the Department cannot assess nor determine whether Respondent is safe for Respondent to practice nursing with reasonable skill and safety. Therefore, the Board concludes that Respondent's conduct, deemed admitted and true, is sufficient grounds on which to impose disciplinary action on Respondent's R.N. license pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b)(2) and 19a-17.

#### Order

Based on the record in this case, the above findings of fact, and conclusions of law, the Board hereby orders that Donna Duncan's R.N. license, number E37186, is **revoked**.

This Order is effective on the date it is signed by the Board.

The Board hereby informs Respondent, Donna Duncan, and the Department of this Decision.

#### MEMORANDUM OF DECISION

I

#### Procedural Background

On July 26, 2021, the Department of Public Health ("Department") filed a Statement of Charges ("Charges") with the Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board"). The Charges allege violations of Chapter 378 of the Connecticut General Statutes ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") by Leah Pressley, R.N. ("Respondent") which would subject Respondent's registered nurse ("R.N.") license number 126819 to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17 and 20-99(b)(2), 20-99(b)(4) and/or 20-99(b)(5). Board ("Bd.") Exhibit ("Ex.") 1.

On July 26, 2021, the Department filed a Motion for Summary Suspension Order ("Motion") with the Board. Bd. Ex. 2. Based on the allegations in the Charges, and the affidavits and reports attached to the Motion, the Board found that Respondent's continued nursing practice presented a clear and immediate danger to public health and safety.

On August 11, 2021, pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 4-182(c) and 19a-17(c), the Board ordered that Respondent's R.N. license be summarily suspended pending a final determination by the Board of the allegations contained in the Charges ("Summary Suspension Order"). Bd. Ex. 3.

On August 12, 2021, the Summary Suspension Order, Charges, and a Notice of Hearing ("Notice") were sent to Respondent via first class mail at 54 Litchfield Avenue, P.O. Box 143, Rogers, CT 06263, Respondent's address of record on file with the Department. The correspondence was also sent to <a href="mailto:leahhhp@gmail.com">leahhhp@gmail.com</a>, Respondent's email address of record on file with the Department. Bd. Ex. 4.

On August 13, 2021, a Corrected Notice of Hearing ("Corrected Notice") was sent to Respondent via first class mail at 54 Litchfield Avenue, P.O. Box 143, Rogers, CT 06263.. The Corrected Notice was also sent to <a href="mailto:leahhhp@gmail.com">leahhhp@gmail.com</a>. The Corrected Notice informed that a hearing was scheduled to convene on September 15, 2021. Bd. Ex. 5.

The hearing was held on September 15, 2021. Respondent was neither present nor represented by counsel at the hearing. Tr. p. 3. Attorney Diane Wilan represented the Department. *Id*.

Respondent failed to file an Answer to the Charges. Tr. p. 5.

At the hearing, given that Respondent failed to file an Answer to the Charges, the Department moved orally on the record to deem the allegations admitted. *Id*.

Given that the record is devoid of any evidence that the Department's August 12, 2021 and August 13, 2021 emails were not delivered to Respondent, and given that the first-class mail sent to Respondent on those same dates was not returned to the Department (Tr. p.5), the Board granted the Department's motion to deem allegations admitted. Tr. pp. 5-6.

Following the close of the record, the Board conducted fact finding.

Each member of the Board involved in this decision attests that he or she was present at the hearing, or has reviewed the record, and that this decision is based entirely on the record, the law, and the Board's specialized professional knowledge in evaluating the evidence. *Pet v. Department of Health Services*, 228 Conn. 651 (1994).

#### II

#### **Allegations**

- 1. In paragraph 1 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent of Rogers, Connecticut is, and has been at all times, as referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut registered nurse license number 126819.
- 2. In paragraph 2 of the Charges, the Department alleges that respondent has been diagnosed with an emotional order.
- 3. In paragraph 3 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent has been diagnosed with severe stimulant use disorder—cocaine, and severe opioid use disorder—fentanyl.

- 4. In paragraph 4 of the Charges, the Department alleges that in or about 2021, Respondent abused or utilized fentanyl and/or cocaine to excess.
- 5. In paragraph 5 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent's emotional disorder and/or abuse of fentanyl and/or cocaine does, and/or may, affect her practice as a registered nurse.
- 6. In paragraph 6 of the Charges, the Department alleges that the above-described facts constitute grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b), including, but not limited to,:
  - a.  $\S 20-99(b)(2)$ ;
  - b. § 20-99(b)(4); and/or
  - c. § 20-99(b)(5).

- 1. On August 12, 2021, the Summary Suspension Order, Charges, and Notice were sent to Respondent via first class mail at 54 Litchfield Avenue, P.O. Box 143, Rogers, CT 06263, Respondent's address of record on file with the Department. The correspondence was also sent to <a href="mailto:leahhhp@gmail.com">leahhhp@gmail.com</a>, Respondent's email address of record on file with the Department. Bd. Ex. 4.
- 2. On August 13, 2021, a Corrected Notice was sent to Respondent via first class mail at 54 Litchfield Avenue, P.O. Box 143, Rogers, CT 06263, Respondent's address of record on file with the Department. - 5. In 2021, Respondent abused or utilized fentanyl and/or cocaine to excess. Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, p. 1 (under seal).

- 6. Respondent was diagnosed with severe stimulant use disorder and severe opiate use disorder. Respondent used cocaine intravenously for approximately four months, used fentanyl intravenously daily for approximately two years, and smoked fentanyl for approximately five years. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 1, 25, 42-44 (under seal).
- 7. Respondent reported using drugs while at work and being high on the job. Respondent also called out sick and was late for shifts, resulting in her termination from her last job. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 1, 25, 44 (under seal).
- 8. Since May 2021, the Department has not been able to reach Respondent by phone or email. Respondent has failed to respond to the Department's correspondence. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 1-2 (under seal).
- 9. From May 20, 2021 to May 10, 2021, during Respondent' stay in a 21-day residential treatment program, Respondent expressed ambivalence about being sober, continuing therapy, and participating in intensive outpatient treatment ("IOP"). Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2 (under seal).
- 10. Respondent's emotional disorder and/or abuse of fentanyl and/or cocaine does, and/or may, affect her practice as a registered nurse.
- 11. The factual allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 5 of the Charges are deemed admitted and true. Tr. pp. 5-6.
- 12. The Department is unable to assess and determine Respondent's fitness to practice nursing with reasonable skill and safety. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2 (under seal).

# Discussion and Conclusions of Law

The Department bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence in this matter. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Department sustained its burden of proof with respect to the allegations contained in the Charges.

Pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b)(2) and 20-99(b)(4) and (5), the Board is authorized to discipline the license of a nurse who fails to conform to the accepted standards of practice of the nursing profession, including, but not limited to, illegal conduct, incompetence, or negligence in carrying out usual nursing functions, emotional disorder or mental illness, or abuse or excessive use of drugs, including alcohol.

Since Respondent did not file an Answer, the allegations are deemed admitted. *See*, Conn. Agencies Regs. § 19a-9-20. Therefore, the Department has established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent's abuse and excessive use of cocaine and fentanyl affects her ability to practice. Findings of Fact ("FF") 5-12.

The record establishes that in early April 2021, Respondent sought emergency treatment for her substance abuse of controlled substances. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 1 (under seal). Subsequently, Respondent was diagnosed with severe stimulant use disorder and severe opiate use disorder (FF 6). On April 20, 2021, Respondent was admitted to a substance abuse treatment facility for a 21-day detoxification and residential treatment program. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 1 (under seal).

The record shows that Respondent started using controlled substances consistently at age 22. Respondent reported that prior to her stay in residential treatment in April and May 2021, her longest period of sobriety was four days in duration. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 44 (under seal).

Respondent used cocaine intravenously for approximately four months, fentanyl intravenously daily for approximately two years, and smoked fentanyl for approximately five years. FF 7. Respondent reported using drugs while at work and being high on the job. Respondent also called out sick and was late for shifts, resulting in her termination from her last job. *Id*.

Since May 10, 2021, when Respondent completed a 21-day detoxification and residential treatment program, the Department has not been able to reach her by phone or email. Moreover, Respondent has failed to respond to the Department's correspondence. FF 8.

Throughout her stay in the 21-day residential treatment program, Respondent expressed ambivalence about being sober, continuing therapy, and participating in IOP. FF 9.

The Department has established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent's emotional disorder and/or abuse of fentanyl and/or cocaine does, and/or may, affect her practice as a registered nurse. FF 10. Moreover, the Department is unable to assess and determine Respondent's fitness to practice nursing with reasonable skill and safety. FF 12.

Thus, the Board concludes that Respondent's conduct, as deemed to be admitted and true, constitutes grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b)(2), 20-99(b)(4) and (5), and 19a-17.

#### Order

Based on the record in this case, the above findings of fact, and conclusions of law, the Board orders that Leah Pressley's registered nurse license number 126819 is hereby **revoked**.

On September 14, 2021, the Department notified the parties that the September 15, 2021, hearing was rescheduled to November 17, 2021. Bd. Ex. 5. Respondent was notified of the new hearing date by email and first-class mail. *Id*.

On November 17, 2021, the Board convened the hearing. Respondent was present at the hearing but was not represented by legal counsel. Attorney Joelle Newton represented the Department. Tr. p. 3.

Following the close of the record, the Board conducted fact finding.

- 4. In paragraph 4 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on or about September 18, 2014, Respondent answered "no" when asked whether she had any disciplinary action taken against her [L.P.N. license] since her last Connecticut renewal.
- 5. In paragraph 5 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on or about June 12, 2020, the Alabama Board of Nursing issued a Consent Order, ABN Case Number 2020-0552 placing a reprimand on Respondent's Alabama licensed practical nurse license number 246894. The disciplinary action resulted from, in part, failing to disclose the Texas Order.
- 6. In paragraph 6 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on or about September 28, 2020, Respondent answered "no" when asked whether she had any disciplinary action taken against her [L.P.N. license]since her last Connecticut renewal.

¹ The Texas Eligibility Order was issued after the Texas Board of Nursing reviewed Respondent's application for licensure by endorsement. Dept. Ex. 3. Based on this review, the Texas Board disciplined Respondent's license for failure to disclose the Alabama Consent Order issued in 2004.

7. In paragraph 7 of the Charges, the Department alleges that the above-described facts constitute grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(f) and 20-99(b), including, but not limited to, § 20-99(b)(2).

- 1. Respondent, of Jemison, Alabama, is, and has been at all times, as referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut L.P.N. license number 030756. Tr. p. 9.
- 2. On or about November 19, 2004, the Alabama Board of Nursing issued a Consent Order placing Respondent's Alabama licensed practical nurse license number 246894 on probation ("Alabama Consent Order"). The Alabama Board of Nursing issued the Consent Order after it found that Respondent had practiced beyond the scope of her practice. Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, pp. 1-3; Dept. Ex. 2, pp. 1-6; Tr. pp. 9, 15-17.
- 3. On or about April 2, 2014, the Texas Board of Nursing issued an Eligibility Order ("Texas Order"). This disciplinary action resulted from Respondent's failure to disclose the Alabama Consent Order to the Texas Board of Nursing when she applied for a Texas nursing license by endorsement. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 1-3; Dept. Ex. 3, pp. 1-7; Tr. pp. 9-10.
- 4. On or about September 18, 2014, Respondent completed a Connecticut L.P.N license renewal application. In response to an inquiry on the application, Respondent reported that no disciplinary action had been taken against her license since the previous renewal of her Connecticut L.P.N. license. Tr. p. 10; Dept. Ex. 1, p. 3.
- 5. On or about June 12, 2020, the Alabama Board of Nursing issued a Consent Order, ABN Case Number 2020-0552, placing a reprimand on Respondent's Alabama licensed practical nurse license number 246894. The disciplinary action resulted, in part, from Respondent's failure to disclose the Texas Order. Tr. pp. 10, 19; Dept. Ex. 1, p. 3; Dept. Ex. 5, pp. 1-5.
- 6. On or about September 28, 2020, Respondent completed a Connecticut L.P.N. license renewal application. In response to an inquiry on the application, Respondent reported that no disciplinary action had been taken against her license since the previous renewal of her Connecticut L.P.N. license renewal. Tr. pp. 11-13, 17-21; Dept. Ex. 1, p. 3; Dept. Ex. 4, pp. 1-3; Dept. Ex. 6, pp. 1-3.

# Discussion and Conclusions of Law

The Department bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence in this matter. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Department sustained its burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence with regard to all of the allegations contained in the Charges.

Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99 provides, in pertinent part:

- (a) The Board . . . shall have jurisdiction to hear all charges of conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession brought against persons licensed to practice nursing. After holding a hearing . . . said board, if it finds such person to be guilty, may revoke or suspend his or her license or take any of the actions set forth in section 19a-17. . . .
- (b) Conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession includes, but is not limited to, the following: . . . (2) illegal conduct, incompetence, or negligence in carrying out usual nursing functions.

Conn Gen. Stat. § 19a-17 provides, in pertinent part:

(f) Such board . . . may take disciplinary action against a practitioner's license or permit as a result of the practitioner having been subject to disciplinary action . . . by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of any state . . .

Under Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-17(f), the Board can discipline the license of a nurse that has been disciplined by another state. Additionally, under Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99(b)(2), the Board can discipline the license of a nurse who fails to conform to the accepted standards of practice of the nursing profession,

Respondent admitted to all of the allegations contained in the Charges, except the allegation contained in paragraph 6. Nonetheless, the Board finds that with respect to the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 6, inclusive, of the Charges, the Department sustained its burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence. Findings of Fact ("FF") 1-6.

There is no dispute that Respondent, of Jemison, Alabama, is, and has been at all times, as referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut L.P.N. license number 030756. Thus, the Department satisfied its burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence with respect to paragraph 1. FF 1.

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 2 of the Charges, the record establishes that on or about November 19, 2004, the Alabama Board of Nursing issued a Consent Order placing Respondent's Alabama licensed practical nurse license number 246894 on probation for practicing beyond the scope of her practice. FF 2. The Alabama Board of Nursing issued the Consent Order after it found that Respondent had inappropriately participated in the sharp debridement of a patient's wound which was both beyond the scope of Respondent's practice and performed without a physician's order. Dept. Ex. 1, p. During the November 17, 2021, hearing, Respondent repeatedly testified that she did not practice beyond the scope of her practice by participating in the patient's wound care. (Tr. pp. 15-17.) She further testified that the registered nurse who was involved in the sharp debridement of the patient's wound could corroborate her testimony and is willing to do so. (Tr. pp. 15-17, 21). Respondent stated that in retrospect, she regrets not obtaining legal counsel and pursuing legal action to refute the charge that she practiced beyond the scope of her practice. (Tr. pp. 15-17.) Respondent testified that she agreed to sign the Consent order because she was afraid and ignorant of the law. (Tr. pp. 15-17.) Respondent stated, "I didn't know, I was afraid, I didn't know how to operate or how to do what needed to be done to not get this on my license . . ." (Tr. p. 15.) In accordance with the Consent Order, Respondent agreed to pay a fine of \$250 and successfully complete an approved course in wound care. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2; Dept. Ex. p. 2. On or about November 22, 2004, the terms of Respondent's probation were satisfied. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2. Thus, with respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 2 of the Charges, the Department met its burden of proof.

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 3 of the Charges alleging that the Texas Board of Nursing issued an Eligibility Order regarding Respondent's failure to disclose the Alabama Consent Order when she applied for a Texas nursing license by endorsement, the Department satisfied its burden of proof. FF 3. While there is no dispute that the Texas Board issued such an Eligibility Order (Dept. Ex. 3), Respondent testified that she was not aware that she was required to disclose the 2004 Alabama Consent Order in her application to the Texas Board. Tr. pp. 15-16. Respondent further testified that until Texas issued its Eligibility Order, she was not aware that the Alabama Consent Order remained a part of her record. *Id*. Respondent testified that because she had satisfied the requirements of the Alabama Consent Oder in a matter of days after it went into effect by paying the \$250 fine and attending a course in wound care, she believed that the 2004 Alabama Consent Order was no longer a part of her

record. *Id.* The record establishes that on November 22, 2004, Respondent's probation status was cleared after Respondent satisfied the 2004 Alabama Consent Order by paying a \$250 fine and successfully completing a Board-approved course in wound care. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2. However, the record establishes, and Respondent admits, that she failed to disclose the 2004 Alabama Consent Order to the Texas Board when she applied for a Texas nursing license by endorsement. Therefore, with respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 3 of the Charges, the Department satisfied its burden of proof.

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 4 of the Charges, the record establishes, and Respondent admits, that on or about September 18, 2014, Respondent completed a Connecticut L.P.N. license renewal application and, upon inquiry, reported that she had not had any disciplinary action taken against her license since the previous renewal of her Connecticut L.P.N. license. FF 4. The Department's review of Respondent's Connecticut renewal applications for the years 2010-2014 found no evidence that Respondent reported the 2004 Alabama or the 2014 Texas disciplinary actions on any of her renewal applications or within thirty following those disciplinary actions as required by Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-12e.² Dept. Ex. 1, p. 3. Thus, the Department established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent failed to disclose on her Connecticut nursing license renewal applications that the states of Alabama and Texas had imposed disciplinary action against her license in 2004 and 2014, respectively.

Paragraph 5 of the Charges alleges that on or about June 12, 2020, the Alabama Board of Nursing issued a Consent Order, ABN Case Number 2020-0552, placing a reprimand on Respondent's Alabama licensed practical nurse license number 246894. The disciplinary action resulted, in part, from Respondent's failure to disclose the 2014 Texas Order. FF 5.

The record establishes that on January 10, 2020, Respondent applied for a L.P.N. multistate licensure. While there is no dispute that she had successfully completed the terms of the 2004 Alabama Consent Order (Dept. Ex. 1, p.2.), in its review of Respondent's January 2020 application, the Alabama Nursing Board learned that Respondent had failed to disclose the discipline the Texas Board imposed on her license in 2014. Dept. Ex. 5, pp. 1-5. Subsequently,

² Conn, Gen. Stat. §19a-12e (e) states in pertinent part: "A health care professional shall report to the department any disciplinary action . . . taken against the health care professional by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of any state, . . . not later than thirty days after such action."

on June 12, 2020, the Alabama Board approved her multi-state licensure application, ordered her to pay a fine of \$300, and issued a public reprimand on her license. Dept. Ex. 5, p. 4. Thus, the Department satisfied its burden of proof with respect to the allegations in paragraph 5.

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 6 of the Charges, the Respondent initially appeared to admit to the allegation. (Tr. pp. 12-13.). However, upon further inquiry from the Board, the Respondent appeared to deny the allegation. (Tr. p. 13.) The record establishes that on or about September 28, 2020, Respondent completed a Connecticut L.P.N. license renewal application, reporting that she had not had any disciplinary action taken against her license since the previous renewal of her Connecticut L.P.N. license. FF 6.

In her testimony, Respondent could not recall the date when she first learned about the June 2020 Alabama Consent Order but admitted that she was aware of it on or about September 28, 2020, when she completed her Connecticut L.P.N. license renewal application. Tr. pp. 19-20. She testified that the answers she provided in her 2020 Connecticut license renewal application were in error because she did not read the application questions carefully. (Tr. p. 20.) Respondent testified that she will be more careful next time. Tr. pp. 21-22. Based on the evidence presented, and the Respondent's admission, the Department satisfied its burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence with respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 6

Based on the foregoing, the Board finds that the Department has established by a preponderance of the evidence that the conduct admitted, in conjunction with the Department's sustaining of its burden of proof, renders Respondent's license subject to sanctions, including, among others, revocation, suspension, or probation. *See* Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(a)(1), (2) and (5), and 19a-17(f). Therefore, such conduct that is admitted as true is sufficient grounds on which to impose disciplinary action on Respondent's license pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99(b)(2). FF 1-6.

#### $\mathbf{V}$

#### Order

Based on the record in this case, the above findings of fact, and the conclusions of law, the Board hereby orders with respect to Respondent's L.P.N. license number 030756 the following disciplinary action: Respondent's license number 030756 to practice as a licensed practical nurse in the State of Connecticut is hereby reprimanded.

This Order is effective on the date it is signed by the Board.

The Board hereby informs Respondent, Dazella Smith-Peoples, and the Department of this decision.

#### **MEMORANDUM OF DECISION**

I

#### Procedural Background

On July 19, 2021, the Department of Public Health ("Department") filed a Statement of Charges with the Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board"). Board ("Bd.") Exhibit ("Ex.") 1. The Statement of Charges allege violations of Chapter 378 of the General Statutes of Connecticut ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") by Nichelle Robinson ("Respondent"), which would subject Respondent's registered nurse ("R.N.") license No. 069635 to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17 and 20-99(b). *Id*.

On July 19, 2021, the Department filed a Motion for Summary Suspension ("Motion") with the Board. Bd. Ex. 2.

Based on the allegations in the Statement of Charges and the affidavits and reports attached to the Motion, the Board found that Respondent's continued nursing practice presented a clear and immediate danger to public health and safety. Accordingly, on July 21, 2021, pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 4-182(c) and 19a-17(c), the Board ordered that Respondent's R.N. license be summarily suspended pending a final determination by the Board of the allegations contained in the Statement of Charges ("Summary Suspension Order"). Bd. Ex. 3.

On July 22, 2021, the Summary Suspension Order, Statement of Charges and Notice of Hearing ("Notice"), were emailed to Respondent at <a href="michelle0915@gmail.com">nichelle0915@gmail.com</a>, her email address of record on file with the Department. The Notice informed Respondent that a hearing was scheduled for August 11, 2021. Bd. Ex. 4.

On August 9, 2021, the Department filed a Motion to Amend the Statement of Charges. Bd. Ex. 6, 7. The Motion was filed in order to clarify the language contained in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the original Statement of Charges and to include an additional allegation, contained in paragraph 5, with subparagraphs 5a through 5h, to the original Statement of Charges. Tr. 8/11/2021, pp. 7-11.

The hearing was held on August 11, 2021 and October 20, 2021. Respondent appeared at the hearing and was not represented by counsel. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 3. Attorney Leslie Scoville represented the Department on both days of the hearing. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 4.

At the outset of the hearing, the Board granted the Department's Motion to Amend the Statement of Charges ("Charges") Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 12.

Prior to the first day of the hearing, Respondent had not filed an Answer to the Charges. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 13. During the hearing, Respondent orally answered the Charges on the record. Tr. 8/11/2021, pp. 13-24.

During the hearing, the Board left the record open in order to allow Respondent an opportunity to submit documentary evidence. Tr. 8/11/2021, pp. 28-31; Tr. 10/20/2021, p. 3.

On September 16, 2021, the Department sent a Notice of Rescheduled Hearing to Respondent's email address of record at <a href="mailto:nichelle0915@gmail.com">nichelle0915@gmail.com</a>, and by first class mail to her address of record at 120 Main Street, Apt. 7, Meriden, CT 06451. Bd. Ex. 5. The Notice of Rescheduled Hearing informed that a continued hearing was scheduled for October 20, 2021. The purpose of the rescheduled hearing was to reopen the record in order to allow Respondent to enter into evidence documents that she had not presented prior to, or during, the August 11, 2021 hearing, and to allow the parties to present revised closing arguments. Bd. Ex. 8.

On or about October 13, 2021, Respondent submitted to the Department a late-filed document consisting of three pages. The document evidenced Respondent's successful completion of the two courses she was required to take pursuant to the Board's February 17, 2021, Memorandum of Decision.¹

Following the close of the record at the hearing on October 20, 2021, the Board conducted fact finding.

Each member of the Board involved in this decision attests that he or she was present at the hearing or has reviewed the record, and that this decision is based entirely on the record, the law, and the Board's specialized professional knowledge in evaluating the evidence. *Pet v. Department of Health Services*, 228 Conn. 651 (1994).

¹ On or about October 13, 2021, Respondent filed a three-page document consisting of a copy of a transcript and a copy of a certificate of course completion from the National Council of State Boards of Nursing ("NCSBN"). The document was labeled as Respondent ("Resp.") Ex. 1 for identification purposes and entered into the record. The transcript listed the courses as follows: Ethics of Nursing Practice v6.5 and Medication Errors: Causes & Prevention v2.5. The Ethics of Nursing Practice v6.5 certificate identifies August 10, 2021 as the completion date and 4.8 as the number of contact hours. The Medication Errors course was completed on May 10, 2021, with 4 contact hours. Resp. Ex. 1.

#### Allegations

- 1. In paragraph 1 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent of Meriden, Connecticut, 06451 is and has been at all times referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut R.N. license number 069635.
- 2. In paragraph 2 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on February 1, 2021, the Board issued a Memorandum of Decision in Petition Number 2018-1078 ("Memorandum of Decision"), effective February 17, 2021, that placed Respondent's R.N. license on probation for six months.
- 3. In paragraph 3 of the Charges, the Department alleges that such disciplinary action was a result of Respondent's signing the name of her Director of Nursing on a Controlled Substance Drug Order form, for ordering Tramadol and Lyrica, and failure to document accurately medical records for two patients regarding the administration and waste of oxycodone/APAP and oxycodone.
- 4. In paragraph 4 of the Charges, the Department alleges that said Memorandum of Decision specifically provided, in part, that:
  - a. the Department shall pre-approve Respondent's employment and/or change of employment within the nursing profession;
  - b. Respondent shall provide a copy of the Memorandum of Decision to any and all employers if employed as a nurse during the probationary period. The Department shall be notified in writing by any employer(s) within 30 days of the commencement of employment, as to receipt of a copy of this Memorandum of Decision;
  - c. Respondent shall not administer, count, or have access to controlled substances, or have responsibility for such activities in the course of performing her nursing duties during the probationary period;
  - d. During the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent, at her expense, shall successfully complete a course in medication administration and documentation that is pre-approved by the Department. Respondent shall provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of the course within 30 days;
  - e. During the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent, at her expense, shall successfully complete a course in ethics that is pre-approved by the Department. Respondent shall provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of the course with 30 days of completion;
  - f. If employed as a nurse, Respondent shall cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor commencing with the report due on the first business day of the month following employment as a nurse. Employer reports shall be submitted monthly for the entire probationary period;

- g. If employed as a nurse, Respondent shall cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor during the entire probationary period. Employer reports shall be submitted commencing with the report due on the first business day of the month for the entire probationary period.
- 5, In paragraph 5 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent failed to comply with the above-referenced Memorandum of Decision in one or more of the following ways:
  - a. Respondent failed to notify the Department of her employment and/or change of employment;
  - b. Respondent failed to provide a copy of the above-referenced Memorandum of Decision to any and all employers if employed as a nurse during the probationary period and/or Respondent failed to cause her employer(s), within 30 days of the commencement of Respondent's employment, as to receipt of the Memorandum of Decision;
  - c. Respondent administered, counted and/or had access to controlled substances and/or Respondent had responsibility for said activities in the course of performing her nursing duties during the probationary period;
  - d. During the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent, at her expense, failed to complete successfully a course in medication administration and documentation that is pre-approved by the Department. Respondent failed to provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of said course within 30 days;
  - e. Respondent failed to complete, at her expense, a course in ethics that is preapproved by the Department during the first three months of her probationary period, and/or, failed to provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of the course within 30 days of completion;
  - f. Respondent failed to cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor commencing with the report due on the first business day of the month following employment as a nurse;
  - g. Respondent failed to cause employer reports to be submitted monthly for the entire probationary period; and/or,
  - h. Respondent failed to cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor during the entire probationary period, commencing with the report due on the first business day of the month for the entire probationary period.

### III Findings of Fact

- 1. Respondent of Meriden, Connecticut, 06451 is and has been at all times referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut R.N. license number 069635. Tr. pp. 13-14.
- 2. On February 1, 2021, the Board issued a Memorandum of Decision in Petition Number 2018-1078 ("Memorandum of Decision"), effective February 17, 2021, that placed Respondent's R.N. license on probation for six months. Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, pp. 2-12.

- 3. Such disciplinary action resulted from Respondent's signing the name of her Director of Nursing on a Controlled Substance Drug Order form, for the order of Tramadol and Lyrica, and failing to document accurately medical records for two patients regarding the administration and waste of oxycodone/APAP and oxycodone. Bd. Ex. 1, p. 1; Bd. Ex. 7, p. 1; Dept. Ex. 1, p.13.
- 4. Respondent failed to comply with the February 17, 2021, Memorandum of Decision in one or more of the following ways:
  - a. Respondent failed to notify the Department of her employment and/or change of employment;
  - b. Respondent failed to provide a copy of the above-referenced Memorandum of Decision to her employer while she was employed as a nurse during the probationary period, thereby precluding Respondent's employer from notifying the Department, in writing, of receipt of the Memorandum of Decision within 30 days of the commencement of Respondent's employment;
  - c. Respondent administered, counted, and/or had access to controlled substances and/or Respondent had responsibility for said activities in the course of performing her nursing duties during the probationary period;
  - d. During the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent failed to successfully complete a course² in medication administration and documentation that was pre-approved by the Department and as such, Respondent failed to provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of said course within 30 days of completion of the course;
  - e. During the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent failed to successfully complete a course in ethics that was pre-approved by the Department and as such, Respondent failed to provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of said course within 30 days of completion of the course;
  - f. Respondent failed to ensure that employer reports were submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor on the first business day of the month following her employment as a nurse;
  - g. Respondent failed to ensure that employer reports were submitted, monthly, for the entire probationary period; and/or,
  - h. Respondent failed to ensure employer reports were submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor on the first business day of the month during the entire probationary period.

Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 13-15.

² During the hearing, the Department moved to correct a typographical error in paragraph 4d so that the word "curse" is replaced with the word "course." Tr. 8/11/2021, pp. 24-25. The Board approved the Department's motion unanimously. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 25.

#### Discussion and Conclusions of Law

The Department bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence in this matter. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Department sustained its burden of proof with regard to all of the allegations contained in the Charges.

Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99 provides, in pertinent part,

- (a) The Board . . . shall have jurisdiction to hear all charges of conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession brought against persons licensed to practice nursing. After holding a hearing . . . said board, if it finds such person to be guilty, may revoke or suspend his or her license or take any of the actions set forth in section 19a-17 . . . .
- (b) Conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession.

The Board has jurisdiction to determine whether Respondent's conduct failed to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession. In this matter, Respondent admitted to all of the allegations contained in the Charges Therefore, the Department met its burden of proof with respect to the allegations contained in the Charges. Findings of Fact ("FF") 1-4(a) through 4(h).

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 1 of the Charges, the record establishes, and Respondent admits, that Respondent is, and has been at all times referenced in the Charges, the holder of R.N. license number 069635. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 13-14.

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraph 2 of the Charges, the record establishes, and Respondent admits, that on February 1, 2021, the Board issued a Memorandum of Decision placing Respondent's R.N. license on probation for six months, subject to numerous terms and conditions. The Memorandum of Decision was effective as of February 17, 2021. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 2-12

With regard to the allegations contained in paragraph 3 of the Charges, the record establishes, and Respondent admits that the Board ordered disciplinary action be taken against her license because she improperly signed her director of nurse's name on a Controlled Drug Order Form/Shipping Record/Invoice and ordered Tramadol and Lyrica. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 14-24. Respondent also admitted that such disciplinary action was imposed against her license because she also failed to document two patients' medical records accurately regarding the administration and waste of oxycodone/APAP and oxycodone. Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 14. Thus, the Department met its burden of proof with respect to the allegations in paragraph 3 of the Charges.

With respect to the allegations contained in paragraphs 4 and 5, the record establishes, and Respondent admits that she failed to comply with the probationary terms of the February 17, 2021, Memorandum of Decision.

Specifically, Respondent failed to comply with the terms of her probation as follows: a) Respondent failed to notify the Department of her nursing employment and/or change of employment; b) Respondent failed to provide a copy of the Board's February 1, 2021 Memorandum of Decision to her employer while she was employed as a nurse during her probationary period, thereby precluding her employer from notifying the Department, in writing, of receipt of the Memorandum of Decision within 30 days of the commencement of Respondent's employment; c) Respondent administered, counted, and/or had access to controlled substances and/or Respondent had responsibility for said activities in the course of performing her nursing duties during the probationary period; d) Respondent failed to cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department by her immediate supervisor on the first business day of the month following her employment as a nurse; e) Respondent failed to cause employer reports to be submitted monthly by her immediate supervisor on the first business day of the month and for the entire probationary period. FF 4a-4h.

Although Respondent successfully completed a course on May 10, 2021, in medication administration and documentation during the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent failed to provide proof, to the satisfaction of the Department, of her successful completion of such coursework within 30 days of its completion. Respondent only provided the Department with documentation evidencing her successful completion of the course on October 13, 2021. *Id.* Moreover, while Respondent successfully completed a course in ethics of nursing practice, Respondent failed to complete the ethics course during the first three months of her probationary period. Similarly, she failed to provide proof, to the satisfaction of the Department, of her successful completion of the course within 30 days of its completion. *Id.* Respondent only provided the Department with documentation evidencing her successful completion of said course on October 13, 2021. *Id.* 

In her defense, Respondent stated that she did not understand that she was to have her employment pre-approved by the Department nor that she was to notify her employer of her probationary status. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 14. Respondent erroneously assumed that because she had worked at her former place of employment from June 11, 2018 until March 25, 2021 (Tr. 8/11/2021, pp. 39, 41), that she was not required to notify her employer of her probationary status. Clearly, that assumption was incorrect. The Board finds that Respondent's erroneous

assumption was a violation of the terms of her probation. Moreover, from February 17, 2021 to March 25, 2021, Respondent worked full time as a nursing supervisor. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 14; Tr. 8/11/2021, p. 40. As a nursing supervisor, she had access to controlled substances, which also constituted a violation of the terms of her probation. *Id*.

Further, Respondent stated to her former director of nursing services (Dept. Ex. 1, p. 14), and later testified, that she thought that her probationary period was the length of time between the allegations under review and the Board's final decision based on its findings. Tr. 8/11/2021, pp. 34-36, 83-84. This belief was likewise incorrect. Due to unforeseen circumstances, including the COVID-19 pandemic, almost a year had elapsed from the date of her February 19, 2020, hearing regarding Petition No. 2018-1078 and the issuance of the Board's February 1, 2021, Memorandum of Decision.

Based on Respondent's admissions and the Department's sustaining its burden of proof, Respondent's license is subject to sanctions, including among others, revocation, suspension, or probation. *See* Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(a)(1), (2) and (5). Therefore, the Board concludes that Respondent's conduct as discussed above constitutes grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b) and §19a-17.

Despite her failure to comply fully with the terms of her probation, Respondent successfully completed the coursework in medication administration and documentation and ethics of nursing practice. Resp. Ex. 1. Moreover, Respondent's former director of nursing services stated in her April 20, 2021, correspondence to the Department that during Respondent's employment, there were no performance and/or safety issues with regard to resident/patient safety. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 61. Therefore, the Board finds that Respondent's course work requirements have been satisfied and that Respondent can practice nursing with reasonable skill and safety under the terms of the Order below.

V

#### Order

Based on the record in this case, the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, and pursuant to the authority vested in it by Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(a)(1), (2) and (5) and 20-99(b), the Board finds that the conduct alleged and proven warrants the disciplinary action imposed by this Order. Therefore, the Board hereby orders, with respect to Respondent's R.N. license number 069635, the following:

Page 9 of 11

- Respondent's license shall be placed on probation for a period of six months under the following terms and conditions. If any of the conditions of probation are not met, Respondent's R.N. license may be subject to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-17.
- 2. Respondent's license number 069635 to practice as a registered nurse in the State of Connecticut is hereby reprimanded.
  - A. During the period of probation, the Department shall pre-approve Respondent's employment and/or change of employment within the nursing profession.
  - B. Respondent shall not be employed as a nurse for a personnel provider service, assisted living services agency, homemaker-home health aide agency, or home health care agency, and shall not be self-employed as a nurse during the probationary period.
  - C. Respondent shall provide a copy of this Decision to any and all employers if employed as a nurse during the probationary period. The Department shall be notified in writing by any employer(s), within 30 days of the commencement of employment, as to receipt of a copy of this Decision.
  - D. Respondent shall not administer, count, or have access to controlled substances, or have responsibility for such activities in the course of performing her nursing duties during the probationary period.
  - E. If employed as a nurse, Respondent shall cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department, by her immediate supervisor during the entire probationary period. Employer reports shall be submitted commencing with the report due on the first business day of the month following employment as a nurse. Employer reports shall be submitted monthly for the entire probationary period.
  - F. The employer reports cited in Paragraph E above shall include documentation of Respondent's ability to practice nursing safely and competently. Employer reports shall be submitted directly to the Department at the address cited in Paragraph K below.
  - G. Should Respondent's employment as a nurse be involuntarily terminated or suspended, Respondent and her employer shall notify the Department within 72 hours of such termination or suspension.
  - H. In the event Respondent is not employed as a nurse for periods of 30 consecutive days or longer, she shall notify the Department in writing. Such periods of time

shall not be counted in reducing the probationary period covered by this Order and such terms shall be held in abeyance. During such time period, Respondent shall not be responsible for complying with the terms of probation of this Order. In the event Respondent resumes the practice of nursing, she shall provide the Department with 15 days prior written notice.

- I. If Respondent pursues further training in any subject area that is regulated by the Department, Respondent shall provide a copy of this Decision to the educational institution or, if not an institution, to Respondent's instructor. Such institution or instructor shall notify the Department in writing as to receipt of a copy of this Decision within 15 days of receipt. Said notification shall be submitted directly to the Department at the address cited in Paragraph K below.
- J. The Department must be informed in writing prior to any change of address.
- K. All communications, payments if required, correspondence, and reports are to be addressed to:

3. Any deviation from the terms of probation, without prior written approval by the Board, shall constitute a violation of probation, which will be cause for an immediate hearing on charges of violating this Order. Any finding that Respondent has violated this Order will subject Respondent to sanctions under Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(a) and (c), including but not limited to, the revocation of her license. Any extension of time or grace period for reporting granted by the Board shall not be a waiver of or preclude the Board's right to take subsequent action. The Board shall not be required to grant future extensions of time or grace periods. Notice of revocation or other disciplinary action shall be sent to Respondent's address of record which is deemed to be the most current address reported to the Practitioner Licensing and Investigations Section of the Healthcare Quality and Safety Branch of the Department.

- 6. On or about August 23, 2021, the Department granted respondent a Reinstatement Consent Order (hereinafter "the RCO") in petition 2021-344 that placed respondent's nursing license on probation for two (2) years.
- 7. The RCO required, in part, that respondent shall not obtain or use controlled substances unless prescribed for a legitimate therapeutic purpose by a licensed health care professional and that all urine screes be negative for the presence of drugs and alcohol.
- 8. On or about November 23, 2021, respondent's urine screen tested positive for opiates.
- 9. Respondent's conduct as described above constitutes a violation of the terms of probation as set forth in the RCO, and subjects respondent's license to revocation or other disciplinary action authorized by Connecticut General Statutes, §§19a-17 and 20-99(b).

- 2. On or about November 17, 2020, in relation to a complaint regarding the offensive conduct, and in the matter assigned the Massachusetts Board of Registration in Nursing (hereinafter the "Mass. Board") Docket Number of NUR-2020-0209, the Mass Board summarily suspended respondent's license to practice licensed practical nursing and, thereafter, on or about November 24, 2020, it conducted an evidentiary hearing in the matter. Thereafter, the Mass Board entered an order, effective June 14, 2021, which ordered "'Summary Suspension shall

- remain in effect until the adjudication of the merits of the complaint, including any judicial review thereof, or until other final disposition of the complaint by the Board.'
- 3. On or about December 1, 2021, the Mass. Board and respondent entered into a Consent Agreement for Surrender Followed by Probation as a full and final disposition of the complaint filed in Docket Number of NUR-2020-0209; and therein, respondent admitted to engaging in the offensive conduct.
- 4. The admissions included in the preceding paragraphs set forth facts that constitute grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to the Connecticut General Statutes §§19a-17 and 20-99(b) including, but not limited to:
  - a.  $\S19a-17(f)$ , and
  - b. §20-99(b)(2).

WHEREAS, respondent, in consideration of this Consent Order, has chosen not to contest the above-admitted violation(s) or allegation(s) at a hearing before the Board of Examiners for Nursing (hereinafter "the Board"). Respondent agrees that for the purpose of this or any future proceedings before the Board this Consent Order shall have the same effect as if ordered after a full hearing pursuant to §§19a-9, 19a-10, and 20-99(a) of the General Statutes of Connecticut.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to §19a-17 and §20-99(a) of the General Statutes of Connecticut, respondent hereby stipulates and agrees to the following:

- 1. Respondent waives respondent's right to a hearing on the merits of this matter.
- Respondent's license number 026799 to practice as a licensed practical nurse in the State of Connecticut is hereby reprimanded.
- 3. Respondent's license to practice as a licensed practical nurse in the State of Connecticut is hereby placed on probation for six months, subject to the following terms and conditions:

- A. During the period of probation, respondent shall attend and successfully complete the following coursework:
  - (1) Six (6) hours on Care of Elderly with Cognitive Impairment or Dementia;
  - (2) Three (3) hours on the Legal and Ethical Aspects of Nursing; and
  - (3) Three (3) hours on Patient Rights in Nursing.

Within fifteen days of the effective date of this Consent Order or within fifteen days of the completion of such coursework, whichever is later, respondent shall provide the Department with proof, to the Department's satisfaction, of the successful completion thereof. Respondent's probation shall terminate upon the Department's written satisfaction of the successful completion of the coursework required by this paragraph.

- B. Respondent shall not be employed as a nurse for a personnel provider service, assisted living services agency, homemaker home health aide agency, or home health care agency, and shall not be self-employed as a nurse for the period of probation.
- C. Respondent shall provide a copy of this Consent Order to any and all employers if employed as a nurse during the probationary period. The Department shall be notified in writing by any employer(s) within fifteen (15) days of the commencement of employment or within fifteen days of the effective date of this Consent Order, whichever is later, as to the receipt of a copy of this Consent Order.
- D. Respondent shall notify the Department in writing of any change of employment within fifteen (15) days of such change.
- E. Respondent shall notify the Department of any change in respondent's home or business address within fifteen (15) days of such change.

- F. If respondent pursues further training in, or is engaged at the time of the implementation of the Consent Order in, an educational program in any subject area that is regulated by the Department, respondent shall provide a copy of this Consent Order to the educational institution or, if not an institution, to respondent's instructor. Such institution or instructor shall notify the Department of receipt of the Consent Order within fifteen (15) days of receipt.
- G. All reports required by the terms of this Consent Order shall be due according to a schedule to be established by the Department of Public Health.
- H. All correspondence and reports shall be addressed to:

- 4. Respondent shall comply with all federal and state statutes and regulations applicable to respondent's profession.
- 5. Any violation of the terms of this Consent Order without prior written approval by the

  Department shall constitute grounds for the Department to seek revocation of respondent's

  nursing license following notice and an opportunity to be heard. Respondent shall pay all costs

  necessary to comply with this Consent Order.
- 6. Any extension of time or grace period for reporting granted by the Department shall not be a waiver or preclude the Department's right to take action at a later time. The Department shall not be required to grant future extensions of time or grace periods.

- 7. Legal notice of any action shall be deemed sufficient if sent to respondent's last known address of record reported to the Practitioner Licensing and Investigations Section of the Healthcare Quality and Safety Branch of the Department.
- 8. This Consent Order is effective on the first day of the month immediately following the month in which this Consent Order is approved and accepted by the Board.
- 9. Respondent understands this Consent Order is a matter of public record.
- 10. Respondent understands and agrees that this Consent Order shall be deemed as evidence of the above-admitted violations in any proceeding before the Board in which (1) respondent's compliance with this same Consent Order is at issue, or (2) respondent's compliance with §20-99(b) of the General Statutes of Connecticut, as amended, is at issue. Further, respondent understands that any discipline imposed by this Consent Order shall be reported to the National Practitioner Data Bank maintained by the United States Department of Health and Human Services.
- 11. In the event respondent violates a term of this Consent Order, respondent agrees immediately to refrain from practicing as a nurse, upon request by the Department, for a period not to exceed 45 days. During that time period, respondent further agrees to cooperate with the Department in its investigation of the violation, and to submit to and complete a medical, psychiatric or psychological evaluation, if requested to do so by the Department; and, that the results of the evaluation shall be submitted directly to the Department. Respondent further agrees that failure to cooperate with the Department in its investigation during said 45 day period shall constitute grounds for the Department to seek a summary suspension of respondent's license. In any such summary action, respondent stipulates that failure to cooperate with the Department's investigation shall be considered by the Board and shall be

given due weight by the Board in determining whether respondent's conduct constitutes a clear and immediate danger as required pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes, sections 4-182(c) and 19a-17(c). The Department and respondent understand that the Board has complete and final discretion as to whether a summary suspension is ordered.

12. In the event respondent does not practice as a licensed practical nurse for periods of thirty (30) consecutive days or longer, respondent shall notify the Department in writing. Such periods of time shall not be counted in reducing the probationary period covered by this Consent Order and such terms shall be held in abeyance. During such time period, respondent shall not be responsible for complying with the terms of probation of this Consent Order. In the event respondent resumes practice as a licensed practical nurse, respondent shall provide the Department with thirty (30) days prior written notice. Respondent shall not return practice as a licensed practical nurse without written pre-approval from the Department. Respondent agrees that the Department, in its complete discretion, may require additional documentation from respondent and/or require respondent to satisfy other conditions or terms as a condition precedent to respondent's return to practice.

If requested to do so by the Department, respondent further agrees to complete the following:

 a. Attend and successfully complete coursework, remediation, and/or retraining preapproved by the Department. Upon completion, respondent shall provide the Department with proof, to the Department's satisfaction, of successful completion.

Respondent agrees that any return to practice as a licensed practical nurse without preapproval from the Department shall constitute a violation of this Consent Order and may subject the respondent to further disciplinary action.

- 13. If, during the period of probation, respondent practices nursing outside Connecticut, respondent shall provide written notice to the Department concerning such practice. During such time period, respondent shall not be responsible for complying with the terms of probation of this Consent Order, and such time period shall not be counted in reducing the probationary period covered by this Consent Order. Respondent may comply with the terms of probation while practicing outside Connecticut if pre-approved by the Department. In the event respondent intends to return to the practice of nursing in Connecticut, respondent shall provide the Department with thirty (30) days prior written notice and agrees to comply with all terms and conditions contained in paragraph 3 above.
- 14. In the event respondent violates any term of this Consent Order, said violation may also constitute grounds for the Department to seek a summary suspension of respondent's license before the Board.
- 15. This Consent Order and terms set forth herein are not subject to reconsideration, collateral attack or judicial review under any form or in any forum. Respondent agrees that this Consent Order shall not be subject to modification as a result of any claim that the terms contained herein may result in action by third parties, including, but not limited to, healthcare facilities and/or credentialing or licensure boards and respondent waives any right to seek reconsideration or modification of this Consent Order pursuant to §4-181a of the General Statutes of Connecticut without the express consent and agreement of the Department. Respondent assumes all responsibility for assessing such actions prior to the execution of this document. Further, this Consent Order is not subject to appeal or review under the provisions of Chapters 54 and 368a of the General Statutes of Connecticut, provided

- that this stipulation shall not deprive respondent of any other rights that respondent may have under the laws of the State of Connecticut or of the United States.
- 16. Respondent permits a representative of the Department to present this Consent Order and the factual basis for this Consent Order to the Board. The Department and respondent agree that the Board has complete and final discretion as to whether an executed Consent Order is approved or accepted. Respondent hereby waives any claim of error that could be raised that is related to or arises during the course of the Board's discussions regarding whether to approve or reject this Consent Order and/or a Board member's participation during this process, through the Board member's review or comments, including but not limited to bias or reliance on evidence outside the administrative record if this matter proceeds to a hearing on a statement of charges resulting in a proposed decision and/or final decision by the Board.
