


Campus Organizational Chart

This letter is intended to serve as official notification of the Griffin School of Allied Health Careers' interest in bringing forth to the Board of Examiners for Nursing for an approval to a second campus at our Naugatuck instructional site, located at 727 Rubber Avenue, Naugatuck, CT 06770 with an anticipated start date of June 12, 2023. The new campus is a secondary site, with the inaugural site located at 300 Seymour Avenue, Suite 206, Derby, CT 06418. On June 12th, 2023 we will be poised to accommodate 200 additional students to enter our approved practical nursing program.

The urgency in having the second site stems from Stone Academy's abrupt closure prior to the completion of training for those currently enrolled at the institution. There were over 1,200 active students at the time of the school's closure; nine hundred (900) of them were enrolled in the LPN Program. The Connecticut Office of Higher Education (OHE) is working diligently to facilitate the transfer of students stranded by the Stone Academy closure to one of the other Connecticut schools that have an LPN program. The Griffin School of Allied Health Careers Practical Nursing Program was listed as one of the 3 schools that can accommodate Stone Academy LPN Program students.

Griffin Health has been asked by the Connecticut Office of the Attorney General, William Tong, Connecticut Governor, Ned Lamont, and Executives at The Office of Higher Education to respond quickly to meet the needs of over nine hundred (900) disenfranchised students. Our response has been swift. We are currently hiring twenty-six (26) clinical faculty in a mix of full-time and adjunct faculty positions that will result in a staffing level above the BOEN standard. By capitalizing on long standing relationships with many high-quality and distinguished organizations throughout Connecticut, we have secured an additional thirty-six (36) clinical training sites, twenty-six (26) of them with our highly regarded partner Masonicare who recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Griffin School of Allied Health Careers.



The Griffin School of Allied Health Careers-Practical Nursing Program was approved on September 21, 2022, and the physical space was approved on November 16, 2022. Our inaugural cohort started on January 9, 2023. June 12, 2023 is the start date for the next scheduled cohort with a planned capacity of thirty (30) at the original site and a proposed 200 LPN students will begin at the school's newly constructed second location in Naugatuck on June 12th, 2023 as well. New cohorts will start every 5 months, except for the Stone Academy students transferring in on the "Intermediate, Skilled and Test-Ready", Academic Transfer Pathways (ATP). The start date for ATP students will be determined based on their demonstrated proficiency and transferable credits.

BOEN and OHE approved a total capacity of 90 LPN students per academic year in three-divided cohorts based on the existing infrastructure and available resources. Out of a sense of moral obligation to Stone Academy's nine hundred (900) disenfranchised students, we moved expeditiously to increase the Griffin School of Allied Health Careers' capacity. We did this by securing and building out a satellite facility, acquiring needed technology, as well as hiring, onboarding, and orienting faculty and staff to accommodate two hundred (200) Stone Academy, PN transfer students (in addition to our original approved 30 student cohort) in order to provide exceptional training and education by experienced and highly qualified educators and mentors. Griffin School of Allied Health Careers is CT's only hospital-based LPN program. We benefit from the rich resources and space that the hospital provides for clinical placements, meeting areas and classrooms, a library and faculty offices.

On behalf of Goodwin University, we would like to provide the Board of Examiners for Nursing (BOEN) this *Letter of Intent* to establish a Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) certificate program at Goodwin University at both of our instructional locations (e.g., East Hartford and Bridgeport).

Given need for nurses to have an entry-level path into the profession, an LPN program would align with our Associate, Baccalaureate, and Master's-level programs to provide scaffolded learning and address that state's critical nursing shortage. Goodwin would also like to be positioned to assist with the recent closure of other LPN programs in the state, through the acceptance of transfer credits and the creation of a path to graduation and employment.

MEMORANDUM OF DECISION

Re: Reinstatement Request

I

Procedural Background

On October 24, 2016, the Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board") issued a Memorandum of Decision ("Decision") in Petition No. 2016-846 revoking Danielle Dragon's ("Petitioner") licensed practical nurse ("L.P.N.") license. Department ("Dept.") Exhibit ("Ex.") 1. The Decision was based on sufficient evidence that Petitioner violated the probationary terms of her April 20, 2016, Consent Order (Dept. Ex. 2) and failed to submit to and/or make arrangements for random urine screens for drug and alcohol pursuant to said Consent Order. The Decision was also based on evidence that Petitioner had a significant history of substance abuse that affected her practice as a L.P.N. Dept. Ex. 1.

On June 18, 2022, Petitioner filed a written request for a hearing before the Board, seeking reinstatement of her license. Bd. Ex. 1. The Department did not file an objection to Petitioner's request.

Pursuant to Petitioner's request, the Board issued a Notice of Hearing ("Notice") dated September 29, 2022. Bd. Ex. 1. The hearing was scheduled for December 21, 2022. Bd. Ex. 1.

The hearing was held on December 21, 2022. Petitioner was present at the hearing and was self-represented. Transcript ("Tr.") p. 3. Attorney Joelle Newton represented the Department. Tr. pp. 2, 6.

Following the close of the record, the Board conducted fact finding.

Each member of the Board involved in this decision attests that she was present at the hearing or has reviewed the record, and that this decision is based entirely on the record, the law, and the Board's specialized professional knowledge in evaluating the evidence. *Pet v. Department of Health Services*, 228 Conn. 651 (1994).

II

Findings of Fact

Based on the testimony given and the exhibits admitted into evidence, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact:

- 1. Petitioner previously held Connecticut L.P.N. license number 035747. Dept. Ex. 1; Dept. Ex. 2.
- 2. On October 24, 2016, the Board issued a Memorandum of Decision that revoked Petitioner's L.P.N. license. Dept. Ex. 1.
- 3. Petitioner submitted a self-assessment letter, dated June 4, 2022, in which she acknowledges her addiction to pain pills. She admitted that initially she was in denial that she had a problem, until her license was revoked. She described her attempts at rehabilitation which, until 2019, were unsuccessful. As of June 4, 2022, she had achieved 32 months of sobriety. Petitioner has a good support group of counselors and sponsors assisting her in her progress. She stated that she is willing to do whatever the Board requires her to do in order to get her license reinstated, including taking and passing a refresher course and continuing with her education. Pet. Ex. 1, pp. 1-2.
- 4. On June 18, 2022, Petitioner filed a written request for a hearing before the Board, seeking reinstatement of her license. Bd. Ex. 1, pp. 1-3.
- 5. On June 18, 2022, Petitioner filed documentation in support of her license reinstatement request. Bd. Ex. 2, pp. 1-108 (under seal).
- 6. On June 18, 2022, Petitioner filed five reference letters confirming her successful treatment and negative drug screenings. Bd. Ex. 2, pp. 102-106 (under seal).
- 7. On September 2, 2022, Petitioner filed progress notes from a medical practitioner, dated August 31, 2022, documenting evaluation of her progress. The progress notes also included a negative drug screening report dated August 31, 2022. Bd. Ex. 2, pp. 107-108 (under seal).
- 8. At the December 21, 2022, hearing the Department did not file an objection to Petitioner's request. Tr. p. 6. The Department stated that it supported Petitioner's request for reinstatement of her license. *Id*.
- 9. In December 2022, Petitioner filed a letter with the Department that included updates regarding her ongoing recovery progress. The letter stated that on October 16, 2022, she celebrated three years of sobriety. The letter also stated that she continues to attend meetings on a regular basis and that she was completing a Recovery Support Specialist course for her benefit as well as for others with whom she hopes to share her experiences. Pet. Ex. 2.

Discussion and Conclusions of Law

Connecticut General Statutes ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") § 19a-17(e) provides, in pertinent part, that the Board "may reinstate a license that has been suspended or revoked if, after a hearing, such board . . . is satisfied that the practitioner . . . is able to practice with reasonable skill and safety to patients, customers or the public in general. As a condition of reinstatement, the board . . . may impose disciplinary or corrective measures authorized under this section."

Petitioner has the burden of satisfying the Board that she is able to practice nursing with reasonable skill and safety to patients, customers or the public in general. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Board finds that Petitioner has presented sufficient evidence to satisfy her burden. Findings of Fact ("FF") 3-9.

Prior to the hearing, Petitioner was informed that she would be required to provide evidence at the hearing that documented the "outcomes of [her] efforts toward recovery" over an extended period of time. Bd. Ex. 1. Petitioner was also advised that such evidence should include the following:

- 1. Documentary or testimonial evidence from a licensed **therapist** verifying a lengthy period of drug/alcohol-free status as evidenced by reports of therapy, improved emotional health, and an ability to administer safe nursing care, including the administration of controlled substances.
- 2. **Personal references** stipulating to Petitioner's drug/alcohol-free status, improved emotional health and work habits, as well as any other areas of improvement/recovery.
- 3. Documentary or testimonial evidence from Petitioner's current and past employers, following the revocation of her license, documenting her ability to carry out assigned duties responsibly and accurately and her potential for functioning safely and effectively as a nurse.
- 4. Copies of **random**, **legally defensible screens** for drugs and alcohol conducted by her therapist and/or physician that evidence her drug/alcohol-free status.

- 5. Documentation of Petitioner's participation in **support groups** and **support of a sponsor**, as well as the outcome of her participation in such support groups.
- 6. Documentation from Petitioner's therapist and/or physician that includes a **list of current medications** prescribed by her health care providers, including a need for such medications and an assessment of a continued need for such medications.

Id.

The record establishes that Petitioner submitted a self-assessment letter, dated June 4, 2022, in which she acknowledges her addiction to pain pills. She admitted that initially she was in denial that she had a problem, until her license was revoked. She described her attempts at rehabilitation which, until 2019, were unsuccessful. As of June 4, 2022, she had achieved 32 months of sobriety. Petitioner has a good support group of counselors and sponsors assisting her in her progress. She stated that she is willing to do whatever the Board requires her to do in order to get her license reinstated, including taking and passing a refresher course and continuing with her education. FF 3.

On June 18, 2022, Petitioner filed a written request for a hearing before the Board, seeking reinstatement of her license. Petitioner filed documentation in support of her license reinstatement request. FF 4-5.

On June 18, 2022, Petitioner filed five reference letters confirming her successful treatment and negative drug screenings. FF 6.

On September 2, 2022, Petitioner filed progress notes, dated August 31, 2022, from a medical practitioner who has been treating her and evaluating her progress. The progress notes also included a negative drug screening report dated August 31, 2022. FF 7. There are also negative drug screening reports in the record dated October 25, 2022, and November 26, 2022. Pet. Ex. 3 (under seal).

On November 25, 2022, Petitioner filed a letter from her current employer regarding her outstanding job performance as an employee in a home improvement business. The letter specifically mentions her willingness to work 12 hour shifts to get the work done without fail. Her employer's letter also comments on Petitioner's sobriety through her involvement with the recovery home the employer also manages. The letter confirms that Petitioner has never declined to submit to a drug screening test and that all of her test results have been negative. Pet. Ex. 2.

At the December 21, 2022, hearing, the Department did not file an objection to Petitioner's request. Tr. p. 6. The Department stated that it supported Petitioner's request for reinstatement of her license. FF 8.

In December 2022, Petitioner filed a letter to update the Department regarding her ongoing progress in recovery. The letter stated that on October 16, 2022, she celebrated three years of sobriety. The letter also stated that she continues to attend meetings on a regular basis and that she was completing a Recovery Support Specialist course for her benefit as well as for others with whom she hopes to share her experiences. FF 9.

At the hearing, Petitioner testified that she was ready to get her license back. She testified that she is engaged and invested in her recovery and mental health and that in October 2022 she celebrated three years of sobriety. She also testified that during those three years she has put in the work to learn about her mental health and addiction, stating that she had previously been "super naïve" about these issues. Tr. p. 6.

As noted in the Findings of Fact and foregoing discussion, the Board finds that Petitioner has presented relevant and credible evidence and has sustained her burden of proof. She has satisfied the Board that she is able to return to the practice of nursing with reasonable skill and safety under the terms of the Order described below. Pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-17(e), as a condition of reinstatement, the Board may impose disciplinary or corrective measures.

Order

Pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17 and 20-99, the Board hereby orders the following:

- 1. Danielle Dragon's licensed practical nurse license number, 035747, is hereby reinstated and immediately restricted in that she is prohibited from practicing as a L.P.N. and may only use her L.P.N. license for the sole purpose of participating in a refresher program as set forth in paragraph 2 of this Order.
- 2. Petitioner shall successfully complete a Department-approved L.P.N. refresher course that includes a clinical component and shall successfully take the L.P.N. licensing examination offered by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination ("NCLEX").

- A. Certification of successful completion of the L.P.N. refresher program shall be submitted to the Board directly from the educational institution where said program was taken within thirty (30) days of the program's completion.
- B. Petitioner shall submit an application to the Department's licensing authority. Petitioner shall be administered the L.P.N. licensing examination. Petitioner shall incur all expenses associated with applying for and taking the L.P.N. licensing examination.
- C. Petitioner shall attain a passing score on the L.P.N. licensing examination.
- D. Until such time as Petitioner successfully completes the L.P.N. refresher program and attains a passing score on the L.P.N. licensing examination, Petitioner is prohibited from practicing as a L.P.N. and Petitioner's L.P.N. license shall be restricted and used for the sole purpose of participating in the L.P.N. refresher program.
- 3. Once Petitioner receives notification from the Department that she has satisfied the terms set forth in paragraph 2, Petitioner's L.P.N. license number 035747, shall be placed on probation for a period of two years under the following terms and conditions:
 - A. Petitioner shall not be employed as a L.P.N. for a personnel provider service, assisted living services agency, homemaker-home health aide agency, or home health care agency, and shall not be self-employed as a L.P.N. for the period of probation.
 - B. During the first six months of working as a L.P.N. during the probationary period, Petitioner shall not administer, count, or have access to controlled substances, or have responsibility for such activities in the course of nursing duties.
 - C. If Petitioner is employed as a L.P.N. during the probationary period, she shall provide a copy of this Memorandum of Decision to any and all employers. The Board shall be notified in writing by any employer(s), within thirty (30) days of the commencement of employment as to receipt of a copy of this Memorandum of Decision.
 - D. If employed as a L.P.N., Petitioner shall cause employer reports to be submitted to the Board by her immediate supervisor during the entire probationary period.

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- Employer reports shall be submitted commencing with the report due on the first business day of the month following employment as a nurse. Employer reports shall be submitted quarterly during the entire probationary period.
- E. The employer reports cited in paragraph 3.D. above shall include documentation of Petitioner's ability to practice nursing safely and competently. Employer reports shall be submitted directly to the Board at the address cited in Paragraph 3.P. below.
- F. Should Petitioner's employment as a L.P.N. be involuntarily terminated or suspended, Petitioner and her employer shall notify the Board within seventy-two (72) hours of such termination or suspension.
- G. If Petitioner pursues further training in any subject area that is regulated by the Department, Petitioner shall provide a copy of this Memorandum of Decision to the educational institution or, if not the institution, to Petitioner's instructor. Such institution or instructor shall notify the Department in writing of receipt of a copy of this Memorandum of Decision within fifteen (15) days of receipt. Said notification shall be submitted directly to the Department at the address cited in paragraph 3.P. below.
- H. At her expense, Petitioner shall continue to engage in group or individual therapy and counseling with a licensed or certified therapist approved by the Department for the entire probationary period. She shall attend AA, NA, and/or Nurses to Nurses support group meetings at least eight to ten times a month during the entire probationary period.
- I. Petitioner shall provide a copy of this Decision to her therapist. The Department shall be notified in writing by her therapist within 30 days of the effective date of this Decision as to receipt of a copy of this Decision.
- J. Petitioner shall request her therapist to submit evaluation reports directly to the Department during the entire probationary period. Therapist reports shall be submitted quarterly during the entire probationary period.
- K. The therapist reports cited in Paragraph 3.J. above shall include documentation of dates of treatment, an evaluation of Petitioner's progress, including alcohol and drug-free status, and her ability to practice nursing safely and competently.

Therapist reports shall be submitted directly to the Department at the address cited in Paragraph 3.P. below.

- L. Petitioner shall submit to observed random urine screens as follows:
 - (1) At her expense, Petitioner shall submit to observed random chain of custody urine screens for alcohol and drugs for the entire probationary period at a testing facility approved by the Board, after consultation with the Department, as ordered by her therapist, and/or personal physician, and/or employer. Alcohol/drug screening may also be required at the request of the Board to ensure compliance with this Order. Random alcohol/drug screens shall be legally defensible in that specimen donor and chain of custody can be identified throughout the screening process.
 - (2) Petitioner shall be responsible for notifying the laboratory, her therapist, the Board, the Department, and her prescribing practitioner of any drug(s) she is taking. For any prescription of a controlled substance(s) for more than two consecutive weeks, Petitioner shall request the provider prescribing the controlled substance(s) to submit quarterly reports to the Department until such time as the controlled substance(s) is no longer prescribed. The reports shall include the following:
 - a. A list of controlled substances prescribed by this provider;
 - b. A list of controlled substance(s) prescribed by other providers;
 - c. An evaluation of Petitioner's need for the controlled substances; and
 - d. An assessment of Petitioner's continued need for the controlled substance(s).
 - (3) There must be at least one such observed random alcohol/drug screen quarterly for the entire probationary period.
 - (4) Random alcohol/drug screens shall be negative for the presence of alcohol and drugs. All positive alcohol screen results shall be confirmed by the urine Ethyl Glucuronide (EtG) testing method. Chain of custody documentation must accompany

- all laboratory reports and/or the laboratory reports must indicate that chain of custody procedures have been followed.
- (5) Random alcohol/drug screens must include testing for the following substances:

Amphetamines Methadone
Barbiturates Tramadol
Benzodiazepines Opiates (Metabolites)

Cannabinoids (THC Metabolites) Phencyclidine (PCP)
Cocaine Propoxyphene
Meperidine (Demerol) Ethanol (alcohol)

- (6) Laboratory reports of random alcohol and drug screens shall be submitted to the Department, at the address cited in Paragraph 3.P. below, by Petitioner's therapist, personal physician, or the testing laboratory.
- M. Petitioner shall not obtain for personal use and/or use alcohol or any drug that has not been prescribed for her for a legitimate purpose by a licensed health care practitioner authorized to prescribe medications. Petitioner shall not abuse and/or excessively use any drugs that are prescribed for a legitimate medical purpose.
- N. Petitioner is hereby advised that the ingestion of poppy seeds may produce a positive drug screen result indicating the presence of opiates/morphine and that the ingestion of mouthwash may produce a positive result indicating the presence of alcohol. For that reason, any food substance containing poppy seeds and mouthwash should be avoided during the probationary period. MEMORANDUM OF DECISION

I

Procedural Background

On May 13, 2022, the Department of Public Health ("Department") filed the Statement of Charges with the State of Connecticut Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board"). Board ("Bd.") Exhibit ("Ex.") Bd. Ex. 1. The Charges allege violations of Chapter 378 of the Connecticut General Statutes ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") by Respondent, which would subject her Registered Nurse ("R.N.") license number 098569 and her Advanced Practice Registered Nurse ("A.P.R.N.") license number 006018 to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17, 20-99 (b)(4) and 20-99(b)(5). Id.

On May 18, 2022, the Department filed a Motion for Summary Suspension ("Motion") with the Board. Bd. Ex. 2. Based on the allegations in the Statement of Charges and the affidavits and reports attached to the Motion, the Board found that Respondent's continued nursing practice presented a clear and immediate danger to public health and safety and ordered, on the same date, pursuant Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 4-182 (c) and 19a-17(c) that Rachel Pisani's ("Respondent") R.N. license and A.P.R.N. license be summarily suspended pending a final determination by the Board of the allegations contained in the Statement of Charges ("Summary Suspension Order"). Id.

On May 18, 2022, the Charges, Summary Suspension Order and Notice of Hearing ("Notice") were sent to Respondent by first class mail and email. Bd. Ex. 3. The documents were sent to Respondent's email address of record on file with the Department at rachelmpisani @ gmail.com. Id. The Charges, Summary Suspension Order and Notice were also sent to her

attorney at the time: John O'Brien at 411 Center Street, Manchester, CT 06040. *Id.* The hearing was scheduled to convene on June 1, 2022. *Id.*

On May 31, 2022, Respondent requested by email a continuance of the hearing. Bd. Ex.

4. With no objections from the Department, the Board granted Respondent's request and the hearing was continued to August 3, 2022. Bd. Ex. 5.

On June 1, 2022, the Department notified Respondent by email that the hearing was continued to August 3, 2022. Bd. Ex. 6; Tr. p. 5. Respondent acknowledged receipt of such email. *Id*.

On August 2, 2022, the Board Liaison emailed to Respondent the email link to the video conference. Bd. Ex. 7; Tr. p. 8.

On August 3, 2022, the hearing was held via video conference. Tr. 8/3/22. Respondent did not appear at the hearing and was not represented by legal counsel. Tr. p. 3. Attorney Joelle Newton represented the Department. *Id*.

At the hearing, Attorney Newton orally moved on the record to deem the allegations admitted insofar as Respondent had failed to file an Answer to the Charges. Tr. p. 10. The Board granted the Department's Motion to Deem Allegations Admitted. Tr. pp. 10-11. No witnesses were called to testify at the hearing. Tr. p. 11.

Following the close of the record on August 3, 2022, the Board conducted fact finding.

Each member of the Board involved in this decision attests that he or she was present at the hearing or has reviewed the record, and that this decision is based entirely on the record, the law, and the Board's specialized professional knowledge in evaluating the evidence. *Pet v. Department of Health Services*, 228 Conn. 651 (1994).

II

Allegations

1. In paragraph 1 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Rachel Pisani of Meriden, Connecticut is, and at all times referenced in these Charges, the holder of Connecticut registered nurse license number 098569 and Connecticut advanced practice registered

- nurse license number 006018.
- 2. In paragraph 2 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on or about November 11, 2021, Respondent abused and used to excess cocaine and/or amphetamine ("substance abuse").
- 3. In paragraph 3 of the Charges, the Department alleges that from approximately November 11, 2021, to the present, Respondent has or had one or more emotional disorders and/or mental illnesses ("illnesses").
- 4. In paragraph 4 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent's illnesses and /or substance abuse does, and/or may, affect her practice of nursing.
- 5. In paragraph 5 of the Charges, the Department alleges that the above-described conduct constitutes grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99(b), including, but not necessarily limited to:
 - a. §20-99(b)(4), and/or
 - b. §20-99(b)(5).

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Findings of Fact

- 1. On May 18, 2022, the Charges, Summary Suspension Order and Notice of Hearing were sent to Respondent by first class mail and email. Bd. Ex. 3. The documents were sent to Respondent's email address of record on file with the Department at rachelmpisani@gmail.com. Id. .
- 2. The Charges, Summary Suspension Order and Notice were also sent to her attorney at the time: John O'Brien at 411 Center Street, Manchester, CT 06040.² *Id*.
- 3. The hearing was scheduled to convene on June 1, 2022. *Id.*
- On May 31, 2022, Respondent requested by email a continuance of the hearing. Bd. Ex.
 With no objections from the Department, the Board granted Respondent's request and the hearing was continued to August 3, 2022. Bd. Ex. 5.
- 5. On June 1, 2022, the Department notified Respondent by email that the hearing was continued to August 3, 2022. Bd. Ex. 6; Tr. p. 5. Respondent acknowledged receipt of such email. *Id.*

- 6. On August 2, 2022, the Board Liaison emailed to Respondent the email link to the video conference. Bd. Ex. 7; Tr. p. 8.
- 7. The Department provided Respondent with reasonable and adequate written notice of the hearing and the allegations contained in the Charges. Bd. Ex. 3, 5, 6; Tr. pp. 7-8.
- 8. On August 3, 2022, neither Respondent nor an attorney representing Respondent appeared at the hearing. Tr. p. 3. Respondent did not request a second continuance of the hearing. Id.
- 9. The factual allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 4 of the Charges are deemed admitted and true. Tr. pp. 10-11.
- 10. The Department proved the following facts by a preponderance of the evidence:
 - a. Rachel Pisani of Meriden, Connecticut is, and at all times referenced in these Charges, the holder of Connecticut registered nurse license number 098569 and Connecticut advanced practice registered nurse license number 006018.
 - b. On or about November 11, 2021, Respondent abused and used to excess cocaine and/or amphetamine ("substance abuse").
 - c. From approximately November 11, 2021, to the present, Respondent has or had one or more emotional disorders and/or mental illnesses ("illnesses").
 - d. Respondent's illnesses and /or substance abuse does, and/or may, affect her practice of nursing.
 - e. the Respondent's conduct constitutes grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99(b), including, but not necessarily limited to: §20-99(b)(4), and/or §20-99(b)(5).

IV

Discussion and Conclusions of Law

The Department bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence in this matter. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Department sustained its burden of proof regarding the allegations contained in the Charges.

Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99 provides, in pertinent part, that:

(a) The Board.... shall have jurisdiction to hear all charges of conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession brought against persons licensed to practice nursing. After holding a hearing.... said board, if it finds such person to be guilty, may revoke or suspend his or her license or take any of the actions set forth in section 19a-17

(b) Conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession includes, but is not limited to, the following: (4) emotional disorder or mental illness; (5) abuse or excessive use of drugs, including alcohol, narcotics or chemicals.

Since Respondent did not file an Answer, the allegations are deemed admitted. *See*, Conn. Agencies Regs. § 19a-9-20. In addition, based on the sufficient and credible evidence presented, the Department established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent abused or used cocaine and/or amphetamine to excess; and, from approximately November 11, 2022, to the present, Respondent has or had one or more emotional illnesses. Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, pp. 1-4 (under seal); Dept. Ex. 2, pp. 6-8; Dept. Ex. 3, pp. 14-15 (under seal); and, Dept. Ex. 4, pp. 16-18.

Thus, the Board concludes, based on the sufficient and credible evidence presented, that Respondent's conduct, as alleged in paragraphs 1 through 4 of the Charges, is deemed to be admitted and true, that Respondent is currently unable to practice with reasonable skill and safety; and that such findings constitute grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b)(4), 20-99(b)(5), and § 19a-17.

Order

Based on the record in this case, the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, and pursuant to the statutory authority under Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(a), (2) and (5) and 20-99(b)(4) and 20-99(b)(5), the Board finds that in Petition No. 2021-1209 and Petition No. 2021-1223, the Department has proved by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent's conduct warrants the disciplinary action imposed by this Order. Thus, the Board hereby orders that Rachel Pisani's A.P.R.N. license number 006018 in the State of Connecticut is REVOKED and R.N. license number 098569 in the State of Connecticut is REVOKED.

This Memorandum of Decision becomes effective on the date signed by the Board. The Board hereby informs Respondent, Rachel Pisani, and the Department of this decision.

MEMORANDUM OF DECISION

I

Procedural Background

On May 25, 2022, the Department of Public Health ("Department") filed a Statement of Charges ("Charges") with the Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board"). Board ("Bd.") Exhibit ("Ex.") 1. The Charges allege violations of Chapter 378 of the Connecticut General Statutes ("Conn. Gen. Stat.") by Lisa Simon ("Respondent"), which would subject Respondent's licensed practical nurse ("L.P.N.") license no. 025783 to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-12e(e), 19a-17(f) and §§ 20-99(b)(2), 20-99(b)(2) and/or 20-99(b)(6). *Id*.

On May 25, 2022, the Department filed a Motion for Summary Suspension Order ("Motion") regarding Respondent's practice and the active status of her L.P.N. license. Bd. Ex. 2. Based on the allegations in the Charges and the affidavits and reports accompanying the Motion, the Board found on June 1, 2022, that Respondent's continued nursing practice presented a clear and immediate danger to public health and safety and; on the same date, ordered pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 4-182(c) and § 19a-17(c), that Respondent's license be summarily suspended pending a final determination by the Board of the allegations contained in the Charges ("Summary Suspension Order"). Bd. Ex. 3.

On June 2, 2022, the Charges, Notice of Hearing ("Notice") and Summary Suspension Order were mailed to Respondent, by first-class mail to her address of record on file with the Department: 62 Webb Terrace, Ansonia, CT 06401. Bd. Ex. 4. Also on August 6, 2022, the Charges, Notice and Summary Suspension Order were transmitted to Respondent via her email address of record on file with the Department at sisalimon0924@gmail.com. *Id.* The hearing was scheduled for July 6, 2022. *Id.*

On June 24, 2022, Respondent emailed a request for a continuance (Bd. Ex. 5) and without the Department's objection, the continuance was granted on June 27, 2022. The hearing was continued until August 3, 2022. Bd Ex. 6.

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On June 15, 2022, Respondent filed an Answer to the Charges. Bd. Ex. 7

On July 27, 2022, Respondent requested a second continuance to give her sufficient time to retain counsel. Without objection from the Department, Respondent's request was granted on August 2, 2022. The August 3, 2022, hearing was continued until October 19, 2022. Bd. Ex. 8.

The hearing was held on October 19, 2022. Respondent was present at the hearing but was not represented by legal counsel. Transcript ("Tr.") p. 3. Attorney Linda Fazzina represented the Department. *Id*.

Following the close of the record, the Board conducted fact finding.

Each member of the Board involved in this decision attests that he or she was present at the hearing or has reviewed the record, and that this decision is based entirely on the record, the law, and the Board's specialized professional knowledge in evaluating the evidence. *Pet v. Department of Health Services*, 228 Conn. 651 (1994).

Allegations

- 1. In paragraph 1 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent of Ansonia, CT, is, and has been at all times, as referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut L.P.N. license number 025783. Bd. Ex. 1; Bd. Ex. 7; Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, p. 1.
- 2. In paragraph 2 of the Charges, the Department alleges that on or about September 16, 2021, the Vermont Board of Nursing issued a Summary Suspension Order ("Vermont Order") suspending Respondent's ability to practice nursing in Vermont based, in part upon findings that an emergency action was necessary to prevent patient harm and to protect the public in connection with the misuse of a credit card belonging to a resident of Linden Health Center at Wake Robin Care home in Shelburne, CT ("Wake Robin").
- 3. In paragraph 3 of the Charges, the Department alleges that in or about April 2021, Respondent accepted an assignment as a travel nurse at Wake Robin. At that time, Respondent did not hold a Vermont nursing license, but she was authorized to practice in Vermont pursuant to Act 6 of the 2021 Session Laws of the State of Vermont by virtue of having a Connecticut nursing license in good standing.
- 4. In paragraph 4 of the Charges, the Department alleges that in or about April and/or May 2021, Respondent violated the standard of care of the nursing profession and/or engaged in unprofessional conduct in that she misappropriated and/or fraudulently used a credit card belonging to a Wake Robin resident.

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- 5. In paragraph 5 of the Charges, the Department alleges that Respondent failed to report to the Department, as required by Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-12e(e), the disciplinary action taken by the Vermont Board of Nursing under the Vermont Order.
- 6. In paragraph 6 of the Charges, the Department alleges that the above cited facts constitute grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(f), 19a-12e(e), and/or 20-99, including, but not limited to §§ 20-99(b)(2) and/or 20-99(b)(6).

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Findings of Fact

- 1. Respondent of Ansonia, CT, is, and has been at all times, as referenced in the Charges, the holder of Connecticut L.P.N. license number 025783. Bd. Ex. 1; Bd. Ex. 7; Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, p. 1.
- 2. Respondent was hired as a travel nurse for a 12-week contract that ran from March 10, 2021, through June 12, 2021. At that time, Respondent did not hold a Vermont nursing license, but she was authorized to practice in Vermont pursuant to Act 6 of the 2021 Session Laws of the State of Vermont by virtue of having a Connecticut nursing license in good standing. Bd. Ex. 7;Department ("Dept.") Ex. 1, p. 2.
- 3. Respondent was assigned primarily to work in the Memory Care unit at Wake Robin. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2.
- 4. One of the residents in Respondent's care was a 91-year-old dementia patient, who had numerous chronic conditions. The resident had lived at Wake Robin for 18 years, seven of those years in the Memory Care Unit due to his slow, but continuous cognitive decline. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 20-24, 27-30. The Wake Robin staff was not aware that he had a credit card in his possession. The resident had no access to a computer or the internet and had not used his credit card for any purchases since March 2020. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 1-3, 7-8, 17, 30-31, 42-44, 54-55.
- 5. Respondent used the resident's credit card for the first time on April 11, 2021. Between April 11, 2021, and April 28, 2021, Respondent made fraudulent charges to this card more than 14 times. The amount charged was at least \$3,505. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 41, 43-44, 46-50, 55.
- 6. On May 3, 2021, the resident's daughter froze his bank account. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 3, 44, 55.
- 7. On May 5 and May 6, 2021, Respondent's attempts to charge \$637.37 were declined after the resident's daughter had contacted his bank and had frozen the account. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 3, 44, 55.

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8. After the resident's family notified Wake Robin management in early May 2021 that at least \$3,000 of unauthorized charges were made on the resident's credit card, Wake Robin management began its investigation into the matter. Wake Robin reported this matter to the Shelburne VT Police Department and the Vermont Board of Nursing/Office of Professional Regulation. Department Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 2, 12-13.

- 9. In May 2021, Corporal Jon Marcoux of the Shelburne VT Police Department began his investigation of the unauthorized charges; and on May 26, 2021, he was able to confirm with Wake Robin staff Respondent's identification via surveillance photos. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 2, 47-50, 56-57.
- 10. After several unsuccessful attempts to contact Respondent, the Vermont Board of Nursing's investigator, Dennis Menard, was able to reach Respondent on August 12, 2021. He interviewed Respondent by phone and recorded the same. During this interview, Respondent admitted using the resident's credit card at multiple businesses, but denied that she had stolen the card. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 2-4, 52-53, 57.
- 11. On August 13, 2021, Dennis Menard reported his investigative findings to Corporal Marcoux. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 3, 57.
- 12. On August 18, 2021, after numerous and unsuccessful attempts to interview Respondent, Corporal Marcoux submitted a formal request to the VT's State Attorney's Office for an arrest warrant for Respondent. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 56-59.
- 13. Respondent fraudulently charged more than \$5,000 to the resident's credit card. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 1-2, 5, 55, 62.
- 14. On September 13, 2021, the Vermont Board of Nursing conducted an electronic hearing regarding Respondent's alleged fraudulent use of a Wake Robin resident's credit card. Respondent appeared at the hearing and represented herself. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 3, 60-63.
- 15. On September 16, 2021, the Vermont Board of Nursing issued a Vermont Order suspending Respondent's ability to practice nursing in Vermont based, in part upon findings that an emergency action was necessary to prevent patient harm and to protect the public in connection with the misuse of a credit card belonging to a resident of Wake Robin.
- 16. Respondent failed to report to the Department, as required by Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-12e(e), the disciplinary action taken by the Vermont Board of Nursing under the Vermont Order.

Discussion and Conclusions of Law

The Department bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence in this matter. *Jones v. Connecticut Medical Examining Board*, 309 Conn. 727, 739-740 (2013). The Department sustained its burden of proof with regard to all of the allegations contained in the Charges. Findings of Fact ("FF") 1-16.

Conn. Gen. Stat. § 20-99 provides, in pertinent part, that:

- (a) The Board shall have jurisdiction to hear all charges of conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession brought against persons licensed to practice nursing. After holding a hearing said board, if it finds such person to be guilty, may revoke or suspend his or her license or take any of the actions set forth in section 19a-17
- (b) Conduct which fails to conform to the accepted standards of the nursing profession includes, but is not limited to, the following: . . . (2) illegal conduct, incompetence or negligence in carrying out usual nursing functions; . . . (6) fraud or material deception in the course of professional services or activities.

Conn Gen. Stat. § 19a-17 provides, in pertinent part, that:

- (a) Each board or commission, . . . and the Department of Public Health . . . may take any of the following actions, . . . based on conduct that occurred prior or subsequent to the issuance of a license upon finding the existence of good cause. . . (1) Revoke a practitioner's license; . . .
- (c) Such board or commission . . . where appropriate may summarily suspend a practitioner's license in advance of a final adjudication or during the appeals process if such board or commission finds that a practitioner represents a clear and immediate danger to the public health and safety if he/she is allowed to continue to practice.
- (f) Such board may take disciplinary action against a practitioner's license or permit as a result of the practitioner having been subject to disciplinary action by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of any state

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Specifically, under Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-17(f), the CT Board can discipline the license of a nurse that has been disciplined by another state. Additionally, under Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b)(2) and (6), the CT Board can discipline the license of a nurse who "fails to conform to the accepted standards of practice of the nursing profession, including, but not limited to, illegal conduct, incompetence or negligence in carrying out usual nursing functions and fraud or material deception in the course of professional services or activities."

The evidence demonstrates that Respondent was hired as a travel nurse for a 12-week contract that ran from March 10, 2021, through June 12, 2021. At that time, Respondent did not hold a Vermont nursing license, but she was authorized to practice in Vermont pursuant to Act 6 of the 2021 Session Laws of the State of Vermont by virtue of having a Connecticut nursing license in good standing. FF 2. Respondent was assigned primarily to work in the Memory Care unit at Wake Robin. FF 3.

One of the residents in Respondent's care was a 91-year-old dementia patient, who had numerous chronic conditions. The resident had lived at Wake Robin for 18 years, seven of those years in the Memory Care Unit due to his slow, but continuous cognitive decline. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 20-24, 27-30. The Wake Robin staff was not aware that he had a credit card in his possession. The resident had no access to a computer or the internet and had not used his credit card for any purchases since March 2020. FF 4. Respondent used the resident's credit card for the first time on April 11, 2021. Between April 11, 2021, and April 28, 2021, Respondent made fraudulent charges to this card more than 14 times. The amount charged was at least \$3,505. FF 5.

On May 3, 2021, the resident's daughter froze his bank account. FF 6. On May 5 and May 6, 2021, Respondent's attempts to charge \$637.37 were declined after the resident's daughter had contacted his bank and had frozen the account. FF 7.

After the resident's family notified Wake Robin management in early May 2021 that at least \$3,000 of unauthorized charges were made on the resident's credit card, Wake Robin management began its investigation into the matter. Wake Robin reported this matter to the Shelburne VT Police Department and the Vermont Board of Nursing/Office of Professional Regulation. FF 8.

In May 2021, Corporal Jon Marcoux of the Shelburne VT Police Department began his investigation of the unauthorized charges; and on May 26, 2021, he was able to confirm with

Wake Robin staff Respondent's identification via surveillance photos. FF 9. After several unsuccessful attempts to contact Respondent, the Vermont Board of Nursing's investigator, Dennis Menard, was able to reach Respondent on August 12, 2021. He interviewed Respondent by phone and recorded the same. During this interview, Respondent admitted using the resident's credit card at multiple businesses, but denied that she had stolen the card. FF 10. Respondent denied to the investigator that the amount was \$5,000, but admitted to the investigator that she spent about \$2,000 on the credit card. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2.

On August 13, 2021, Dennis Menard reported his investigative findings to Corporal Marcoux. FF 11. On August 18, 2021, after numerous and unsuccessful attempts to interview Respondent, Corporal Marcoux submitted a formal request to the VT's State Attorney's Office for an arrest warrant for Respondent. FF 12.

Respondent fraudulently charged more than \$5,000 to the resident's credit card. FF 13.

Respondent testified that her coworker "Emma" gave her the resident's credit card. The card was in very poor condition, the magnetic strip was worn, and the name of the cardholder was illegible. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 58. However, the chip in the card still worked. Emma told Respondent that she had ordered a new card but in the meantime, she needed cash and gift cards that could be purchased on the credit card. Respondent testified that she did not know that Emma had stolen the card from the resident. Tr. pp. 47, 51-53.

Respondent further testified that Emma told her that she could no longer get cash advances on the card, so she and Emma worked out an arrangement in which Respondent would purchase items on the credit card and Respondent would pay Emma in cash a discounted amount rather than the actual cost of the purchased item. Respondent claimed that she used the card for gas, food, wine, cigarettes, sneakers, clothing and other items she did not really need. Respondent testified that the whole scheme started when she and Emma were shopping. Emma offered Respondent the use of the credit card because Respondent had forgotten to bring her wallet with her. Tr. pp. 48-60, 64. Respondent also claimed that Emma conveniently excused herself to go to the restroom when Respondent was in a line to pay for the purchases. Tr. p. 57; Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 2-4, 62. Although Corporal Marcoux confirmed that a nurse named Emma also worked as a travel nurse at Wake Robin during the same period that Respondent was also

¹ According to the investigative record, "Emma" moved back to Jamaica after her travel contract terminated. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 2.

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assigned to work at Wake Robin, he informed Respondent that Emma did not appear in any of the surveillance video with Respondent. He also informed Respondent that he could not corroborate Respondent's claims about Emma's involvement and he could not corroborate that Emma accompanied her at the times that Respondent made such fraudulent transactions.

Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 3-5; 58-59, 64-65.

As a mandated reporter, Sarah Hutchins, Director of Nursing at Wake Robin, reported Respondent's alleged misconduct to the Vermont Board of Nursing/Office of Professional Regulation, in addition to the Shelburne VT Police Department. Dept. Ex. 1, p. 1.

On September 13, 2021, the Vermont Board of Nursing conducted an electronic hearing regarding Respondent's alleged fraudulent use of a Wake Robin resident's credit card.

Respondent appeared at the hearing and represented herself. FF 14.

On September 16, 2021, the Vermont Board of Nursing issued a Vermont Order suspending Respondent's ability to practice nursing in Vermont based, in part upon findings that an emergency action was necessary to prevent patient harm and to protect the public in connection with the misuse of a credit card belonging to a resident of Wake Robin. FF 15.

Pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-12e(e) a health care professional shall report to the Department any disciplinary action taken against her license by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of any state, not later than 30 days after such action. Respondent failed to report to the Department, as required by Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-12e(e), the Vermont Order in which the Vermont Board of Nursing took disciplinary action taken against her license. FF 16.

Respondent's failure to report to the Department the legal actions taken by the Vermont Board of Nursing/Office of Professional Regulation in 2021 violated the provisions of §§ 19a-12e(e). The record establishes that Respondent participated in the September 13, 2021, hearing. On or after September 16, 2021, Respondent received the Office of Professional Regulation's final decision. Dept. Ex. 1, pp. 60-63.

Ultimately, the Department established by a preponderance of the evidence that Respondent's practice as a travel nurse in Shelburne, VT fell below the standard of care in one or more ways, including, but not limited to her misappropriation and fraudulent use of a resident's credit card, illegal conduct and theft, fraud, and material deception in the course of her nursing duties and care of the resident in Wake Robin. Thus, the Board concludes that

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Respondent's conduct, as alleged in the Charges constitutes grounds for disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 20-99(b)(2) and (6), and §§ 19a-12e(e), and 19a-17(a), (c) and (f).

Order

Based on the record in this case, the above findings of fact and conclusions of law, and pursuant to the authority vested in it by Conn. Gen. Stat. §§ 19a-17(a)(c) and (f), 20-99(b)(2) and (6), the Board finds that the conduct alleged and proven warrants the disciplinary action imposed by this Order, as set for the below:

- 1. Respondent shall pay a civil penalty of \$500 by certified or cashier's check payable to "Treasurer, State of Connecticut." The check shall reference the Petition Number on the face of the check and shall be payable within 30 days of the effective date of this Memorandum of Decision ("Decision").
- 2. Respondent's license number 025783 to practice as a licensed practical nurse in the State of Connecticut is hereby reprimanded.
- 3. Respondent's license shall be placed on probation for a period of two years under the following terms and conditions. If any of the conditions of probation are not met, Respondent's licensed practical nurse license may be subject to disciplinary action pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. § 19a-17.
 - A. During the period of probation, the Department shall pre-approve Respondent's employment and/or change of employment within the nursing profession.
 - B. Respondent shall not be employed as a nurse for a personnel provider service, assisted living services agency, homemaker-home health aide agency, or home health care agency, and shall not be self-employed as a nurse for the period of probation.
 - C. Respondent shall provide a copy of this Decision to any and all employers if employed as a nurse during the probationary period. The Department shall be notified in writing by any employer(s), within 30 days of the commencement of employment, as to receipt of a copy of this Decision.
 - D. If employed as a nurse, Respondent shall cause employer reports to be submitted to the Department, by her immediate supervisor during the entire probationary

- period. Employer reports shall be submitted commencing with the report due on the first business day of month following employment as a nurse. Employer reports shall be submitted monthly during the entire probationary period.
- E. The employer reports cited in Paragraph D above shall include documentation of Respondent's ability to practice nursing safely and competently. Employer reports shall be submitted directly to the Department at the address cited in Paragraph K below.
- F. Should Respondent's employment as a nurse be involuntarily terminated or suspended, Respondent and her employer shall notify the Department within 72 hours of such termination or suspension.
- G. In the event Respondent is not employed as a nurse for periods of 30 consecutive days or longer, she shall notify the Department in writing. Such periods of time shall not be counted in reducing the probationary period covered by this Order and such terms shall be held in abeyance. During such time period, Respondent shall not be responsible for complying with the terms of probation of this Order. In the event Respondent resumes the practice of nursing, she shall provide the Department with 15 days prior written notice.
- H. If Respondent pursues further training in any subject area that is regulated by the Department, Respondent shall provide a copy of this Memorandum of Decision to the educational institution or, if not an institution, to Respondent's instructor. Such institution or instructor shall notify the Department in writing as to receipt of a copy of this Decision within 15 days of receipt. Said notification shall be submitted directly to the Department at the address cited in Paragraph K below.
- I. Within the first three months of the probationary period, Respondent shall successfully complete a course in **professional ethics** pre-approved by the Department. Within 30 days of completion of the course, Respondent shall provide proof to the satisfaction of the Department of her successful completion of the course.
- J. The Department must be informed in writing prior to any change of Respondent's home or personal email address.

Any deviation from the terms of probation, without prior written approval by the Board, shall constitute a violation of probation, which will be cause for an immediate hearing on charges of violating this Order. Any extension of time or grace period for reporting granted by the Board shall not be a waiver or preclude the Board's right to take subsequent action. The Board shall not be required to grant future extensions of time or grace periods. Notice of revocation or other disciplinary action shall be sent to Respondent's address of record on file with the Department, which is deemed to be the most current address that Respondent has reported to the Practitioner Licensing and Investigations Section of the Healthcare Quality and Safety Branch of the Department.
- 5. The execution of this document has no bearing on any criminal liability without the written consent of the Director of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit or the State's Attorney's Office where the allegation occurred or the Bureau Chief of the applicable unit in the Chief State's Attorney's Office.

<u>DEPARTMENT'S RESPONSE TO RESPONDENT'S</u> OBJECTIONS TO DEPARTMENT PROPOSED EXHIBITS

On January 30, 2023, the Connecticut Board of Examiners for Nursing ("Board") ordered a hearing to be held in the above captioned matter for March 15, 2023 and set a deadline for March 1, 2023 for the filing of exhibits. On March 1, 2023, the Department of Public Health ("Department") filed a batch of ten exhibits with the Public Health Hearing office, and Selena Acocella, L.P.N., R.N., ("respondent") filed a batch of six exhibits and objected to several of the exhibits filed by the Department. The Department now responds to respondent's objections.

As to all objections on hearsay, the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act ("UAPA) allows for hearsay evidence so long as it is reliable and probative. One of respondent's hearsay objections was for Department's Exhibit 1, the Department's investigative report. In this case, it is difficult to identify which declarant and which statement are specifically being objected to. Broadly, the investigative report is both highly reliable to describe the results of the Department's investigation and probative as to the actions of the Department. But even if the investigative report is not reliable and probative, it is not hearsay because it not being offered to prove the truth of any matter asserted, but to show how the Department acquired the documents in its possession, and what the Department did with these documents, and is therefore not hearsay. Further, even if the investigative report was hearsay, it falls under the public record and report exception to the hearsay rule. However, since hearsay is allowed under the UAPA, the report should not be excluded.

Another Hearsay objection was for Department's Exhibit 8, a visual representation of tabular data. This is also not hearsay because there is no declarant. The visualization is based on tabular computer generated data, and a computer that generates data is not a declarant. Further, even if there were a declarant, it also falls under the business records data hearsay exception. However, just as before, as hearsay is allowed under the UAPA, this exhibit should not be excluded.

As to objections on foundation, the respondent suggests that there is insufficient foundation to show some unspecified prerequisite regarding the Department's Exhibit 2, the petitioner's complaint, Department's Exhibit 3, the medical records of Patient #1, Department's Exhibit 5, the American Nursing Association's Code of Ethics, Department's Exhibit 6 the National Council of State Boards of Nursing's Practical Guidelines for Boards of Nursing on Sexual Misconduct Cases, Department's Exhibit 8, a visual representation of tabular data, and Department's Exhibit 9 and 10, the audio of a phone conversation. As respondent fails to identify the alleged missing prerequisite, and because any and all necessary prerequisites will be established at hearing, these documents should not be preemptively excluded.

As to respondents objections to Department's Exhibit 6 and 8 regarding failure to disclose expert testimony, the Department does not intend to call any expert witnesses at hearing. The authors of the publications submitted for consideration are not testifying, these publications are provided for consideration as to widely identified professional standards. All witnesses and exhibits have been identified in accordance with the Notice of Hearing dated February 1, 2023, and there is no additional requirement for expert witnesses imposed by the Notice of Hearing or the UAPA that has not been met. However, as previously stated, the Department does not intend to call any expert witnesses and so this objection must be overruled.

As to objections regarding cumulativeness of Department's Exhibit 8, a graphical representation of tabular data, the document in question is a visual aide only, intended to be used to describe what the evidence at the hearing will show in a way that is more visible and

understandable. It will be used to emphasize and reinforce facts the Department expects to show in a more easily conceptualized form. Visual aides are allowed under the UAPA, the data is relevant and material, and does not otherwise violate other rules of evidence. Therefore, the objection must be overruled.

As to respondents' objections to relevance and materiality regarding Department Exhibits 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 9, and 10, all the documents identified in respondent's objection speak to either if an inappropriate relationship occurred and/or if an inappropriate relationship existed, if it constitutes grounds for discipline. These are key issues identified in the filed Statement of Charges, which allege an inappropriate relationship that is grounds for discipline. Since these documents directly correlate to the charges, they are relevant and material, and so these objections must be overruled.

Finally, as to objections regarding undue prejudice, this objection should be overruled because the probative value of the documents clearly outweighs any chance that the Board would be prejudiced. But even if this evidence was equally probative, or even if the prejudicial risk slightly outweighs the probative value, then these exhibits still must be allowed as evidence because the risk of prejudice must *substantially* outweigh the probative value. The burden of proof to show that the risk of prejudice substantially outweighs the probative value is on respondent, and respondent provided no evidence or argument that any risk of prejudice even exists. The probative value regarding the proposed exhibits is high and respondent has not met her burden to show the risk of prejudice substantially outweighs the probative value of these documents. The objection must be overruled.

STATEMENT OF CHARGES

Pursuant to the General Statutes of Connecticut, §§19a-10 and 19a-14, the Department of Public Health (hereinafter "the Department") brings the following charges against Tiona Stewart:

- 1. Tiona Stewart of Stratford, Connecticut (hereinafter "respondent") is, and has been at all times referenced in this Statement of Charges, the holder of Connecticut registered nurse license number 038404.
- 2. On or about December 15, 2021, the Connecticut State Board of Examiners for Nursing adopted the Consent Order, Petition No. 2017-1275 (hereinafter "the Consent Order"), which placed respondent's nursing license on probation for two (2) years effective January 1, 2022.
- 3. The Consent Order was due, in part, to respondent submitting forged timesheets and receiving compensation for hours she did not work, to misappropriating and/or attempting to misappropriate patient property, and/or to being convicted of one or more counts of larceny. The Consent Order required, in part, that:
 - a. Respondent provide a copy of the Consent Order to any and all employers if employed as a nurse during the probationary period, and cause the Department to be notified in writing by any employer within fifteen (15) days of the commencement of employment as to receipt of a copy of the Consent Order;
 - b. Respondent not be employed as a nurse for a personnel provider service, assisted living services agency, homemaker home health aide agency, or home health care agency, and not be self-employed as a nurse for the period of probation; and/or
 - c. Respondent notify the Department in writing of any change in employment within fifteen (15) days of such change.
- 4. On or about October 12, 2022, respondent was hired at a staffing agency, Pro Med Staff, (hereinafter "employer") as an independent contractor.
- 5. Respondent violated the Consent Order in one or more of the following ways:
 - a. On or about October 27, 2022, she failed to provide her employer with a copy of the Consent Order, and/or failed to cause the Department to be notified in writing by her employer within fifteen (15) days of the commencement of employment as to receipt of a copy of the Consent Order, in violation of paragraph 4B of the Consent Order;

- b. Was employed as a nurse for a personnel provider service, assisted living services agency, homemaker – home health aide agency, or home health care agency, and/or was self-employed as a nurse for the period of probation, in violation of paragraph 4C of the Consent Order; and/or
- c. On or about October 27, 2022, she failed to notify the Department in writing of any change in employment within fifteen (15) days of such change in violation of paragraph 4D of the Consent Order.
- 6. Respondent's conduct as described above constitutes a violation of the terms of probation as set forth in the Consent Order, and subjects respondent's license to revocation or other disciplinary action authorized by Connecticut General Statutes, §§19a-17 and 20-99(b).

I am currently employed at western rehab/civita care of danbury still through the agency and have been for years. I have been a Main charge nurse on one of their units since 2019, under the direction of a supervisor and DNS. I have remained focused on my job and out of trouble. I have been working effortlessly at my job and continue to do so. I have had no disciplinary actions. I have made sure I have gotten my quarterly reviews done as well. I joined Pro staff in hopes to bringing in extra income for my children, I have 2 kids in college, one graduated already in the process and one in her junior year, plus 2 additional kids. "I am their sole provider". When I joined Pro Med was to ensure my kids had a roof over their head and food in their mouths. It was never my intention not to provide Pro med with my consent order, as I gave to the facility like I have done so with Western. I only worked 4 shifts with them and haven't picked up any others. Raquel had informed me that she wasn't given paperwork and I explained to her, and Mrs. Sookram I have always given to facility in pass and was never an issue, so I thought it was ok. I have not worked outside of any facility. I know I am listed as an independent contractor, but as stated I only worked under supervision of a RN and a DNS, never privately, or in a homecare setting. I definitely was not trying to jeopardize my license; I love what I do and don't' know what I would do without my nursing career. I have my children to care for as well as my patients and will be lost without my job.
