Governor Dannel P. Malloy signed the following legislation of the 2017 Regular Session on July 10:

Dear Honorable Members of the Connecticut General Assembly:

Today I am signing Senate Bill 445, An Act Concerning Contracts Between a Pharmacy and a Pharmacy Benefits Manager, the Bidirectional Exchange of Electronic Health Records and the Charging of Facility Fees by a Hospital or Health System. Thank you for taking action on this important bill, which, among other things, prohibits the practice of requiring individuals to pay more for covered prescriptions than they would have otherwise paid if they bought the drug without using an insurance plan. These types of consumer protections are policies that my administration, including the Insurance Department, are very supportive of establishing.

Although I am supportive of the policy behind this legislation, I feel the legislation would have been stronger if the recommendations of both my administration and the Insurance Commissioner had been incorporated. Section 1 of the bill merely *permits* the Insurance Commissioner to enforce this new statute, rather than *requiring* her to do so. While I am confident it will be a priority of the current Commissioner to take appropriate enforcement actions on this matter, I cannot make the same assertion with respect to the priorities of future administrations.

Section 1 also states that violations of this statute fall under the Connecticut Unfair Trade Practices Act (CUTPA), and therefore provides the Department of Consumer Protection (DCP) with the enforcement authority. Undertaking enforcement action under this new law requires resources and subject matter expertise that DCP lacks, which they conveyed repeatedly to policymakers during the legislative session. The Connecticut Insurance Department (CID), on the other hand, has both regulatory authority over insurance carriers, including carriers that use Pharmacy Benefits Managers (PBMs), and existing enforcement authority over those carriers. Extending CID's authority to regulate PBMs and to enforce this new law under their existing authority, as CID proposed in suggested language, would have put all regulation and enforcement of this new law under the appropriate department, and would have provided some much needed clarity for carriers and consumers alike.

In addition to my substantive policy concerns, I have concerns about the manner in which this policy was developed. Subject matter experts within my administration contributed thoughtful workable suggestions throughout the legislative process, as is the standard for developing good public policy. I am dismayed that the suggestions were ignored because, as we all know, an isolated process that occurs behind closed doors with cherry picked input rarely results in good

policy. I would be remiss if I did not caution that such a process will not always have a happy ending, and I urge the proponents to open their doors to a variety of perspectives.

I am further frustrated that an unwarranted and unfounded political attack was directed at my administration. We are all on the side of protecting consumers and this political stunt had no place in the development of this legislation.

In conclusion, I am signing this legislation today because I believe in the real consumer protections established in SB 445, despite the process that was undertaken. I hope that in the future we can work together to create an environment in this state that protects consumers and respects how both businesses and the regulatory framework operates.
