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#### **RIT Roundtable - Are We Ready?**

Instructor: Glen Dube

Description: This class will focus on the concept of RIT and if we are actually ready for a downed firefighter or if we are just checking a box that says RIT. Is a single 3- or 4-person company a RIT? We will review several case study examples of RIT activations for missing members and then have a roundtable discussion of the issues RIT presents officers and departments with. There are legitimate barriers to RIT. Let's talk about it and find a way forward.

Instructor Bio: Glenn Dube is the Deputy Chief of Safety and Training for the Southington Fire Department. He has been a firefighter in Southington since 2001 and an Adjunct Instructor for the Connecticut Fire Academy since 2007. He is certified Fire Officer IV, Fire Instructor III, is a graduate of the National Fire Academy's Executive Fire Officer Program and has a master's degree in Emergency Management from University of New Haven.





#### Why Recruitment is a Priority!

Instructor: Nick Wallick

Description: This session will address the challenges of recruitment faced by many departments trying to fill the roster of candidates. We will discuss budgets, writing a basic recruitment program, social media messages, and regionalization of mutual aid departments to capitalize on resources, and other topics to get started recruiting tomorrow.

Instructor Bio: Nick Wallick has served in the Town of Hebron as a firefighter since 1999, has held many Officers positions including the Fire Chief for eight years until his retirement in 2021. Nick holds numerous training certifications, including Fire Instructor. He teaches regularly as a Hazmat/WMD 472 Instructor and has a certification in Lean Manufacturing as a Continuous Improvement Certification Champion, and Project Management.





#### The Role of the Fire Officer in the Labor-Management Process

Description: Fire officers are in the most advantageous position for employee development. Far too often, however, employee development becomes murky when officers are forced to "discipline" their assigned personnel. This can be complicated when both employees are represented by the same union and their actions are guided by policy outside of a labor agreement. Chief Munson holds an MPA from Marist College.

In attendance to provide a labor perspective will be Brian Gunnoud who has been with the East Hartford Fire Department for 11 years. He became union president in 2022 and was also promoted to Lieutenant in 2022 and is currently assigned to Ladder Company 1 stationed at Fire Headquarters.

#### **After Action Reports**

Description: Common complaints around firehouses: Why do we keep having the same issues? Why doesn't the department ever fix this? Why does Firefighter X or Engine Y continue to perform terribly time after time? After Action Reviews are probably the single best way for an organization to learn and improve from their shared experiences. So why do departments not do them? Or do them incorrectly? What are the barriers to a functional AAR program? This class will look at the AAR, what it is, how to do it well, and most importantly, why it is critical to Firefighter safety. Sample SOPs will be reviewed and the entire process, from creation to implementation, will be discussed.

Instructor Bio: Glenn Dube is the Deputy Chief of Safety and Training for the Southington Fire Department. He has been a firefighter in Southington since 2001 and an Adjunct Instructor for the Connecticut Fire Academy since 2007. As an instructor, Charlie teaches for the Connecticut Fire Academy, as an adjunct with the University of New Haven, and has presented as far away from Connecticut as Oklahoma. He is also involved with the FEMA USAR system and is credentialed as a logistics specialist with the Massachusetts Task Force and as a PIO with the Incident Support Team.





#### Patient Packaging Devices for Technical Rescue

Description: In this session we will discuss the most popular, and some more obscure patient packaging devices. Some of these devices offer many configuration and use options, and we will discuss which make the most sense. We will also discuss some historical perspective of packaging devices, and what the future might hold. This session will include a hands-on demonstration of a packaging device.

Instructor Bio: Chris Parietti has been an adjunct instructor for the Connecticut Fire Academy for 15 years. He has been a member of the Connecticut State USAR team for 20 years. Chris is also a certified Rope Access Technician and certified Rigger.





#### Elevator Emergency Management - The Importance of the Initial Response Procedures

Instructor: Mike Dragonetti

Description: This lecture focuses on the steps to take, upon arrival of a stalled occupied elevator, based on ASME A17.4/2015 recommendations. The safest way to remove a passenger from a stalled occupied elevator, is from the way they walked in and floor level. The ultimate goal is to have the elevator move itself and the doors to open on their own. These tried-and-true practices have worked more often than not and should be performed every time on arrival.

Instructor Bio: Michael A. Dragonetti is a recently retired firefighter of the Stamford (CT) Fire Department, after 28 years of service. For 20 of those years, he was assigned to Rescue Co. 1. He is a nationally recognized fire service instructor and has presented courses in elevator operations at the Fire Department of New York (FDNY) Technical Rescue School (2002-2005). He is a H.O.T. instructor at FDIC International, a contributing author for Fire Engineering Magazine and has appeared in 3 seasons of Training Minutes videos. Prior to developing and teaching "Elevator Emergency Management" in 1999, he had extensive experience in the New York City metropolitan area constructing, modernizing, maintaining, and repairing elevators and escalators with one of the largest elevator companies in the world. He is the founder and president of Dragon Rescue Management, a technical rescue training company.





Fire Dynamics – Understanding the Flow Path in Ventilation Limited Fires

Description: The course provides the Firefighter with the basic knowledge to reinforce the evidence-based research conducted by National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) and Underwriters Laboratories. The presentation introduces new terminology related to Fire Dynamics, Fuel loads, Flow Paths, Door Control and Ventilation that impacts Fire Ground Operations. The class will also consist of Lecture, and small-scale fire behavior demonstration utilizing the alcohol prop.

Instructor Bios: Mike Eremita has been a member of the fire service for 25 years. With the last 15 years on the job in Hartford. Assignments including Firefighter on Ladder 4 & Ladder 2, Driver Engine 16 & Ladder 5, Lieutenant Ladder 4 and presently Captain - Ladder 3. Mike has been an Adjunct Instructor for the CT Fire Academy for the last 11 years at CFA

Adam J. Hansen is an Adjunct Instructor with the CFA and a Battalion Chief with the Milford (CT) Fire Dept. He began his career as a volunteer in his hometown of Branford (CT) in 1999 and was hired with Milford in 2006. Hansen is a graduate of the University of New Haven; Master of Public Administration (MPA) & Bachelor of Science in Fire Science. He is a Nationally Registered Paramedic and holds several state certifications. He works as an Adjunct Professor at the University of New Haven (Fire Science Department) and is an Instructor with Mission CIT.





#### Firehouse Drills: Advanced Forcible Entry

Description: The "Irons Firefighter" is often the Hallmark of a good Truck Company!

This "firehouse style" hands-on drill will go over the locks, hardware, and Tools to enhance one's forcible entry knowledge. Then work on thru-the-lock, inward, and outward Forcible Entry, With a focus on 1-person Forcible Entry skills.

<u>Note: PPE Required</u> – Attendees will be indoors forcing entry into multiple props. Please bring gloves, helmet, and eye protection.

Instructor Bios: Ed has been in the FDNY for over 26 years, working in busy Ladder companies, he is currently a Lieutenant in the South Bronx. Ed got his start in the career Fire service in Connecticut, with the Milford Fire Dept. and has been with the CT. fire Academy for 30+ years

#### Surface Water Rescue Techniques Using a Long Board

Instructor: Daniel Matthews

Description: Since most of North America's waters are defined as cold (70 degrees or less), we need to be prepared to handle cold water emergencies. People can become hypothermic in water less than 91 degrees." This surface water rescue techniques class will focus on using some traditional and some non-traditional methods for FD personnel to employ, when responding to "person in the water" calls.

Utilizing the swimming pool at the Fire Academy, the program will highlight the use of long boards for water rescue response, like the Solstice inflatable rescue board. Attendees should bring a bathing suit / change of clothes and a towel.

<u>Note:</u> This class will take place in the CFA Training pool. Bring a bathing suit, change of clothes and a towel. Students will have full access to the locker rooms including areas to change and shower if needed

Instructor Bio: Instructor Matthews comes to us with an adv. Bachelor's in both Fire Management and Emergency Management, over 28 years of experience in the fire service, and over 17 years of military experience with the United States Marine Corps. Since becoming a firefighter and now a career Fire Lieutenant he has not only strived and continued his own education and training to build upon his knowledge, skills, and abilities, but has also continued to use his ability to help others by teaching and instructing others throughout the CT Fire Service not only in basic firefighting techniques, but also in many of the Technical Rescue Disciplines and Fields.





### Lifting and Stabilization Within Unstable Environments

Instructor: Rich Alfes

Description: This class will address Lifting within a structural collapse environment, which has been extremely controversial. It will address Stabilizing when lifting, (chasing the Load). It will also address Heavy Vehicle Lifting and Stabilizing and discuss some of the equipment available to accomplish these tasks.

Instructor Bio: Rich Alfes is a 30-year fire officer veteran who commanded fire ground and rescue operations with the Naugatuck Fire Department. In charge of (A) platoon, Rich's duties included coverage of 14 square miles of Urban and Rural responses with primary duties of fire suppression and technical rescue operation.

Currently Rich is a Safety Officer / Rescue Specialist and Rigger with the US Department of Homeland Securities, FEMA, Urban Search and Rescue program. He is assigned to the Massachusetts Task Force and is the Task Force Safety Officer. He also serves as a Lead Instructor (L-2) for the National Response Systems Structural Collapse Technician course and Heavy Equipment Rigging Specialist course and Safety Officer. Rich was one of many Rescue Specialists deployed with the Massachusetts Task Force to the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.





The Hot Seat

Description: This course focuses on various topics that include basic leadership, buddy to boss, core values, initial reports, building construction, case studies, leadership in today's fire service, expectations, size up, initial actions, and strategy and Tactics. The culmination of the class runs students through various simulations.

Instructor Bio: Mark is a 35-year veteran of the fire service currently serving the City of New London Fire Department. He also serves as the program planner for the fire officer courses offered through the Connecticut Fire Academy. He has served for 12 years as a Lieutenant, 6 years as a Battalion Chief and is currently serving as the Deputy Fire Chief. He developed this course specifically to address the lack of preparatory courses for new company officers when taking on a new role with hopes of better preparing them the duties and responsibilities.

#### **Cancer Awareness and Prevention for the Modern Educated Firefighter**

The class will also briefly discuss the role of the company officer and managing fire officer in the efforts of cancer prevention and awareness. We look at Connecticut laws that help firefighters and speak about what we really have in this state for protections. The presentation closes with what the Firefighter Cancer Support Network is and what it can do for you if you or a loved one is ever faced with cancer.

Instructor Bio: Jeff Sneller is a Lieutenant in the Town of Manchester for 24 years. He began helping out with the Firefighter Cancer Support Network (FCSN) in 2007. He was the state director in Connecticut for the FCSN for most of those years. Jeff has been a mentor to many other firefighters facing cancer, as Jeff himself is a three-time cancer survivor.





#### Man, VS Machine

Instructor: Cal Brennan

Description: Most agricultural injuries and deaths come from rollovers and entanglements within machinery. This class will touch on the typical man vs machine operations but will come to focus on farm related incidents and considerations. Every response area has agricultural equipment such as tractors, loaders and mowers. We will also cover more farm specific machinery such as hay bailers and auger equipment. The understanding of hydraulics, power take off (PTO) systems and everyday hazards presented on a farm will keep you safe and maximize the chance of survival for the victim.

Instructor Bio: Cal Brennan is a 16-year member of the fire service with both career and volunteer experience. He is currently a Lieutenant with the Hamden Fire Department assigned to Engine Company 3 after serving several years on the department's Squad Company. He is an active volunteer with Beacon Hose Company #1 and is a very active fire instructor within the region. Cal has been around and operated agricultural equipment for many years and recently opened Brennan Brook Farm in Beacon Falls.

He currently is instructing ICS Courses for DEMHS/CFA and is a certified HSEEP Instructor and has developed exercises for CT DEEP.

From grade changes to obstacles such as cars, fences, stairs etc., there are many factors that could hinder our stretch. With that said, it is not always feasible to gear up and go out in our districts and pull line. This class will go over efficiency with hose line deployment, and with training being done in the apparatus bay. Students will not only get great hands-on training with the stretch but will see and learn how it can be done in a way where members can perform multiple evolutions. And all without moving the apparatus! Even in this sterile environment, the difficulty can be increased depending on the proficiency of your members. So, whether you are training newer members to get ready to take out in the field or have a veteran crew that you are looking to change things up a bit with your training, this is for you! Simple, yet practical training that everyone can bring back to their stations. "As the first line goes, so goes the fire." Sets and reps make success!

#### **Command of Special Operations - Not Holding the Hammer**

Description: Technical rescue incidents can be complex and challenging, requiring specialized skills and equipment to safely resolve. As a chief fire officer, it is important to be able to supervise such an incident without being hands-on in order to ensure the safety of both the victims and the rescue team. This two-hour classroom lecture will explore the role of the fire officer in a technical rescue incident, including how to effectively delegate tasks, provide support and guidance to team members, and make informed decisions. Through interactive exercises and real-world examples, participants will have the opportunity to practice the skills necessary to effectively supervise a technical rescue incident from a distance. By the end of the lecture, attendees will have a greater understanding of how to effectively lead and manage a technical rescue incident as a chief fire officer.

Instructor Bio: Christopher D. Zak had over 35 years dedication to the Emergency Services. He brings a wealth of experience to fire service conversations and special operations. Having recently retired as a Battalion Chief in Milford, Connecticut, he embarked on a journey to the Charleston Metro (SC) area, driven by a quest for new opportunities in a training chief position, and found his way there with a Google search.

Chief Carter is the Founder and Executive Director for Girls Future Firefighter Camp, and she is a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Trainer. Chief is a doctoral student studying Critical Infrastructure in Emergency Management in Underserved Communities.

Since nothing is ever perfect, we'll talk about options for self-care, what peer support looks like for leaders, and how to find the right help for the right time.


