## Legislature Hears Arguments on New State Police Training Facility

DAS Commissioner Melody Currey and Commissioner Dora Schiro of DESPP participated in the informational hearing at the Legislative Office Building.

On Tuesday, February 2, the legislature's Public Safety committee held an informational hearing on plans for a New State Police Firearms Training Facility. Commissioner Currey and DESPP Commissioner Dora Schiro were joined by staff: Troop H Commanding Officer Lt. Marc Petruzzi, DAS Staff Counsel Jeffrey Beckham, Property Administrator Shane Mallory, Legislative Program Manager Terrence Tulloch-Reed and Supervising Environmental Analyst Jeff Bolton to give a presentation, discuss the history of this project and how the process was narrowed to three possible sites. Also in attendance were Lt. Governor Nancy Wyman, and Thaddeus Martin, Adjutant General of the Connecticut National Guard.

Lt. Petruzzi gave a comprehensive presentation of how the state determined the current need to

build a new facility. He shared stories of various state troopers responding to dynamic situations and using their firearms.

Petruzzi explained, "Currently, the State Police train officers at a facility in Simsbury that was built on the plains of the Farmington River in 1947. Each spring, as the waters rise the facility floods and in both 2007 and during the Tropical Storm Irene of 2011 the flood waters rose so high the facility was so badly damaged that part of it had to be razed. The cost of flood water damage averages \$30,000 annually with one year costing \$300,000. The frequency of the floods has taken a toll and impacts the training schedule. All 1,100 State Police officers must be certified each year."

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Officer firearms training includes handguns, rifles and shot guns in all weather conditions, as well as dynamic training involving use of state police vehicles. In addition they receive classroom training that includes legal updates, safety instruction and computerized scenarios. The facility operates Monday through Friday from 8 to 4 with some low light training during summer evenings which concludes by 9 pm.

The new facility will include a 55,000 square foot building with classrooms, outdoor ranges and indoor active shooter simulations, gun smith cleaning, lockers and storage. It will have two range control buildings, 125 parking spaces and will be positioned on 30 acres of state land or 100 acres if purchased privately.

DAS' Jeff Bolton gave a Power Point presentation on the process that DAS must go through to reach the narrowed selection of sites proposed. "The search began in June 2013 with a GIS analyses assessment and by identifying parcels in Connecticut with 30 acres or more if state owned or 100 acres if private. We identified sportsman's clubs, sand and gravel pits, old or abandoned airports, brownfields and landfills. We were also approached by private landowners willing to sell. "We categorized these sites by exclusionary criteria and then refined the list using discretionary criteria. Exclusionary criteria means sites not available to the state like protected open space, farmland preservation, floodplains and distance to schools and nursing homes. Discretionary criteria is the environmental resources, social economic and agency needs. We then rank the possible parcels, in this case 3,800 possible sites whittled down to 136 parcels after exclusionary and discretionary screening." After reviewing how buildable the lots were the choice was narrowed down to three options. One was in East Windsor and two in Willington – since then the owner of one of the Willington parcels has withdrawn. In 2015 DAS and DESPP met with the landowners and the first selectmen from each town.

There has been considerable opposition to this project from residents of East Windsor and Willington. U.S. Rep. Joe Courtney proposed a site at the National Guard training facility in East Haven as an alternative to Willington and East Windsor. "DAS reviewed this site and it was found to be inadequate early on," reported Lt. Petruzzi. "In addition, it is a Federal range and they would be charging the state \$895 per day if we were to use it for state training." Representatives at the meeting questioned why the current facility in Simsbury could not be raised above the flood line and rebuilt in its current place. Lt. Mark Petruzzi responded, "We can raise the facility but we still lose access as the roads are completely flooded and officially closed when the flooding occurs."

After an hour long question and answer period the hearing closed. DAS and DESPP will now return to work in order to find and develop this critically needed public safety resource.

# Supplier Diversity Hits the Road

During the 2015 Legislative Session a Public Act was passed that expanded the State Contracting Set-Aside Program to include municipalities. While this addition to the Set-Aside program falls under the oversight and authority of the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO), the DAS Supplier Diversity Team took great opportunity to expand the pool of certified businesses in these communities and HIT THE ROAD, traveling to the municipalities to facilitate discussion with their eligible businesses by educating those companies on the program and the process of applying for Small/Minority certification. This “hands on” approach took-off and a new initiative was born - Community Grown, Community Driven!



Meg Yetishefsky of the DAS Supplier Diversity Program reports that this new initiative brings the program into the communities, reaching out to many local small businesses and helping them to apply for certification, on the spot, in their local library, town hall or other meeting place that has computer access. “As part of the process we are able to communicate with the small business prior to the outreach events allowing the businesses the time to come prepared with the information and documents needed to apply for certification” said Meg. “We started this road show in Simsbury on January 28 at the public library and we were able to work with many businesses from the Farmington Valley area. We also worked with the Upper Albany Merchant Association in Hartford on February 9. The DAS Supplier Diversity unit’s next stop is in the Waterford/ Norwich area in March. Everyone involved is pleased that DAS program representatives are traveling to their community to provide this face-to-face approach to certification. Many local businesses are excited about the opportunities that the certification will provide to the growth of their business.”

The ceremony kicked off with the National Anthem sung by Kevin Haffron, followed by remarks from local dignitaries. Larry Riley, commander of Middletown's

American Legion Post 75, read the names of veterans honored.

The Connecticut Veterans Wartime Service Medal was created by the state legislature in 2005 to honor all Connecticut veterans with qualifying wartime military service, according to a press release. Before that, the state had not honored veterans with a wartime service medal since World War I.

# Housatonic Community College (HCC) and DCS Break Ground for the Campus Extension and Renovation Project

Housatonic Community College (HCC) hosted a groundbreaking ceremony Thursday, March 10 on its Bridgeport campus, officially kicking off the Lafayette Hall expansion project.

The \$45 million project includes additions and renovations to Lafayette Hall and is expected to be completed in the fall of 2017.

Speakers at Thursday's groundbreaking included Bridgeport Mayor Joseph P. Ganim, HCC President Paul Broadie II, Mark E. Ojakian, president of the Connecticut State

College and University system and DAS Deputy Commissioner Bud Salemi. The event was also attended by a crowd of students, staff and faculty.

The four-story addition will encompass over 47,000 square feet of space, which will include a new student services center, science labs, classrooms, library space and two floors of new art studios and classrooms. The expansion will allow Housatonic Community College to grow from about 5,000 students to 8,000.

Robert Giuditta, Director of the State Marshal Commission stated, "State Marshals are appointed to work as sole proprietors, independent contractors, as well as public officers with the status of peace officers, to make service of process in civil and administrative proceedings and also legal executions. State Marshals are appointed by county and work within their county unless authorized by law to go to other counties, or to work statewide."

With the conclusion of the ceremony everyone gathered for coffee, beverages and cake.

# Aspiring Leaders Kicks Off 2016

At CCSU's Institute of Technology & Business Development (ITBD) DAS kicked off its 2016 Aspiring Leaders training session with about 30 participants looking to grow and expand their professional skills. Aspiring Leaders is Connecticut state government's skill-based training program for managers. It is



designed to develop managers to become the next generation of leaders, focusing on critical skills needed for effective leadership today and in the future.

The Aspiring Leaders curriculum focuses on eight areas that incorporate the managerial competencies. They are: strategic planning, results based accountability, leading meetings and facilitation, process improvement, project management, leading through change, leadership, and presentation skills. It incorporates two self assessments: the Myers Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI), and the Leadership Behavioral Analysis II (Blanchard Co.).

Kicking off the event, DAS Commissioner Melody Currey welcomed the attendees and

talked about the work of state employees. "The importance of what you do cannot be overstated," she said. "This course will take your skills to the next level."

Commissioner Currey then had the pleasure of introducing the Governor - Nancy Wyman. "It's a unique pleasure to introduce her as the Governor because Governor Malloy is out of the state today." "I care about state employees and I am proud to be a state employee," said Wyman. "Training, networking and educating employees to help them do their jobs – and sometime do more with less – is something I support."

Each fall, invitations and applications go out to agency heads requesting that they nominate selected managers to attend the next program. The program includes 11 class days and runs from March to June, annually. Interested managers should request consideration from their agency Commissioner to be nominated for next year's program.

# BEST Endorsement of CTfastrak

CTfastrak will be celebrating its one year anniversary this month and what better way to celebrate then to hear a testimonial from one of our own DAS employees.

Leonard Welch is the Director of Unified Communications at BEST and his testimony was featured in a CTfastrak commercial.

### **How did you get involved with CTfastrak?**

I have a friend who works for the DOT as a CTfastrak planner so I'd been getting updates of the plans since construction began. I came to the State in July of 2014 – and as part of my preparation – I wondered whether CTfastrak would be an option for me. Around the time that I started, my friend let me know that there would be

a stop at my building at 55 Farmington Avenue. Living in Berlin – close to the hub station in New Britain – taking CTfastrak seemed like be a great opportunity to reduce what's become a wildly variable commute time. How did your story end up as one of their commercials?

Having a son with after-school commitments, it's sometimes important to know when I'll be home. One day, I sent a text to my wife after I boarded the bus - 'I'll be home at 6:15pm'. I actually walked in the door at 6:14 pm and we both had a laugh.

I took the bus during the first week and talked to my DOT friend about my experience. Weeks later, she asked whether I'd be willing to share my experience with CTfastrak. As part of the process, I had to submit a brief video talking about my experience. I went to a CTfastrak station during the day and had a friend record a video on his phone. In the video, I talked about how – during my early experience on CTfastrak – I'd been able to inform my wife of the exact time that I'd be home. I guess that idea resonated with the review team. It's the one year anniversary of the opening of CTfastrak.

### **How's it been?**

There's been only one downside for me – and this is a very good problem to have – it's been difficult to find a parking space at the Cedar Street station that I use. Obviously, it's because more people are riding, and that's the object. It's working!

I still enjoy taking the bus when my schedule allows, and I particularly enjoy the relaxing ride to work. I also like the social aspects of the ride. When I'm stuck in traffic – trying to get home on-time for a parent/teacher conference - the only person I talk to is myself...and that's typically not a pleasant conversation.

### **WHAT IS CTfastrak?** – from the ctfastrak.com website

CT fastrak is Connecticut's first Bus Rapid Transit system. It is a system of bus routes that utilize a bus-only roadway for all or a portion of your trip.

CTfastrak routes are integrated with the CTTransit system, making it easy to connect, transfer and pay your fare. There are different types of routes and services available. The basic "subway style" route travels between Hartford and New Britain and stops at each of the 10 stations. Express routes exit the bus-only road at downtown New Britain station and travel beyond New Britain to Bristol, Southington, Cheshire, and Waterbury. Circulator routes use the bus-only roadway for a portion of the trip, exiting the bus-only roadway at certain locations to provide service to destinations in Central Connecticut like UConn Health, Westfarms Mall, and Manchester Community College. All routes on the bus-only roadway circulate through the downtown Hartford area to provide access to downtown destinations.

- Discussed specifics related to evacuation procedures for the tenant manual. Sub Committee, suggested either “live” or video training for everyone in building rather than having procedures highlighted only in tenant manual.

### Emergency Protocol Committee Met March 21, 2016

- Shared outline of Welcome booklet and Tenant Manual as related to emergency protocols for fire evacuations, active shooter emergencies, threatening phone calls etc... Statewide Security and Facilities staff will lead “tours” of evacuation paths sometime during the first week of each move in.

## Did You Know

- 1. Each office floor will have an attractive new break room equipped with two new refrigerators, microwave ovens, sink, counters and cabinets in addition to comfortable chairs with tables.
- 2. Each office floor will have a sound masking system to reduce conversations and other sounds (i.e. music, conversations) from traveling to adjacent areas.
- 3. Each office floor will have pleasant views of either the Connecticut River or the downtown skyline.
- 4. We will have 2 water fountains in the break room along with a built-in filtered water bottle filler...eliminating the need for “water clubs”.

# Black History Month Celebration

On Tuesday, February 16 the Gina McCarthy Auditorium was once again filled with employees who braved the snow, ice and rain to take part in the 15th Annual Black Heritage Month celebration. As in the past, this event was co-sponsored by the Departments of Administrative Services (DAS), Agriculture (DoAG), Consumer Protection (DCP), Education (SDE), Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP), Public Health (DPH), the Office of Early Childhood and the African-American Affairs Commission.

Opening the ceremony was Lt. Governor Nancy Wyman, who, as a strong advocate for healthcare and education, said, “we must continue to build Connecticut with fair wages and access to education and healthcare for all – equality for everyone.”



After the singing of the *Lift Every Voice and Sing*, by DAS' Mary Taylor, Chairperson of the Black History Committee, a Moment of Silence for Fallen Soldiers was delivered by Lt. Leroy James. DEEP Commissioner Klee spoke briefly then introduced SDE Commissioner Dianna Wentzell who said, “Early in my career as a social studies teacher I learned how important it is for children to know the history of their ancestral countries. And in learning this history they need to understand the struggles of the African-American people. I know we celebrate this event in February, but we need to celebrate black history year round,” she said.



DCP Commissioner Reviczky asked everyone to keep in mind how our nation evolved because of the struggles of African-Americans.

Deputy Commissioner Toni Fatone spoke of the journey of Richard Allen, for whom this year's stamp commemorates, and noted that the African Methodist Episcopal church (A.M.E) which he founded in Philadelphia in 1816 is now 2,500,000 members strong. She went on to thank this year's 2016 Black History Committee members: Mary Taylor, Tanya Washington, Glenda Rollins, Felicia Canty, Andrea Wadowski, Barbara Brown, Colleen Carter, Maxine Lewis and Rosalyn Thorpe.

Catherine Blinder spoke for DCP Commissioner Harris who was not able to attend. “We need to reach out to

people in the margins of society.” Putting the accomplishments of Richard Allen in perspective she said, “he was an entrepreneur out of nature and need!”

Glenn Cassis, Executive Director of the African-American Affairs says his commission is involved in remedying disparities involving African-Americans in our state, but that they must do more. “We need to do more for a second chance society; we need more minority teachers and administrators; we need to do more for student debt; free



community college for Connecticut students; and legislation is needed to prohibit unethical debt collection practices. In addition, he reminded everyone that this year is the 175th anniversary of the Amistad trial in New Haven and festivities were planned commemorating this event.




# Web Update by John McKay

It's really happening! DAS is in the beginning stages of migrating all information from the BEST, Construction Services and DAS Classic websites into one website on the CT.gov portal.

A team of 32 subject matter experts from across all three business centers have been meeting to aid in this transition. "We believe we have just about every division and unit of DAS covered in helping to organize, verify and eventually move the information over to the CT.gov portal," said DAS Commissioner Melody Currey. "We are going through what is called a migration process to take our current information/content and consolidate it under one website, which will be CT.gov. All information/content will now be organized by 'topic or task,' not by agency or government structure."



The vendor – Connecticut Interactive, LLC (CI) – is working on this "Unification Initiative" to restructure all executive agency information and services, currently found under individual websites, and re-organize it under CT.gov, the official State of Connecticut website. While each state agency will have its own "landing page," they will be fully integrated into the official CT.gov website. DAS is one of the pilot agencies working with the CI team. Our DAS Website Migration Team has been bringing forward a number of challenges that will assist the CI Team as they begin working with other state agencies on their transition. CI's plan is to have all agencies moved off of their existing sites, to the new content management system within the next year.

Information being organized by content/topic and not by state program means that customers (the public or other state agencies) will be able to find needed information without navigating through individual websites.

It's important to understand that this is a huge undertaking. The CI Team and our DAS Website Migration Team are working together on this project to make it easier for our internal and external customers to find needed information through all types of devices.






