**CATASTPOPHIC RELIEF FUND**

<b>DISCUSSION</b>	<p>The Relief Fund is a piece of the larger need. It is felt that this fund will assist families but will not solve the issues families face. Legislators are misinformed about the various resources and often thinking that a fund would pay for non-medical items.</p> <p>Concerns are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The funding source will alienate the business communities.</li> <li>2. Is the Chamber of Commerce included?</li> </ol>		
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	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>3. Could companies receive a tax credit?</li> <li>4. Would some one from New Jersey or Massachusetts come to speak about their Catastrophic Relief Fund?</li> <li>5. Could companies contract better health policies i.e. larger benefit for durable medical supplies?</li> <li>6. Would there be an employee contribution?</li> </ol> <p>The fund as it is written would require any business that is subjected to unemployment tax will pay one dollar per employee. The Legislation uses the New Jersey and Massachusetts model.</p>

### CTFSC FUNDING

These funds are for operational, supplies, and travel.

### TRANSFORMATION GRANT

**BARBARA BUGGELLA AND BERT PLANT**

<b>DISCUSSION</b>	Barbara Buggella from DMAHS The grant focus is on Mental Health. DMAHS is the lead agency. Fifteen state agencies singed an
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agreement to work together. The grant funds 2 million per year and has six goals. The funds are for structure building not for direct services.

1. Consumer, family and youth driven: Looks at services and approach to care paying attention to people's rights.
2. Data: State Departments collect data. The grant looks at the ability to share data between agencies for case management by the Stat Departments adopting memorandums of arrangement to share information.
3. Community Education: Focus on antistigmatic and coordination with BRS.
4. Local school systems: HOPE
5. Workforce Development: Training with existing employers, parent leadership training, and a consultation agency to assist individual with MH issues to join the workforce.

Bert Plant from DCF:

Describes the grant as wrap around services that :

1. Focus on children and youth.
2. Look at existing models.
3. The number of youth who have mental health dilemmas and are involved with juvenile justice. These youths are better served before they reach the juvenile justice system.

Focus areas include:

1. Kid Care Services. Services that were implemented fall short of the family vision and culturally competent focus. A priority is to look at the mistakes and build upon them.
2. Training: staff members were trained but the Agency did not accomplish what was intended follow through was an issue. The Agency needs quality indicators, follow up and supervision.
3. Workforce is a huge issue. Workers need skills to provide the service and it needs to be sustainable. To receive state funding workers need to Provide research, demonstrate that: the needs, the service is sustainable, and what was accomplished.
4. Training package for targeted communities. An RFP will be sent out to provide coordination. An RFQ will also be distributed a community will be a recipient. The community needs to have various community agencies collaborating with them, such as the schools, probation officer etc. There will be flexible funding so that each community can request funding from coordinating entity.
5. Yale University will be looking for outcomes. A focus on school attendance, hospital and residential stays, truancy to name a few.
6. An advisory board will be established.

A parallel but separate focus is the repurchasing emergency psychiatric mobile system to better link with the school system.
