


Come One, Come All!

One of the many books that Eric Sloane wrote, Diary of an Early American Boy: Noah Blake –1805 chronicles the life of the 15 year old boy in diary and story form. Sloane conceived of a project where the cabin, as described by Noah in the book was constructed on museum grounds in the summer of 1974 and open to the public in the fall of that same year.
