CO-SPONSORSHIP BY NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

- **Q:** I am a registered non-profit organization. Can I apply for a UGCG grant?
- A: DEEP may only enter into UGCG grant contracts with Municipalities. If awarded a UGCG grant, the Municipality enters into grant contract agreement with DEEP. Municipalities



often coordinate with non-profit entities on the management of projects proposed on municipally-owned lands. Non-profits properly registered with the Secretary of the State may co-sponsor projects by entering into a project management agreement with the Municipality where the project is to take place and assisting with preparing an application package. To be included as part of the submitted application package, an agreement must be in place between the Municipality and registered non-profit entity for the management of the project proposal. To expedite the grant award process and make payment reimbursements more timely, it is important that the non-profit and municipality have good communication and an effective working relationship. The Department will reimburse the municipality, who then reimburses the non-profit entity.

REQUIRED MATCH & SAMPLE BUDGET TABLE

- **Q:** What percentage of costs do grant funds cover?
- A: This a reimbursement matching program and UGCG grant funds can cover up to 50% of the total project cost. For example, if the total cost of a project is \$50,000, then the State will fund \$25,000 and the applying Municipality must demonstrate match for \$25,000.
- **Q:** What expenses can be accounted towards the 50% match?
- A: Eligible expenses are listed below and generally cover materials, professional services, minor structures such as tool sheds, tools, and rental equipment. Additionally:
 - Donated materials;
 - Donated professional services;
 - Volunteer labor (as of April 2022, the hourly rate according to Independent Sector is \$29.95).
- Q: What types of expenses are eligible?

- Materials:

Such as lumber, soil, mulch, fencing, crushed stone dust, signage, hand tools, and reference books. Funds can be used to purchase native perennial flowers, shrubs, and shade trees. Grant funds cannot be used to purchase plants that are on the <u>University</u> <u>of Connecticut's invasive plant species list</u>.

• Professional Services:

Funding may be used to hire professional architects and engineers. Please note that chosen contractor(s) must be listed as an approved contractor under the Department of Administrative Services, Contractor Prequalification Program. • Structures:

The UCGC grant program aims to promote urban gardens and passive recreation green spaces. Grant funding may be used to purchase minor outdoor structures. Acceptable structures may include small garden sheds, picnic tables, and benches. Funds cannot be used to purchase enclosed structures such as offices, indoor classrooms, wash/pack facilities, or indoor recreation facilities. Funds cannot be used to purchase park amenities such as playscapes, splash pads, barbeques, agility courses, or sports equipment.

- Non-powered Hand Tools: Grant funding may be used to purchase hand tools only such as shovels, hoes, rakes, and irrigation materials. Funding cannot be used to purchase power tools or motorized equipment such as rototillers or motorized yard carts and wagons.
- Construction / Maintenance Equipment Rental: Grant funds may be used to rent equipment for the construction or maintenance of a project.

EXISTING PROPERTY OWNERSHIP

- **Q:** Where can I get a copy of the current deed for the parcel or lot which is the subject of my proposed project?
- A: Town or City Clerk's Offices have public computers you can use to search electronic databases for copies of property cards and property deeds. You can also visit your municipal Assessor's Office in person and ask for the property tax field card(s). Look on the tax field card for the parcel or lot's most current deed book volume(s) and page number(s). Then, go to the Town or City Clerk's Office to retrieve a copy the deed(s).

COMMUNITY NEED & CONSISTENCY WITH OTHER PLANS

- **Q:** Where can I find materials which support my project purpose statement?
- **A:** For finding excerpts of local and State plans of conservation and development related to your project and community need:

Please note that these plans now need to be less than ten years old to be "current" if a municipality submits a proposal and their C&D plan is not current, that project will not be evaluated.
