\$0.05 Fee on "Miniatures"

### Overview

- Effective Oct. 1, 2021
- Wholesalers must assess a \$0.05 fee on all miniature alcohol bottles sold to retailers
- Revenues from the \$0.05 fee are disbursed by the Wine & Spirits Wholesalers of CT (WSWC) on behalf of wholesalers to municipalities each April and October (starting April 2022)

## \$0.05 Fee on "Miniatures"

### A reminder:

- Miniatures are not part of the deposit redemption system
- No state involvement aside from receiving semiannual report from wholesalers/WSWC

# • How can these funds be used by municipalities?

• Public Act 21-58 specifies that "All payments received by any municipality... shall be expended by such municipality on environmental measures intended to reduce the generation of solid waste in such municipality or reduce the impact of litter caused by such solid waste, including, but not limited to, the hiring of a recycling coordinator, the installation of storm drain filters designed to block solid waste and beverage container debris or the purchase of mechanical street sweeper, vacuum or broom that removes litter, including, but not limited to, such beverage containers and other debris from streets, sidewalks and abutting lawn and turf areas."
