The Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) program makes federal funds available to states, U.S territories, Indian tribal governments, and local communities for pre-disaster mitigation activities.

Sub-Applications are due to the State in *FEMA Go* no later than December 2, 2022.

Paper or email sub-applications cannot be accepted.

Eligible Sub-Applicants

- State and Local Governmental Agencies
- Indian Tribal Governments

Local governments are eligible Sub-applicants and can sponsor applications on behalf of homeowners to submit to the Applicant

Cost Share Breakdown by Property Type (Percentage of Federal/Non-Federal Share)

- Project selection is a nationally competitive basis once the state set aside has been reached 75/25

SUB-APPLICANTS MUST HAVE A FEMA APPROVED MITIGATION PLAN BY JANUARY 27, 2023 TO BE ELIGIBLE TO APPLY FOR PROJECT FUNDING

2022 Priority Projects

The BRIC Program will focus on Capability and Capacity Building Activities and Traditional Mitigation Projects:

- Activities that incentivize natural hazard risk reduction activities that mitigate risk to public infrastructure
- Activities that prioritize benefits to disadvantaged communities
- Activities that mitigate risk to one or more community lifelines
- Activities that incorporate nature-based solutions
- Activities that enhance climate resilience and adaptation
- Activities that facilitate the adoption and enforcement of the latest published editions of building codes

FEMA will perform the technical evaluation according to the identified technical evaluation criteria and scoring. A National Review Panel will perform the qualitative evaluation according to the identified qualitative evaluation criteria and scoring. A project's cumulative score from both qualitative and technical evaluations will determine its priority order

Projects will be ranked following the FEMA Priorities and the 2019-2024 State Hazard Mitigation Plan Priorities

Available Funding for the NOFO: \$2,295,000,000

State Set Aside Funding: \$2,000,000

Period of Performance: 36 months

*** Current mitigation plans are not required for applicants and sub-applicants submitting planning sub-applications to develop a new mitigation plan or to update a mitigation plan***

All projects must be cost-effective using FEMA's Benefit Cost Analysis Software or Pre-Calculated Benefits Projects will be ranked within their category by Benefit Cost Ratio. FEMA will accept version 6.0 as the only version as documentation for demonstrating cost effectiveness.
