




CLASS A



CLASS B

CLASS C

Vehicle that does not meet the definitions of Class A or B but is constructed to carry 16 or more passengers (including the driver) or transport hazardous materials which require placards

	School Bus	Class C with P Endorsement
	Pickup with Trailer (hauling hazardous materials)	Class C with H Endorsements

GVWR Gross vehicle weight rating is the weight specified by the manufacturer as the loaded weight of a single vehicle.

GCWR Gross combination weight rating is the weight specified by the manufacturer as the loaded weight of a combination vehicle. In the absence of a value specified by the manufacturer, GCWR will be determined by adding the GVWR of the power unit and the total weight of the towed unit and its load. GVWR information can usually be found inside the driver's door on newer vehicles.

III: Other endorsements may be required in addition to those shown. For example, a hazardous materials endorsement is required when transporting any load that requires placards for hazardous materials on the vehicle.
