Connecticut Department of Agriculture Releases 2022 Farm Transition Grant Guidance

The Connecticut Department of Agriculture announces the informational guidance regarding the 2022 Farm Transition Grant (FTG) is now available at www.CTGrown.gov/grants.

**Applications will be accepted from January 18, 2022, at 12:00 p.m.
until March 8, 2022, at 4:00 p.m.**

The 2022 program will again provide matching funds to Connecticut farmers and agricultural cooperatives for the diversification of existing farm operations, transitioning to value-added agricultural production and sales, and other venues in which a majority of products sold are grown in the state.

Four grant categories, for which eligible applicants can apply, are available.

- **New Farmer Micro Grant:** Supports new individuals/partnerships who have one full year to three years of production history and are seeking long-term careers that financially support them through farming and agriculture.
- **Infrastructure Investment Grant:** Supports farmers in production for a minimum of three years with infrastructure to expand the farm's production and operation.
- **Research and Development Grant:** A grant program for farms to conduct research to assess the viability of and develop a new product line, service, or market.
- **Innovation and Diversification Grant:** A grant program for the implementation of a new product or service for market or business expansion after a research and development phase has been explored.

Applicants will choose one of the four categories of the Farm Transition Grant and submit an application to demonstrate how their project proposal will advance farming and agriculture.

The FTG is a competitive matching reimbursement grant for Connecticut agricultural producers and agricultural cooperatives. The Farm Transition Grant is provided through the State of Connecticut Farm Transition Grant Program, established in 2005 through Public Act 05-228, An Act Concerning Farmland Preservation, Land Protection, Affordable Housing, and Historic Preservation.



NORTHEAST DAIRY BUSINESS INNOVATION CENTER INVESTS IN PROJECTS

The Northeast Dairy Business Innovation Center (NE-DBIC) invests in projects that advance the regional dairy industry. A range of NE-DBIC funding opportunities totaling approximately \$3 million will be available for farmers, processors, and industry partners in 2022:

- **January** – Dairy Product Packaging Innovation Grant: Funding for modernized packaging initiatives that prioritize sustainability, scalability, and marketability.
- **February** – Multi-Business Dairy Agritourism Grant: Funding for projects that elevate multiple dairy businesses through activities that engage consumers and promote regionally produced dairy products.
- **February** – Grazing, Forage, & Alternative Management Cohort Technical Assistance Contract: Contracts for service providers to offer technical assistance to cohorts of farmers in grazing, forage production, or alternative farm management strategies.
- **April** – Dairy Marketing & Branding Services Grant: Funding for value-added dairy processors to access professional services to implement marketing tactics, brand improvements, and overall strategy.
- **June** – Dairy Processor Innovation Grant: Funding for dairy processors to make key developments in operations, products, marketing, and other strategies to position their businesses for long-term success.
- **October** – Dairy Farm Innovation Grant: Funding for dairy farms to take a holistic approach to implementing community- and climate-forward dairy production and business strategies.

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CAES ANNOUNCES RENEWAL OF THE SPOTTED LANTERNFLY QUARANTINE FOR CONNECTICUT

The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station (CAES) in cooperation with USDA APHIS Plant Protection and Quarantine (PPQ) continued to detect expanding populations of the spotted lanternfly (SLF) in Connecticut through 2021. The Director of CAES hereby announces the renewal of the Order of Quarantine for SLF that was established on July 1, 2021, **effective January 1, 2022**. THE BIDEN-HARRIS ACTION PLAN FOR A FAIRER, MORE COMPETITIVE, AND MORE RESILIENT MEAT AND POULTRY SUPPLY CHAIN

The Biden-Harris Administration will dedicate \$1 billion in American Rescue Plan funds for the expansion of independent processing capacity. USDA reviewed nearly 450 comments received over the summer in response to its request for input on how best to increase independent processing capacity. Through their analysis of stakeholder input, USDA identified an urgent need to:

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- Provide producers an opportunity to have ownership in processing facilities;
- Create stable, well-paying jobs in rural regions;
- Raise the bar on worker health, safety, training, and wages for meatpacking jobs;
- Spur collaboration among producers and workers;
- Prompt state, tribal, and private co-investment; and
- Provide consumers with more choices.

To these ends, USDA has increased available funding and is releasing new program details to support the meat and poultry supply chain. To read the full statement from the White House follow the link below.

DEADLINES APPROACHING FOR NRCS FY2022 CONSERVATION FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is announcing the fiscal year 2022 assistance opportunities for agricultural producers and private landowners for key programs, such as the [Environmental Quality Incentives Program \(EQIP\)](#); [Conservation Stewardship Program \(CSP\)](#); [Agricultural Conservation Easement Program \(ACEP\)](#) - Agricultural Land Easement (ACEP-ALE), Wetlands Reserve Easement (ACEP-WRE); [Regional Conservation Partnership Program \(RCPP\)](#); and [Agricultural Management Assistance \(AMA\)](#) program. While USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) accepts applications for these programs year-round, producers and landowners should apply by state-specific ranking dates to be considered for this year's funding. In Connecticut, these dates include:

- January 14, 2022 - Round 2 for both EQIP and AMA
- January 14, 2022 - [RCPP Southern New England Heritage Forest](#)
- January 28, 2022 -ACEP-ALE and ACEP-WRE
- February 18, 2022 -CSP

SIX COUNTIES APPROVED FOR FEDERAL AGRICULTURE DISASTER DECLARATION DUE TO HURRICANE IDA

On Dec. 21, Governor Ned Lamont announced that he has received notice from U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack that an agriculture disaster declaration has been approved for portions of Connecticut due to the impact of the remnants of Hurricane Ida on the state in early September.

The declaration will make farmers in six of the state's counties – including Hartford, Middlesex, New Haven, New London, Tolland, and Windham – eligible to be considered for certain disaster assistance from the Farm Service Agency to cover production losses from the storm, such as emergency loans, provided that eligibility requirements are met. While Middlesex and New London are named as primary counties in the declaration, the other four are named as contiguous disaster counties, making farmers in all six of those named counties eligible for assistance.

Farmers will have eight months from the date of the secretarial disaster declaration to apply for emergency loans. The Farm Service Agency considers each emergency loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of production losses on the farm and the security and repayment ability of the operator. Farmers interested in applying for the assistance must contact [their local Farm Service Agency office](#).

In August, a similar federal agriculture disaster declaration was approved for Connecticut as a result of the damages caused by Tropical Storm Elsa, which impacted the state in early July. That particular declaration applies to all eight of the state's counties, and farmers statewide are still eligible to apply for assistance under it.

- Public or private non-profit organization or association, including labor unions, acting in cooperation with officials of a political subdivision of a State

Individuals or for-profit entities, including for-profit institutions of higher education, are not eligible.

USDA LAUNCHES LOAN GUARANTEE PROGRAM

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack announced USDA is deploying \$100 million under the new Food Supply Chain Guaranteed Loan Program to make available nearly \$1 billion in loan guarantees; these loan guarantees will back private investment in processing and food supply infrastructure that will strengthen the food supply chain for the American people.

USDA is making the funding available through the American Rescue Plan Act. The program is part of the Biden-Harris Administration's efforts to address food system challenges dating back decades and further exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. These investments will help essential processing and supply chain infrastructure that will ultimately deliver more opportunities and fairer prices for farmers, they will give people greater access to healthier foods, and they will help eliminate bottlenecks in the food supply chain.

Food Supply Chain Guaranteed Loan Program

Through the Food Supply Chain Guaranteed Loan Program, USDA will partner with lenders to guarantee loans of up to \$40 million to help eligible entities expand meat and poultry processing capacity and finance other food supply chain infrastructure. Lenders may provide the loans to eligible cooperatives, corporations, for profits, nonprofits, Tribal communities, public bodies and people in rural and urban areas.

USDA Rural Development (RD) will administer the loans. Funding may be used to:

- start-up or expand food supply chain activities such as aggregating, processing, manufacturing, storing, transporting, wholesaling or distributing food.
- address supply chain bottlenecks.
- increase capacity and help create a more resilient, diverse and secure U.S. food supply chain.

USDA is accepting electronic applications from lenders through the Food Supply Chain Online Application System until funds are expended. Paper applications will not be accepted. To access the online application system,
