Initially, I wanted to do an article on fuel prices and what controls them, but since we have no control over that, I felt it would be better to focus on something we can control. My thoughts then turned over to getting what you pay for or need, and octane came to mind.

Does everyone know what octane is? If you remember, the high compression higher horsepower cars of the 60's and 70's they needed the higher-octane fuel or they would ping (knock) like crazy. This pinging was usually improper ignition timing or the octane of the fuel you were burning was too low.

Which brings me back to the question, what is octane? Basically, the octane rating given to gasoline tells you how much the fuel can be compressed before it spontaneously ignites. When gas ignites by compression rather than a spark plug, this causes knocking (pinging) and is not good for the engine. Lower octane gas (regular 87-octane gas) can handle the least amount of compression before igniting. Now let's get into exactly what octane means.

The name octane comes from the following fact: When you take crude oil and "crack" it at a refinery, you end up getting hydrocarbon chains of different lengths. These different chains can then be separated from each other and blended to form other fuels.

For example, methane, propane, and butane are all hydrocarbons. Methane is a single carbon atom. Propane is a three-carbon atom and butane has four carbon atoms chained together. This continues through pentane, hexane, and heptane until we reach octane that has eight carbon atoms chained together.

Octane handles compression very well without spontaneously combusting. All that being said, an 87 percent octane gasoline contains 87 percent octane and 13 percent heptane (or some other combination of fuels that produce the same performance of this mixture).

National Nurses Week begins each year on May 6th and ends on May 12th, Florence Nightingale's birthday. In celebration of National Nurses Week, the Connecticut Department of Correction would like to recognize the 2007 Nightingale Awards for Excellence in Nursing recipients from UCONN Correctional Managed Health Care. #### Did You Know Cont'd

During World War 1, chemists discovered that you can add a chemical called tetraethyl lead (Tel) to gasoline and improve its octane rating above the octane/heptane combination. This meant that cheaper grades of gasoline could be made usable by adding Tel., which led to the wide spread use of "ethyl" or "leaded" gasoline. Unfortunately, the side effects of adding the lead were not environmentally sound. This caused lead to be banned, which caused gas prices to rise because refineries could no longer boost the octane rating of cheaper grades of gas.

Airplanes are still allowed to use leaded gasoline (known as AvGas) and octane ratings of 100 or more are commonly used in high performance and airplane engines. In the case of AvGas, 100 is the gasoline's performance rating, not the percentage of actual octane in the gas. The addition of Tel., boosts the compression level of the gasoline, it doesn't add more octane.

Now you know what octane really is. Don't use a higher octane than your owner's manual calls for and you will only be paying for what you need.
