Paying their Respects

When Correction Officer Wender Garland passed away recently, at the age of just 52, his correctional family quickly learned that the circumstances of his life would affect him even in death. The quiet and reserved second shift officer, who had served the state for nearly 20 years had been a foster child and therefore had no direct blood relatives to see to his burial. It was also discovered that he had never changed his beneficiary from his foster mother, who had passed several years ago. With his benefits at issue, and no direct relatives, his correctional family immediately stepped in to insure that Officer Garland would have a proper funeral and burial. Within just a few days, through a picnic, tee shirt sales and direct

donations, the staff of Cheshire CI raised the more than \$9,000 that was necessary for the service and internment that took place on Wednesday, July 16, 2008. "I could not be prouder of my staff and their sense of care for each other," said Warden Charles Lee. Commissioner Theresa C. Lantz, who attended the picnic, as did members of her executive team, echoes the warden's sentiments. "The degree of compassion that staff has shown speaks volumes of the character of the men and women who make up this agency," she said. As staff flipped burgers and sold raffle tickets on CO Garland's behalf, they stressed one message be delivered throughout the agency. Check your benefits and make sure they are up to date as to who will see to your homegoing.

DOC Returns to its Roots

Long before the houses of Connecticut's suburbs began cropping up within view of the perimeter fences of the state's correctional facilities the surrounding land had long been used for farming. As recently as the late 60's, the harvest from those fields, tended by inmates, became part of the nightly meal in the chow hall. While this is

still common practice in some of the country's more rural states, the value of land in Connecticut long ago meant that inmate food would come only via the delivery truck. With some highly skillful buying by the Food Services Unit, the cost of three meals a day per inmate long hovered at about \$2.00. But with higher fuel prices, the demand for corn as fuel and several other economic factors, shopping for 19,400 isn't what it used to be. As a result, a number of Connecticut correctional facilities are literally returning to the land. At Corrigan-Radgowski C.C. in Uncasville, a long time vegetable garden has been greatly expanded and a second patch of land is also being cultivated with everything from peppers, to squash and even herbs. The combined two acres is expected to produce some 5,000 pounds of food for the inmate table this year, with enough left over to be frozen for winter use. "It's a win all around," said Warden

John Sieminski. "The inmates learn a productive job with a sense of accomplishment, we can serve more nutritious food and we are saving the taxpayers money." A garden at Bergin C.I. in Storrs has also begun producing fresh produce for the chow hall. The administration of Commissioner Theresa Lantz is now encouraging a return to farming for all facilities that have the space and inmates who are cleared for the work.

Digging Up the Past

The historic Shaker farming community in Enfield and the Carl Robinson Correctional Institution are so intertwined that at times the link between the past and the present are literally set in stone.

Since its creation, the walkway leading from the conference center down to Crescent Lake has included three Shaker headstones. Until now that is. In early July, maintenance staff delicately chiseled the old headstones out of the walkway, and carefully delivered them to the Martha A. Parsons Memorial Trust. Eventually, the grave marker in the best condition will be displayed among other Shaker artifacts in the Enfield house museum.

Members of the Crescent Lake community have expressed concerns about the use of tombstones as part of a walkway, according to Mark Rashaw, plant facilities engineer for the Department's north district. "But they were there long before the Correctional Institution came to own the property," he said.

Just how these grave markers came to be used as part of a walkway is more a case of pragmatism than disrespect. They were simply recycling, says Martha A. Parsons Memorial Trust Chairman Dick O'Brien.

In the early years of the 20th century, the Shaker community replaced all of the headstones in their graveyard, located across the street from the Carl Robinson facility, with uniform markers. The Shakers believe that all members of their community were equal and no one should have a bigger gravestone than anyone else. The old headstones no longer served their original function, so the Shakers distributed the stones to be reused for

paving. "The Shakers were a very practical people, and a flat stone was a flat stone," O'Brien said.

It is hard to imagine that relocating three head stones, could touch the lives of so any people more than 150 years after they were created. Those who thought that it was disrespectful to use tombstones as part of a walkway, have been appeased. Also, added Rashaw, "the folks from the museum are happy to have the headstones, and we were happy to help."

Williams, as well as those who only knew him as one of us. As we reflected on his life, I was also struck by the fact that his death, in a motorcycle accident, is becoming an all too common incident for our staff. Over the past five years of my administration, I have attended far too many funerals of DOC men and women that resulted from motorcycle fatalities, and even visited one staff member in the hospital as a result of a crippling accident.

Please understand that I am not about to preach against owning and riding motorcycles. While I have never ridden one, I can appreciate the allure that they hold for many, including members of my executive team. What I am asking is that for you who do ride, to be as careful as is possible.

The number of registered motorcycles in the state has risen from 61,000 in 1985 to more than 89,000 last year. That does not count the increasing number of those who are now riding even more due to frustration over today's high gas prices. For just the first nine months of 2007 (the latest time period studied) there were 39 riders and five passengers killed in accidents.

On behalf of your fellow staff and myself I would ask the following:

· Take a Department of Transportation rider education course. Even if you have been a motorcyclist for years, refresher training, which we do in the agency every year, is always beneficial in helping you reinforce those important skills. Information is available on the DOT website at www.ct.gov/dot.

· Make sure your motorcycle is in good operating condition. Something as simple as a badly worn tire or a lack of air pressure (when is the last time you checked that) could cause you to lose control. A yearly check up at the dealership may cost a few hundred dollars but it is far less costly than the alternative.

· Ride within your ability. This obviously includes obeying traffic rules, particularly the speed limits. But also, if you are not experienced and comfortable carrying a passenger, don't do so. The extra weight changes the center of balance of the motorcycle and makes it much more difficult to handle.

· Lastly, do not drink and drive. While that is crucial for the operation of any motor vehicle, the affect of alcohol on your coordination, reflexes and balance are nothing less than disastrous on a motorcycle.

Please accept this as a heartfelt request, not just on my behalf, but also from your fellow staff who want you at their side, safe and on duty.
