Signal #1 – The New Radios Are Here

After months of testing and reviewing staff evaluation sheets, the Radio Advisory Committee has voted-on, and approved TAIT as the manufacturer to replace the "old" EF Johnson portable radios currently in use throughout the agency.

Beginning in October, Facilities Management & Engineering will start rotating the new TAIT model 9500 radios into Enfield CI, Northern CI, Osborn CI; followed by Willard/Cybulski CI and Robinson CI in November. It is anticipated that the deployment of the TAIT radios statewide will be completed by the fall of 2009.



The purchase of the new radios is the culmination of more than a year's work by a 15-member committee comprised of District Administrators, as well as staff from: Tactical/Armory Operations, NP4 - Union, Engineering, MIS and District 1 Radio Specialists. The main purpose of the committee was to find, test, evaluate and purchase the best possible radio equipment available that fit the Department's needs.

To achieve this goal, the committee purchased four radios from five different manufacturers with all hardware, software, batteries, chargers, holster etc., for evaluation. The five manufacturers chosen were Motorola, Tait, MA/COM, Kenwood, and EF Johnson. These radios were field tested by line staff at four correctional facilities. The facilities chosen were Hartford CC, Robinson CI, MacDougall CI, and York CI. Each facility received four radios to be tested on first, second and third shifts. Each manufacturer was tested for the entire week then rotated into the next facility. Tactical and District 1 Electronic Shop also performed rigorous testing on performance and functionality.

On September 17, 2008, the NP-4 and NP-8 Executive Staff met with the Radio Committee and were presented with the Committee's findings and supported the Committee's decision.

US Attorney's Office Recognizes DoC's Staff

At a recent awards ceremony, The United States District of Connecticut Attorney's Office recognized the contributions of two Department of Correction staff members. Counselor Supervisor John Aldi and Lieutenant Sean Sullivan were award recipients at the event held September 12th at the Shubert Theater in New Haven. During the ceremony, a sampling of criminal and civil cases that were completed during the past year were highlighted. The case in which Lieutenant Sullivan was recognized for his assistance involved the targeting of suppliers of the drug PCP in the New Haven area. After identifying the distributors, an FBI-led task force was able to not only dismantle the PCP enterprise run by local gang members, but also to identify and arrest the PCP supplier in New York.

Did You Know?...

How does GPS work, and is now the time to invest in one?

GPS, short for Global Positioning System, allows people to know exactly where they are without having to use a map and compass. GPS works by communicating with satellites orbiting the earth. The satellites transmit a signal telling their position which is received by the GPS unit. The GPS unit then compares the information between 3 or 4 satellites, and can calculate where you are on the surface of the earth. GPS units are becoming increasingly affordable, and provide you with the security of knowing where you are, no matter how far from home.

But what does this mean?

This means that you never have to get lost driving again! GPS systems are no longer exclusive items, they can be bought for as cheaply as \$150 dollars at stores such as Staples, Best Buy, Target, and even Wal-Mart. High end GPS units can still cost over \$1000 dollars, but spending as little as \$200 can give you a well equipped unit that will speak aloud directions as you are driving.

What should I buy?

For use in an automobile, the most popular units are TomTom, Garmin, and Magellan. Most devices are mounted to your dash or windshield with a suction cup, and allow you to plug them into a 12 volt outlet such as your cigarette lighter or alternate accessory outlet. For around \$150 dollars the low end models will allow you to enter in destinations and get visual directions on where to turn. Don't worry, if you miss a turn, all GPS units will recalculate your route as if nothing happened! More expensive models, \$250+ will speak to you as you are driving, calling out street names and places to turn, and even allow you to enter your destination by speaking into the unit rather than typing. And once you reach a destination, simply hit a "Return" button, and enjoy directions back to your home. The highest end models are Bluetooth enabled and function as a hands free cell phone unit. Some also provide real time traffic updates, suggesting alternate routes around construction sites and accidents.



I am currently looking for a GPS unit myself, and have found the TomTom 130S,

which provides turn by turn spoken directions and many other features for only \$200 to be a excellent deal. If you are interested in a GPS unit, Staples always has a wide variety of them on display for easy comparison, and there is even more information available on the internet. And just remember guys, with a GPS unit you will never have to ask for directions again!
