## **Rate of Dying by Legal Intervention in Connecticut from 2015 to 2019 by Race/Ethnicity**

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During an interaction between law enforcement and the public, for instance, as during an arrest, has the potential to escalate, ultimately leading to lethal use of force by law enforcement. So, the population at risk of dying from lethal force by law enforcement, a legal intervention, are those people under arrest. The denominator (population at risk) used in the calculation for the rate of dying by legal intervention will be number of arrests (all-manners) by race/ ethnicity from 2015 to 2019. The arrest data by race/ethnicity was obtained from the Crime Analysis Unit of the State Police. See Table 1.

The standards for race and ethnicity are as follows: White Non-Hispanic, Black Non-Hispanic, American Indian/Native American, Asian or Pacific Islander Non-Hispanic, then Hispanic.
