- Excellent job on the first sections of the report. Both of you did a great job summarizing what we did


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- To add somewhere perhaps: Moving forward, establish ongoing communication to keep a tab on progress of implementation
- Once the Governor, SDE, etc receive this, what are the next steps? How will the document be distributed around the state? What will be the expected impact of the document at the district level?
- Wish I had known the Governor was coming...
- Don't limit the debate on the final draft, there hasn't been much debate
- We need to add recommendations for student success
- Please bear in mind that the final report that we will submit to the Governor is not the end of the process of seeking to improve the quality and consistency of Common Core implementation efforts. If the standards are to have staying power, work must continue.
- A recommendation for districts and SDE: continue writing legislation that allows districts to shift from Carnegie units/seat time as the primary graduation requirement so students advance when they demonstrate knowledge and skills – no sooner, no later
- Recommendations for professional learning on the CCSS for nonclassroom faculty
- Feel the document is a good beginning
- Would like to continue this process at our next meeting
- Want to make sure we include professional learning for noninstructional support staff (school counselor, psychologist, social worker)
- Addressing the needs of sped/ELL/bilingual (IEP/504's)
- We need to have consensus on the recommendations. I want to hear the feedback from other task force members.

What is consensus?

Consensus is...

- Consensus is a group process where the input of everyone is carefully considered and an outcome is crafted that best meets the needs of the group. It is a process of synthesizing the wisdom of all the participants into the best decision possible at the time.
- Consensus is a group discussion where everyone's opinions are heard and understood, and a solution is created that respects those opinions.
- Consensus results in the best solution that the group can achieve at the time. in order to settle the issue.
- Consensus unites a group around what it can collectively "live with," "agree to," or "gives permission to."
- Consensus accounts for dissent and addresses it, although it does not always accommodate it

Consensus is not...

- □ Consensus is not a majority vote.
- Consensus is not what everyone agrees to, nor is it the preference of the majority.
- Consensus is not unanimous agreement. Participants may consent to an decision they disagree with, but recognize meets the needs of the group and therefore give permission to.

- The best way to determine consensus is to actually understand each person's arguments, even if they are divided on the surface.
- Consensus can be found by looking for common ground and synthesizing the best solution that the group can achieve at that time.
- Remember, the root of "consensus" is "consent". This means that even if parties disagree, there is still overall consent to move forward.


