In accordance with Public Act 86-420, as amended, the State Bond Commission may authorize the issuance of up to \$29,614,747 of revenue bonds of the clean water fund for the purpose of financing both state authorized clean water and safe drinking water loans and federal authorized loans with less cost to the state general fund. At previous meetings of the State Bond Commission funds were approved to finance estimated grants and loans for various projects through the issuance of general obligation bonds of the clean water fund for safe drinking water fund purposes. This request is to repeal portions of certain prior requests which represent the authorized and unissued state loans previously approved as general obligations which will be authorized and allocated under the revenue bond authorization. As a result, the unallocated will increase respectively and will be available for future safe drinking water projects at the discretion of the State Bond Commission.

In accordance with Public Act 86-420, as amended, a combined sewer project shall receive a grant of fifty percent of the cost and a loan of fifty percent of the cost. Any other eligible water quality project shall receive a grant of twenty percent of the cost and a loan of eighty percent of the cost. However, a construction project undertaken for nitrogen removal shall receive a project grant of up to thirty per cent of the cost of the project associated with nitrogen removal and a loan for the remainder of the costs of the project, not exceeding one hundred per cent.

Also in accordance with Public Act 86-420, as amended, revenue bonds shall not constitute a charge, lien or encumbrance, legal or equitable, upon any property of the State or of any political subdivision thereof, except the property mortgaged or otherwise encumbered under the provisions and for the purposes of Sections 22a-475 to 22a-483 of the General Statutes, inclusive.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STATE BOND COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In accordance with Chapter 266a et seq. of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended (the "Act"), the State Treasurer is hereby authorized to issue and sell Bradley International Airport General Airport Revenue Bonds of the State (the "Bonds") authorized by this commission to be issued in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$194,000,000 to finance and refinance improvements at Bradley International Airport (the "Airport"). The State Treasurer is delegated the authority to determine the terms and particulars of the Bonds in accordance with the provisions of the Indenture and the First Supplemental Indenture hereinafter mentioned.

Section 2. The State Treasurer is authorized to sell such bonds at public sale on sealed proposals or by negotiation, in such manner, at such price or prices, at such time or times, and on such terms and conditions as the State Treasurer shall determine to be in the best interests of the State.

Section 3. Pursuant to the Act, the issuance of the Bonds shall be authorized by a Trust Indenture between the State and the trustee named therein (the "Indenture") and a First Supplemental Trust Indenture between the State and the trustee named therein (the "First Supplemental Indenture") containing the terms and conditions of their issuance and delivery. The State Treasurer is authorized to determine the form, date or dates, maturities of serial or term bonds, date and manner of sale, interest rate or rates and due dates thereof (including the issuance of such bonds at fixed rates or variable rates, and as capital appreciation or current interest bonds), the denominations and

of such bonds, registration, conversion and privileges, the terms of redemption with or without premium, and all other terms and conditions of such bonds and of the issuance and sale thereof, as she shall determine to be in the best interests of the State, as provided in and subject to the requirements of Section 15-1011(c) of the Connecticut General Statutes, as amended. The Indenture and the First Supplemental Indenture, placed on file with the Secretary of this commission and a summary of which has been submitted to this commission, hereby approved, with such changes, substitutions, deletions, additions or amendments as the State Treasurer shall determine to be necessary or appropriate, in the best interest of the State and in accordance with the intent of its passage at this meeting, and any and all delegations of authority granted under the Indenture and the First Supplemental Indenture to the State Treasurer are hereby expressly ratified.

Section 4. The State Treasurer is authorized to obtain from a commercial bank or insurance company authorized to do business within or without the State a letter of credit, line of credit or other liquidity facility or credit facility for the purpose of providing funds for the payments in respect of the Bonds required by the holders thereof to be redeemed or repurchased prior to maturity or for providing additional security for the Bonds.

Section 5. The State Treasurer is hereby further authorized to cause the preparation and distribution of a Preliminary Official Statement of the State for use in connection with the offering and sale of the Bonds. Upon the sale of the Bonds, the State Treasurer shall prepare and distribute a final Official Statement and is hereby authorized to execute and deliver such Official Statement to the purchasers of the Bonds in the name and on behalf of the State. Such Official Statement also may be signed by the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management and the Commissioner of the Department of Transportation.

The Governor, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Section 6. Comptroller, Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management, Secretary of the State, and the Commissioner of the Department of Transportation or their duly authorized representatives are hereby authorized on behalf of the State to take any and all action necessary and proper to effect the purposes of this resolution not inconsistent herewith including the execution and delivery of any and all documents, certificates instruments related to, necessary and appropriate in connection with the sale, issuance and delivery of the Bonds, including but not limited to, (1) contracts of purchase, (2) financial advisory agreements, (3) reimbursement agreements, (4) remarketing agreements, (5) standby bond purchase agreements, (6) any other necessary or appropriate agreements in connection with obtaining any liquidity facility or credit facility with respect to such Bonds and (7) any contracts deemed necessary or appropriate by the State Treasurer to place the limited revenue

The Treasurer is further delegated the authority to enter agreements on behalf of the State with respect to the issuance and sale of said bonds, including financial advisory agreements, bond purchase agreements, secondary market disclosure agreements and agreements with respect to the issuances, sale and securing of such bonds, including agreements referred to in Section 3-20r of the General Statutes and tax compliance agreements, and the full faith and credit of the State is hereby pledged to the State's payment obligations under any such agreements.

Section 4. The Treasurer is further delegated the authority to determine the form, date or dates, maturities of serial or term bonds, date and manner of sale, interest rate or rates and due dates thereof, and all other terms and particulars of such bonds including denominations and designation, registration, conversion and transfer privileges and terms of redemption with or without premium, as she shall determine to be in the best interests of the State, provided she shall file a certification of determination with the Secretary of the State Bond Commission on or before the date of delivery of such bonds setting forth the details and particulars of such bonds determined by her in accordance with this delegation.

Section 5. The Treasurer is hereby further authorized to cause the preparation and distribution of a marketing document or documents, including a Preliminary Official Statement or Official Statement of the state for use in connection with the offering and sale of the Bonds should such document or documents be deemed necessary by the Treasurer.

Section 6. This resolution will take effect immediately.

RESOLVED, (1) that the requests and certificates and the appropriate resolutions to effect the bond authorizations and bond sales approved today are hereby approved and adopted; (2) that the resolutions and the State Treasurer's certificate as to state indebtedness made in accordance with section 3-21 of the general statutes, as amended, be made a part of the record of today's meeting; (3) that the State hereby declares the official intent of the State required pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Federal Income Tax Regulations, Title 26, with respect to each of the agenda items approved today, to the effect that the State reasonably expects to reimburse from the proceeds of borrowings any and all expenditures paid from the bond fund accounts designated and functionally described in each such agenda item or bond authorization resolution, in an amount anticipated not to exceed the amount of the authorization contained in such item or bond authorization resolution, and that the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management and the Treasurer are authorized to amend this declaration of official intent on behalf of the State for any such item; and (4) that the State Treasurer is authorized to make representations and enter into agreements to provide secondary market disclosure information with respect to borrowings by State authorities or other entities, or by the State itself, in connection with which the State may be an obligated party under Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.
