


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BJA Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) JAG is OJP's flagship grant program and the leading source of federal justice funding to state, local, and tribal jurisdictions. There are nine broad purpose areas: Law enforcement programs 6) Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement Prosecution and court programs 7) Crime victim and witness programs (noncompensation) 3) Crime Prevention and education 8) Mental health programs (and related law enforcement and corrections programs, including behavioral programs and crisis intervention teams)

Implementation of state crisis intervention court programs Corrections and community corrections, including reentry proceedings and related programs or initiatives 5) Drug treatment and enforcement (including but not limited to mental health courts, drug courts, veterans' courts, and extreme risk protection order programs) programs

Receive funding to plan, implement, and enhance adult treatment courts for individuals involved with the justice system who have substance use disorders, including stimulant, opioid, and other substances. and other substances.

Maximum per Award

Up to \$900,000 per award for planning and implementation, including no-cost training and technical assistance (TTA)

Up to \$1,000,000 per award for enhancement, including no-cost TTA

Up to \$2,500,000 per award for statewide, including no-cost technical assistance




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
