Monthly Indicators Report

Highlights

- The prison population was stable during August. On September 1st, 16,577 people were incarcerated in Connecticut. A month earlier, there were 16,569 prisoners in state prison facilities.
- Effective August 29th, James Dzurenda stepped down as Commissioner of the CT DOC to accept a position as First Deputy Commissioner at the DOC for the City of New York. He held the position for less than one year. Governor Malloy appointed Deputy Commissioner Scott Semple to lead the Department on an interim basis. Semple served as Warden at Garner CI, in Newtown, from 2009 to 2013.
- The volume of pre-trial offenders entering prison during the summer months has been trending downward in recent years (see chart 2a). Monthly statewide arrests have declined even more during the same period.
- The number of parole hearings continued to edge up this month. The number of offenders who were granted parole dates also increased during August although not to the levels witnessed in 2012 (see table 4b).
- The adult probation caseloads have been falling. Last month 42,137 people were on adult probation supervision. A year ago, in August, the number was 44,533. In 2012, there were 47,750 adult probationers in the state.

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Prison Population Forecast

The prison population was expected to jump during August. Instead, it remain relatively flat. Total admissions to prison were down 7.5% compared to August last year (see table3). It is not clear why.

At this point, it would not seem unreseasonable to estimate the end-of-the-year prison population dropping to somewhere in the region of 16,100 to 16,200. That said, the behavior of prison population trends in recent years have helped to illustrate that accurate forecasting is as much the product of good luck as of science.

The Research Unit at OPM is expanding. A by-product of this expansion will be an effort to develop a more accurate predictive model of the prison system. From Chart 2, one can get a sense that the state’s criminal justice system, including its prisons, is a multi-legged creature with many moving parts. The ability to develop better reporting and more-granular insight into operations should hopefully result in better system-wide modeling in the near future.

 January 1, 2013 through February 1, 2015






Chart 2 - Criminal justice, monthly counts and flows

Chart 2a – Trends in summertime pre-trial prison admissions, 2009 - 2014



Pre-trial prison admissions during the months of May through August have fallen off in recent years. In 2009, approximately 2,000 pre-trial offenders were admitted to prison each month between May 1st and September 1st. This year, the average number of admissions was 1,624, a 19.1% decline.

The reasons for this development are not immediately apparent although the trend itself may help to explain why the prison population has not grown at the rate OPM forecast in February.

Coincidentally, perhaps, statewide criminal arrests during the same four-month period declined as well. In 2009, police agencies in the State reported 44,941 criminal arrests. During the same period in 2014, they reported only 32,585 arrests, a 27.5% drop.

The historical data reveals a useful rule-of-thumb relationship between criminal arrests and pre-trial admits. In a typical month, one DOC pre-trial admit is clocked for every five criminal arrests reported.

September 1, 2014 to September 7, 2014




Chart 6 – Monthly DOC Admissions

July 2013 through August 2014




Chart 4 – Prison population, first-of-month

2013 and 2014




Chart 7– Remands from community release

August 2014




Chart 5 – Statewide criminal arrests

2013 versus 2014





Chart 8 – DOC community supervision
