 - Working in collaboration with the LEGO Group. Over 3500 Replay Sets were distributed to all public school 1st graders in Waterbury and Bridgeport along with an additional 180 sets to needy students in Enfield, LEGO's US Headquarters.



Child Nutrition Programs

- <u>School Child Nutrition Programs Under COVID-19</u>
- Emergency School Meals Program
 - 132 Programs, 460 Sites, 8-Million meals since the closure of schools in March; 123 At-risk After-school Supper Programs
 - Waivers and Summer Extensions
- Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) Program (DSS Partnership) 290,000 students receive a one-time benefit of approximately \$365 each (Total: \$105-Million)
 - Phase 1 Late May: Students in households receiving benefits through SNAP and TANF
 - Phase 2 June 7th: Students in households enrolled in Medicaid (HUSKY A)
 - Phase 3 Mid-June: Students not included in Phase 1 or Phase 2 but *receiving* free or reducedprice school meals when school is in session
- Meals to You Program
 - Rural food box delivery program
- State FEMA Application
 - Funding to support additional meal services
