Enrollment Requirements for Haitian Refugee Students



Many schools in Connecticut are now facing the need to enroll students that have recently been displaced by the catastrophic earthquake and aftershocks in Haiti. The federal McKinney-Vento Act that requires schools to immediately enroll homeless students into school may be in effect for Haitian refugee students. To determine their homeless status, the school nurse or nursing supervisor should collaborate with the district's local education liaison. The McKinney-Vento Act allows students to enroll without health and immunization information. Once enrolled, many school nurses will be faced with the challenge of working with families and health care providers to obtain the necessary health information. Due to the devastation in Haiti, it will take several months to recover health records, if ever. In the meantime, the Connecticut State Department of Education and the State Department of Public Health has provided guidance on health assessments and immunizations for this population. Allowable Milk Substitutions for Nondisabled Children in the U.S. Department of Agriculture School Nutrition Programs

Schools participating in the U.S. Department of Agriculture school nutrition programs (National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, After-School Snack Program, Seamless Summer and Special Milk Program) must follow the federal requirements for milk substitutions for nondisabled children. These requirements apply to accommodations for children **without disabilities** who can not drink milk, i.e., children who do *not* have a life-threatening food allergy to milk.

School districts have the **option** to make this accommodation and offer an allowable fluid milk substitute for children without disabilities. If the district chooses to make allowable milk substitutions available, they must be available for *all students* when requested by their parent/guardian or medical authority.

SUBJECT: Enrollment Requirements for Haitian Refugee Students

Many schools in Connecticut are now facing the need to enroll students that have recently been displaced by the catastrophic earthquake and aftershocks in Haiti. The federal McKinney-Vento Act that requires schools to immediately enroll homeless students into school may be in effect for Haitian refugee students. To determine their homeless status, the school nurse or nursing supervisor should collaborate with the district's local homeless education liaison. If determined homeless, the McKinney-Vento Act allows students to enroll without health and immunization information. Once enrolled, many school nurses will be faced with the challenge of working with families and health care providers to obtain the necessary health information. Due to the devastation in Haiti, it will take several months to recover health records, if ever. In the meantime, the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) and the State Department of Public Health (DPH) would like to provide the following guidance on health assessments and immunizations for this population.

Health Assessments

Health assessments including a tuberculosis test (PPD skin test) should be completed by a primary care provider in Connecticut once the family has access to health insurance (either privately or through the Healthcare for Uninsured Kids and Youth [HUSKY] program). Other options may include a health assessment through a school-based health clinic or local health clinic. For information on Medicare and HUSKY eligibility, contact the Department of Social Services toll-free at 1-877-CT-HUSKY (877-284-8759).

Immunizations

Most students will arrive in Connecticut without immunization records. Given the limited public health infrastructure in Haiti before the earthquake, students arriving without documentation should be considered unvaccinated. Such students should start their vaccination series as soon as possible after enrollment according to the immunization catch up schedule. Students may access community health centers or local health departments for needed immunizations or contact the Immunization Program for help in locating access to vaccination sites.

Recognizing that the McKinney-Vento Act may provide some key services and support for eligible students, the National Center for Homeless Education has posted information about this topic on its Web site at <http://www.serve.org/nche/index.php#new>. In addition, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has information on other health concerns that may be useful to you. Organizations Offering to Provide Oral Health Services in Schools

The State Department of Public Health (DPH) and the Connecticut State Dental Association (CSDA) have received many questions from schools regarding dental organizations offering to provide oral health services to children in the school setting. MEMORANDUM

TO: School Superintendents, Principals, School Nurses and Local Health Directors

SUBJECT: Organizations Offering to Provide Oral Health Services in Schools

DATE: January 8, 2010

The CT Department of Public Health and the CT State Dental Association have received many questions from schools regarding new dental organizations (in addition to existing ones) offering to provide oral health services to children in the school setting. Usually these services entail dental screening, prevention and/or dental sealant application. Many of these services also entail the use of mobile dental units or portable dental equipment.

If your school is approached by a mobile oral health organization offering to provide services in your school, it is important that you are comfortable with the credentials and protocols of the organization. To assist you with this, we recommend that schools ask questions of the oral health care organization to ensure that:

- Dentists and dental hygienists providing services are licensed Connecticut dental providers.
- there is appropriate approval, generally from the superintendent and/or school committee, for these providers to practice in the school setting or in mobile dental unit providing care to the school's students.
- the mobile/portable oral health provider maintains an appropriate list of local dentists (including those who are HUSKY providers) who have agreed to provide follow-up treatment and/or emergency dental care to children for issues identified by the mobile/portable oral health providers. If possible, request a copy of the list and the signed memoranda of agreement.
- adequate parental information about the service and consent procedures are in place.
- parents are aware of the location of their child's dental records, including x-rays and that these are readily available to parents.
- there are procedures, with assigned responsibilities; for timely notification of parents and referral to local dentists should treatment needs be identified.
- there is a memorandum of agreement between the school district and the mobile/portable organizations, which outlines the responsibilities of each party.


School Nurse Supervisors Conference

Nipro GlucoPro Insulin Syringes: Recall !!

Nipro Medical Corporation and the United States Food and Drug Administration notified healthcare professionals of a voluntary nationwide recall of all GlucoPro Insulin Syringes. These syringes may have needles that detach from the syringe. If the needle becomes detached from the syringe during use, it can become stuck in the insulin vial, push back into the syringe, or remain in the skin after injection. This recall includes all product codes and lot numbers with expiration dates before November 1, 2011. The product was distributed nationwide, including Puerto Rico. Consumers who have GlucoPro Insulin Syringes should stop using and return them to point of sale for reimbursement.
