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

STRIDE Adaptive Snowsports Program at Ski Sundown March 1, 2022

BESB was thrilled to partner with STRIDE Adaptive Snowsports Program at Ski Sundown. STRIDE's vision is to build a community with equal opportunity and access for sport and recreational activities. Guides from STRIDE met BESB students, shared information about the gear they would be wearing and helped students explore the equipment they would need for the ski program. Each student was paired with two volunteers from STRIDE for their individual lesson.

The volunteers helped determine where each student should start. Some students began on the Magic Carpet while others were towed up the hill just a little way by guides. By the end of the program, all

Leap into Life Rail-Bike Adventure April 20, 2022 7 students, 8th-12th grade

Leap into Life (LIL) is a program designed to provide students with opportunities to experience and practice independence in a safe environment. LIL promotes the skills blind and visually impaired students need to transition to an independent life, college, and mature social settings.

On April 20, 7 students, 4 parents

and staff from BESB participated in a bike adventure on the rail trail of the Essex Steam Train. This was their first in-person event since before the pandemic. *Thump, thump, thump, thump* was the sound of the rail trail bikes on the Essex rail trail! One student described it as a heartbeat as students, parents and teachers pedaled away. After basic instructions from rail bike staff, participants loaded the bikes with 4 people to a bike. One sighted adult controlled the handbrake on each bike.



Participants pedaled the bike on the rails through the woods. It was a beautiful day but a bit cold until they started moving. Students were able to socialize with each other as they pedaled and parents were able to talk with other parents. Upon arrival back at the Train Station, BESB staff set out lunch options for the students and their parents at picnic tables underneath a tent.

This activity was the first Leap Into Life event for some of the students. LIL hopes to build on the momentum of this successful trip with additional events that will provide social opportunities for teens who are visually impaired or blind as well as strengthen their transition skills.

Virtual Music Class with CT Music Therapy



BESB continues to collaborate with Kelsy Gati of CT Music Therapy for monthly virtual music classes, now for our students of all ages. During each session, Kelsy leads the children in an interactive program with songs, instruments, and body movements. It's impossible to leave the session without a smile on your face!

This is an ongoing program throughout the year and registration is month-to-month. Birth-to-three and preschool aged students meet on the first Wednesday of the month at 3:00 and school-aged students meet on the third Wednesday of each month at 5:00. September 27th Training for teams working with students in preschool and paraprofessionals working with school age academic students (Rocky Hill)


September 28th Training for teams working with academic students who use Large Print or Braille materials (Rocky Hill)
