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


I currently live on the shoreline and love to travel, especially during the summer. This past summer, I spent an incredible month in Indonesia!

Preschool Field Trip to New Pond Farm May 18, 2024







Ten BESB families gathered at New Pond Farm in Reading on a beautiful Saturday morning in May. They were joined by siblings and parents/grandparents for a total of 40 in attendance.

The families were split into groups to rotate through stations run by the farm education staff. Students went to the barn where they were able to brush and meet a cow up close, examine bones from a cow and horse, and touch a chicken. Some were also able to meet a very friendly cow as well as a curious sheep who came right up to the fence by the hen house. After meeting the animals, families walked to herb garden and had the opportunity to smell mint, lavender and lemon balm.

In the education center, students felt the difference between brushed wool, natural wool and yarn. They also got to touch and smell lanolin, which garnered a wide range of reactions from participants! Students learned about bees, tasted honey, touched a honeycomb and made their own beeswax candle. It was truly a multi-sensory and hands-on field trip, and our students and families left with smiles on their faces.







Leap Into Life Yardgoats Dunkin Park Tour June 18, 2024

This end-of-the-year Leap Event was open to both middle and high schoolers, and there were nine in attendance. First, students explored a tactile map to get a sense of the bases and locations. Then the Stadiums General Manager met the group at the Main gate to mimic the experience of entering the park during a real game. Students sat in the stadium while the manager told them about the history of the park and field.

Next, students went to the Production Box, where they learned about the significance of various sounds and songs played throughout a game. They each got a chance, using the microphone, to introduce themselves as a player and hear their voices echo throughout the stadium. One student even volunteered to sing the whole National Anthem. Another student did so well on the mic that the manager invited him to make an announcement at an upcoming game.

Students asked lots of great questions throughout the day. They saw the locker rooms, warmup batting cages, workout room, dugout, and outfield. In the dugout, they tried on helmets and baseball mitts. On the outfield, they checked out the padded outer wall and field. Orientation and mobility instructors brought a 'true to size' (90 ft) rope and tether

that allowed students to independently run/walk the distance to a base. Everyone had a pizza lunch, socialized, and received tickets to return for a real game at the end of June.





Skills for Life July 15-19, 2024

This was a week-long program focusing on orientation and mobility skills in commercial and residential neighborhoods. The three participants were cane users ages 15-18. They navigated simple and complex street crossings, used tactile maps and travel-related apps, took public transit, practiced daily living skills related to food preparation and money management, and enjoyed a meal out. Aside from the goals of improving mobility and independent living skills, the participants had the opportunity to take responsibility for planning, to socialize with peers, and to observe other students as role models.

Staff Events

Our teachers put on very thorough annual trainings for other professionals who work with our students, but they also make time to continue learning themselves.

Spring In-Service for Birth-to-Three Service Providers May 21, 2024

Fourteen participants gathered at the Pitkin Center in Wethersfield for BESB's first spring in-service geared specifically towards birth-to-three providers. Attendees learned

about eligibility for BESB services and the effects of vision in regard to child development. Topics included the hand-under-hand technique, the Oregon Project, stay-put exploration spaces, experience boxes/boards, and anticipation objects and routines.

Fall In-Services for School Staff September-October, 2024

Each fall in late September and early October, ADS/BESB provides training for team members working with student clients. During the in-services, participants learn about ADS/BESB services, common eye conditions that cause vision impairment, and intervention strategies tailored to specific eye conditions, as well as techniques for working with students with visual impairments.

The in-service trainings were provided in the following categories: preschool (3–5-year-olds), teams working with students who read print, teams working with students who read Braille, teams working with students who have multiple impairments, and teams working with students who have CVI completing academic tasks. We had 256 attendees in total for the 2024 fall in-service trainings.

NEAER Conference November 13-15, 2024

The annual conference of the Northeast Association of Education and Rehabilitation for the Blind and Visually Impaired, (NEAER), is an exciting opportunity for vision professionals from all over New England to learn, network, and share best practices. As usual, BESB was well-represented, this time in beautiful Stowe, VT. Our TVI's hosting conference sessions included Jackie Dettore, Jennifer Prugh, Lydia Randall, Lauren Royce, and Alicia Tucker. It was Connecticut's turn this year to plan the program, and Jessica Gibson and Alicia Tucker were the Co-Chairs of the Conference Program Committee.
