The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) has reviewed the referenced project in response to a Scoping Notice posted on the Environmental Monitor. SHPO understands that the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) intends to remove the dam to eliminate public safety risk and reconnect habitat by restoring the free-flowing river. The Connecticut River Watershed Council submitted this project to our office for review on March 19, 2007 in accordance with the Connecticut Environmental Policy Act (see attached). After an exchange of information, SHPO concluded, "that the Springborn Dam possesses historic and industrial importance and is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places."

In the correspondence from SHPO dated September 24, 2007, this office recommended that a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) pursuant to the National Historic Preservation Act be drafted for the proposed undertaking. At that time, SHPO included specific mitigative measures to be included in the MOA. In consideration of the currently proposed removal action and still present historic components, SHPO reaffirms its prior recommendations and request for a MOA to include state-level documentation of Springborn Dam, publication of the results of this documentation in a scholarly journal, and archeological monitoring of the dam removal process.

This office appreciates the opportunity to review and comment upon this project. These comments are provided in accordance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, as amended, and the Connecticut Environmental Policy Act. Dear Ms. Hearne:

The State Historic Preservation Office has reviewed supplemental information provided by the Connecticut River Watershed Council concerning the above-named project. This office believes that the Springborn Dam possesses historic and industrial importance and is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

In the opinion of the State Historic Preservation Office, the proposed project will constitute an <u>adverse effect</u> upon the Springborn Dam. However, this office offers no objection to the proposed removal of this historic structure. In this regard, we recommend that the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration draft a Memorandum of Agreement pursuant to the National Historic Preservation Act for the proposed undertaking.

The State Historic Preservation Office strongly recommends that the professional implementation of the following mitigative measures be included within the Memorandum of Agreement:

O Prior to construction-related activities, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and/or the Connecticut River Watershed Council shall document the Springborn Dam, to the professional standards of the State Historic Preservation Office. Documentation shall consist of narrative text, photographs and/or high-quality digital images, an index of photographs, and a photographic site plan. Photographic documentation shall include ponded and dewatered conditions, including all exposed industrial features, and pertinent context-related perspectives of the adjacent mill complex. Final documentation shall be provided to the State Historic Preservation Office for permanent archiving and public accessibility.

- o The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and/or the Connecticut River Watershed Council shall prepare and submit a brief history and description of the Springborn Dam, including project-related information, photographs and maps, to the Society for Industrial Archeology New England Chapters Newsletter.
- O The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and/or the Connecticut River Watershed Council shall retain an industrial archaeologist who meets National Park Service qualification standards to monitor and professionally document any industrial archaeological remains that may be exposed through project-related activities. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and/or the Connecticut River Watershed Council shall consult with the Office of State Archaeology at the University of Connecticut (Storrs) regarding the curation of industrial artifacts that may be recovered through the archaeological monitoring.

The State Historic Preservation Office appreciates the opportunity to have reviewed and commented upon the proposed undertaking.

This office looks forward to further coordination with all interested parties regarding the expeditious furtherance of the proposed undertaking as well as the professional management of Connecticut's cultural heritage.

Dear Dr. Poirier,

Connecticut River Watershed Council, Scantic River Watershed Association and American Rivers are currently investigating the feasibility of fully removing the Springborn Dam, owned by CT DEP, located on the Scantic River in Enfield, CT. I sent an initial request for determination in March and am now responding to your office's follow up questions received in April. Photographs of the dam and adjacent structure are attached.

The first dam at this site (village of Scitico within Enfield) was built in 1840 by Shakers. This dam was used to power a gristmill and then a sawmill. In 1901 the Gordon Brothers increased the height of the dam and built a mill in order to recycle waste wool to sell back to the carpet mills. "For power, they used the 20-foot waterfall to develop 260 horsepower, transmitted by a forest of belts and pulleys to the cards and pickers." (from The Challenge of Change edited by Ruth E. Bridge, 1977, published by Enfield Historical Society p.198)

After DeBell and Richardson moved their plastics development laboratory to the old Gordon Brothers building in 1948, "On August 18-19, 1955, a tremendous storm dumped 14 inches of rainfall on the Scantic watershed, and all of this poured through the Scantic Gap, smashed the dam, and knocked out four stories of the south wall of the old Gordon mill.... The company rebuilt and reinforced the structures, and converted the Stowe pond – a tangle of swamp, fallen timber, and debris – into a sylvan meadow and trout pond." (Bridge, pp. 199,200) This company specialized in plastics invention, manufacture and fabrication. Some of its noted patents were for fluorocarbon polymerization, shaped glass fibers, foam radar lenses for fighter plane navigation, and deep-drawn oriented thermoplastics sheet (cigarette packages). (Bridge, p.200).

PHONE: (413) 772-2020 WEB: www.ctriver.org Currently the mill building adjacent to Springborn dam does not use the dam or impoundment at all. It houses STR Inc., a multi-national company that conducts quality assurance testing and compliance monitoring for a variety of industries.

My searches at the town hall and library revealed the following ownership history. The last several land records show the name of the corporation was changed several times due to mergers.

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


2 photographs of Springborn Dam and the adjacent mill building Copy of book page showing 1901 photograph of same building

In 1901, the Gordon Brothers built a brick mill on the Scantic River in Scitico, where they operated what would today be classified as a recycling business. Rags and cloth scraps were processed at the mill to extract their wool content. The scraps were treated with acid to destroy any cotton content, and the wool was carded. The result was a very good grade of wool that could be sold back at profit to the same mills from which the scrap was purchased. The Gordon Brothers also owned most of the nearby housing and charged their employees between \$1.40 and \$2.50 per week for rent. They showed unusual concern for their employees' well-being and actually waived the rent for days when the employees were unable to work due to illness. (EHS Collection.)



Water power was one of the natural resources that attracted settlers to Hazardville and Scitico. Pine Point Lake in Hazardville was made by the Enfield Shakers to supply water for a sawmill. The Pine Point name came from the 150 acres of pine trees planted there by a Shaker named Omar Pease. Most of the trees were lost in the 1938 hurricane. After the Shakers left Enfield, the lake became a popular recreation area. (MAP Collection.)
