1. Rescue Technician - Trench Rocky Hill

August 5, 6, 12, 13, 19, and 20 with Practical Exam on the 27th.

This program will train the students to perform technician level trench rescue. The training objectives meet NFPA 1006 and OSHA 1926. Students will evaluate trenches and soil conditions; will learn to shore unprotected straight and intersecting trenches with both community and pneumatic shoring. They will also use supplemental shoring when needed. Students develop an action plan to manage and remove a victim from a trench accident. The PPE requirements are a protective helmet, footwear, gloves, eye protection, and work clothes. Training prerequisites: Rescue Technician Core and Hazardous Materials Operational; proof must be submitted with the application. Certification Examination Prerequisite: Rescue Technician Core and a minimum of EMR certification; proof must be submitted with the application. For certification to this level, an additional practical skills examination of one or two days plus a written test is required. Certification testing time: requires additional dates for certification written and practical exam. Class Hours: 48 Course Fee: \$490.00

6. NIOSH Fire Fighter Fatality Investigation and Prevention Program Reports

<u>Captain Suffers Sudden Cardiac Death After Performing Physical Fitness Training – Mississippi(https://www.cdc.gov/niosh/fire/reports/face201613.html)</u>

A captain performed fitness training by walking on a treadmill at his fire station. After exercising for about 20 minutes, he ate dinner and went to take a shower. About 75 minutes later, a crew member found the captain unresponsive in the shower room. The captain was pronounced dead at the station.

Swift-Water Mishap in Full Turnout Gear

Summary

It's that time of year again: severe-weather season! In this ROTW, the value of doing an adequate and deliberate rescue profile and risk assessment before engaging in rescue efforts is highlighted.

Event Description

Hurricane damage and the ensuing hysteria that coincides with such an event put the responders in this report in a treacherous position. The crew of an engine company was given the assignment to search and evacuate nearby houses that had been affected by flooding from a recent hurricane. The crew found themselves in danger after they entered the water in full turnout gear with PFDs and found themselves needing to be rescued.

Take-Aways

The reporter highlights the dangers of wearing turnout gear near the edge of any water, especially swift water. Water rescue can be misleading to responders; the appearance of the surface doesn't tell the story of what lies beneath it. Proper training and exercise, including at least swift-water awareness, is critical to establishing a best-practice approach to water rescues. When responders act without the proper training and equipment, they become liabilities and can have a severely negative impact on the initial rescue response.

Skills such as reading the current and understanding eddy pools and how to navigate turbulent water will help rescuers successfully mitigate the hazards they face when engaging in water rescue.

The biggest takeaway—this can't be emphasized enough—is to work within your scope of practice. Do a quick and thorough rescue profile to determine if the actions you're about to take are necessary or if you can protect in place until the right resources arrive on scene.

• Have you preplanned and done a thorough hazard assessment of target waterways or potential flood plains on your jurisdiction?

- Does your department have a certified dive rescue team? If not, do you have interagency agreements with neighboring jurisdictions to support any water rescue effort in your municipality?
- What level of training and certification does your department employ as objective criteria for personnel to engage in water rescue?
- Do you have a policy, procedure or guideline that defines who can enter the water and who can't and what the appropriate level of PPE is?

Leading Practices

Technical rescue is a skill set above and beyond the essential functions of a firefighter. Advanced training and exercise, supported by strong guidelines, are two of many ways to safely mitigate hazards like the ones called out in this report. At a minimum, fire departments that have actual or potential water hazards from severe weather need to preplan and train aggressively.

Obviously, hurricane season is a low-frequency, somewhat-predictable event we can plan for. However, creating a rescue plan after an event occurs puts rescuers and the community behind the curve and it can be impossible to catch up.
