4. Firefighter Near Miss Report of the Week

Apparatus is Struck by Bullet Returning from Call

SUMMARY

It is imperative for firefighters to understand the law enforcement community is not the only target with regards to the careless or unlawful use of firearms. This week's report is a reminder that we must be vigilant when in our communities. This apparatus was struck by a bullet when returning from a call.

EVENT DESCRIPTION

The firefighters were returning from a call when they heard a shot and simultaneously the windshield broke, spraying glass all over the cab of the engine. The driver immediately stopped the apparatus and everyone checked themselves for injuries. The captain notified the battalion chief, advising that the engine had been struck by something and their windshield was shattered. The battalion chief then requested police and EMS to respond to the scene.

After checking themselves for injuries they could see where a bullet had entered through the curved portion of the upper left corner of the windshield, ricocheted against the windshield's flat part, and dropped to the dash. The scene was investigated by police, and the company was placed in a reserve apparatus.

The driver was sprayed by the glass from the windshield, and while he received no cuts, went home for the night. The captain received a few minor cuts around his neck but did not require medical attention. The two firefighters in the back were not affected by the glass.

TAKE-AWAYS

The reporter discussed two important lessons learned from this event. After the bullet was found, the apparatus stayed in place. It would have been better to leave the area first to finish investigating the damage in a secure location. In the report, the investigation deemed that this was a random act, however, if this were a malicious act, the firefighters were still in danger by immediately stopping and then staying.

The battalion chief made an excellent choice to dispatch police and EMS immediately after learning of the event. The reporter stated the fire department was not prepared to appropriately work with law enforcement on the investigation of the incident. The report stated that it is imperative for fire departments to work with police to develop a plan for such events.

DISCUSSION

- Discuss the relationships between police and fire departments in your area. How can you improve the working relationships with your law enforcement community?
- Review your operating guideline or protocol for apparatus accidents? How would you change your actions in a shooting incident similar to this report?
- Does your fire department have a plan for requesting an expedited police presence in situations such as an active shooter, civil unrest or potential firefighter hostage? How would you request a police presence on the radio when you are not in a position to use plain talk communications?
- Talk with law enforcement representatives about their investigation process. What do you need to be mindful of after a shooting incident to ensure a smooth response from both your agencies?

LEADING PRACTICES

Firefighters are being exposed to acts of violence across the country. From mass casualty active shooter to the single victim gunfire, we find ourselves adapting our response matrix in order to best serve our citizens in a safe manner. Certain jurisdictions are moving away from the concepts of staging several miles away waiting for law enforcement to clear a shooting scene. Discussions of "warm zone" responses in shooting situations and the issuance of ballistic vests are currently hot topics.

Despite how your department responds to shooting incidents, our job is inherently dangerous and there is no complete guarantee that we will never face violent individuals, aimed to target fire service professionals. If there aren't department-wide policies in place, start planning within your company on how to react, should you be involved in gunfire. This is where a high level of situational awareness is paramount.

Having a dialogue with your local law enforcement is also vital to ensure an appropriate response. Knowing their mindset in these scenarios can alleviate confusion between responders. Having a discussion on the various priorities between the two agencies makes for a more streamlined response. Patients can be treated on the front end, but a successful investigation to prevent another incident could also save lives.
