APPARATUS PROGRAMS

Introduction to Tactical Considerations for Aerial Devices

This course will cover the responsibilities of an aerial operator. The course will also explore some of the options available to the aerial operator in both emergency and non-emergency situations. It is delivered in a workshop-style setting with discussion so each operator can learn from the other students, as well as the instructor.

Prerequisites: None Class Hours: 8 FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit 0

Aerial Operator

This course meets NFPA 1002 for the driver/operator section, that addresses aerial devices. Time will be spent with aerial, tower ladders and articulating booms. Course content will prepare the students for the practical and written examinations for Aerial Operator certification. The course is designed for the driver/operator of aerial equipment. The course begins with road handling and moves on to apparatus placement, mobilization and stabilization, elevation, various aerial operations, and ends with apparatus readiness. It is required that each student has access to the reference manual.

Full protective clothing (no SCBA) required.

Basic Pump Operations

This course examines the components and controls in the operation of a fire pump. The internal parts of a fire pump are examined with the goal of having the student fully understand how the fire pump moves water. Pump panel controls are discussed in relation to the specific function and use of each device. The process and functions involved in drafting and hydrant operations are explained in detail. Full protective clothing (no SCBA) required.

Fire Service Hydraulics

This course for prospective and current pump operators and will enhance their skills in pump operations. Participants will learn how

to determine and overcome friction loss, how to calculate theoretical pump pressure and how to apply easy-to-use "rule of thumb." Principles of relay pumping, supplying sprinklers and standpipe systems will be discussed. The afternoon session will be spent on the training ground performing practical applications while flowing water at prescribed pressures.

Full protective clothing (no SCBA) required.

Pump Operator

This course is designed to prepare the student for the practical skills and written examinations for Pump Operator certification. Class work will include: safe driving techniques, preventive maintenance, pump operations, hydraulic calculations, water supply and apparatus systems. The course begins inside the classroom and ends outside with the pumping apparatus. The main emphasis is on "hands-on" exercises using various capacity pumps, hose sizes and nozzles. Full protective clothing (no SCBA) required.

Tactical Considerations for Aerial Devices

EMS PROGRAM

Emergency Medical Technician Refresher - EMT

This course is designed to review and refresh knowledge and skills required for Emergency Medical Technicians currently certified according to the latest U.S. DOT EMT-Basic National Standard Curriculum. Classroom and "hands-on" training will update the EMT on current practices and confirm skill levels. A review and renewal of Healthcare Provider CPR will be conducted in confor-

mance with the latest JAMA standards through approved programs of the American Heart Association. Refresher topics include: well-being of EMT; airway management; ventilation and oxygen therapy; patient assessment; medical trauma; general pharmacology; interventions; altered mental status; automated external defibrillation; infants and children; emergency childbirth; normal and abnormal deliveries; post-delivery care; body substance isolation (BSI); and MAST. Practical sessions include: bleeding control and bandaging/splinting. Comfortable clothing is suggested for this session. Other topics include Haz-Mat recognition; personal protection; patient handling/moving techniques; environmental injuries; and legal, ethical and psychological aspects of EMS. Written and Practical examinations will be conducted in conformance with the policies established by the State of Connecticut Department of Public Health.

Arson Awareness for the First Responder - A Team Approach

Arson Detection for the First Responder

This National Fire Academy course is designed to provide a clear definition of the role of the initial responders and to provide essential knowledge to enable them to recognize the potential of an intentionally set fire, to preserve evidence and to properly report information to appropriate officials. Topics covered include: fire behavior, critical observations, fire cause, scene security, evidence preservation and legal considerations.

Fire Arson Detection

This National Fire Academy course is designed to familiarize all fire service personnel with basic techniques for determining fire cause, recognizing evidence for investigative purposes, and the initial steps in an arson investigation.

Fire Cause Determination for the Company Officer

This National Fire Academy course is geared to the company level officer or Fire Chief who is on the scene initially and is responsible to make a basic call as to the origin and cause of minor fires.

Initial Fire Investigation

This National Fire Academy course is geared to the department level individual whose responsibility is to make more complex origin and cause determinations.

FIREFIGHTING PROGRAMS

RECRUIT FIREFIGHTER

This 10-week course focuses on developing the skills and abilities needed for a new firefighter to perform entry-level tasks under direct supervision required.

One of the first components of the course is to establish in the recruit a strong desire and will for self-discipline, teamwork, company morale, orderliness and precision. The fire department organizational structure will be defined showing the role and responsibility of the firefighter and officer in the organization. The training for a recruit firefighter will consist of theory, backed with appropriate skill development, which follow as closely as possible to the new information being presented. The theory and practical skills development combination will be delivered on an incremental basis for maximum retention and skill development.

This approach will develop competency in the recruit and reduce the risk of injury. At the conclusion of this course, the recruit firefighter will be tested to the Firefighter II level and will return to their fire department. After local orientation, the firefighter will be assigned to a firefighting company.

The course includes: Hazardous Materials - First Responder Awareness and Operational; Physical Fitness; Confined Space Rescue; CPR Defibrillator, First aid and all applicable OSHA standards. Prerequisites: None

FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$2,500

Firefighter II

Firefighter II is the second of two levels of firefighter training, which prepares the student for firefighter certification. This complete course (18 subjects) ranges from fire behavior to fire suppression and Hazardous Materials First Responder Operations. Each class meets eight hours per day for 21 days. This course requires hands-on training along with classroom instruction.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be a Certified Firefighter I and have completed Hazardous Materials Awareness. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 168 FM Credits: 52 Hours EMS-I Credits 0 Course fee: \$325

Rapid Intervention Teams (RIT)

This is an intensive course on fire behavior and firefighter training. Safely removing a trapped or unconscious firefighter from a burning building is a labor-intensive operation. Using scenarios based on real-life incidents, the class identifies problems that were encountered and offers possible solutions for the safe and efficient removal of members in distress. It will show the importance of establishing a Rapid Intervention Team, and provide instruction for team members removing an unconscious firefighter down a hallway, out of a window, or from a cellar, and / or a staircase. Methods of searching for a missing firefighter in a large open area will be covered and the participant will be able to conduct this type of search. Additionally self-rescue procedures, such as low profile ladder egress; team search and personal rope bail-out procedures, giving the participant

options if caught in a deteriorating situation, will be provided.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be certified Firefighter I or have been a member of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with the Student Application.

Class Hours: 16

Course fee: \$110

Introduction to the Fire Service (Cadet Camp)

This program focuses on introducing individuals ages 14-17 to the fire service. Topics addressed include: discipline; orientation to the Connecticut Fire Academy; fire department organization and structure; fire behavior; woodland fires; hazardous materials awareness; fire streams; ladders and search and rescue. This program will be held in a camp type atmosphere simulating a firehouse environment. Each student will be required to reside at the academy for the duration of the course.

Full protective clothing is required for this program. This includes helmet, bunker coat, gloves, 3/4 boots or bunkers.

Course Hours: 40

CO Emergencies / Chimney Fires

The first half of this course will cover the information needed by a fire department when responding to carbon monoxide alarms and to carbon monoxide present at the fire scene. Topics include: the identification and hazards of carbon monoxide; a description of the techniques for investigating alarms and detecting the presence of this odorless, tasteless gas. The second half is designed to instruct the proper procedures to be used at a chimney fire. A simple routine fire can become a disaster if not handled properly from the start. The "reading" of a chimney before a fire occurs will be covered in detail. Topics include: construction of chimneys, why fires start, extinguishment, inspection after the fire and firefighter safety.

Prerequisites: None

Course fee: \$30

PROGRAMS

Elevator Rescue for Fire Departments

This course will familiarize fire service personnel with safe operations involving passenger and freight elevators. High angle environment protection, electrical and mechanical exposure reduction and fire suppression tactics will be discussed. Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to understand the differences between electric traction and piston operated elevators; evaluate an incident as emergency or non-emergency; gain access to the hoistway and car using non-destructive methods; control car movement by top and independent service methods; and develop safe standard operating procedures for elevator use during the rescue and/or fire suppression.

Coveralls or other clothing that may be exposed to grease, oil and the usual dirt found in shafts and pits and should be available for the practical component.

Prerequisites: None Class Hours: 16

FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit 0

Course fee: \$125

Firefighter Safety and Survival

This is a self-rescue course on firefighter survival training. Using scenario based real-life incidents, this course identifies problems that were encountered, and offers possible solutions for the safe and efficient removal of yourself from a rapidly deteriorating atmosphere. Self-rescue procedures covered are low profile ladder egress, wall breaching and personnel rope bailout procedures.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be a certified Firefighter I or have been a member of the fire service on or before July 1977. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 16

FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$110

Flashover Survival

This intensive course deals with fire behavior and firefighter survival training. Students will learn to recognize the signs of a flashover and participate in a controlled flashover. A flashover simulator will be used for this live fire training evolution.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: All students must have written authorization from their fire chief allowing participation. Applicants must be a Certified Firefighter I or have been a member of the fire service on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 8

FM Credits: 0 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$55

Forcible Entry

This course is designed for firefighters, fire officers and rescue personnel to help improve tactical operations at fires and emergencies. Special emphasis will be placed upon the unique problems of the urban fire department. Topics will include: size-up, fireground tactics and procedures, conventional forcible entry, "through-the-lock" entry, power tools, building construction and tactical ventilation.

Prerequisites: None Class Hours: 3

FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$25

Handling Elevator Emergencies

This short course is offered to assist fire departments in handling emergencies in stalled elevators and in using elevators during fires. Presentation topics will cover: following a procedure to safely remove passengers from stalled elevators, elevator equipment, methods of entering the elevator, use of the fire department control key and using the elevator during fire emergencies.

Prerequisites: None Class Hours: 3

FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$25

Smoke Divers

This physically challenging two-day course was developed to raise the skills of the advanced SCBA user. With the emphasis on physical fitness and readiness, this course will start with a brief classroom session and then move to the training ground. The Connecticut Fire Academy Mobile Training Maze will be used during the course.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA and one spare cylinder, is required. Participants are encouraged to bring exercise clothing, running shoes and/or sneakers.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be a Certified Firefighter I or have been a member of the fire service on or before July1, 1977. Proof

must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 16

FM Credit: 0 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$150

Sprinklers

This complete two-day course is designed for the firefighter with little understanding of automatic sprinkler systems. Course content will trace the historical development of sprinklers and provide information on types of systems; the care, maintenance and inspection of sprinkler systems; and fire department operations required to support sprinkler systems in sprinklered occupancies. In the second half of the course, students will cover the basic design of automatic sprinkler systems, water supply, materials, pipe schedule and hydraulic systems, water flow tests, sprinkler plan review and outside protection. The Connecticut Fire Academy Sprinkler Lab will offer each student the opportunity to compare and contrast types of systems and witness their operating and flow characteristics.

FIRE OFFICER PROGRAMS

Fire Service Instructor I

This course content is designed to meet the certification requirements for the first level of instructor as identified by the National Professional Qualifications Standard. Class time is spent on instructor roles, audience analysis, communication skills, the writing of objectives, simulations and evaluation methods. Each student is required to prepare and deliver both a 10-minute and a 20-minute classroom presentation. Homework is required and will be reviewed. Required Text: IFSTA Fire service Instructor 5th Edition

PROGRAMS

First Line Company Supervision Fire Officer I

First Line Company Supervision is a comprehensive course designed to strengthen the new or aspiring fire officer's supervisory and leadership skills. Emergency and routine duties of the company officer will be discussed. Topics include: human resource management, community and government relations, public education, safety, inspection and investigation and emergency services delivery. A fire command simulator will be used in the emergency services delivery section of the course.

Required Text: IFSTA Fire Department Company Officer 3rd Edition. and Model Procedures Guide for Structural Fire Fighting 2nd Edition Prerequisites: None

Certification Prerequisites: To be eligible to take the Fire Officer I exam applicants must be certified to the firefighter II level or have been a member of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 96

FM Credit: 33 Hours EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$385

Multi-Company Supervision - Fire Officer II

Multi-Company Supervision is a seven-day course designed for those fire officers that need the skills necessary to supervise multiple companies. Generally, this level involves the oversight of single company supervisors involved in the operational aspects of a fire station. Topics covered in this course include: group behavior, employee evaluation, communication skills, report preparation, pre-fire and operational planning, inspections, command of hazardous materials incidents, safety and emergency services delivery. A fire command simulator will be used in the emergency delivery section of this course.

Required Texts: IFSTA Fire Department Company Officer 3rd Edition. Prerequisites: None

Certification Prerequisites: To be eligible to take the Fire Officer II Exam applicants must be certified to Fire Officer I and Fire Service Instructor I level. Proof must be submitted with application.

Class Hours: 56

FM Credit: 46 Hours EMS- I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$250

Organizational Administration - Fire Officer III

Organizational Administration is a non-traditional course offered to individuals currently holding or aspiring to the rank of shift commander or chief officer. It is designed to enhance the skills of the chief officer by providing a group of peers with a progressive learning

environment. This semi-independent study course includes a balance of regularly scheduled peer group discussions and development of individual projects. Areas covered in the discussions and projects will include human resource management, community relations, administration, inspection and investigation, emergency services delivery and safety.

Areas specifically covered will include: personnel assignments, hiring and promotional procedures, professional development, community awareness programs, budget management, record-keeping systems, pre-incident planning and accident protection. A mentor will be provided to the participants for discussion and guideline purposes. Projects need not be created specially for this course. Projects previously prepared by the participant may be submitted. As such, credit for life experiences to-date will be available. There is no final examination connected with this course. Instead, each candidate will present their project portfolio to an oral examination panel consisting of Connecticut fire service leaders. The reference book used for this course will be the current edition of the Fire Chief's Handbook. Required Text: Fire Chief Handbook 6th Edition Fire Engineering Publication.

Prerequisites: Preference will be given to those currently serving as shift commander, chief officer or those having at least three years of company officer experience.

Certification prerequisites: Fire Officer II

Class Hours: It is expected that approximately 40 hours of discussion group time will be required in addition to project preparation and presentation time.

FM Credit: 60 EMS-I Credit: 0

Course fee: \$290

Executive Management - Fire Officer IV

Executive Management is oriented toward fire chiefs. It is a semi-independent study course consisting of a balance of regularly scheduled peer group discussion sessions and the development of individual projects. Areas covered in the resource management, administration, multi-agency emergency services delivery and safety. Areas specifically covered will include: grievance administration, training and educational goal setting requirements planning, employee assistance programs, incentive programs, community event planning, long range planning, and civil disturbance and disaster planning. A mentor will be provided to the participants for discussion and guideline purposes. Class projects do not need to be created specifically for this course. Projects previously prepared by the participant may be submitted. As such, credit for life experiences to date will be available. There is no final exam connected with this course. Instead.

each candidate will present their project portfolio to an oral examination panel consisting of Connecticut fire service leaders. The reference book for this course will be the current edition of the Fire Chief's Handbook.

Prerequisites: Preference will be given to those currently serving as shift commander, chief officer or those having at least three years of company officer experience.

Class Hours: 40 Hours classroom discussion time in addition to outside project work and presentation.

Building Construction: Combustible

This two-day National Fire Academy course provides an introduction to basic construction principles and to the specific characteristics of wood and ordinary construction as they pertain to the fire service. The primary emphasis of the course is to improve the firefighter's ability to ensure personal safety by recognizing common causes and indicators of failure or other hazards related to building construction. An understanding of the course material will improve operational effectiveness, as the firefighter will be able to better predict the overall reaction of a building to fire conditions.

Course fee: Free

Building Construction Non-combustible

This two-day National Fire Academy course provides an introduction to the special characteristics of non-combustible and fire resistive construction as they pertain to the fire service. The primary emphasis of the course is to improve the fire officer's and senior firefighter's ability to ensure firefighter safety by recognizing common causes and indicators of failure and other hazards related to building construction or contents. An understanding of the course materials will improve operational effectiveness, as the fire officer and senior firefighter will be able to better predict the overall reaction of a building to fire conditions.

Conducting Fire Prevention Inspections

This National Fire Academy course is designed for the firefighter, fire officer and prospective fire prevention personnel. This interactive course provides officers with an opportunity to participate in an Incident Management organization that will challenge the student to implement effective fireground management decisions. Using the National Incident Command System, students will develop response strategy and implement tactical considerations. The Command Simulator will be used to augment the emergency during the tabletop emergency management exercise.

This course is designed to provide fire officers and managers the information needed to use and implement the Incident Command System (ICS). Course topics include: the needs of the incident manager, the structure and expendability of ICS and the command skills needed by departmental officers to effectively use ICS guidelines. Scenario practice on the application of ICS provides guidelines and resource information for setting up and implementing a departmental Incident Command System.

Incident Command for Structural Collapse

Incident Command For High-Rise Operations

This National Fire Academy course is designed to assist emergency response officers who have responsibility for managing high-rise incidents. Students completing this course will be able to identify: various high-rise construction systems, fire behavior problems and their impact on strategy, tactics and life safety concerns, strategic and tactical operations and resources needed for high-rise firefighting. They will also be able to: describe the application of proper ventilation techniques used in high-rise operations,

explain the basic command procedures and ICS organization necessary to manage a major high-rise incident effectively, and identify roles and responsibilities associated with command procedures for major high-rise operations.

Incident Safety Officer

This course examines the safety officer's role at emergency response situations. Course content will focus specifically on the safety officer's role within an Incident Command System. Upon completion of this course, the participant will be able to identify and analyze safety concerns as they relate to all hazard scene evaluations, and will be able to communicate recommended solutions to the command authority.

Introduction to Volunteer Emergency Services Management

This National Fire Academy Course is designed for those individuals whose responsibility is to manage any of the facets of the volunteer emergency service organization. Introduction to Volunteer Emergency Services Management demonstrates the basic management techniques needed to effectively administer the volunteer emergency services organization. Participants will explore the transition a member has to make when they step into the role of manager in their organization. Through the use of small group activities, the participants will learn and apply the basic principles of communication, motivation, problem solving, decision making and the management process to accomplish their organization's mission and goals. This course will give the participant an overview of management principles as they relate to the volunteer emergency services and will provide the foundation upon which to build their management skills. Target Audience: Emergency response personnel who have recently been appointed to a management position in their volunteer organization (administrative officers, line officers, board of directors, standing committee chairpersons, etc.).

Leadership I: Strategies for Company Success: Decision Making, Problem Solving, Running Meetings

(MCTO) - Command Decision

Topics include: the command sequence; size-up with particular focus on predicting fire behavior; assessment of resource requirements; critical, strategic, and tactical decisions; and action planning.

Managing Company Tactical Operations (MCTO) - Tactics

This course is the third of the MCTO series, and is designed to develop the company commander's supervisory and management capabilities in structural firefighting operations. Key contents include: ventilation, rescue, fire control, property conservation and support activities. Simulation provides an

opportunity to apply the principles of strategy and tactics to fire incidents in private dwellings. The final course in this curriculum provides an opportunity for integrated application through structural firefighting simulation in a variety of structure and occupancy types. Prerequisites: None

Time will be spent on group exercises that fire police personnel will encounter in the course of their duties. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS PROGRAM

Chemistry of Hazardous Materials

This course provides the basic knowledge required to evaluate the potential hazards and behaviors of hazardous materials. It also reviews the underlying reasons for the chemical behavior of hazardous materials and is designed to improve decision making, safety operations and handling techniques. The course is heavily chemistry oriented. This course is targeted at State and Municipal Emergency Response Personnel responsible for analysis, management and fire prevention inspection where knowledge of the chemical behavior of materials in essential. This course is a prerequisite for the National Fire Academy Operating Site Practice course. Students should make appropriate arrangements to be present at all sessions, as total attendance is mandatory.

Emergency Response to Terrorism: Basic Concepts (ERT:BC)

This course is designed to provide students with a general understanding and recognition of terrorism; defensive considerations (biological, nuclear, incendiary, chemical, and explosive); as well as command and control issues associated with criminal incidents. When an incident occurs, the student will be able to recognize and implement self-protective measures; secure the scene; complete appropriate notification to local, state, and federal authorities; and assist in completing a smooth transition from emergency to recovery and termination of operations.

Course fee: Free

Responding to the Terrorist Threat: Managing the Incident

This course is designed to provide the emergency responder with basic awareness level information concerning the terrorist threat. Areas that will be briefly covered include: legal requirements, self-protective measures, introduction to ICS, personal protective equip-

ment and Decon, and incident management. A student exercise is included to allow the student to put together the materials presented in the course context.

Responding to the Terrorist Threat: An Introduction

This course is designed to provide municipal leaders, boards of education and emergency responders with an introduction to the threat of terrorism. Terrorists have proven they have the knowledge and the capability to strike anywhere.

Hazardous Materials First Responder Awareness

This course is designed to meet the mandatory OSHA 1910.120 (q) training requirements for "Hazardous Materials First Responder Awareness Level." The goal of this course is to provide first responders (Fire, Police and EMS) who in the course of their normal duties may be the first on the scene of a Hazardous Materials incident, with the competencies to respond in a safe manner. Personnel at this level do not take any further action other than to recognize that a hazard exists, call for trained personnel and secure the area. This course focuses on the initial tasks to be taken by response personnel responding to a Hazardous Materials incident. These initial tasks include: recognizing and identifying hazardous materials, initiating command and control activities collection, interpretation of hazard and response information, and initiating the emergency response plan.

PROGRAMS

Hazardous Materials First Responder Operational

This course is designed to meet the NFPA 472 Standard, and OSHA 29 CFR 1910.120 for Hazardous Materials First Responder Operational Level." Class time will be spent on incident command, safety awareness, risk assessment (through the use of monitoring equipment), spill control (diking and damming), personal protective equipment and decontamination. The last day will involve students in an exercise using the skills covered in the classroom.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: Applicants must have completed any one of the following courses: Awareness (8 Hours); Basic Recognition of Hazardous Materials incidents - Concepts and Awareness/Concepts Implementation (12 hours) or the combination of Recognizing and Identifying Hazardous Materials (4 hours) and Hazardous materials Incident Analysis (12 hours). Proof must be submitted with application. Class Hours: 32

Course fee: Free

Hazardous Materials Technician

This course is designed for Hazardous Materials Team members and will meet NFPA 472 Technician Standard and OSHA 29 CFR 1910.120 "Technician Level." It introduces the students to hazardous materials chemistry, which includes a basic understanding of the atom and its properties. During course instruction students shall also be able to describe and show their role in the incident command system. Additional modules of the program include; detection equipment, spill control, decontamination, vessel plugging/patching, drum overpacking and diking. Hands-on training will give the students the opportunity to don and doff protective suits and equipment and perform containment operations in a safe and controlled atmosphere. This along with various classes of hazardous materials, techniques for dealing with gaseous products in all stages, flammable liquid detection, mitigation and vapors suppression will also be covered in detail.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: Applicants must have completed Hazardous Materials First Responder Operational. Proof must be submitted with application. Certification Prerequisites: Student Manual Required.

LPG Emergencies

Classroom lecture and hands-on training are included in this one-day training program. The program covers the basic characteristics of LP Gases, the way propane behaves in a vessel, the physical and chemical properties of propane, basic information on propane containers, the concept of hazard assessment and risk evaluation during propane emergencies, and describes the basic tactics for managing various types of propane emergencies. Practical fire suppression evolutions involving gas grills and portable propane cylinders will be conducted.

RESCUE PROGRAMS

Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting

This course is offered to assist fire departments that respond to aircraft emergencies with standard structural and airport fire equipment. Also covered: What to expect when the FAA and NTSB arrive on scene.

Prerequisites: Applicants must be Certified Firefighter I or firefighters who have been a member of a fire department on or before July 1, 1977. Proof must be submitted with application.

Basic Water Rescue

This course is designed for firefighters and other public safety personnel who may be called to handle emergencies in or around water. The morning session will include the following topics: water hazards, aquatic safety, types of water rescue operations, basic water craft safety, hypothermia, rescue equipment, emergency response and the operations of water rescue. The afternoon session includes: practical skills for rescue and self rescue, and it allows participants to become

familiar with their own personal limitations obtained through pool exercises. Following successful completion of the practical skills and written examination, participants will receive a Connecticut Fire Academy certificate of completion. Participants are required to bring swimming suits and towels. Participants are not required to be a swimmer to attend this course.

Breaching, Breaking Concrete & Steel

Breaching and Breaking of Concrete and Steel is a very physically demanding and labor-intensive program. B & B is designed to enable firefighters to perform rescue operations in concrete and steel structures with compromised openings. Through the use of hand, gas, electric, and pneumatic tools, students will perform a series of breaches through concrete walls, floors and steel objects.

Full protective clothing, including SCBA with one spare cylinder, is required.

Prerequisites: Must be certified Firefighter II, Hazard Materials Operational and Confined Space Rescue. Proof must be submitted with application.

Cold Water Rescue

This course is designed for firefighters who might be called to a water rescue incident involving cold or icy waters, as well as ice rescues. Simulated rescue on ice (if available), and water will be practiced.

Confined Space Rescue

This course will prepare the participants for confined space rescue situations, that may include pits, wells, vats, mines and tanks. Students will perform actual rescue/recovery scenarios.

FIRE PREVENTION PROGRAMS

Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I

This is an entry-level course that will prepare anyone who performs public education duties to present existing programs to all audiences. The course addresses fire prevention activities, the major causes of unintentional injury, characteristics of learning, evaluation of lesson plans, presentation methods, effective usage of audiovisual aids, successfully dealing with the media and recordkeeping. This four-day course meets the requirements of NFPA 1035, "Professional Qualifications for Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I." Reference Material is required for the class.

Kid's Fire Safety House

What is the Kid's Fire Safety House?

The Kid's Fire Safety House is a mobile educational trailer used by community educators to teach preschool to high school aged children home safety. This educational tool allows children to practice escaping from a simulated house fire. The trailer uses electronically operated smoke detectors and a non-toxic smoke in a simulated bedroom to create a realistic environment where children can practice escaping from a house in the event of a fire. Additional features of the trailer enable the educator to teach kitchen safety, home heating safety and reporting an emergency.

Who Can Reserve the Kid's Fire Safety House?

Community educators, including Fire & Life Safety Educators and others engaged in teaching fire or other life safety skills to the public. This includes fire and emergency medical service organizations and schools.

CANDIDATE PHYSICAL ABILITY TEST - CPAT

The Candidate Physical Ability Test (CPAT) consists of eight separate events. CPAT is a sequence of events requiring you to progress along a predetermined path from event to event in a continuous manner. This test was developed to allow fire departments to obtain pools of trainable candidates who are physically able to perform the essential jobs on the fire scene.

This is a pass/fail test based on a validated maximum total time of 10 minutes and 20 seconds. In these events you wear a 50-pound vest to simulate the weight of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) and firefighter protective clothing. An additional 25 pounds, using two 12.5-pound weights that simulate a high-rise pack (hose bundle), is added to your shoulders for the stair climb event only. Throughout all events, you must wear long pants, a hard hat with chinstrap, provided work gloves, and footwear with no open heel or toe. Watches and loose or restricted jewelry are not permitted. All props were designed to obtain the necessary information regarding your physical ability. The tools and equipment were chosen to provide the highest level of consistency, safety and validity in measuring your physical abilities. A schematic drawing of CPAT is included in the orientation material. The events and distances between events are always the same. The events are placed in a sequence that best simulates fire scene events while allowing an 85-foot walk between events. To ensure the highest level of safety and to prevent exhaustion, no running is allowed between events. This walk intentionally allows you approximately 20 seconds to recover and regroup before each event. The following is a description of the structure and components of the Certification Examinations. The NFPA Standard to which the examination is written is noted below the certification level. The State of Connecticut Commission on Fire Prevention and Control is pleased to offer Fire Service Certification to the members of Connecticut's fire service, Certification is an excellent means by which an individual may measure his/her knowledge, skills, and abilities against a national standard and that of their peers. As indicated below, there are currently 12 levels of certification offered consisting of written and/or practical skills examination components as well as live fire suppression verification for the levels of Firefighter I and Firefighter II. The Commission has adopted the most current edition of the applicable Professional Qualifications Standards of the National Fire Protection Association as the Standards for Certification, A 13th level of certification, that of Airport Firefighter, is currently under development. The level of Fire Inspector I is offered through the Office of the State Fire Marshal. 

CERTIFICATION EXAMINATION - PREREQUISITES AND APPLICATION PROCEDURES

The Training Division of the State of Connecticut Commission on Fire Prevention and Control has streamlined the process by which individuals may participate in certain training programs by eliminating as training prerequisites certification examination requirements. The responsibility for ensuring that individuals are qualified to participate in a certification examination now shifts from the Training Registrar to the individual certification candidate. Candidates for Certification are now personally required to ensure that they have met all prerequisites prior to submitting an examination application and are required to submit any required documentation prior to the examination. Failure to do so will result in rejection of the examination application.

Certification Examination Requirements by Level As of January 1, 2004

It is the individual responsibility of the candidate to ensure that all of the following applicable requirements have been fulfilled and/or proof submitted prior to an examination in addition to submission of a completed examination application.

Additionally, State of Connecticut Regulations require that all candidates for certification be 18 years of age at the time of the examination and that candidates for certification be a member of a fire department with the exception of Public Fire and Life Safety Educator I and II, which allow direct entry into those levels.

CERTIFICATION EXAMINATION COMPONENTS - CONTINUE

Indemnification of Instructors

An added benefit to Certification for Fire Service Instructors may be found in Section 7-323q of the General Statutes of Connecticut which states: "The state shall save harmless and indemnify any person certified as a fire service instructor by the Commission on Fire Prevention and Control under section 7-323l from financial loss and expense, including legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of alleged negligence or other act resulting in personal injury or property damage, which acts are not wanton, reckless or malicious, providing such person at the time of the acts resulting in such injury or damage was acting in the discharge of his duties in providing fire service training and instruction."
