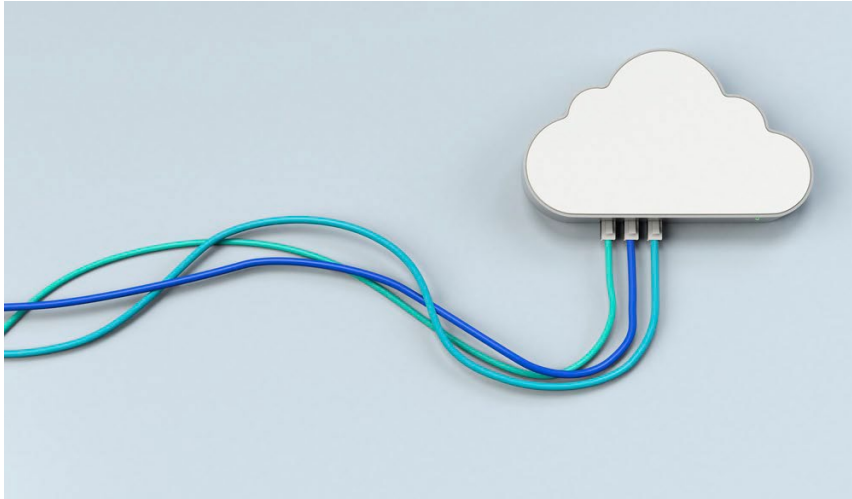

Key Accomplishments for 2024

Electronic Workflow Achievements

In 2024, CJIS-CT made significant progress in enhancing its electronic workflow systems across Connecticut. The Police Department Kickoff Meeting (Familiarization) process was successfully completed across 17 Geographical Areas (GAs), engaging 74 police departments. All local PD IT connectivity issues were resolved, ensuring readiness for full CISS Workflow deployment. The release of CISS v11.4.3 introduced support for Clean Slate, MVP, and enhanced family violence indicators. Additionally, a new legislatively driven gun violence variable bond percentage field was implemented for Arrest Paperwork submissions. The latest NexGen RMS software release was certified, featuring Supplemental Transmittal routing for DCJ and an intuitive bond tab for SCO. Further expanding its reach, CISS Workflow deployment grew to include five additional GAs, bringing the total to 25 municipal police departments (MPDs) actively submitting Arrest and Summons packages.

CISS continues to enhance justice and public safety operations in Connecticut with over 5,200 individuals trained in CISS Search. Active users conduct 5,000+ searches monthly. A comprehensive study on digital evidence management explored centralized storage solutions, while CISS training efforts onboarded over 1,000 new users across law enforcement agencies. Additionally, critical infrastructure upgrades modernized data centers, improving system performance and security. CJIS-CT also supports the Clean Slate initiative which advanced with the launch of the Sentence Discharge Database (SDDB) component, processing 23 years of case history.

Looking Ahead: 2025 Initiatives

In 2025, CJIS-CT will continue advancing its electronic workflow change management process across Connecticut, enabling more police departments to submit arrest packages electronically, reducing manual paperwork and improving efficiency. All Geographical Areas (GAs) will integrate a NexGen component, allowing broader collaboration with RMS vendors, while efforts will focus on software enablement, training, and activation for departments already connected. Once NexGen integration is complete, smaller MPDs and RMS vendors (IMC, Inform, and ProPhoenix) will be brought into the system, expanding participation in Level 1 Early Arrest Notifications and Level 2 Full Arrest Packages (paperless). Additional priorities include onboarding new municipal police departments and private PSAPs, transit and rail police, launching a cloud-based digital evidence pilot project, and streamlining CISS user authorization through an electronic request portal (eCUAR). Data integration efforts will enhance Clean Slate processing and RMS vendor collaboration, while security measures will focus on maintaining compliance with federal cybersecurity standards.

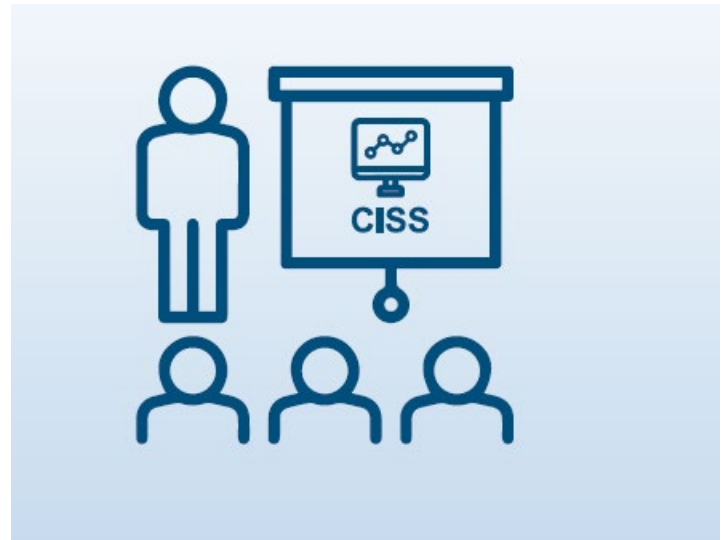
