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MR. MORISSETTE: This remote public hearing is called to order this Thursday, April 28, 2022, at 6:30 p.m. My name is John Morissette, member and presiding officer of the Connecticut Siting Council.

This is a continuation of the remote public hearing that began at 2nd p.m. this afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's Docket Number 508 webpage, along with the record of this matter, the public hearing notice, instructions for public

access to this remote public hearing, and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council Procedures.

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This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon an application from The United Illuminating Company for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the Milvon to West River Railroad Transmission Line 115-kV Rebuild Project that consists of the relocation and rebuild of its existing 115-kilovolt electric transmission lines from the railroad catenary structures to the new steel monopole structures and related modifications to facilitate interconnection of the rebuilt 115-kV electric transmission lines at UI's existing Milvon, Woodmont, Allings Crossing, Elmwest and West River Substations along the approximately 9.5 miles of the Connecticut Department of Transportation's Metro-North Railroad corridor traversing the municipalities of Milford, Orange, West Haven and New Haven, Connecticut. This application was received by the Council on February 28, 2022.

The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this remote public hearing was published in The New Haven Register on March 26, 2022. Upon this Council's request, the applicant erected signs at conspicuous locations along the route so as to inform the public of the name of the applicant, the type of facility, the remote public hearing date, and contact information for the Council, including the website and phone

number.

The locations of the signs are as follows: The Milford Train Station located at 1 Railroad Avenue in Milford.

The intersection of Marsh Hill Road and Metro-North Railroad in Orange.

The UI operations building located at 100 Marsh Hill Road in Orange.

The West Haven Train Station located at 20 Railroad Avenue in West Haven.

And the West River Substation located at 255 Ella T. Grasso Boulevard, also known as Route 10, in New Haven.

This public comment session is reserved for the public to make brief statements into the record. These public statements are not subject

to questions from the parties or the Council, and members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council.

These public statements will become part of the record for the Council's consideration. Please be advised that written comments may be submitted by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council's staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law.

I wish to note that parties and intervenors, including their representatives, witnesses and members, are not allowed to participate in the public comment session. I also wish to note for those who are listening and for the benefit of your friends and families who are unable to join us for this remote public comment session that you or they may send written comments, written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof by mail or by email, and such written statements will be given the same weight as if spoken at the remote public hearing session itself. Please be advised that any person may be removed from the Zoom remote public comment

session at the discretion of the Council.

We ask that each person making public statements in this proceeding to confine his or her statements to the subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all of the concerns you and your neighbors may have. Please be advised that the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal.

A verbatim transcript of this remote public hearing will be posted on the Council's Docket No. 508 webpage and deposited at the City Clerk's Office of the Milford, New Haven and West Haven City Halls and the Town Clerk's Office of the Orange Town Hall for the convenience of the public.

Please be advised that the Council's project evaluation criteria under the statute does not include consideration of property values.

Before I call on members of the public to make statements, I request the applicant to make a very brief description to the public describing the project. And I believe Mr. Crosbie will be doing that.

Mr. Crosbie.

MR. CROSBIE: Mr. Morissette, thank you very much. Good evening, members of the Connecticut Siting Council, elected officials and the public attending the meeting. I want to start off by providing some information related to UI's Milvon to West River Transmission Line Rebuild Project along the Connecticut DOT corridor, give some background, provide some detail about the project and some other information relative to the project.

Some history related to the railroad corridor. The corridor is owned by Connecticut DOT, and railroad catenaries were built within that corridor in the 1910s. In the 1940s, UI installed its infrastructure along that same corridor at 69,000 volts and in 1980 it upgraded its facilities to 115,000 volts. To date, UI has conducted and completed five transmission line rebuilds within this same corridor between New Haven and Fairfield. This is the sixth of a total of seven legs of the project. There will be one further to do.

In 2018, UI completed an engineering study between New Haven and Fairfield that showed due to aging infrastructure and deterioration of

UI's facilities an upgrade to their facilities were needed to meet current National Electric Safety Code standards along with grid capacity needs allowing it to withstand certain weather conditions such as wind load for category 3 scenarios.

within this engineering study UI also evaluated different options for the infrastructure rebuild which ranged from single circuit to underground facilities. UI, in collaboration with ISO New England, selected that the double circuit monopoles for this leg of our project was the most prudent solution to meet the transmission system needs from a reliability, risk and cost perspective. The project will provide efficient electricity to not only UI's 350,000 customers but also add resiliency to the region.

In 2019, UI gained approval from the Regional Transmission Organization, ISO New England, under its proposed plan application for work between New Haven and Fairfield inclusive of this segment between New Haven to Milford. UI has also submitted a municipal consultation filing to each one of the municipalities along the way, the Connecticut Siting Council, and also as we're here

tonight for the application submitted in February of 2022.

The project consists of approximately 158 double circuit monopole structures constructed primarily on the north side of the tracks. Some structures will be installed on the south side of the tracks to accommodate the current substation alignments. The linear distance of the project is approximately 9.5 miles, and it goes through four towns along the way. Those towns, starting from east to west, are New Haven, West Haven, Orange and Milford. All the proposed construction work is predominantly within the existing Connecticut DOT corridor.

Project work and construction is being designed to be segmented between each of the five UI substations along the Connecticut DOT corridor. Those substations can be seen on the screen in Figure 1-1. From east to west we have UI's West River Substation by Elmwest Substation, Allings Crossing Substation, Woodmont Substation and finishing to the furthest west substation in UI's territory Milvon Substation located in Milford, Connecticut.

Pending the CSC's approval, the final

1 design is anticipated to be completed in 2023. 2 During the course of our design with our 3 engineering team, project team and other 4 supporting departments, we've consulted and 5 performed applicable due diligence with many 6 municipal, state and federal agencies. Some of 7 these state agencies that we've worked with to 8 assist in the design of our project are the 9 Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental 10 Protection. Within that organization we've spoke 11 with the likes of the solid waste division and the 12 water resources related to wetland watercourse 13 impacts. We spoke with the State Historic 14 Preservation Office, the Audubon Society and of 15 course the owner of the corridor, the Connecticut 16 Department of Transportation. A few federal 17 agencies that we've worked with, U.S. Fish and 18 Wildlife, the Army Corps of Engineers, the U.S. 19 Coast Guard and the Federal Aviation 20 Administration. During these consultations we've 21 worked with these agencies to help us minimize the 22 environmental impacts and also provide mitigation 23 measures where impacts may occur.

If approvals fall into place for UI, the current schedule is to mobilize to perform

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construction in the summer/fall of 2023. Some activity that the public and municipal officials may see during the construction, sequence of construction work are survey crews, vegetation clearing, E&S, erosion and sediment control, site preparation, access road and work pad, drilling to install our foundations, steel pole erection and conductors.

The in-service dates of the four segments will commence in the spring of 2023 and are estimated to be finished in the winter of 2027. Following the in-service dates, restoration inspections will be performed by licensed parties to meet certain permit requirements and land access agreements. Once in-service is performed, crews will work to remove the old UI facilities located on both the north and south sides of the Metro-North catenaries located on the bonnets on top of those catenaries.

Again, I want to thank the public, members of the Council and elected officials for coming out this evening to learn more about UI's Milvon to West River Transmission Line Rebuild Project, and we look forward to working with you through the life cycle of our project. Thank you

State Representative Smith.

REP. SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Morissette, and thank the Council for hosting this public

hearing. I represent the 118th District of Milford in the House of Representatives, the General Assembly. In fact, I am at the Capitol right now, as is Representative Kennedy, and we are in the midst of voting as we speak here. So we already clicked off at one point here in order to vote, so please bear with us.

I (AUDIO INTERRUPTION) this public hearing UI's Milvon to West River transmission line upgrade. Without commenting on the environmental or technical merits of the proposal, which I have every confidence are well founded and probably of some necessity, the configuration of it would be, the monopoles, the size, scope and intrusion that it represents along the railroad corridor and that particular area from West River Street impinges directly on the historic district in the downtown area of Milford.

My objection at this point is purely aesthetic, but it is something that I can't understate in terms of its effect on the traditional views, vistas and character of the Town of Milford. Because it is on the railroad corridor, DOT Railroad corridor, it naturally does go through the Old Town, to use an expression, and

represents a fairly extensive disfiguration of what we have known and appreciated as residents of Milford. In fact, it is very central to our plan of conservation and development. This particular plan is a large imposition in terms of the scope and the perspective that visitors have and residents of Milford and really require, I feel, further consideration of the necessity and development of perhaps some alternative approaches to it which I understand is not part of the agenda of this meeting.

But I do stand in strong opposition to this for the simple reason is that it undermines, and to my way of thinking, and I think I share this with my constituents and neighbors and fellow citizens of Milford, a step in the wrong direction in terms of the aesthetics and the picturesque allure of Milford. These are large, extremely imposing structures and are, as I said, feel to be an imposition on what we understand and expect our town to be in terms of planning for the future and in terms of full enjoyment of our neighborhoods today.

And with that, I will submit a written summary with more detail with regard to my

And I thank you for your time and indulgence.

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, State Representative Smith, and thank you for coming out this evening.

We'll now continue with public comments from State Representative Kennedy.

REP. KENNEDY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. It's a pleasure to come before you this evening. I apologize, I am literally in a phone booth because it's the quietest place I can find right now without getting back to the Legislative Office Building. Again, thank you. I am State Representative Kathy Kennedy. I represent the 119th District which encompasses parts of Milford and Orange. But I represent all of the residents of -- I come before you because I represent all the residents of Milford and Orange and especially Milford.

We have our beautiful historic downtown Milford. We're like a quaint little seaside little town. The train station parallels our downtown. My concern and the reason I come before you is I'm concerned with the impact this project will have on our downtown New Milford.

1 Just a little point of information. 2 Our downtown green has the tallest flag pole in 3 the State of Connecticut at 120 feet. It's my 4 understanding that the lines, stanchions, if 5 that's what they're called, are going to be 6 150-feet tall. I've seen photographs and video of 7 it, and it's quite obtrusive, quite honestly. That's where my first concern lies.

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I also understand the State Historic Office reached out to you and cited five historic resources in the City of Milford and a little confused when it came back with, well, we're going to protect Charles Island. Well, Charles Island is no where near the downtown area where this proposal is going. It was my understanding that there would be some kind of signage to take away from, but I don't see that. So when you look at your notes, I was just looking at part of your project notes, and that was what I had seen in there.

So again, I come to voice my concerns, my strong concerns that you look at this project again and reconsider the size of the stanchions that will be going up 150 feet. I understand that that cuts back on the number that you have to

have, that by going small you'd have to have more, there would be more, but I think that really needs to be looked at. As I pictured it, I mean, these 150-foot poles are in someone's backyard, and there are a lot of residential areas. We have a very quaint, almost transit-oriented district downtown Milford.

And finally, I would just say that I'm just so concerned about the charm of our beautiful downtown Milford and going into Orange. So I ask you to take those, to consider those items that I've stated. And like State Representative Smith, I'll send in my comments in writing to the Council. I did submit my request for testimony a little late, so I really appreciate the indulgence tonight and wish you all the best tonight. So thank you very much, Mr. Chairman.
