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THE HEARING OFFICER: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. Can everyone hear me okay? Very good, thank you.

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This hearing is called to order. It is Thursday, June 15, 2023, at 6:30 p.m. My name is John Morissette, member and presiding officer of the Connecticut Siting Council.

Other members of the Council are Brian Golembiewski, designee for Commissioner Katie Dykes of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection; Quat Nguyen, designee for Chairman Marissa Paslick Gillett of the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority. We have Robert Silvestri and Daniel P. Lynch, Jr.

Members of the staff are Melanie Bachman, Executive Director and Staff Attorney; Robert Mercier, siting analyst, and Lisa Fontaine, fiscal administrative officer.

If you haven't done so already, I ask that everyone please mute their computer audio and/or telephones now.

This is a continuation of the remote public hearing that began this afternoon at 2 p.m.

copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's Docket Number 514 webpage, along with the record of this matter, the public hearing notice, instructions for public access to this remote public hearing, and the Council's Citizens' Guide to Siting Council's Procedures.

This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon the application from Glenvale LLC, d/b/a Glenvale Solar, for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need for the construction, maintenance, and operation of a four-megawatt AC solar photovoltaic electric generating facility located at 56 River Road in Putnam, Connecticut.

This application was received by the Council on March 8, 2023. The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this remote public hearing was published in the Norwich Bulletin on April 5, 2023.

Upon this Council's request, the Applicant erected a sign in the vicinity of the proposed site so as to inform the public of the name of the Applicant, the type of the facility, the remote

public hearing date, and contact information for the Council, including the website and phone number.

Please be advised that the Council does not issue permits for stormwater management. If the proposed project is approved by the Council, a Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, DEEP stormwater permit is independently required. DEEP could hold a public hearing on any stormwater permit application.

Please also be advised that the Council's project evaluation criteria under the statute does not include consideration of property value.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law.

This remote public comment session is reserved for the public who have signed up in advance to make brief statements. These limited appearance statements are not subject to questions from the parties or the Council. The members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council.

In accordance with the public hearing notice

and in fairness to everyone who signed up to speak, these public statements will be limited to three minutes. Please be advised that written comments may be submitted by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

I wish to note that parties and interveners, including their representatives, witnesses, and members are not allowed to participate in the public comment session. I also wish to note for those who are listening and for the benefit of your friends and families who are unable to join us in the remote public comment session, that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof, by mail or by e-mail.

Please be advised that any person may be removed from the remote public comment session at the discretion of the Council. We ask that each person making a limited appearance statement in this proceeding confine his or her statements to the subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all the concerns you and your neighbors may have. Please be advised that the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal.

A verbatim transcript will be made of this hearing and will be deposited at the Putnam Town Clerk's Office for the convenience of the public.

At this time, I request the Applicant to make a brief presentation to the public describing the proposed facility. I believe Lisa Raffin is going to be making that presentation. Lisa?

THE WITNESS (Raffin): Yes. Thank you, Mr. Morissette.

Will there be an image that is shared?

THE HEARING OFFICER: Yes.

THE WITNESS (Raffin): Thank you. So the project that is proposed is located at 56 River Road in Putnam.

Surrounding that area are, to the north, Day

Kimball Hospital and an industrial park.

To the east, there is a 23 kV distribution line, wastewater treatment plant, the Quinebaug River, Route 395, and another industrial park. To the south is a gravel pit.

There are four residential properties to the north and one residential property to the south.

To the west of the project site is River Road and a parcel across the street, which is owned by the same owner as the project site.

The site was selected as it's -- with its proximity to electrical infrastructure.

Considerations were given to slope, wetlands, and natural conditions and any potential effects to the local community.

The site is a 31-acre parcel, 17 acres of which will be used for the project. Three acres in the northwest corner of the site are currently leased to a local farmer for feed corn.

And then the site itself, the project elements are, it's a four-megawatt AC solar photovoltaic plant. There will be approximately 8,900 panels which will be mounted on trackers that will track with the sun in one single axis.

The project will generate 6,700 megawatt hours in the first year approximately. That energy will be delivered to Eversource utility via a 20-year power purchase agreement. This project was part of the 2021 Shared Clean Energy Facility Program, which was a competitive procurement and it was selected under that procurement.

There is an access road proposed that would enter the site at the northwest corner. That access road is approximately 350 feet long and would enter inside the perimeter fence. That perimeter fence would be seven feet high around three sides of the project, with the side along

the west being eight feet high. That eight-foot high fence along the west side would have privacy screening along River Road.

There are wetlands and a vernal pool to the south of the project, and the project is set back to allow for wetlands and habitat buffer.

Plantings will be put in place between that vernal pool and the project to promote habitat, the habitat in the vernal pool area.

There are several stormwater control features designed for this project with retention basins to address stormwater runoff.

The electrical interconnection is proposed and then reviewed by both Eversource and ISO New England with an overhead tap from the northwest corner from an existing pole that comes across River Road to another pole. And then there will be a pad-mounted meter and electrical equipment from there.

I think that completes my description of the project.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Raffin.

We will now call on Tim Taft, followed by Elaine Sistare, to make a public statement.

Tim Taft, please?

TIMOTHY TAFT: Yes, good evening. Thank you for the opportunity to let me speak. My name is Tim Taft.

I live at 50 Mantup Road, Putnam, Connecticut, one-half mile from this proposed facility.

My wife and family drive by this area many times. We chose to live here 28 years ago for its natural beauty and surrounding woodlands and wildlife.

I'm not against green energy proposed solutions, provided they make sense. I honestly do not feel as though this proposal makes much sense at all.

Based on the diagram that I saw today, it's clear to me that the land for this proposal is approximately three quarters wooded and one quarter cornfield.

On a daily basis, it's very common to see eight to ten deer and wild turkeys grazing in the cornfield. Hawks and coyotes have been spotted there, and there's also a black bear in this exact location that was recently spotted on Quinebaug and posted on the WINY Radio Facebook page on June 9th with photographic proof. So to deforest this area, I feel as though it would be a travesty.

Much of the wildlife has already been

displaced by the neighboring Putnam ash landfill expansion and the daily barrage of ash landfill trucks. The landfill was recently expanded from 60 acres to 120.

Additionally, there is an adjacent 267-acre vacant, might I say, technology park in Putnam's expanded wastewater treatment facility. It's worth noting that the Town built the neighboring technology park 20 years ago and has not had one tenant since. All of that open land is sitting vacant. There's also an expanded gravel pit facility down the road where blasting occurs on a weekly basis.

I live a mile away from that facility and I feel the blast at my house, and I've been told that there's a lot of ledge veins and that's why I experience that. I've had seismic measuring devices put outside my house to measure that, and that's a mile away.

My point with a lot of this is that all this adjacent deforestation is pushing wildlife out of their habitat. I've witnessed this firsthand in my 28 years living here. This proposal literally is going to destroy green forest ecosystems to put up a, quote-unquote, green energy solution. To

me, that's an oxymoron.

One may argue that some of the proposed land is already farmland for growing corn, but I can tell you in the 25 years of watching wildlife in that area, they come out of the woods in the winter to feed on kernels of corn left in the ground from the farmer's harvesting process.

This is a vital food source for these animals, especially during winter months. Field mice eat the leftover corn; the hawks fly above, eat the mice; deer and turkeys eat the corn. To me, it's nature at its finest.

This once pristine area of Connecticut, affectionately known as the last green valley, has become a dumping ground of the state and I say that literally because the ash landfill facilitates all of Connecticut and New York, and parts of Massachusetts.

I heard Ms. Raffin state earlier that

Glenvale looks for brownfield first, but I

question why not the landfill cells that was

recently closed by Wheelabrator, or the adjoining

closed Putnam ash landfill, the municipal ash

landfill on River Road, or the Town's 20-year

vacant technology park, or even the brownfield

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landfill on neighboring Modoc Road down --THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Taft.

> Unfortunately, your three minutes has expired. Thank you for coming out this evening.

We'll now continue with Elaine Sistare. Elaine?

ELAINE SISTARE: Good evening, everyone. Elaine Sistare. I'm the Town Administrator in the Town of Putnam. Putnam's land use agent, Bruce Fitzback, and I both attended the evidentiary hearing earlier today.

I will say both of us were very pleased to see that the Connecticut Siting Council appears to have done a thorough review of the project.

As part of Glenvale's preliminary information, they did ask the Town for input and we did collect information and input from our wetlands agent, our aquifer protection agent, our planning and zoning officers, our building department, our fire marshal, and our highway superintendent. So lots of folks that work for the Town of Putnam were able to review and provide input during the creation of these documents.

And again, I thank the Siting Council for what I was very impressed with for their review. Thank you.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Elaine. Thank you for coming out this evening. Okay. That concludes our public comment session for this evening.

And before closing this hearing, the Connecticut Siting Council announces that briefs and proposed findings of fact may be filed with the Council by any party or intervener no later than July 15, 2023.

The submission of briefs or proposed findings of fact are not required by this Council. Rather, we leave it to the choice of the parties and interveners. Anyone who has not become a party or intervener but who desires to make his or her views known to the Council may file written statements with the Council within 30 days of the date hereof.

The Council will issue a draft finding of fact, and thereafter parties and interveners may identify errors or inconsistencies between the Council's draft findings of fact and the record. However, no new information, no new evidence, and no argument and no reply briefs without permission will be considered by the Council.

Copies of the transcript of this hearing will

be filed at the Putnam Town Clerk's office. I hereby declare this hearing adjourned. Thank you everyone for your participation and have a good evening. Thank you. (End: 6:47 p.m.) б
