On behalf of Verizon Wireless ("Verizon"), All-Points Technology Corporation, P.C. ("APT") performed an evaluation with respect to possible federally- and state-listed, Endangered, Threatened, or Special Concern species in order to determine if the proposed referenced telecommunication facility ("Facility") would result in a potential adverse effect to listed species.

APT understands that Verizon proposes to construct a wireless telecommunications facility with associated electrical equipment and underground conduit northeast of an existing developed paved bus storage lot located at 180 School Road, Wilton, Connecticut ("Property"). The location of the proposed Facility and underground utilities consists of disturbed edge forest abutting the already developed areas. Minor tree clearing would be required to accommodate the proposed Facility.

USFWS

The federal consultation was completed in accordance with Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") rules implementing the National Environmental Policy Act ("NEPA") and Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's ("USFWS") Information, Planning, and Conservation System ("IPaC"). Based on the results of the IPaC review, one federally listed threatened species is known to occur in the vicinity of the Property documented as the northern long-eared bat ("NLEB"; *Myotis septentrionalis*²); please refer to the attached list of threatened and endangered species dated June 20, 2023. As a result of this preliminary finding, APT performed an evaluation to determine if the proposed referenced Facility would result in a likely adverse effect to NLEB.

Northern Long-eared Bat

The proposed Facility and access drive would be located within a disturbed forest edge area requiring minor tree clearing; trees potentially provide NLEB habitat. A review of the Connecticut Department of Energy & Environmental Protection ("CTDEEP") Wildlife Division Natural Diversity Data Base

("NDDB") NLEB habitat map³ revealed that the proposed Facility is not within 150 feet of a known occupied NLEB maternity roost tree and is not within 0.25 mile of a known NLEB hibernaculum. The nearest NLEB habitat resource to the proposed Facility is located ± 11.9 miles to the southwest in Greenwich.

Effective March 31, 2023, NLEB has been reclassified as endangered under the ESA. The reclassification eliminates use of the previous 4(d) rule for NLEB; 4(d) rules may only be applied to threatened species. A NLEB Interim Consultation Framework has been developed by USFWS for projects that are reasonably certain to occur before April 1, 2024 (date on which the NLEB Interim Consultation Framework expires) to facilitate transition from the 4(d) rule to typical ESA consultation procedures for endangered species. APT submitted the effects determination using the current NLEB Determination Key ("DKey") within the IPaC system for this Facility and determined there would be "No Effect" to NLEB. Please refer to the enclosed USFWS June 20, 2023 letter confirming the NLEB No Effect determination and ESA compliance for the Facility.

In APT's previous August 31, 2022 USFWS & NDDB Compliance document, the following additional USFWS voluntary conservation measures, as encouraged in the April 29, 2016 FCC Public Notice⁴, were proposed to reduce potential impacts to NLEB.

- Conduct tree removal activities outside of the NLEB pup season (June 1-July 31) and active season (April 1-October 31) to minimize impacts to pups at roosts not yet identified.
- Avoid clearing suitable spring staging and fall swarming habitat within a five-mile radius of known or assumed NLEB hibernacula during the staging and swarming seasons (April 1-May 15 and August 15-November 14, respectively). Not applicable.
- Maintain dead trees (snags) and large trees when possible.
- Use herbicides and pesticides only if unavoidable. If necessary, spot treatment is preferred over aerial application.
- Minimize exterior night lighting, opting for down-shielded, motion-sensor security lights to keep light within the boundaries of the Property, avoiding constant illumination lighting.

However, through the updated NLEB DKey consultation it was revealed in the enclosed USFWS June 20, 2023 letter that "[T]he proposed action does not intersect an area where the northern long-eared bat is likely to occur, based on the information available to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as of the most recent update of this key." The new NLEB DKey now contains occupancy modeling data that support these not likely to occur in NLEB habitat conclusions. Therefore, since NLEB is unlikely to occur at the Property the voluntary time of year tree clearing restrictions and conservation measures noted above would not be required for this Facility.

NDDB

No known areas of state-listed species are currently depicted on the most recent CTDEEP NDDB Maps in the location of the proposed Verizon Facility. Please refer to the enclosed NDDB Map which depicts the nearest NDDB buffer ± 0.93 -mile north of the Property. Since the proposed Facility and Property are not located within a NDDB buffer area, consultation with DEEP is not required in accordance with their review policy.

Therefore, the proposed Verizon Wireless Facility is not anticipated to adversely impact any federal or state threatened, endangered or species of special concern.

This letter records your determination using the Information for Planning and Consultation (IPaC) system provided to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) on June 20, 2023, for '(VZW) Wilton South CT' (here forward, Project). This project has been assigned Project Code 2022-0062662 and all future correspondence should clearly reference this number. **Please carefully review this letter.**

Ensuring Accurate Determinations When Using IPaC

The Service developed the IPaC system and associated species' determination keys in accordance with the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA; 87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) and based on a standing analysis. All information submitted by the Project proponent into the IPaC must accurately represent the full scope and details of the Project. Failure to accurately represent or implement the Project as detailed in IPaC or the Northern Long-eared Bat Rangewide Determination Key (Dkey), invalidates this letter.

Determination for the Northern Long-Eared Bat

Based upon your IPaC submission and a standing analysis, your project has reached the determination of "No Effect" on the northern long-eared bat. To make a no effect determination, the full scope of the proposed project implementation (action) should not have any effects (either positive or negative), to a federally listed species or designated critical habitat. Effects of the action are all consequences to listed species or critical habitat that are caused by the proposed action, including the consequences of other activities that are caused by the proposed action. A consequence is caused by the proposed action if it would not occur but for the proposed action and it is reasonably certain to occur. Effects of the action may occur later in time and may

include consequences occurring outside the immediate area involved in the action. (See § 402.17).

Under Section 7 of the ESA, if a federal action agency makes a no effect determination, no consultation with the Service is required (ESA §7). If a proposed Federal action may affect a listed species or designated critical habitat, formal consultation is required except when the Service concurs, in writing, that a proposed action "is not likely to adversely affect" listed species or designated critical habitat [50 CFR §402.02, 50 CFR§402.13].






Proposed Monopole
