MR. MORISSETTE: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. This hearing is called to order. It is Thursday, November 30th, 2023 at 6:30 PM. My name is John Morissette, Member and Presiding Officer of the Connecticut Siting Council.

Other members of the Council are Brian Golembiewski, Designee for Commissioner Katie Dykes of the Department of Energy and Environmental protection; Quat Nguyen, Designee for Chairman Marissa Paslick Gillett of the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority; Robert Silvestri and Daniel P. Lynch, Jr.

Members of the staff are Melanie Bachman, Executive Director and Staff Attorney; Robert Mercier, Siting Analyst; and Lisa Fontaine, Fiscal Administrative Officer.

If you haven't do so, I ask that everyone please mute their computer audio and/or telephones now. This is a continuation of the public hearing that began at 2:00 PM this afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's Docket Number 517 web page, along with the record of this matter, the Public Hearing Notice, instructions for public access to this public hearing and the Council's Citizens Guide to

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Siting Council's Procedures.

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This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes, and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon an application from MCM Holdings, LLC for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the construction, maintenance and operation of a telecommunications facility located at the Boy Scouts of America Camp Hoyt, 288 Simpaug Turnpike, parcel number 12-29 in Redding, Connecticut. This application was received by the Council on August 15th, 2023. This application is also governed by the Telecommunications Act of 1996, which is administered by the Federal Communications Commission. This act prohibits this Council from considering the health effects of radio frequency emissions on human health and wildlife to the extent emissions from towers are within the federal acceptable safe limit standards, which standards is also followed by the State Department of Health. The Federal Act also prohibits the Council from discriminating between and amongst providers of functionally equivalent This means that if one carrier already services. provides service in the area, other carriers have the right to compete and provide service in the same area. The Council's legal notice of the date and time of

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this public hearing was published in the Redding Sentinel on September 14th, 2023. Upon this Council's request, the Applicant erected signs in the vicinity of the proposed site so as to inform the Public of the name of the applicant, the type of the facility, the public hearing date and contact information for the Council, including the website and phone number.

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Please be advised that the Council's project evaluation criteria under the statute does not include consideration of property value.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council, or a member of the Council's staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law.

15 This public comment session is reserved for members of the public who signed up in advance to make brief 16 17 These limited appearance statements are not statements. 18 subject to questions from the parties or the Council; 19 and members of the public making statements may not ask 20 questions of the parties or the Council. In accordance with the Public Hearing Notice, and in fairness to 22 everyone who is signed up to speak this evening, these 23 public statements will be limited to three minutes. 24 Please be advised that written comments may be submitted 25 by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

I wish to note that parties and intervenors, including their representatives, witnesses and members, are not allowed to participate in the public comment session.

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I also wish to note for those who are listening, and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for the public comment session, that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof by mail or by e-mail.

11 Please be advised that any person may be removed 12 from the public comment session at the discretion of the 13 Council. We ask each person making the limited 14 appearance statement in this proceeding to confine his 15 or her statements to the subject matter before the 16 Council, and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we 17 may hear all of the concerns you and your neighbors may Please be advised that the Council cannot answer 18 have. 19 questions from the Public about the proposal. A 20 verbatim transcript will be made of this hearing and be 21 placed and deposited at Redding Town Clerk's Office for 22 the convenience of the public.

At this time I request the Applicant make a brief presentation to the Public describing the proposed facility. I believe Brian Gaudet is going to make that

presentation; Mr. Gaudet.

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MR. GAUDET: Good evening, Mr. Morissette. For the record, my name is Brian Gaudet. I am a Project Manager with All Points Technology.

The Applicant that has proposed a 150 monopole is MCM Holdings, LLC. The site is located at 3 Marchant Road, also known as 288 Simpaug Turnpike in Redding. It is approximately a 174-acre parcel that is currently owned by the Connecticut Yankee Council. The property is located within an R2 residential zone, and is occupied by the Boy Scouts of America, Hoyt Scout Camp.

The new compound will be located in the north central section of the parcel. Vehicle access to the site will be along the existing paved driveway off of Simpaug Turnpike to the north, and traverse generally to the south, transitioning to an existing gravel parking area. An approximately 125-foot long gravel access drive extension will be installed from the southeast corner of the parking area, and extend to the southeast into the compound. Next page, please. Thank you very much.

The compound is a 4,880 square foot, irregularly shaped gravel based compound, surrounded by an eight foot high chain link fence with privacy slats. The compound will be accessed by a 12-foot wide gate on the

western fence line. Electric and telco utilities will run underground from an existing utility pole that will be placed by the utility owner in the existing parking lot along with the proposed access drive extension, and terminate at a proposed stepdown transformer and multimeter bank outside the southwest corner of the compound. Next slide, please. Thank you.

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The compound has been sized for four carriers, Verizon, and three future carriers. Verizon equipment, including a 50kw liquid propane emergency back-up generator, will be installed on a 10-foot by 20-foot concrete pad in the northeast corner of the compound. A 1,000 gallon propane tank will be installed on a separate 5-foot by 16-foot concrete pad in the northwest corner of the compound.

The new 150-foot tall monopole, to be painted brown, will be located in the eastern portion of the new compound. Verizon plans to install nine antennas, nine remote radio heads and one OBP mounted on a new platform. The center line of the antennas will be 146 feet above ground level.

The tower has been designed to accommodate three future carriers, with additional leased area within the existing compound. No future tower extension is to be designed at this time. Thank you very much.

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, Mr. Gaudet. We will now call on Jason Jaffee to make a public statement, followed by Paska Ann Nayden. Mr. Jaffee.

MR. JAFFEE: Yes, good evening. Can everyone hear me?

MR. MORISSETTE: Good evening. Yes, we can hear you fine. Thank you.

MR. JAFFEE: Great. So, yes, my name is Jason Jaffee. I am a resident of West Redding, and I just wanted to take this opportunity to voice my opposition to the construction of this cell tower at the Hoyt Scout Reservation.

To begin, I do not believe that the dark zones lacking cell service in West Redding are as widespread and prevalent as the filings in Docket 517 would lead one to believe. I live less then one mile from the proposed cell site and utilize Verizon as my carrier. Ι have no issues with service at my residence. I also drive on the local roads everyday, and rarely run into instances where I lose service. To validate my claims and provide additional clarity regarding current cell coverage availability in the region, I conducted a simple assessment by driving around to each of the 29 24 locations presented within Attachment 5, all within a 25 roughly two-mile radius of the proposed tower site. 26

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of these locations are in the Town of Redding, with Ridgefield, Danbury and Bethel all represented with one location. My cell service ranged from two to three bars depending on the location and I had no problems sending and receiving text message, as well as phone calls from each of these 29 locations. I prepared a document with screenshots of my phone at each of these locations displaying the cell service, as well as a map overlay. I am happy to share this document with anyone who would like to see it.

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I also have concerns about the location that is being proposed. Adjacent to the tower site is the Saugatuck River, the primary source for the namesake reservoir that provides clean drinking water to thousands of people in Fairfield County. There is also a wetland less than 50 feet from the site, per Attachment 4.

18 Additionally, many of Redding's most unique and 19 beautiful natural resources and youth educational 20 centers, either directly border or lie near the Hoyt 21 Scout Property where the tower would sit, including the 22 New Pond Farm Education Center, the Marchant Farm, the 23 Westbrook Nature School, as well as various Redding Land 24 Trust Conservation Lands. I fear the visual impact 25 associated with the construction of a 150-foot tall

structure so close to these cherished natural resources will permanently impair the experience that the users of these resources seek to enjoy.

Finally, there is the obvious safety concern that must be considered when placing a cell tower in a location that children frequent at all hours of the day and night, given that camping is a common activity at the Hoyt property, and campsites are located just a short walk away. I would not trust a simple fence to keep the tower protected from infringements and the potential for serious injury.

Redding is unique in its rural and bucolic attributes in a region of the state that is otherwise highly populated and urbanized. Residents have tremendous pride in the Town's natural beauty, and many elect to live and raise their families here for this very reason. The potential gain for so few is not worth the permanent impairment and erosion of the very characteristics that make Redding a unique and desirable place to live to so many. Thank you.

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MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, Mr. Jaffee.

I will state that you are allowed to provide and
 send written statements to the Council within 30 days of
 the date hereof by either mail or e-mail. And we will
 take a look at it and consider it in our deliberation.

Thank you.

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And we will now call upon Paska Ann Nayden, followed by Lauren De Souza.

MS. NAYDEN: Thank you so much. This is Paska Ann from Easton, Connecticut. I thank you all for this time this evening.

And I am voicing my opposition to this tower in Redding. Why? I think basically, it is simple law. I am objecting because just as Connecticut and Redding is bound to follow every U.S. Supreme Court ruling and every U.S. Court of Appeals Second Circuit rulings, it is also bound to follow every D.C. Circuit Ruling, including, but not limited to, the Missoula Corp. Versus the FCC in 2019, the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians versus the FCC in 2019, and the Environmental Health Trust versus the Federal Communications, FCC, in 2021. I think you are all familiar with those cases, if not, in my written that I will be e-mailing tomorrow, you can review those cases.

But in particular is the 2022 case, the Second Circuit case, out of Long Island. That is a very important case. This case is not under appeals, because I checked with the lawyers this week, and it has not been in appeals, they dropped their appeals, but this case is very important. It is a landmark legal decision

by Judge Frederick Block, a Senior United States District Judge for the Eastern District of New York. They found that the Village of Flower Hill, New York, was justified in denying the application of ExteNet, as an agent for Verizon Wireless, to place 18 small cell antennas in the Village. The Judge quoted the 1996 Telecommunication Act, citing the provision that nothing in this chapter shall limit or affect the authority of a State or Local Government or instrumentality thereof, over decisions regarding the placement, construction and modification of personal wireless services. Most importantly, the Judge ruled that the 1996 Act do not necessarily apply to the new uses of wireless, and that is what this tower is all about. It is new uses to provide broadband and other services. Improved capacity, he said, and speed are desirable, and no doubt profitable, but the goals in the age of smart phones, he wrote, but they are not protected by the Act.

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So I think this is very important that this
Council, in their due diligence, and I know they do due
diligence, and I respect with they do, honors and
respects these Supreme Court cases, as well as the
Second Circuit Court from this, just 2022, that we have
a right, and the Telecommunication Act does not protect
the 3.9, 3.7, call it the CBan, 5G, whatever they are

1 calling it these days, because 5G is just a marketing term that is used. So, I yield. 2 MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you for your comments this 3 4 evening, and thank you for coming out. 5 We will now call on Lauren De Souza, followed by 6 Clifford De Souza. Lauren. 7 MS. DE SOUZA: Hello. 8 MR. MORISSETTE: Good evening. 9 MS. DE SOUZA: Good evening. I am here to voice essentially my opposal to this. I know that there's, 10 11 there are many restrictions placed on what we can and 12 can't bring up that just so happen to coincide with many 13 concerns we all have when a new cell tower is proposed. 14 Those restrictions may be legal, but in my opinion they are incredibly unethical. And if our concerns prove 15 16 valid, we are the ones left footing the bill, 17 figuratively and literally. I yield. 18 MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, Ms. De Souza. 19 Now calling upon Clifford De Souza. 20 MR. DE SOUZA: Good evening. 21 MR. MORISSETTE: Good evening. 22 MR. DE SOUZA: I am a resident of Redding, and I am 23 here to voice my opposition to the cell tower proposal. 24 Whereas the Connecticut Siting Council is not required 25 to look at health risks or economic risks, I believe

that as a body of government, we should be aware of the issues. So the ruling rests on a piece of research that at this stage is over a quarter of a century old. Speaking as a scientist, I find that absurd. If you look at more recent decisions by bodies, governmental bodies, including the (inaudible), the International Commission on the Biological Effects of Electromagnetic Fields, you will find that there is a very strong case that these cellphone towers are responsible, and have been noted, to create (inaudible) effects.

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This is not a trivial issue. It is not something the CT Council can just simply ignore as a matter of law, because it does require to some degree of substantiation. It is not just simply about putting a tower where you will, it is about the effects of the people and the residents of the Town of Redding.

17 I would note what one of the previous speakers, that United States Court of Appeal for the District of 18 19 Columbia noted that the 1996 safety limits for human 20 exposure to wireless radiation, based on the FTC, and 21 the inability to update this would define as arbitrary 22 and capricious. So it seems absurd to me that we are 23 actually proceeding on those grounds when the health 24 risks are not actually known, and that we are not 25 allowed to look at it.

You also mentioned that we are not allowed to discuss the issue of house prices. Well I would note that in the Journal of Real Estate Finance and Economics, in a recent issue a couple of years ago, we noted that house prices within a kilometer of cellphone towers dropped by an average of 10 percent. As a member of the Town of Redding, I don't particularly want to see that happen to my real estate prices. And I particularly, if I was, certainly the father of a young child, would not consider living in Redding if a cellphone tower went up. Thank you very much.

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, Mr. De Souza, and thank you for coming out this evening.

14 Well before closing this hearing, we, the 15 Connecticut Siting Council announces that briefs and 16 proposed findings of fact may be filed with the Council by any party or intervenors no later than the continuation of this hearing -- excuse me, let me start The Council announces that it will continue the over. evidentiary session of this public hearing on January 23rd, 2024, at 2:00 PM via Zoom remote conferencing. The copy of the agenda for the continued evidentiary hearing session will be available on the Council's Docket 517 web page. Along with a record of this matter, the Public Hearing Notice, instructions for

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public access to this evidentiary hearing session, and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council Procedures.

Please note that anyone who has not become a party or intervenors, but who desires to make his or her views known to the Council, may file written statements with the Council until the public comment record closes. Copies of the transcript of this hearing will be filed at the Redding Town Clerk's Office.
