On behalf of Celco Partnership d/b/a Verizon Wireless ("Verizon"), All-Points Technology Corporation, P.C. ("APT") performed an evaluation with respect to possible Federally- and State-listed, Endangered, Threatened, or Special Concern species in order to determine if the proposed referenced telecommunication facility ("Facility") would result in a potential adverse effect to listed species.

APT understands that Verizon proposes to construct a new wireless telecommunications facility at 11 Chamberlain Road in East Windsor, Connecticut (the "Property"). The Property consists of an approximately 10.9-acre commercially developed parcel. The area proposed for the facility is located in the northern portion of the Property in an area that is currently comprised of early successional upland forest. Verizon Wireless proposes to install a 120-foot tall monopole tower and ground equipment enclosure within a 50-foot by 50-foot gravel compound area surrounded with an 8-foot tall chain link fence ("Facility"). A proposed 20-foot wide gravel access road and utility easement would be located off Chamberlain Road in order to gain access and provide electric and telco services to the proposed Facility.

USFWS

The Federal consultation was completed in accordance with Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") rules implementing the National Environmental Policy Act ("NEPA") and Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act ("ESA") through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's ("USFWS") Information, Planning, and Conservation System ("IPaC"). Based on the results of the IPaC review, one Federally listed¹ Endangered species is known to occur in the vicinity of the Property documented as the northern long-eared bat ("NLEB"; *Myotis septentrionalis*)². Please refer to the enclosed official species list. As a result of this preliminary finding, APT performed an evaluation to determine if the proposed referenced Facility would result in a likely adverse effect to NLEB.

Northern Long-eared Bat

The proposed Facility and access drive would be located within a disturbed forest edge area requiring tree clearing; trees potentially provide NLEB habitat. A review of the Connecticut Department of

Energy & Environmental Protection ("CTDEEP") Wildlife Division Natural Diversity Data Base ("NDDDB") NLEB habitat map³ revealed that the proposed Facility is not within 150 feet of a known occupied NLEB maternity roost tree and is not within 0.25 mile of a known NLEB hibernaculum. The nearest NLEB habitat resource to the proposed Facility is located ±9.7 miles to the northwest in East Granby.

NLEB has been reclassified as Endangered under the ESA. The reclassification now eliminates use of the previous 4(d) rule for NLEB; 4(d) rules may only be applied to Threatened species. A NLEB Interim Consultation Framework has been developed by USFWS for projects that are reasonably certain to occur before April 1, 2024 (date on which the NLEB Interim Consultation Framework expires) to facilitate transition from the 4(d) rule to typical ESA consultation procedures for Endangered species. APT submitted the effects determination using the current NLEB Determination Key ("DKey") within the IPaC system for this Facility and determined there would be "No Effect" to NLEB. Please refer to the enclosed USFWS June 5, 2023 letter confirming the NLEB No Effect determination and ESA compliance for the Facility.

NDDB

APT reviewed the most recent DEEP NDDB mapping (June 2023), which reveals that a NDDB polygon is located ±0.22 mile southwest of the Facility, encroaching just onto the southern Property boundary. Because state-listed species or communities are documented on the Property, consultation with NDDB is required since the Facility's area of effect could potentially impact species associated with this nearby NDDB polygon.

APT submitted a review request to the DEEP electronic NDDB submission system on May 8, 2023 with respect to this Facility. A NDDB Determination letter (No. 202304681) was received identifying one State-listed Special Concern Species: *Margaritifera margaritifera*, Eastern pearlshell, a freshwater mussel species inhabiting fast-flowing unpopulated streams and rivers. Please see attached NDDB Determination Letter. Habitat of this nature is absent from the Property, however, recommended protective measures for these non-avian species will be implemented during construction to avoid water quality impacts that could affect downstream resources.

Therefore, with the protection measures for Eastern pearlshell the proposed Facility is not anticipated to adversely impact any Federal or State Threatened, Endangered or Special Concern species.

If a Federal agency, or its non-Federal representative, determines that listed species and/or designated critical habitat may be affected by the proposed project, the agency is required to consult with the Service pursuant to 50 CFR 402. In addition, the Federal agency also may need to consider proposed species and proposed critical habitat in the consultation. 50 CFR 402.14(c)(1) specifies the information required for consultation under the Act regardless of the format of the evaluation. This letter records your determination using the Information for Planning and Consultation (IPaC) system provided to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) on June 05, 2023, for 'Cellco Partnership d.b.a. Verizon Wireless Broadbrook Relo CT' (here forward, Project). This project has been assigned Project Code 2023-0084389 and all future correspondence should clearly reference this number. **Please carefully review this letter.**

Ensuring Accurate Determinations When Using IPaC

The Service developed the IPaC system and associated species' determination keys in accordance with the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA; 87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) and based on a standing analysis. All information submitted by the Project proponent into the IPaC must accurately represent the full scope and details of the Project. Failure to accurately represent or implement the Project as detailed in IPaC or the Northern Long-eared Bat Rangewide Determination Key (Dkey), invalidates this letter.

Determination for the Northern Long-Eared Bat

Based upon your IPaC submission and a standing analysis, your project has reached the determination of "No Effect" on the northern long-eared bat. To make a no effect determination, the full scope of the proposed project implementation (action) should not have any effects (either positive or negative), to a federally listed species or designated critical habitat. Effects of the action are all consequences to listed species or critical habitat that are caused by the proposed action, including the consequences of other activities that are caused by the proposed action. A consequence is caused by the proposed action if it would not occur but for the proposed action and it is reasonably certain to occur. Effects of the action may occur later in time and may

include consequences occurring outside the immediate area involved in the action. (See § 402.17).

Under Section 7 of the ESA, if a federal action agency makes a no effect determination, no consultation with the Service is required (ESA §7). If a proposed Federal action may affect a listed species or designated critical habitat, formal consultation is required except when the Service concurs, in writing, that a proposed action "is not likely to adversely affect" listed species or designated critical habitat [50 CFR §402.02, 50 CFR§402.13].

Other Species and Critical Habitat that May be Present in the Action Area

The IPaC-assisted determination for the northern long-eared bat does not apply to the following ESA-protected species and/or critical habitat that also may occur in your Action area:

- Monarch Butterfly *Danaus plexippus* Candidate

You may coordinate with our Office to determine whether the Action may affect the animal species listed above and, if so, how they may be affected.

Next Steps

Based upon your IPaC submission, your project has reached the determination of "No Effect" on the northern long-eared bat. If there are no updates on listed species, no further consultation/coordination for this project is required with respect to the northern long-eared bat. However, the Service recommends that project proponents re-evaluate the Project in IPaC if: 1) the scope, timing, duration, or location of the Project changes (includes any project changes or amendments); 2) new information reveals the Project may impact (positively or negatively) federally listed species or designated critical habitat; or 3) a new species is listed, or critical habitat designated. If any of the above conditions occurs, additional coordination with the Service should take place to ensure compliance with the Act.

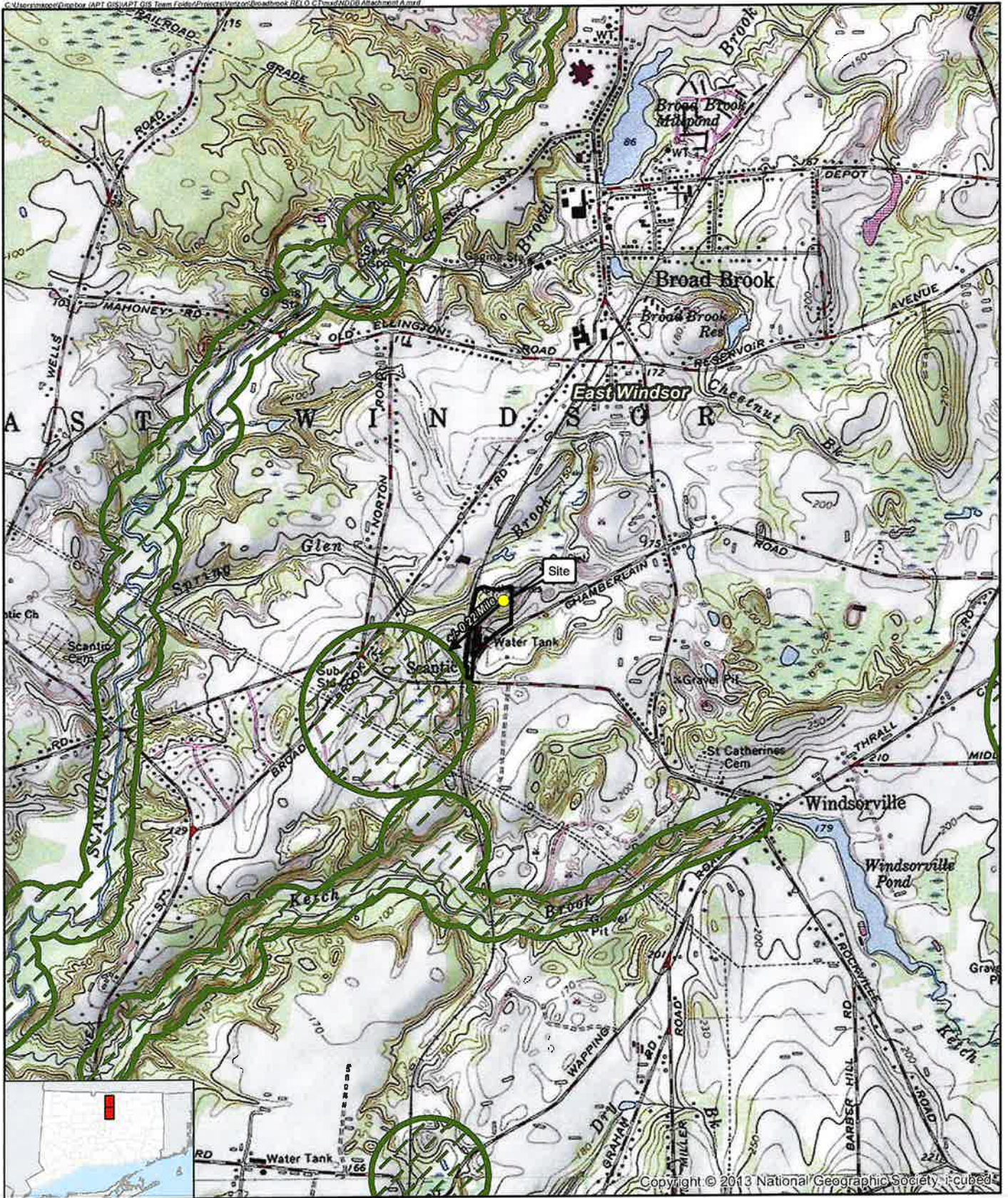

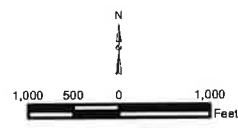
