THE HEARING OFFICER: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. This hearing is called to order this Thursday, December 12, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. My name is John Morissette, member and Presiding Officer of the Connecticut Siting Council.

Other members of the Council are Brian

Golembiewski, designee for Commissioner Katie

Dykes of the Department of Energy and

Environmental Protection; Quat Nguyen, designee

for Chairman Marissa Paslick Gillett of the Public

Utilities Regulatory Authority; Chance Carter;

If you haven't done so already, I ask that everyone please mute their computer audio and/or telephones now.

Thank you.

This is a continuation of the public hearing that began at 2 p.m. this afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's

Docket Number 526 webpage, along with a record of this matter, the public hearing notice, instructions for public access to the public hearing, and the Council's citizens guide to Siting Council's procedures.

This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon an application from Greenskies Clean Energy, LLC, for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need for the construction, maintenance, and operation of a 4.999-megawatt AC solar photovoltaic electric-generating facility and associated equipment located at Lantern Hill Road, Parcel Number 169-1-4 in Stonington, Connecticut, and the associated electrical interconnection.

This application was received by the Council on September 27, 2024. The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this public hearing was published in The Day on October 26, 2024.

Upon this Council's request, the Applicant erected a sign in the vicinity of the proposed site so as to inform the public of the name of the applicant, the type of facility, the public

hearing date, and contact information for the Council, including its website and phone number.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council's staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law.

This public comment session is reserved for members of the public who have signed up in advance to make brief statements. These limited-appearance statements are not subject to questions from the Applicant or the Council, and members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the Applicant or the Council.

In accordance with the public hearing notice and in fairness to everyone who has signed up in advance to speak, these public statements will be limited to three minutes. Please be advised that written comments may be submitted by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

I wish to note that the Applicant, including their representatives, witnesses, and members are not allowed to participate in the public comment session. I also wish to note for those who are listening and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for the public

comment session, that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof by mail or by e-mail.

Please be advised that any person may be removed from the public comment session at the discretion of the Council.

We have asked each person making
limited-appearance statements in this proceeding
to confine his or her statements to the subject
matter before the Council, and to avoid
unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all
the concerns you and your neighbors may have.
Please be advised that the Council cannot answer
questions from the public about the proposal.

A verbatim transcript will be made of this hearing and will be deposited in the Stonington Town Clerk's office for the convenience of the public.

At this time, I request the Applicant to make a brief presentation to the public describing the proposed facility. I believe Dennis Hicks is going to make the presentation. Mr. Hicks?

DENNIS HICKS: Hi. Dennis Hicks, Project Developer for Greenskies Clean Energy.

I just wanted to give a sort of a brief

summary of the project. The proposed project is a 4.99-megawatt AC system located off of Lantern Hill Road. The project was submitted and awarded as part of the Shared Clean Energy Facility Program, or SCEF.

The project will sit on approximately 28 acres of a 72-acre parcel along Whitford Brook, bordering the town of Ledyard, off of Lantern Hill Road. We are proposing a seven-foot-tall agricultural-style fence with no barbed wire.

Greenskies has taken care for the project to have as little impact to the land as possible due to the nature of the project location. Measures have been taken to ensure no pesticides or fertilizers would be used on the land.

Soil quality will be maintained through either a pollinator-friendly ground cover mix or an agricultural co-use alongside the solar system. These precautions should ensure the aquifer protection area is respected, and groundwater quality maintained. The project will also adhere to all state regulations for stormwater controls and wildlife protections.

A noise study confirmed that the project will be within the noise limits during operations during the day, and at night no noise should be produced due to the system not operating. There's no expected tree clearing with the project, no activities within wetlands, and no major earthwork expected outside of what may be required to create stormwater controls and management practices.

The proposed interconnection equipment has been designed to have minimal visual impacts to the abutting properties. The project design goal includes two utility poles near Lantern Hill Road, and two poles set further in, further interior to the project with underground trenching, bringing electrical feeders from the project to the road.

The project is currently included in a cluster study with ISO New England and Eversource.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Hicks.

DENNIS HICKS: Thank you for sharing that.

THE HEARING OFFICER: We now call on Malachy Weinges to make a public statement followed by Noreen

Weinges. Hopefully, I pronounced your last names

correctly. Malachy?

MALACHY WEINGES: Sorry about that. I was wondering, can I have my wife speak first and I can end with my comments?

THE HEARING OFFICER: Certainly. Go right ahead.

Noreen?

NOREEN FALK WEINGES: Yes. Yes, thank you. I'm Noreen Falk Weinges. And along with my husband Malachy, we own Lantern Hill Farm. I asked to speak today because I wanted to add a human element so you could put a face to the property.

I know Greenskies has done a wonderful job of presenting all the facts, but I just wanted you to see who -- the person who really has been involved with this since 1953.

I was two years old when I moved to Lantern Hill Farm, and that's where I grew up. It has a great New England history. I knew -- as a child, I knew the previous owners who had retired and then lived next door to my family. And they were two Italian immigrants, Aldo and Julia Gasparino, and they used the land to grow vegetables. They had a huge family, lots of kids, and I'm sure all the children were the labor that they used to keep that farm running. And as we have problems today with finding enough labor, in those days everybody had lots of kids. So, that took care of that issue.

And so they did that until they retired.

Then my father, who was a recent graduate of the

University of Connecticut, he majored in animal husbandry and he wanted his own farm. So he, along with my mother, bought the land and developed a dairy farm. So, he had dairy cattle, he had Holsteins on the land, and he grew corn and he hayed. We had a hayloft. We had silage, and it was a working farm, and it was a wonderful place.

He started off right out of college, not much money and he had to sell his milk to someone else who bottled. He eventually was able to develop his own bottling plant, and that became known as Sunny Lee Dairy. So, he delivered milk to everybody in the area, Mystic, Stonington, Groton, homes, businesses. And that is -- I lived there until 1968.

When my father retired, he put the property in my name. He wanted to see it continue in the family with the hopes, I'm sure, that someone would want to continue farming. Unfortunately, my brother died in a car accident at a young age.

So, he couldn't do that, and I simply am not a farmer.

So we have held onto the land with hopes that maybe we'd eventually live there, or someone, a

distant cousin would want to be a farmer, but that just isn't happening. And so, we've had to look at other things; what will become of this property and what is financially feasible? Because the property sits there and you do want to do something with it.

As for myself, I am a conservationist. I am a lifetime member of the Nature Conservancy. I currently live in Sedona, Arizona, and I was a member of the Historic Preservation Commission in Sedona. So, I've always had a fascination for preserving history. I love the history of New England.

And so, I look at the farm and I've said, how can we preserve it in some way and keep the land? And over the years, we've been approached by many developers who might have wanted to put homes, basically homes, sometimes parking lots, and we just never wanted to do that. We never wanted to tear the land apart.

And in doing research over the years, we came upon a solar farm and it just seemed to be the best fit for my concern with being able to preserve the farm, but doing something productive and something for the good of the public.

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And so, we ended up meeting Ryan Linares from Greenskies, and we've been working with him since 2016 to develop a good approach to developing the solar farm. And after years of paperwork on his part and studies done by his company, we're finally at the point that we can present this and move ahead, hopefully.

And I think this is a wonderful plan. Ιt provides clean solar energy to the public. will, once construction is done, it should have no impact on the traffic in the area. When the lease ends the farm will be restored, and there there's still a farm. If the economy changes and people are interested in being farmers, the land is still there.

So, I hope that you feel the way I do, that this is a very positive project.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Noreen. Thank you so much for coming out this evening and sharing that with us.

NOREEN FALK WEINGES: Thank you.

THE HEARING OFFICER: We'll now go to Malachy.

MALACHY WEINGES: Thank you, sir.

I think Noreen said everything I was going to say. I didn't get a chance to really talk to her

about what we were going to talk about, but I had the pleasure from twelve o'clock my time, two o'clock your time, listening to the first session and I think that every question that we had on our minds over the last eight years, you raised the same questions in two hours.

And I really appreciate the Siting Council for, you know, being so detailed with your questions. We questioned about the turtles. We questioned about pesticides. We questioned about the floodplains and basically -- and also we brought up -- I think it was also brought up about fire safety and all, and I think you addressed everything in your first session.

So all I have to say is, really, I want to thank really the members of your Siting Council for your community service.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you so much, and thank you again for coming out and speaking to us this evening. We very much appreciate it.

MALACHY WEINGES: Very welcome, sir.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. We'll now turn it over to Amy Austin Burke. Amy, are you with us this evening?

(No response.)

THE HEARING OFFICER: Unfortunately, I do not see Amy on the screen, so I don't think she made it this evening. Unfortunately, she hasn't joined us.

So with that, we will now close the hearing, but before closing this hearing, the Connecticut Siting Council announces that briefs and proposed findings of fact may be filed with the Council by the Applicant no later than January 11, 2025.

The submission of briefs and proposed findings of fact are not required by this Council. Rather, we leave to the choice of the Applicant. Anyone who has not become a party or intervener but wishes the desire to make his or her views known to the Council may file written statements with the Council within 30 days of the date hereof.

The Council will issue draft findings of fact, and thereafter parties and interveners may identify errors or inconsistencies between the Council's draft findings of fact and the record. However, no new information, no new evidence, and no arguments, and no reply briefs without our permission will be considered by the Council.

Copies of the transcript of this hearing will be filed in the Stonington Town Clerk's office. I hereby declare this hearing adjourned, and thank you, everyone, for your participation. Have a good evening. Thank you. (End: 6:46 p.m.)
