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MR. SILVESTRI: This remote public hearing is called to order this Thursday, July 23, 2020, at 6:30 p.m. My name is Robert Silvestri, member and presiding officer of the Connecticut Siting Council. Other members of the Council are Mr. Robert Hannon, designee for Commissioner Katie Dykes of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection. Ms. Linda Guliuzza, designee for Chairman Marissa Paslick Gillett of the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority. Mr. John Morissette, Mr. Michael Harder, Mr. Edward Edelson and Mr. Daniel P. Lynch, Jr.

Members of the staff are, Ms. Melanie Bachman, executive director and staff attorney; Mr. Robert Mercier, siting analyst; and Ms. Lisa Fontaine, fiscal administrative officer.

Please note, as everyone is aware, we currently have a statewide effort to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus. This is why the Council is holding this remote public hearing, and we ask for your patience. If you haven't done so already, I ask that everyone please mute their computer audio and/or telephone now.

This is a continuation of a remote public hearing that began at 2 p.m. this

afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's Docket No. 488 web page, along with the record of this matter, the public hearing notice, and instructions for public access to this remote public hearing, and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council Procedures.

This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon an application from Homeland Towers, LLC and New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC doing business as AT&T for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the construction, maintenance, and operation of a telecommunications facility located at one of two sites: Lot 38 Bald Hill Road or 93 Richards Road in Kent, Connecticut. This application was received by the Council on February 28, 2020.

The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this remote public hearing was published in the Republican American on June 11, 2020. Upon the Council's request, the applicants erected a sign at the proposed sites so as to inform the public of the name of the applicants,

the type of the facility, the remote public hearing date, and contact information for the Council.

This remote public comment session is reserved for the public to make brief statements into the record. These public statements are not subject to questions from the parties or the Council, and members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council.

In fairness to everyone who signed up to speak, these public statements will be limited to three minutes and will become part of the record for Council consideration. Please be advised that if the public comment session does not conclude by 9:30 p.m., written comments may be submitted by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council's staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law. I wish to note that parties and intervenors, including their representatives, witnesses and members, are not allowed to participate in the public comment

session.

I also wish to note for those who are listening, and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for this remote public comment session, that you or they may send written comments to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof by mail or by email, and such written statements will be given the same weight as if spoken at the remote public comment session this evening.

Please be advised that any person may be removed from the remote public comment session at the direction and discretion of the Council.

We ask each person making a public statement in this proceeding to confine his or her statements to the subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear only the concerns that you and your neighbors may have. Please be advised that the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal.

A verbatim transcript of this remote public hearing will be posted on the Council's Docket No. 488 web page and deposited at the Kent Town Clerk's office for the convenience of the

public.

Before I call on members of the public to make statements, I request the applicants to make a very brief presentation to the public describing the proposed facilities.

And I believe, Mr. Burns, you're going to do that for the applicants?

MR. BURNS: Yes, sir, that's correct.

MR. SILVESTRI: Please proceed.

MR. BURNS: For the record, my name is Robert Burns. I'm a licensed civil engineer in the State of Connecticut working with All-Points Technologies.

I'll start by going through Site A, which is the site on Bald Hill Road. This site is located on the west side of Bald Hill Road. The compound is in the southwest corner of the parcel. This compound will be accessed from a new 12 foot wide by 300 foot long gravel access driveway commencing from Bald Hill Road and running westerly onto the privately-owned parcel to the proposed fenced compound.

The compound is 3,950 square feet, and it's irregularly shaped with a gravel surface.

It's surrounded by an 8 foot high chain link fence

with a 12 foot wide access gate on the eastern side. The proposed compound has been sized for four carriers, AT&T, who's the initial anchor, and three future carriers, and an area for municipal equipment.

Outside of the fence on the eastern side of the compound is a proposed utility area which will include a utility backboard with the proposed electric meters, an electric transformer, and a telephone cabinet. This area will be surrounded by steel bollards for protection.

The proposed electric and telco services that will feed the site will be installed underground beginning at an existing utility pole on the east side of Bald Hill Road and running underground following the proposed access driveway to the compound.

Inside the fence in the southwest corner of the compound is AT&T's ground equipment. That will include a 7 foot by 7 foot walk-in cabinet which will sit on a concrete pad, and a 15 kW propane generator and a propane tank, both of which will sit on concrete pads.

In the center of the compound is a 154 foot high monopole. The tower will be designed

with a hinge point at 91 feet due to the closest property line being 63 feet to the west. The town will install whip antennas and a small microwave dish at the top of the tower which will serve the town highway, fire department and fire dispatch. AT&T is going to install nine panel antennas and eight remote radio heads which will be mounted on The center line of those antennas a platform. will be at 150 feet. The tower will then be designed for three additional future carriers at 10 foot intervals below AT&T's antennas. The town will also install whip antennas at elevation 100 which will serve the town EMS, fire command and fire dispatch.

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The compound itself will be -- there will be 6 foot tall proposed plantings installed on the outside of the proposed fencing on the southern and eastern sides of the development as a means of screening the proposed facility.

Going to Site B, Site B is located at 93 Richards Road which is on the east side of Richards Road. It's in the northeast corner of the parcel. The site will be accessed from a new 12 foot wide by 60 foot long gravel access driveway commencing from Richards Road onto the

privately-owned parcel and then merging with the existing driveway, and then will run along the existing gravel driveway to the proposed compound.

The compound is a 60 foot by 60 foot gravel surface compound surrounded by an 8 foot high chain link fence with a 12 foot wide access gate on the western side. The proposed compound has been sized for four carriers, AT&T and three future carriers, and an area for municipal equipment.

Outside of the fence on the west side of the compound is the proposed utility area which will include a utility backboard with the electric meters, an electric transformer and a telephone cabinet. This area will be surrounded by steel bollards for protection.

The proposed electric and telephone services that will feed the site will be installed underground beginning at an existing utility pole on the west side of Richards Road and run underground following the proposed and existing access drive to the compound.

Inside of the fence on the northeast corner of the compound is AT&T's ground equipment which will include a 7 foot by 7 foot walk-in

cabinet which will sit on a concrete pad, and a 15 kW propane generator and associated propane tank which will also sit on concrete pads.

The center of the compound is a 154 foot high monopole. The tower will be designed with a hinge point at 70 feet due to the closest property line being 84 feet to the southeast.

The town will install whip antennas and a microwave dish at the top serving town highway, fire department and fire dispatch. AT&T is going to install nine panel antennas and 18 remote radio heads which will be mounted on a platform, the center line being at 150 feet. The tower will be also designed for three additional future carriers at 10 foot intervals below AT&T's installation. The town will install whip antennas at elevation 100 which will serve town EMS, fire command and fire dispatch.

There will be 6 foot tall proposed plantings that will be installed on the outside of the fencing on the northern and eastern sides as a means of screening the proposed facility. Thank you.

MR. SILVESTRI: Thank you, Mr. Burns. Before I call on members of the public to make

1 statements, I will apologize in advance if I 2 mispronounce your name. 3 We will now call upon Joseph Dwyer to 4 make a public statement followed by Christine 5 Heun. 6 Joseph Dwyer? Is Joseph Dwyer with us 7 at this time? Hello? 8 BONNIE HARRIS: He's muted. 9 MR. SILVESTRI: If he could unmute, we 10 could hear him. 11 BONNIE HARRIS: Maybe he doesn't know 12 how. 13 JOSEPH DWYER: I took it off and 14 somebody put it on. So now it's off. 15 MR. SILVESTRI: I can hear you now, Mr. 16 Dwyer. 17 JOSEPH DWYER: Can you hear me? 18 MR. SILVESTRI: Yes, I can. Go right 19 ahead. 20 JOSEPH DWYER: Okay. So I live up here 21 on Segar Mountain, just off Segar Mountain Road. 22 And we don't have -- we're in a dead area for cell 23 connection, so I'm very much in favor of having 24 cell connection in this area if it can be done in 25 a less intrusive way with some other thing, but

1 that would be fine, but otherwise having cell 2 towers is good. 3 I worked in Africa for many years, and many of the areas out in even almost desert areas 4 5 they have cell phone coverage. And we're 90 miles 6 from New York City and we don't have any cell 7 phone coverage here. 8 So that's the main thing that I wanted 9 to say, and I hope that the hearing goes well. 10 Thank you. 11 MR. SILVESTRI: Thank you very much for 12 your comments. 13 Next I have Christine Heun followed by 14 Linda Josephy. Is Christine with us? Christine 15 Heun? 16 (No response.) 17 MR. SILVESTRI: I don't see her on my 18 screen, so we will come back to her afterwards. 19 Linda Josephy, is Linda with us? Linda 20 Josephy? 21 (No response.) 22 MR. SILVESTRI: I see her on my screen. 23 We'll come back to Linda as well. 24 Next on my list I have Amanda Seitz 25 that would be followed by Larry Milburn.

MR. SILVESTRI: No, you could just

proceed with your comments.

MICHAEL JAY: Great. I've been a Kent resident for over five years. In the view -- let me start my video. Sorry. In the view behind me in the winter six, seven months of the year you can see the skyline of Route 341. Any cell tower 50, 60, 70 feet above the treeline would be obvious. I am in the Kent Hollow near Lake Waramaug south of the town.

I listened to the first 90 minutes of the evidentiary hearing today. I want to mention a couple of things. The rep from AT&T acknowledged that no one cell phone tower can cover the square mileage that currently has no coverage. I want to make sure everyone hears that. This is only one tower of several to come. It's a shot across the bow. It is not the solution. They're not going to put up one tower.

All this talk about what it looks like or not is only the tip of the iceberg. I know it's not going to be a huge amount more, but it will be several towers. So first everyone needs to understand that that's clear. The rep actually

said this tower will only provide incremental coverage, perhaps a third. Later he said 29 percent of what needs to be covered. He said this will be the first step to filling in the coverage.

I also want everyone to realize that as far as AT&T, the rep actually said that he acknowledged truly there's no coverage at Lake Waramaug. This is printed out from AT&T's site today, as with Verizon and other companies, that shows Kent on this side. There's Lake Waramaug. The blue is coverage, LTE 4G coverage. And you know that's a lie. So keep in mind what they tell you. Keep in mind what the cell tower would do or how many it would take to fill it in.

But currently if you buy a phone here, you buy service from them, they'll tell you, sure, you have coverage. It's why I make them give me a free microcell when I said I live at a certain address there is no coverage. Anyone who drives through the Kent Hollow or goes to the lake or just outside of town or halfway up to Kent Falls knows that there's no coverage. Go to their site. Look at the coverage map or Google that if you want to see that.

But what I really want to talk about is

1 the Siting Council. When I lived near New Milford 2 and I talked to other activists, I was told that 3 the Siting Council was essentially rubber stamped. 4 They approved 96, 97 percent of everything that 5 crossed its desk. I decided to check that today, 6 and I looked at their site and the 1,405 petitions 7 that are currently there. I have the numbers 8 Let's see, 40 of them were withdrawn. 53 here. 9 were denied. That leaves 1,312 approved out of 10 1,405. So the various activists who told me it 11 was a 97 percent approval rate --12 MR. SILVESTRI: Mr. Jay, we just hit the three-minute limit. I could suggest that you 13 14 send in written comments to us either by mail or 15 by email and you could continue that aspect of it. 16 But I will thank you for your comments. 17 MICHAEL JAY: May I finish that sentence, please? 18 19 MR. SILVESTRI: I can't, because 20 otherwise other people would want to finish 21 theirs, and we'd blow the three-minute mark. 22 MICHAEL JAY: Heads up, people. That's 23 all I want to say. 24 Thank you, sir. MR. SILVESTRI: 25 Next on the list is Alan Gawel,

communications officer, Kent Volunteer Fire Department.

ALAN GAWEL: Good evening. Can you hear me?

MR. SILVESTRI: I can, yes.

ALAN GAWEL: Okay. Yes. My name is Alan Gawel. I am the current communications officer at the Kent Volunteer Fire Department. My current chief, Ed Matson, is also signed up to speak earlier -- or speak later. I just finished my third term as chief of the department and was chief of the department when this tower proposal was brought forward. And I believe earlier a letter on behalf of the department authored and signed by myself you have as evidence and so forth.

So I just wanted to make a couple comments that, you know, being a life-long resident of Kent and the beauty we have here, we are concerned for the aesthetics and what can be done to help with keeping a tower disguised. But we, and I personally, are very much in support of the tower to provide emergency service communications and the public safety communications of the cell service. It is

desperately needed. I mean, there's no way around it. There's nothing else in the area currently.

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There is a group that was working to try to come up with alternatives. I did meet with them on several occasions. And hopefully something can be worked out that wouldn't have such an impact into the ridge. But the bottom line is that we need to have emergency communications for the fire department. We perform fire, EMS and rescue operations for the And both of these proposals, as you heard, town. they would provide that to us and free of charge. And so that is just a huge asset in a small town and a small volunteer department, not to mention the public being able to access 911 from their cell phones. More and more people do not have landlines in their homes anymore, they're using their cell phones, if at all possible, and it really makes a difference.

MR. SILVESTRI: Thank you for your comments.

ALAN GAWEL: Thank you.

MR. SILVESTRI: Next I have Chief Edward Matson from the Kent Volunteer Fire Department. Is Chief Matson with us?

1 EDWARD MATSON: Yes, I am. I'm sorry. 2 MR. SILVESTRI: No, no problem. 3 right ahead. 4 EDWARD MATSON: Can you hear me? 5 MR. SILVESTRI: I can, yes. EDWARD MATSON: I'm glad I'm following 6 7 Alan, because Alan and I have spoken. I agree 100 percent with Alan and his thoughts. I've been, 8 9 since I took over for Alan as chief, I had a 10 couple of calls up in the Kenmont area where I had 11 audible alarms going off and I had no cell 12 service. I could not contact dispatch. So if I 13 actually had a building burning, I wouldn't have 14 been able to call for mutual aid. (Audio 15 interruptions) So we need emergency service --16 MR. SILVESTRI: Chief Matson, you're 17 kind of breaking up a little bit. I'm not sure if 18 you could correct that at all. 19 EDWARD MATSON: I agree with the 20 aesthetic part. I'll see if I can get to a better 21 spot. No? 22 MR. SILVESTRI: A little bit better. 23 Go ahead. 24 EDWARD MATSON: Okay. I don't know how 25 much time I have left. But that's why I'm in

support of emergency service, rescue service and ambulance service upon either one of those towers for the Town of Kent unless something else can be done. So thank you.

MR. SILVESTRI: Very good, sir. Thank you.

Next I have B. Blake Levitt, communication director, the Berkshire Litchfield Environmental Council. And you need to unmute. There we go.

B. BLAKE LEVITT: Thank you for the opportunity to address the Siting Council.

I'm wearing two hats tonight. One is as a Warren resident, I live at the base of Tanner Hill Road on Lake Waramaug, and also for the Berkshire Litchfield Environmental Council which is a 501(c)(3) up in the New Canaan tristate area.

Let me address my Warren concerns
first. Tanner Hill is one of the most iconic
viewsheds in all of Litchfield County, certainly a
regional asset. Just ask the State Tourism Board
about Tanner Hill and the long distant viewsheds
around Lake Waramaug. The distant viewsheds are
of primary concern here. From the top of Tanner
Hill the Richards Road tower, in particular, will

be highly visible. Yes, it will be a small tower visually, as AT&T was talking about, but there are significant concerns about site development. A big chunk out of that ridgeline is one of those things that ends up looking like a travesty from a long distance view. If the Siting Council had done siting visits, it would have been wonderful if you could have come and actually taken a look at the distant viewsheds that would be impacted by this.

That area up there is loaded with plain artists all times of the year. We've actually had tourist buses go up there, believe it or not, much to the town's chagrin. It's really -- it's also mentioned in our plan of conservation and development as most worthy of protection. It's just a spectacular area. And it's very unusual to get distant 360 degree views, distant viewsheds, of unbroken ridgelines like that. It's very, very worth protecting. And as a Warren resident, I really beg the Siting Council to do that.

As far as the concerns for the Berkshire Litchfield Environmental Council, we really wish that the Town of Kent and the intervenors had done some more significant

1 wildlife inventory up there. That is a direct 2 migratory bird flyway between those two lakes. 3 You can stand at the top of Tanner Hill, which 4 attracts birders by the scores up there in the spring and the fall, and you can see raptors 5 6 flying between those two lakes at both migratory 7 periods. And it's a very significant environmental possibility that 150 foot tower, 8 9 especially the one on Richards Road, will create 10 an impedance impact for migratory birds. We encourage the Siting Council and the Town of Kent 11 12 to contact the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service that 13 makes recommendations for tower sitings in areas 14 like this. It would be an asset to the Siting 15 Council from an environmental perspective. 16 We're also concerned about -- this is 17

something that we --
