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MR. SILVESTRI: This remote public hearing is called to order this Thursday, November 12, 2020, at 6:30 p.m. My name is Robert Silvestri, member and presiding officer of the Connecticut Siting Council. Other members of the Council are Robert Hannon, designee for Commissioner Katie Dykes of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, John Morissette, Edward Edelson, Daniel P. Lynch, Jr., and Michael Harder.

Members of the staff are Melanie Bachman, executive director and staff attorney; Michael Perrone, siting analyst; and Lisa Fontaine, fiscal administrative officer.

As all are keenly aware, there is currently a statewide effort to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus, and this is why the Siting Council is holding this remote public hearing, and we ask for your patience.

If you haven't done so already, I ask that everyone please mute their computer audio and/or telephone at this time.

This is a continuation of a remote public hearing that began at 2 p.m. this afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is

available on the Council's Docket No. 492 webpage, along with the record of this matter, the public hearing notice, instructions for public access to this remote public hearing, and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council Procedures.

This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative

Procedure Act upon an application from Gravel Pit Solar for a Certificate of Environmental

Compatibility and Public Need for the construction, maintenance, and operation of a 120-megawatt-AC solar photovoltaic electric generating facility on eight parcels generally located to the east and west of the Amtrak and Connecticut Rail Line, south of Apothecaries Hall Road and north of the South Windsor town boundary in East Windsor, Connecticut. The application was received by the council on July 31, 2020.

The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this remote public hearing was published in the Journal Inquirer on September 30, 2020. Upon this Council's request, the applicant erected signs, one near the proposed access entrance at Apothecaries Hall Road, and one near

the proposed access entrance directly north of Plantation Road so as to inform the public of the name of the applicant, the type of the facility, the remote public hearing date, and contact information for the Council.

This remote public comment session is reserved for the public for those who signed up in advance to make brief statements into the record. Public statements are not subject to questions from the parties or the Council, and members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council. Public statements will become part of the record for Council consideration. Additionally, written comments may be submitted by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law.

I wish to note that parties and intervenors, including their representatives, witnesses and members, are not allowed to participate in the public comment session.

I also wish to note for those who are

listening and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for this remote public comment session that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof by mail or by email, and such written statements will be given the same weight as if spoken at the remote public comment session tonight.

Please be advised that any person may be removed from the remote public comment session at the discretion of the Council.

We ask each person making a public statement in this proceeding to confine his or her statements to the subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all of the concerns you and your neighbors may have. And please be advised that public comments will be limited to three minutes per participant. Also please be advised that the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal.

A verbatim transcript of this remote public hearing will be posted on the Council's Docket No. 492 webpage and will be deposited at the East Windsor Town Clerk's Office and the South

1 Windsor Town Clerk's Office for the convenience of 2 the public. 3 Please be advised that the Council does 4 not issue permits for stormwater management. 5 the proposed project is approved by the Council, 6 the Department of Energy and Environmental 7 Protection stormwater permit is independently 8 required. The Department of Energy and 9 Environmental Protection could hold a public 10 hearing on any stormwater permit application. 11 Before I call on members of the public 12 to make a statement, I request the applicant to 13 make a very brief presentation to the public 14 describing the proposed facility. 15 And I believe, Mr. Svedlow, would you 16 be doing that this evening? 17 MR. SVEDLOW: Yes, sir. 18 MR. SILVESTRI: Very good. Please 19 proceed. 20 MR. SVEDLOW: Excellent. Good evening. 21 My name is Aaron Svedlow. I hope you're all doing 22 well tonight. I'm with Gravel Pit Solar, and I'm 23 just going to introduce the project and tell you a 24 little bit about our company.

Gravel Pit Solar is a 120 megawatt

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proposed solar facility that will connect to the existing Eversource transmission lines on site.

The project is located between Apothecaries Hall Road and the South Windsor town line. The project is being developed by D.E. Shaw Renewable

Investments, or DESRI for short. DESRI is a leading owner/operator of wind and solar facilities across the U.S. from Hawaii to

Massachusetts. DESRI owns and operates two existing projects in Connecticut, Tobacco Valley Solar in Simsbury at 26 megawatts, and Fusion Solar in Sprague at 20 megawatts.

The Gravel Pit Solar team consists of expert engineers, scientists and planners, and we have drawn on their expertise and our own experience to design a project that minimizes impacts to sensitive natural resources in the host community. In particular, DESRI has incorporated the lessons we've learned at Tobacco Valley Solar and Fusion in the development of GPS and the design of the facility.

The Gravel Pit Solar project is particularly exciting for Connecticut and the New England region because it accomplishes a number of goals. Gravel Pit Solar will general low-cost

energy to help Connecticut and New England meet its renewable energy portfolio standards and provides new generation capacity to the regional grid.

Gravel Pit Solar will be sited on a mix of brownfield property, the former gravel mines, and farmland. And we are proposing to implement a number of innovative soil restoration and preservation measures throughout the facility to improve soil quality.

And last, we have been working closely with the relevant state agencies, the Town of East Windsor, and the project's neighbors to design the project to minimize impacts to the host community and maximize economic benefits for the town.

One of the benefits of the project that we've heard a lot about and from some of you on this call, is a reduction in dust, noise and truck traffic that will be accomplished by closing the gravel pits. And by fencing the properties, we will reduce the illicit ATV activity that has become a nuisance to the neighbors. Thank you.

MR. SILVESTRI: Thank you. We will now call on First Selectman for the Town of East Windsor, Jason Bowsza. And I hope I pronounced

that correct.

MR. BOWSZA: You did, sir. Just give me one moment, please, to put my earbuds in.

MR. SILVESTRI: Very good. Thank you.

MR. BOWSZA: Thank you. And thanks for indulging me. I have a toddler at home, and it would be quite disruptive to everybody if I didn't have these in.

So first and foremost, I'd like to thank the Siting Council for providing the opportunity to provide comments on this project.

I've submitted written comments earlier today that I ask to be adopted as my formal testimony, but I would just highlight a couple of points for the benefit of the Council that I think are important to the town.

First, as Mr. Svedlow says, this
project, as proposed, solves a long-standing
attractive nuisance issue in town that has been,
just because of the sheer scope and scale of the
subject properties, we haven't been able to
curtail otherwise. That's a point that I hear a
lot from residents in and around the area
expressing their frustration with some of those
illicit activities that happen. And having a

neighbor like Gravel Pit Solar occupying that space I think will go a long way towards resolving that which we haven't been able to resolve otherwise.

think is very supportive of renewable energy projects, especially when the projects make sense for us. Certainly not all of these projects are created equal, and there are circumstances that need to be considered by communities when deciding whether or not to be supportive of them. Gravel Pit Solar makes a lot of sense for us, and mostly that has to do with where it is. It is going to have, as proposed, it will have very little impact on abutting property owners. It's mostly, the subject parcel is mostly out of sight with some, only a few instances where that isn't the case.

A project like this is going to be a quiet neighbor. They're not going to put a lot of burden on municipal services. They're going to install their projects, and then they're going to be nice and quiet for the duration of their stay. And we look forward to that. It's not going to be something that becomes an eyesore. It's not going to be something that becomes an attraction of

sorts. It's going to be largely hidden and out of the way.

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I would say that Gravel Pit Solar, Mr. Svedlow and his team, have been nothing but cooperative and communicative with us since the first time they walked in my office almost a year ago. They have repeatedly offered, and we have accepted the offer, of them coming to various land use boards in town and to the Board of Selectmen to provide updates on the project, where it stands at the moment, soliciting feedback and input from stakeholders who in a not state sited project would have input in the role. They've gone out of their way to be inclusive of the thoughts and concerns of our land use team here in town, both from a staff level and from a volunteer level, and I thank them for that.

I was listening on the evidentiary
hearing, I guess, earlier today, and I don't
recall if this was answered or not, but I don't
think there has been an issue raised by our
Planning and Zoning Commission or by our Wetlands
Commission that hasn't been addressed by the folks
at Gravel Pit.

So I know my time is short, and I'll

1 save some if there's any questions. And again, I'll reference you to my written testimony, but I 2 3 would just end by saying that the town is very 4 supportive of this application and hope for a 5 favorable determination from the Council. 6 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much for 7 your comments. Our next speaker is Robert Urso. 8 And I see Robert is on the screen. 9 Mr. Urso, I did see you, and then you 10 kind of disappeared. Are you still with us? 11 (No response.) 12 MR. SILVESTRI: I'm not sure if there's 13 a technical issue on his end, but let me move to 14 Doug King, and I will come back to Mr. Urso, if he 15 reconnected. 16 Mr. King, are you with us? 17 MR. KING: Do you hear me? 18 MR. SILVESTRI: I could hear you, yes. 19 Thank you. 20 MR. KING: Thank you very much. I'd 21 like to say I've lived in town for 50 years, 40 22 years at my present address which is 341 Rye 23 Street. I abut the property. I have had numerous 24 conversations with Aaron. And I think it's a good 25 project for the town and for our people.

1 brings us a good tax base with very little load on 2 our infrastructure. 3 I speak, you know, I think, for a lot 4 of people in town that we'd rather see this than 5 housing or any other type of development that 6 would happen here, you know, we would definitely 7 support the project in any way we can. 8 MR. SILVESTRI: All set? 9 MR. KING: Yes, sir. 10 MR. SILVESTRI: Very good. Thank you, 11 Mr. King. 12 And again, I'll go back to Robert Urso. 13 I did see him earlier on my screen. 14 disappeared. 15 Attorney Bachman, do you have him at 16 all as a person that's on this call? 17 MS. BACHMAN: Thank you, Mr. Silvestri. 18 I literally just admitted Mr. Urso from the 19 waiting room, so his audio should connect 20 momentarily. 21 MR. SILVESTRI: Very good. Thank you. 22 Mr. Urso, if you could hear us? 23 MR. URSO: Yes, I can. 24 MR. SILVESTRI: Very good. It's your 25 time, sir.

MR. URSO: Okay. Thank you very much. First of all, I'd like to thank the Council for giving me the opportunity to give you some input that I feel very confident about.

I am a resident of South Windsor. I've been here approximately 50 years. And over the years there's been many hearings, et cetera, over the truck traffic that came from the gravel pit out in that way previously. It was Manchester Sand and Gravel many years ago, and on the roads of Rye Street, Windsorville Road, Graham Road. And they tried to curtail the truck traffic there through the neighborhoods for the safety of children over the years. And I think now that hopefully this particular occupant, you know, applicant goes forward, I think this will answer many residents' wishes over the years. That's number one.

Number two, I think that the project is going in the right direction as far as being green with clean energy. And as the First Selectman said, you're going to have a nice tax base there for the town, and they're not going to require any town services either. So I am in favor of this application. Thank you.

MR. SILVESTRI: Very good. Thank you also for your comments.

Ladies and gentlemen, that was the last of the speakers who had signed up in advance. So the Council announces that it will continue the evidentiary session of this public hearing on Tuesday, December 1, 2020, at 2 p.m., and that's via Zoom remote conferencing.
