On April 11, 2016, I transmitted to you a copy of the March 31, 2016 Environmental Justice (“EJ”) Plan for the Killingly Energy Center (KEC), pending as Docket No. 470 before the Siting Council. On April 14, 2016, an updated EJ Plan was submitted to the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP). 1.0 INTRODUCTION

This Environmental Justice Plan (EJ Plan) outlines the coordinated public participation activities that NTE Connecticut, LLC (NTE) will conduct to provide opportunities for early and active public involvement throughout the planning, pre-application, certification, compliance, and implementation of the proposed Killingly Energy Center in Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut (the Project). In particular, this EJ Plan emphasizes activities focused on pre-construction activities.

The activities outlined in the EJ Plan provide a variety of opportunities by which public concerns can be identified and addressed as early as possible throughout the various stages of the decision-making process and will facilitate effective and open communication between stakeholders and NTE. Updates to this information will be made as the Project's outreach activities progress.

This EJ Plan was developed consistent with the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP)'s Environmental Justice Policy, codified as section 22a-20a of the Connecticut General Statutes (CGS). The Project, as an electric generating facility with a capacity of more than ten megawatts (MW) is defined as an "affecting facility." CGS also defines an environmental justice community as including a "distressed municipality"; Killingly is currently listed by DEEP as a distressed municipality. Therefore, an EJ Plan is required to be approved and implemented, with a Final Report to DEEP's Environmental Justice Program to be submitted prior to issuance of a Notice of Tentative Determination by DEEP.

1.1 PROJECT PURPOSE AND INTENT



NTE is proposing an approximately 550-MW electric generating facility to be located on an approximately 70-acre parcel in the town of Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut. The proposed facility directly responds to the need for expanding the energy base in the region by constructing a cost-effective and environmentally responsible energy generation facility.

The proposed Project will be located in an industrial area in the northern portion of Killingly, west of Interstate 395 (I-395) and Alexander Lake; south of the Quinebaug River; and north of Lake Road and the Hartford Providence Turnpike. While some low-density residential uses are located west of the site, and more densely around Alexander Lake, the site is generally located in an area separated from Killingly's higher density residential areas to the east by I-395. The existing Lake Road Generating Facility is located within approximately one mile east of the site.

The proposed Project will utilize a single combustion turbine in a 1x1x1 configuration, with a heat recovery steam generator, steam turbine and air-cooled condensers. The Project will be fueled primarily with natural gas. Natural gas will be provided via the Algonquin Natural Gas pipeline. The Project will connect to the

existing 345-kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line located adjacent to the property's eastern boundary.

It is anticipated that the Project will receive water for process use from the Connecticut Water Company and that infrastructure to provide water exists at or near the Project site within Lake Road. It is presumed that wastewater will be discharged using nearby interconnections to existing wastewater facilities.

1.2 ANTICIPATED PERMITTING REQUIREMENTS

The Project is currently developing design details that will refine its pre-construction environmental permitting requirements, and will update the EJ Plan as additional details are known. At the present time, the following approvals are anticipated to be required at the state level:

- The Project will require approval by the Connecticut Siting Council (CSC);
- The Project will require air permitting New Source Review by DEEP;
- The Project is anticipated to require a permit from DEEP for discharge to the sanitary sewer, which could fall within the requirements of a General Permit categorical industry user (<10,000 gallons per day);
- The Project is working to avoid wetland impact, but could require review for an Inland 401 Water Quality Certification; and
- The Project will require DEEP General Permit approval associated with Stormwater & Dewatering Wastewaters during Construction Activities, as well as for Stormwater Associated with Industrial Activities.

1.3 PLAN GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The overall goal of this plan is two-fold: 1) to actively seek public participation throughout the planning, pre-application, certification, compliance, and implementation process; and 2) to encourage stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity in the review of the proposed Project so their input can be considered. This plan indicates the steps that NTE will take to inform, engage, and solicit input from the local community, general public and other stakeholders, including a schedule that indicates when the steps will be taken. Section 2 of this plan provides a description of the surrounding local community, including important demographic information, while Section 3 outlines the planned public involvement activities.

2.0 COMMUNITY INFORMATION

This section describes the town of Killingly within its context as an environmental justice community. In accordance with CGS Section 22a-20a, an environmental justice community is:

- a. *A United States census block group, as determined in accordance with the most recent United States census, for which thirty percent or more of the population consists of low income persons who are not institutionalized and have an income below two hundred percent of the federal poverty level, or*
- b. *A distressed municipality.*

Killingly is identified on the list of distressed municipalities. The following discussion provides some context for community characteristics.

2.1 COMMUNITY BACKGROUND AND HISTORY

The town of Killingly is located in Windham County in the northeastern corner of Connecticut. The town, first incorporated in 1708, began as several mill villages sited along its abundant waterways, including the Five-Mile and Quinebaug Rivers. In the early half of the 19th century, Killingly was the largest producer of cotton goods in Connecticut in the early 20th century, earning the epithet “curtain capital of the world.” The town is one of the largest in the county, and includes several distinct village areas: Attawaugan, Ballouville, Dayville, East Killingly, Rogers, South Killingly, and the Borough of Danielson. The Project is located most proximate to the Dayville community.

The area surrounding the Project site has been designated for industrial development by the town, and currently includes several major businesses as well as the Lake Road Generating Plant. Alexander Lake, south and east of this economic development area, includes private residences surrounding this recreational lake.

2.2 DEMOGRAPHICS

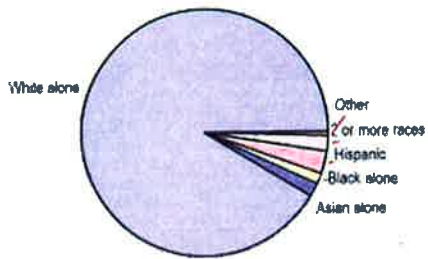
The Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) has identified Killingly as a distressed municipality since 1999. Identifying factors and considerations include high unemployment and poverty, aging housing stock, low or declining rates of growth in job creation, population, per capita income, and education. More specifically, the DECD weighed the following criteria in their most recent designation of distressed municipalities:

- Per capita income for 2013
- Percent of poverty in population for 2013
- Unemployment rate for 2014
- Percent change in population from 2000 to 2010
- Percent change in employment from 2004 to 2014
- Percent change in per capita income from 2000 to 2013
- Percent of house stock built before 1939 in 2013
- Percent population with high school degree and higher in 2013
- Per Capita Adjusted Equalized Net Grand List in 2015-2016

In 2014, the estimated population of Killingly was 17,172 individuals – nearly 15 percent of the Windham County population. A growth rate of 0.4 percent growth per year had been projected by the Connecticut Economic Research Center (CERC) for the period from 2012 through 2020. However, the town population dropped 1.1 percent from 2010 to 2014; in contrast, the state population during the same period increased 0.6 percent.

In 2014, the median household income in Killingly was \$57,016. While higher than the national median of \$53,482, it is notably lower than the state’s median income, \$69,899. The town’s per capita income was \$27,549, lower than

both the national and state averages, \$28,555 and \$38,480, respectively. Similarly, about 9.6 percent of the Killingly population lives in poverty, which is lower than the national average, 14.8 percent, as well as the state average, 10.8 percent.

Almost 88 percent of the population age 25 or older are high school graduates, while 21 percent have obtained a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Killingly is primarily Caucasian (91.3 percent), with Hispanics making up the second largest ethnicity, at 3 percent of Killingly's population.

Unemployment in Killingly is greater than the state average. In June, 2014, Killingly was at 7.7 percent unemployment, while Connecticut had an unemployment rate of 6.5 percent.

2.3 POTENTIAL COMMUNITY CONCERNS

This section summarizes community concerns typically associated with power plant siting and construction projects. Please note the concerns outlined here are those typically communicated by the public for sites undergoing construction. Note that only limited community interviews have so far been conducted; detailed information has not yet been gathered from the local community in Killingly to draw these conclusions about specific community concerns for the Project site.

This section will be updated throughout the outreach and engagement process to reflect concerns that are raised by the surrounding community and stakeholders during events such as stakeholder meetings/briefings, community meetings, and community interviews.

2.3.1 Typical Concerns During Design and Construction

- **Quality of Life Impacts** – During construction projects, local community concerns often include quality of life considerations such as increased dust generation, truck traffic, and noise. For this Project, comprehensive construction plans, including mitigation plans for dust, traffic, and noise, will be available for public comment and consideration. NTE will take the necessary steps to ensure that quality of life impacts are appropriately addressed during design and construction.
- **Health & Safety** – Worker and community health and safety are often key concerns at construction sites. To demonstrate its commitment to the health and safety of site workers and neighbors, NTE will implement the necessary Project controls (such as fencing, signs, security, traffic control, etc.) during all on-site construction activities. Appropriate Project control plans will be developed and finalized before construction begins.
- **Project Construction Schedules** – The timing of Project activities at construction sites is typically a concern to surrounding neighborhoods. To address this potential concern, NTE will make every effort to ensure that work is appropriately scheduled to minimize or even eliminate disruption of normal community activities. NTE will also regularly inform the public of Project schedules through updates on the project website or other means.
- **Access to the Process** – Additional issues tend to arise when the public is concerned that adequate public access and involvement in the regulatory review process is not accommodated, or that communication during the construction process is not clear. Power plant siting and construction projects are complex and they can take substantial time. This plan encourages all interested community members and stakeholders to become engaged early in the process, and stay engaged throughout the entire process. The activities

outlined in Section 3 to be implemented by NTE, such as providing a Project contact, hosting community meetings/open houses, developing a Project website, and preparing/disseminating fact sheets, will go a long way to providing the public and other interested stakeholders with ample opportunity to participate in the process while remaining compliant with legislated outreach requirements.

2.3.2 Typical Concerns During Operation

- **Water Use** – Even where plentiful water is available from existing purveyors, water use can be a concern for power projects. The Project will incorporate air cooling to reduce its water demand to the greatest extent possible, and will work closely with the Connecticut Water Company and the local community to evaluate and assure that impacts to existing users and/or nearby water resources such as Alexander Lake would not occur.
- **Operational Noise** – The Project will be designed using industry best practices to alleviate noise impacts to comply with applicable standards through the use of sound attenuation design measures. Anticipated changes in sound level will be assessed, and compliance with applicable standards demonstrated.
- **Visual** – A common community concern with industrial development is the change in aesthetics. Although the Project site is in an area planned for industrial uses, with surrounding industrial uses, residences are also located nearby. The Project's structures and their potential visibility from surrounding areas will be assessed.
- **Air Quality** – Health-based concerns associated with emissions are typical concerns for new power plant projects. This plan will engage the community in open discussions about the air quality impacts of the Project during construction and operation, including the Project's compliance with applicable health-based standards. By listening to community concerns, addressing them in an open and public forum, and accepting feedback throughout the process, NTE will proactively address air quality concerns. The Project will incorporate emission controls, such as selective catalytic reduction and an oxidation catalyst, to demonstrate that Best Available Control Technology and Lowest Achievable Emissions Rates are reflected by the Project, as appropriate.
- **Greenhouse Gas/Global Warming from Fossil Fuel Combustion** – Greenhouse gases (GHGs) and environmental issues associated with power plants are common community concerns. NTE will utilize extremely efficient technology to comply with all regulatory requirements for GHGs, and will use the best technologies available to reduce GHG emissions. NTE will also implement practices and measures to ensure that the Project functions properly and operates efficiently.
- **Ultra-low sulfur distillate (ULSD) and Chemical Storage** – ULSD and chemical delivery, storage, and handling could result in some level of concern among stakeholders. Detailed containment design will be reflected in the Project and spill response plans will be prepared. Although very stringent standards are required public outreach and engagement will help alleviate concerns.

2.3.3 Killingly-Specific Community Issues

Based on outreach conducted to date, including a public open house held on March 22, 2016, key issues identified to date have focused on concerns about the Project's effect on noise and water resources. As additional meetings are held and broad Project issues are discussed, key topics of local concern will continue to be identified and addressed.

3.0 PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

3.1 PLANNED PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

This section outlines the public outreach and participation activities that NTE will undertake to meet the goals and objectives of this plan. The Project's public involvement program will include:

- Consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders
- Pre-application activities to increase Project awareness at the earliest opportunity
- Establishment of a Project website to disseminate information to the public
- Notifications of Project activities and opportunities for public participation

NTE plans to implement the public involvement activities described below to fulfill these objectives and enable stakeholders and agencies to engage in a meaningful way early in the process. In addition, these activities provide many opportunities for the public, agencies, and other stakeholders to stay engaged throughout all phases of the Project, from planning and pre-application to certification and compliance, all the way to operation. The public involvement activities outlined in this section will be sequenced with the major phases of the Project, assuming a general schedule as such:

- Pre-Application (approximately 1 – 2 months)
- Application Review (approximately 9 – 12 months)
- Certification and Compliance Phase (Construction) (approximately 24 – 36 months)
- Operational Phase

A tentative schedule of the planned public involvement activities is described throughout this section and then summarized in Section 3.2.

3.1.1 Project Mailing/E-mail List

Description: To facilitate communication, public involvement, and dissemination of information, a Project mailing/e-mail list will be developed, and maintained for use in distributing fact sheets, notices, and other project information, as appropriate. The Project mailing/e-mail list will include, to the extent possible, owners of property adjacent to the site; local, county, state, and federal officials; individuals who attend community meetings; interested community organizations; interested environmental organizations; people who make inquiries regarding the site; and local school districts, libraries, and media outlets.

The Project mailing/e-mail list will be revised regularly so that contact information, including name, organization (as appropriate), address, phone number, and e-mail address, is kept up to date. Furthermore, the list will be updated as requests for inclusion are received from interested parties.

Timing: Developed in Pre-Application phase; updated and maintained until construction is completed; modified for maintenance throughout Project's operational life.

3.1.2 Regular Agency and Stakeholder Briefings, Meetings, and Updates

Description: In order to provide meaningful and ongoing consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders, regular briefings and meetings will be held throughout the Project regulatory review process and written updates prepared. These items will include face-to-face meetings, conference calls, and written Project updates to keep agencies and stakeholders informed and engaged in a positive manner and to continually request their consultation.

Timing: Initiated in the Pre-Application phase to kick off the project; continuing through the Application and Construction phases.

3.1.3 Key Message Statements, Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), News Releases, and Press Kits

Description: These items will help to proactively publicize progress or key milestones in the process. They will also serve as resources for responding to inquiries from the public for information on how to participate in the proposed Project review. Development of key message statements early in the process will be essential to ensure consistent messaging among all public involvement materials prepared. FAQs will be essential for the Project contact person, as well as Project participants, if they are approached by the media, interested members of the public, or other stakeholders. The remaining items -- news releases and press kits -- would be released to the media outlets identified on the Project mailing/e-mail list as a way to proactively inform those outlets about certain aspects of the Project.

Timing: Developed for use in the Pre-Application phase, and revised as appropriate for review throughout the Project's operating life.

3.1.4 Project Website

Description: A Project website will be designed, set up, and maintained to house Project news and updates, Project schedule, contact information, key documents, etc. This will allow for all interested parties to stay informed and provide instant access to key project documents, fact sheets, and other project-related information.

At the present time, the Project website is envisioned to contain the following:

- General Project information and photos/graphics
- "News and events" feature
- Identification of and contact information for key Project personnel and agency representatives
- Method for phoning/e-mailing/sending in comments/questions to the Project contact person, including the availability of a Project hotline

As the Project progresses and more information is gathered, additional content and features will be added to the Project website to help stakeholders participate in the process.

Timing: Developed/set up to go live early in the Pre-Application phase; maintained and updated until completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.5 Brochures and Fact Sheets

Description: For up-front and ongoing communication with the public, brochures and fact sheets will be prepared to encourage the public and other interested stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity. Another objective of fact sheets and brochures is to educate the public as to the specific elements and features of the Project. These materials will summarize essential information for the public and other interested stakeholders, and include

announcements about upcoming events, summaries of current work activities or Project status, schedules for upcoming work, and contact information.

As such, fact sheets will be used to announce major milestones of the Project, explain the principal facts, and provide technical information in plain language, including such information as:

- Background and purpose of the Project
- Current status/major milestones reached
- Next steps in the Project
- Contact information for the Project contact person
- Information about how to access the Project website
- Locations of the local information repositories

Timing: “Introductory” fact sheets developed early in the Pre-Application phase; continue to be developed and disseminated until completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.6 Notifications/Public Notices

Description: Public notices to announce public meetings, open houses, regulatory proceedings, and major Project milestones will be placed in local newspapers (such as the Norwich Bulletin), and on the Project website. For certain events or milestones, these notices can also be sent to the Project mailing/e-mail list.

Notifications will be an important part of this public involvement program as they will broadcast opportunities for the public to participate and provide input throughout the process.

In addition the notification methods listed above, other methods of notification may include:

- Placing newspaper inserts can garner additional attention when used in conjunction with a traditional public notice placed in the local paper.
- Developing a “community notification” newsletter to distribute to members of the public and other interested stakeholders is a good way to directly inform and notify about upcoming events.
- Placing notices in a newsletter distributed by a local government, a civic or community organization, or in a free publication can be a good way to target a specific audience or segment of the community.
- Placing signs and bulletin boards within the community can alert interested members of the public about upcoming events.
- Using social media outlets (Facebook, Twitter, etc.) can help promote upcoming events.
- Making telephone calls can provide a personal and immediate manner of spreading information.

Timing: To announce important Project events such as public meetings, and open houses.

3.1.7 Public Meetings

Description: Scheduling and implementing periodic public informational meetings during the Project development process will provide two-way communication, with community members able to directly discuss the Project and its implications with Project representatives. Public meetings will be held as required by the regulatory process, as well as at certain key Project milestones and to solicit public input.

Key audience members and their anticipated issues of concern will be identified ahead of time. To the extent possible, public meetings will be announced before the meeting date in local newspapers (such as the Norwich Bulletin), mailings (such as fact sheets) to the Project mailing/e-mail list, and on the Project website.

To the extent possible, the meetings will be scheduled at times and locations that will accommodate the majority of concerned members of the public. Relevant documents will be made available for public review, either via the information repository, project website, at the meeting itself, or a combination of these methods, as necessary.

A sign-up sheet will be available at each public meeting held and attendees will be encouraged to voluntarily provide their names and addresses, which will be added to the Project mail/e-mail list.

Timing: Initial public meeting held early in the Pre-Application phase to introduce the Project; additional public meetings held during the Application review phase.

3.1.8 Information Repository

Description: Information repositories will be set up at the Killingly Public Library and Killingly Town Hall. The two repositories will house hard copies of relevant Project documents. The addresses and hours of operation of these two repositories are:

The primary objectives of the information repository is to serve as a collection of documents related to the Project and make those documents readily available to people who are interested in learning about, or keeping updated on, Project activities. As such, establishing these repositories makes information accessible to the public in two convenient locations.

As with the Project website, the information repositories can serve as crucial resources for the public in accessing records relating to the Project. As such, both repositories will be initially stocked with relevant Project materials and then continually updated throughout the life of the Project. Some example materials to be included in the repositories include:

- Background information on the proposed Project and NTE
- Fact sheets, brochures, handouts, and other public involvement materials
- This EJ Plan
- Names and phone numbers of the Project contact person and appropriate agency representatives
- Any other relevant material

The repositories will be kept up-to-date by adding new documents as they are generated.

Timing: Set up early in the Pre-Application phase; maintained and updated through completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.9 Project Contact Person

Description: A Project contact person will be identified early in the process and will be a designated Project staff member who is responsible for responding to questions and inquiries from the public, the media, and stakeholders. The Project contact person will be instrumental in developing public involvement materials such as fact sheets, brochures, press kits, and talking points, among other items.

Timing: Contact person identified and ready to go early in the Pre-Application phase.

3.1.10 Public Open Houses

Description: Public open houses can be held to provide the public with an opportunity to gain more information about the Project in an open setting and discuss issues face to face with Project personnel and agency representatives. They can also be held and targeted for special interest community groups.

Open houses are informal meetings in a public location where people can talk to Project and agency personnel on a one-to-one basis. These sessions allow interested members of the public to ask questions and express their concerns directly to Project and agency staff. Open houses can also be set up to allow members of the public to talk with representatives from interested organizations in the community.

Open houses will be typically held when new Project information is available that may not be appropriate for a public meeting and/or when it is found out that members of the public have widely varying interests or levels of knowledge. The more informal setting of these sessions is appropriate to enhance direct dialog with members of the community and encourage members of the public to raise questions and be a part of the process outside of the more formal public meetings and hearings.

Open houses will typically be scheduled during evening or weekend hours, to promote a high level of attendance by all concerned members of the public. A convenient location within the community will be selected.

To provide clear, consistent messaging and information, appropriate materials, such as posters, handouts, or fact sheets, will be prepared and made available at these sessions. To the extent possible, open houses will be announced at least seven days ahead of time. Announcements will be sent to the Project mailing/e-mail list to inform all interested parties.

Timing: As dictated by Project needs.

3.1.11 Community Interviews, Surveys and/or Focus Groups

Description: During the Pre-Application phase, community surveys may be planned and conducted through invited sessions, door knocks, or other means to provide information about the Project to community members, obtain input from neighbors one-on-one, and find out about any concerns about the Project.

Timing: As dictated by Project needs.

3.1.12 Site Signage

Description: Signage will be designed and installed at the Project site to inform the surrounding community about the planned and ongoing construction at the site.

Timing: Installed early in the Construction phase before construction begins at the site and maintained throughout the Project's operational life.

3.1.13 Additional Activities for Consideration

Description: Additional items may include groundbreaking ceremony, completion ceremony, and site tours, as appropriate.

Timing: As needed throughout the Project's Construction and Operational phases.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

This Environmental Justice Plan (EJ Plan) outlines the coordinated public participation activities that NTE Connecticut, LLC (NTE) will conduct to provide opportunities for early and active public involvement throughout the planning, pre-application, certification, compliance, and implementation of the proposed Killingly Energy Center in Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut (the Project). In particular, this EJ Plan emphasizes activities focused on pre-construction activities.

The activities outlined in the EJ Plan provide a variety of opportunities by which public concerns can be identified and addressed as early as possible throughout the various stages of the decision-making process and will facilitate effective and open communication between stakeholders and NTE. Updates to this information will be made as the Project's outreach activities progress.

This EJ Plan was developed consistent with the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP)'s Environmental Justice Policy, codified as section 22a-20a of the Connecticut General Statutes (CGS). The Project, as an electric generating facility with a capacity of more than ten megawatts (MW) is defined as an "affecting facility." CGS also defines an environmental justice community as including a "distressed municipality"; Killingly is currently listed by DEEP as a distressed municipality. Therefore, an EJ Plan is required to be approved and implemented, with a Final Report to DEEP's Environmental Justice Program to be submitted prior to issuance of a Notice of Tentative Determination by DEEP.

1.1 PROJECT PURPOSE AND INTENT



NTE is proposing an approximately 550-MW electric generating facility to be located on an approximately 70-acre parcel in the town of Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut. The proposed facility directly responds to the need for expanding the energy base in the region by constructing a cost-effective and environmentally responsible energy generation facility.

The proposed Project will be located in an industrial area in the northern portion of Killingly, west of Interstate 395 (I-395) and Alexander Lake; south of the Quinebaug River; and north of Lake Road and the Hartford Providence Turnpike. While some low-density residential uses are located west of the site, and more densely around Alexander Lake, the site is generally located in an area separated from Killingly's higher density residential areas to the east by I-395. The existing Lake Road Generating Facility is located within approximately one mile east of the site.

The proposed Project will utilize a single combustion turbine in a 1x1x1 configuration, with a heat recovery steam generator, steam turbine and air-cooled condensers. The Project will be fueled primarily with natural gas. Natural gas will be provided via the Algonquin Natural Gas pipeline. The Project will connect to the

existing 345-kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line located adjacent to the property's eastern boundary.

It is anticipated that the Project will receive water for process use from the Connecticut Water Company and that infrastructure to provide water exists at or near the Project site within Lake Road. It is presumed that wastewater will be discharged using nearby interconnections to existing wastewater facilities.

1.2 ANTICIPATED PERMITTING REQUIREMENTS

The Project is currently developing design details that will refine its pre-construction environmental permitting requirements, and will update the EJ Plan as additional details are known. At the present time, the following approvals are anticipated to be required at the state level:

- The Project will require approval by the Connecticut Siting Council (CSC);
- The Project will require air permitting New Source Review by DEEP;
- The Project is anticipated to require a permit from DEEP for discharge to the sanitary sewer, which could fall within the requirements of a General Permit categorical industry user (<10,000 gallons per day);
- The Project is working to avoid wetland impact, but could require review for an Inland 401 Water Quality Certification; and
- The Project will require DEEP General Permit approval associated with Stormwater & Dewatering Wastewaters during Construction Activities, as well as for Stormwater Associated with Industrial Activities.

1.3 PLAN GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The overall goal of this plan is two-fold: 1) to actively seek public participation throughout the planning, pre-application, certification, compliance, and implementation process; and 2) to encourage stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity in the review of the proposed Project so their input can be considered. This plan indicates the steps that NTE will take to inform, engage, and solicit input from the local community, general public and other stakeholders, including a schedule that indicates when the steps will be taken. Section 2 of this plan provides a description of the surrounding local community, including important demographic information, while Section 3 outlines the planned public involvement activities.

2.0 COMMUNITY INFORMATION

This section describes the town of Killingly within its context as an environmental justice community. In accordance with CGS Section 22a-20a, an environmental justice community is:

- a. *A United States census block group, as determined in accordance with the most recent United States census, for which thirty percent or more of the population consists of low income persons who are not institutionalized and have an income below two hundred percent of the federal poverty level, or*
- b. *A distressed municipality.*

Killingly is identified on the list of distressed municipalities. The following discussion provides some context for community characteristics.

2.1 COMMUNITY BACKGROUND AND HISTORY

The town of Killingly is located in Windham County in the northeastern corner of Connecticut. The town, first incorporated in 1708, began as several mill villages sited along its abundant waterways, including the Five-Mile and Quinebaug Rivers. In the early half of the 19th century, Killingly was the largest producer of cotton goods in Connecticut in the early 20th century, earning the epithet “curtain capital of the world.” The town is one of the largest in the county, and includes several distinct village areas: Attawaugan, Ballouville, Dayville, East Killingly, Rogers, South Killingly, and the Borough of Danielson. The Project is located most proximate to the Dayville community.

The area surrounding the Project site has been designated for industrial development by the town, and currently includes several major businesses as well as the Lake Road Generating Plant. Alexander Lake, south and east of this economic development area, includes private residences surrounding this recreational lake.

2.2 DEMOGRAPHICS

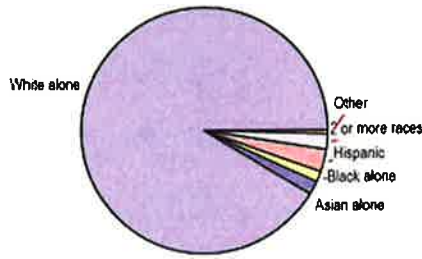
The Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) has identified Killingly as a distressed municipality since 1999. Identifying factors and considerations include high unemployment and poverty, aging housing stock, low or declining rates of growth in job creation, population, per capita income, and education. More specifically, the DECD weighed the following criteria in their most recent designation of distressed municipalities:

- Per capita income for 2013
- Percent of poverty in population for 2013
- Unemployment rate for 2014
- Percent change in population from 2000 to 2010
- Percent change in employment from 2004 to 2014
- Percent change in per capita income from 2000 to 2013
- Percent of house stock built before 1939 in 2013
- Percent population with high school degree and higher in 2013
- Per Capita Adjusted Equalized Net Grand List in 2015-2016

In 2014, the estimated population of Killingly was 17,172 individuals – nearly 15 percent of the Windham County population. A growth rate of 0.4 percent growth per year had been projected by the Connecticut Economic Research Center (CERC) for the period from 2012 through 2020. However, the town population dropped 1.1 percent from 2010 to 2014; in contrast, the state population during the same period increased 0.6 percent.

In 2014, the median household income in Killingly was \$57,016. While higher than the national median of \$53,482, it is notably lower than the state’s median income, \$69,899. The town’s per capita income was \$27,549, lower than

both the national and state averages, \$28,555 and \$38,480, respectively. Similarly, about 9.6 percent of the Killingly population lives in poverty, which is lower than the national average, 14.8 percent, as well as the state average, 10.8 percent.

Almost 88 percent of the population age 25 or older are high school graduates, while 21 percent have obtained a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Killingly is primarily Caucasian (91.3 percent), with Hispanics making up the second largest ethnicity, at 3 percent of Killingly's population.

Unemployment in Killingly is greater than the state average. In June, 2014, Killingly was at 7.7 percent unemployment, while Connecticut had an unemployment rate of 6.5 percent.

2.3 POTENTIAL COMMUNITY CONCERNS

This section summarizes community concerns typically associated with power plant siting and construction projects. Please note the concerns outlined here are those typically communicated by the public for sites undergoing construction. Note that only limited community interviews have so far been conducted; detailed information has not yet been gathered from the local community in Killingly to draw these conclusions about specific community concerns for the Project site.

This section will be updated throughout the outreach and engagement process to reflect concerns that are raised by the surrounding community and stakeholders during events such as stakeholder meetings/briefings, community meetings, and community interviews.

2.3.1 Typical Concerns During Design and Construction

- **Quality of Life Impacts** – During construction projects, local community concerns often include quality of life considerations such as increased dust generation, truck traffic, and noise. For this Project, comprehensive construction plans, including mitigation plans for dust, traffic, and noise, will be available for public comment and consideration. NTE will take the necessary steps to ensure that quality of life impacts are appropriately addressed during design and construction.
- **Health & Safety** – Worker and community health and safety are often key concerns at construction sites. To demonstrate its commitment to the health and safety of site workers and neighbors, NTE will implement the necessary Project controls (such as fencing, signs, security, traffic control, etc.) during all on-site construction activities. Appropriate Project control plans will be developed and finalized before construction begins.
- **Project Construction Schedules** – The timing of Project activities at construction sites is typically a concern to surrounding neighborhoods. To address this potential concern, NTE will make every effort to ensure that work is appropriately scheduled to minimize or even eliminate disruption of normal community activities. NTE will also regularly inform the public of Project schedules through updates on the project website or other means.
- **Access to the Process** – Additional issues tend to arise when the public is concerned that adequate public access and involvement in the regulatory review process is not accommodated, or that communication during the construction process is not clear. Power plant siting and construction projects are complex and they can take substantial time. This plan encourages all interested community members and stakeholders to become engaged early in the process, and stay engaged throughout the entire process. The activities

outlined in Section 3 to be implemented by NTE, such as providing a Project contact, hosting community meetings/open houses, developing a Project website, and preparing/disseminating fact sheets, will go a long way to providing the public and other interested stakeholders with ample opportunity to participate in the process while remaining compliant with legislated outreach requirements.

2.3.2 Typical Concerns During Operation

- **Water Use** – Even where plentiful water is available from existing purveyors, water use can be a concern for power projects. The Project will incorporate air cooling to reduce its water demand to the greatest extent possible, and will work closely with the Connecticut Water Company and the local community to evaluate and assure that impacts to existing users and/or nearby water resources such as Alexander Lake would not occur.
- **Operational Noise** – The Project will be designed using industry best practices to alleviate noise impacts to comply with applicable standards through the use of sound attenuation design measures. Anticipated changes in sound level will be assessed, and compliance with applicable standards demonstrated.
- **Visual** – A common community concern with industrial development is the change in aesthetics. Although the Project site is in an area planned for industrial uses, with surrounding industrial uses, residences are also located nearby. The Project's structures and their potential visibility from surrounding areas will be assessed.
- **Air Quality** – Health-based concerns associated with emissions are typical concerns for new power plant projects. This plan will engage the community in open discussions about the air quality impacts of the Project during construction and operation, including the Project's compliance with applicable health-based standards. By listening to community concerns, addressing them in an open and public forum, and accepting feedback throughout the process, NTE will proactively address air quality concerns. The Project will incorporate emission controls, such as selective catalytic reduction and an oxidation catalyst, to demonstrate that Best Available Control Technology and Lowest Achievable Emissions Rates are reflected by the Project, as appropriate.
- **Greenhouse Gas/Global Warming from Fossil Fuel Combustion** – Greenhouse gases (GHGs) and environmental issues associated with power plants are common community concerns. NTE will utilize extremely efficient technology to comply with all regulatory requirements for GHGs, and will use the best technologies available to reduce GHG emissions. NTE will also implement practices and measures to ensure that the Project functions properly and operates efficiently.
- **Ultra-low sulfur distillate (ULSD) and Chemical Storage** – ULSD and chemical delivery, storage, and handling could result in some level of concern among stakeholders. Detailed containment design will be reflected in the Project and spill response plans will be prepared. Although very stringent standards are required public outreach and engagement will help alleviate concerns.

2.3.3 Killingly-Specific Community Issues

Based on outreach conducted to date, including a public open house held on March 22, 2016, key issues identified to date have focused on concerns about the Project's effect on noise and water resources. As additional meetings are held and broad Project issues are discussed, key topics of local concern will continue to be identified and addressed.

3.0 PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

3.1 PLANNED PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

This section outlines the public outreach and participation activities that NTE will undertake to meet the goals and objectives of this plan. The Project's public involvement program will include:

- Consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders
- Pre-application activities to increase Project awareness at the earliest opportunity
- Establishment of a Project website to disseminate information to the public
- Notifications of Project activities and opportunities for public participation

NTE plans to implement the public involvement activities described below to fulfill these objectives and enable stakeholders and agencies to engage in a meaningful way early in the process. In addition, these activities provide many opportunities for the public, agencies, and other stakeholders to stay engaged throughout all phases of the Project, from planning and pre-application to certification and compliance, all the way to operation. The public involvement activities outlined in this section will be sequenced with the major phases of the Project, assuming a general schedule as such:

- Pre-Application (approximately 1 – 2 months)
- Application Review (approximately 9 – 12 months)
- Certification and Compliance Phase (Construction) (approximately 24 – 36 months)
- Operational Phase

A tentative schedule of the planned public involvement activities is described throughout this section and then summarized in Section 3.2.

3.1.1 Project Mailing/E-mail List

Description: To facilitate communication, public involvement, and dissemination of information, a Project mailing/e-mail list will be developed, and maintained for use in distributing fact sheets, notices, and other project information, as appropriate. The Project mailing/e-mail list will include, to the extent possible, owners of property adjacent to the site; local, county, state, and federal officials; individuals who attend community meetings; interested community organizations; interested environmental organizations; people who make inquiries regarding the site; and local school districts, libraries, and media outlets.

The Project mailing/e-mail list will be revised regularly so that contact information, including name, organization (as appropriate), address, phone number, and e-mail address, is kept up to date. Furthermore, the list will be updated as requests for inclusion are received from interested parties.

Timing: Developed in Pre-Application phase; updated and maintained until construction is completed; modified for maintenance throughout Project's operational life.

3.1.2 Regular Agency and Stakeholder Briefings, Meetings, and Updates

Description: In order to provide meaningful and ongoing consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders, regular briefings and meetings will be held throughout the Project regulatory review process and written updates prepared. These items will include face-to-face meetings, conference calls, and written Project updates to keep agencies and stakeholders informed and engaged in a positive manner and to continually request their consultation.

Timing: Initiated in the Pre-Application phase to kick off the project; continuing through the Application and Construction phases.

3.1.3 Key Message Statements, Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), News Releases, and Press Kits

Description: These items will help to proactively publicize progress or key milestones in the process. They will also serve as resources for responding to inquiries from the public for information on how to participate in the proposed Project review. Development of key message statements early in the process will be essential to ensure consistent messaging among all public involvement materials prepared. FAQs will be essential for the Project contact person, as well as Project participants, if they are approached by the media, interested members of the public, or other stakeholders. The remaining items -- news releases and press kits -- would be released to the media outlets identified on the Project mailing/e-mail list as a way to proactively inform those outlets about certain aspects of the Project.

Timing: Developed for use in the Pre-Application phase, and revised as appropriate for review throughout the Project's operating life.

3.1.4 Project Website

Description: A Project website will be designed, set up, and maintained to house Project news and updates, Project schedule, contact information, key documents, etc. This will allow for all interested parties to stay informed and provide instant access to key project documents, fact sheets, and other project-related information.

At the present time, the Project website is envisioned to contain the following:

- General Project information and photos/graphics
- "News and events" feature
- Identification of and contact information for key Project personnel and agency representatives
- Method for phoning/e-mailing/sending in comments/questions to the Project contact person, including the availability of a Project hotline

As the Project progresses and more information is gathered, additional content and features will be added to the Project website to help stakeholders participate in the process.

Timing: Developed/set up to go live early in the Pre-Application phase; maintained and updated until completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.5 Brochures and Fact Sheets

Description: For up-front and ongoing communication with the public, brochures and fact sheets will be prepared to encourage the public and other interested stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity. Another objective of fact sheets and brochures is to educate the public as to the specific elements and features of the Project. These materials will summarize essential information for the public and other interested stakeholders, and include

announcements about upcoming events, summaries of current work activities or Project status, schedules for upcoming work, and contact information.

As such, fact sheets will be used to announce major milestones of the Project, explain the principal facts, and provide technical information in plain language, including such information as:

- Background and purpose of the Project
- Current status/major milestones reached
- Next steps in the Project
- Contact information for the Project contact person
- Information about how to access the Project website
- Locations of the local information repositories

Timing: “Introductory” fact sheets developed early in the Pre-Application phase; continue to be developed and disseminated until completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.6 Notifications/Public Notices

Description: Public notices to announce public meetings, open houses, regulatory proceedings, and major Project milestones will be placed in local newspapers (such as the Norwich Bulletin), and on the Project website. For certain events or milestones, these notices can also be sent to the Project mailing/e-mail list.

Notifications will be an important part of this public involvement program as they will broadcast opportunities for the public to participate and provide input throughout the process.

In addition the notification methods listed above, other methods of notification may include:

- Placing newspaper inserts can garner additional attention when used in conjunction with a traditional public notice placed in the local paper.
- Developing a “community notification” newsletter to distribute to members of the public and other interested stakeholders is a good way to directly inform and notify about upcoming events.
- Placing notices in a newsletter distributed by a local government, a civic or community organization, or in a free publication can be a good way to target a specific audience or segment of the community.
- Placing signs and bulletin boards within the community can alert interested members of the public about upcoming events.
- Using social media outlets (Facebook, Twitter, etc.) can help promote upcoming events.
- Making telephone calls can provide a personal and immediate manner of spreading information.

Timing: To announce important Project events such as public meetings, and open houses.

3.1.7 Public Meetings

Description: Scheduling and implementing periodic public informational meetings during the Project development process will provide two-way communication, with community members able to directly discuss the Project and its implications with Project representatives. Public meetings will be held as required by the regulatory process, as well as at certain key Project milestones and to solicit public input.

Key audience members and their anticipated issues of concern will be identified ahead of time. To the extent possible, public meetings will be announced before the meeting date in local newspapers (such as the Norwich Bulletin), mailings (such as fact sheets) to the Project mailing/e-mail list, and on the Project website.

To the extent possible, the meetings will be scheduled at times and locations that will accommodate the majority of concerned members of the public. Relevant documents will be made available for public review, either via the information repository, project website, at the meeting itself, or a combination of these methods, as necessary.

A sign-up sheet will be available at each public meeting held and attendees will be encouraged to voluntarily provide their names and addresses, which will be added to the Project mail/e-mail list.

Timing: Initial public meeting held early in the Pre-Application phase to introduce the Project; additional public meetings held during the Application review phase.

3.1.8 Information Repository

Description: Information repositories will be set up at the Killingly Public Library and Killingly Town Hall. The two repositories will house hard copies of relevant Project documents. The addresses and hours of operation of these two repositories are:

The primary objectives of the information repository is to serve as a collection of documents related to the Project and make those documents readily available to people who are interested in learning about, or keeping updated on, Project activities. As such, establishing these repositories makes information accessible to the public in two convenient locations.

As with the Project website, the information repositories can serve as crucial resources for the public in accessing records relating to the Project. As such, both repositories will be initially stocked with relevant Project materials and then continually updated throughout the life of the Project. Some example materials to be included in the repositories include:

- Background information on the proposed Project and NTE
- Fact sheets, brochures, handouts, and other public involvement materials
- This EJ Plan
- Names and phone numbers of the Project contact person and appropriate agency representatives
- Any other relevant material

The repositories will be kept up-to-date by adding new documents as they are generated.

Timing: Set up early in the Pre-Application phase; maintained and updated through completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.9 Project Contact Person

Description: A Project contact person will be identified early in the process and will be a designated Project staff member who is responsible for responding to questions and inquiries from the public, the media, and stakeholders. The Project contact person will be instrumental in developing public involvement materials such as fact sheets, brochures, press kits, and talking points, among other items.

Timing: Contact person identified and ready to go early in the Pre-Application phase.

3.1.10 Public Open Houses

Description: Public open houses can be held to provide the public with an opportunity to gain more information about the Project in an open setting and discuss issues face to face with Project personnel and agency representatives. They can also be held and targeted for special interest community groups.

Open houses are informal meetings in a public location where people can talk to Project and agency personnel on a one-to-one basis. These sessions allow interested members of the public to ask questions and express their concerns directly to Project and agency staff. Open houses can also be set up to allow members of the public to talk with representatives from interested organizations in the community.

Open houses will be typically held when new Project information is available that may not be appropriate for a public meeting and/or when it is found out that members of the public have widely varying interests or levels of knowledge. The more informal setting of these sessions is appropriate to enhance direct dialog with members of the community and encourage members of the public to raise questions and be a part of the process outside of the more formal public meetings and hearings.

Open houses will typically be scheduled during evening or weekend hours, to promote a high level of attendance by all concerned members of the public. A convenient location within the community will be selected.

To provide clear, consistent messaging and information, appropriate materials, such as posters, handouts, or fact sheets, will be prepared and made available at these sessions. To the extent possible, open houses will be announced at least seven days ahead of time. Announcements will be sent to the Project mailing/e-mail list to inform all interested parties.

Timing: As dictated by Project needs.

3.1.11 Community Interviews, Surveys and/or Focus Groups

Description: During the Pre-Application phase, community surveys may be planned and conducted through invited sessions, door knocks, or other means to provide information about the Project to community members, obtain input from neighbors one-on-one, and find out about any concerns about the Project.

Timing: As dictated by Project needs.

3.1.12 Site Signage

Description: Signage will be designed and installed at the Project site to inform the surrounding community about the planned and ongoing construction at the site.

Timing: Installed early in the Construction phase before construction begins at the site and maintained throughout the Project's operational life.

3.1.13 Additional Activities for Consideration

Description: Additional items may include groundbreaking ceremony, completion ceremony, and site tours, as appropriate.

Timing: As needed throughout the Project's Construction and Operational phases.
