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1.0 Introduction

1.1 Executive Summary

This final report and certification is to confirm that NTE Connecticut, LLC (NTE) has complied with and exceeded the efforts detailed in its approved Environmental Justice Public Participation Plan (EJ Plan). While NTE looks forward to continued community engagement in efforts before the Connecticut Siting Council (CSC) and the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP), the submittal of this Environmental Justice Final Report (EJ Report) concludes the formal Environmental Justice process and documents NTE's satisfaction of its EJ Plan.

Consistent with Connecticut General Statutes (C.G.S.) Section 22a-20a and DEEP's Environmental Justice Program and Policy, NTE developed an EJ Plan, which outlined the coordinated public participation activities that NTE would conduct to provide opportunities for early, active and meaningful public involvement throughout the planning, pre-application, certification, permitting, compliance, and implementation process associated with the proposed Killingly Energy Center in Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut (the Project). NTE's updated EJ Plan was approved by the Administrator of Connecticut DEEP's Environmental Justice program on April 19, 2016. The majority of this final report documents NTE's compliance with the statutory requirements and the approved EJ Plan. Beyond this and as referenced below, NTE's efforts went beyond the EJ Plan and statutory requirements.

The activities proposed in the approved EJ Plan, supplemented by additional activities, and undertaken as presented in this EJ Report, facilitated meaningful public participation between stakeholders and NTE throughout the Project pre-construction, permitting, regulatory, and development process. The Environmental Justice-related activities and efforts also provided a variety of opportunities by and through which a number of public concerns were heard and addressed.

One of the goals of the Environmental Justice process is to encourage the meaningful engagement of the Environmental Justice community in the CSC and DEEP regulatory processes. Beyond the efforts undertaken by NTE as described in this report, the turnout and thoughtful and substantive participation at several public forums provides evidence that this goal of citizen engagement has been achieved. More specifically, NTE engaged in a number of activities designed to enhance both awareness and participation by the Environmental Justice community. These efforts included, among others: (i) creating a robust and interactive project website, (ii) providing mailings to the residents and businesses within this community, (iii) publishing monthly Project newsletters, (iv) holding multiple Project meetings in the community, (v) meeting weekly with community members, (vi) and making presentations to community organizations. Beyond these, NTE engaged in supplemental activities: (i) allocating funds for the Town of Killingly to retain a 3rd party engineering consultant to review all application documents to help the Town



evaluate the Project and, if desired, prepare Regulate and Restrict Orders¹, (ii) providing accessibility to studies/reports prior to their formal submission to the CSC, and (iii) undertaking online digital, mailing and call campaigns.

As this EJ Report further communicates, all measures and objectives presented in the EJ Plan were carried out and meaningful public engagement and participation has been achieved. These measures and the results/conclusions are presented in this Final EJ Report.

1.2 Project Purpose and Intent

NTE is proposing the construction of a 550-megawatt (MW) electric generating facility to be located on a 73-acre property (consisting of two parcels) in the Town of Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut (the Site). The proposed facility directly responds to the need for expanding the energy capacity in the state and region by constructing an environmentally responsible energy generation facility capable of providing cost-effective energy.


The proposed Project, located at 180 and 189 Lake Road, is located just beyond the westernmost portion of an existing industrial park in Killingly. The primary parcel at 189 Lake Road is within an area designated for future industrial development by the Town of Killingly. While some low density residential uses are located west of the site, and other residential uses exist at Alexander Lake to the east, the Site is generally located in an area separated from Killingly's higher density residential areas that lie to the east by Interstate 395.

The existing Lake Road Generating Facility is located approximately one mile east of the Site. The proposed Project will utilize a single combustion turbine in a 1x1x1 configuration, with a heat recovery steam generator, steam turbine and air-cooled condenser. The Project will be fueled primarily with natural gas. Natural gas will be provided via the Algonquin Natural Gas pipeline. The Project will connect to the existing Eversource 345-kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line located adjacent to the property's eastern boundary. CT Water has confirmed its ability to supply the Project with its limited water needs. Wastewater will be discharged using nearby interconnections to existing wastewater facilities.

1.3 Efforts to Implement the EJ Plan and Achieve EJ Plan Goals and Objectives

The goal of the EJ Plan was two-fold: 1) to actively seek public participation throughout the process; and 2) to encourage stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity in the review of the proposed Project so their input could be considered. The EJ Plan indicated the steps that

¹While the CSC has exclusive jurisdiction over the municipal siting/land use considerations of the facilities it regulates, it must consider municipal regulations and other state laws it considers appropriate when ruling on applications for certificates or petitions for declaratory rulings. In addition, a municipal zoning commission and inland wetland agency may regulate and restrict the proposed location of an electric generation facility or substation.



NTE would take to inform, engage, and solicit input from the local community, local government and local businesses, including a schedule of when the steps would be taken.

NTE's EJ Plan, as related to both the CSC and DEEP regulatory processes, was submitted on March 31, 2016, updated on April 14, 2016, and approved on April 19, 2016 by the Administrator of the Environmental Justice program. A copy of the EJ Plan is included as Appendix A to this report; a copy of the approval letter is provided in Appendix B of this report.

Following approval of the EJ Plan, NTE worked diligently to implement the measures required to facilitate meaningful pubic participation. This effort included a considerable number and wider variety of approaches to encourage public participation and input from a variety of community demographics.

Public meetings, newspaper publications, emails, direct mailings, site signage, a Project website, an open house, meetings with neighborhood and community members, group presentations, and other efforts were made to encourage and secure public participation. This Final EJ Report describes, in detail, the fulfillment of all public outreach efforts identified in the EJ Plan. Collateral materials used throughout the implementation process are included in the appendices.

The following provides an abbreviated chronology of the most significant milestones in implementing and going beyond the approved EJ Plan:

- March 22, 2016 NTE holds Public Open House
- March 31, 2016 NTE submits EJ Plan for approval
- April 14, 2016 NTE submits updated EJ Plan with revised date for Informal Public Meeting
- April 19, 2016 DEEP approves EJ Plan
- May 4, 2016 NTE holds Public Meeting #1
- May 12, 2016 Administrator, Environmental Justice Program requests further public meeting
- July 11, 2016 NTE holds Public Meeting #2
- July 28, 2016 Administrator, Environmental Justice Program confirms NTE met Environmental Justice Public Meeting requirement
- September 29, 2016 Administrator, Environmental Justice Program provides community supplemental questions to NTE
- October 11, 2016 NTE presents Proposed Community Financial Benefits at the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council, including potential benefits related to the Community Environmental Benefits Agreement
- October 19, 2016 NTE holds Public Meeting #3 to address community supplemental questions received from the Administrator, Environmental Justice Program



2.0 Community Information

This section describes the considerations contributing to the Town of Killingly's designation as an Environmental Justice community. As defined by the C.G.S. Section 22a-20a, an Environmental Justice community is:

- a. A United States census block group, as determined in accordance with the most recent United States census, for which thirty percent or more of the population consists of low income persons who are not institutionalized and have an income below two hundred percent of the federal poverty level, or
- b. A distressed municipality.

Killingly is identified on the list of distressed municipalities. A distressed municipality, as defined by C.G.S. Section 32-9p, is based on "high unemployment and poverty, aging housing stock and low or declining rates of growth in job creation, population, and per capita income."


2.1 Demographics

NTE took community demographics into consideration in developing communication mediums and tactics to best promote community engagement.


The Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) has identified Killingly as a distressed municipality since 1999. Identifying factors and considerations include high unemployment and poverty, aging housing stock, low or declining rates of growth in job creation, population, per capital income, and education. More specifically, the DECD weighed the following criteria specific to Killingly in DECD's most recent designation of distressed municipalities:

- Per capita income for 2013
- Percent of poverty in population for 2013
- Unemployment rate for 2014
- Percent change in population from 2000 to 2010
- Percent change in employment from 2004 to 2014
- Percent change in per capita income from 2000 to 2013
- Percent of house stock built before 1939 in 2013
- Percent population with high school degree and higher in 2013
- Per Capita Adjusted Equalized Net Grand List in 2015-2016

In 2014, the estimated population of Killingly was 17,172 individuals – nearly 15 percent of the Windham County population. A growth rate of 0.4 percent growth per year had been projected



by the Connecticut Economic Research Center (CERC) for the period from 2012 through 2020. However, the town population dropped 1.1 percent from 2010 to 2014; in contrast, the state population during the same period increased 0.6 percent.



In 2014, the median household income in Killingly was \$57,016. While higher than the national median of \$53,482, it is notably lower than the state's median income, \$69,899. The Town's per capita income was \$27,549, lower than both the national and state \$28,555 and \$38,480, respectively. averages, Similarly, about 9.6 percent of the Killingly population lives in poverty, which is lower than the national average of 14.8 percent, and lower than the state average of 10.8 percent. Almost 88 percent of the population age 25 or older are high school graduates, while 21 percent have obtained a Bachelor's degree or higher. Killingly is primarily Caucasian (91.3 percent), with Hispanics making up the second largest ethnicity, at 3 percent of Killingly's population.

Unemployment in Killingly is greater than the state average. In June, 2014, Killingly was at 7.7 percent unemployment, while Connecticut had an unemployment rate of 6.5 percent.

These demographics helped NTE identify the most applicable approach for communications to the community. For instance, 88 percent of the population is over age 25. To reach older age groups, communication channels like direct mailings, newspaper publications, and hard copy prints were more effective. NTE implemented accessible online channels for communications as well, including emails, a website and use of social media, like Twitter. These channels helped reach younger demographics more likely to be connected through the internet. The information available documented that the Town of Killingly is not diverse relative to ethnicity. Based on this, communications were limited to one language (English).

2.2 Community Input

In the EJ Plan, NTE presented potential community concerns typically raised in the context of electric generating facility siting and construction projects. After conducting multiple community interviews, taking questions from community members at public meetings, and requesting feedback from community members through mailings and emails, detailed information was gathered to better understand Project specific concerns from community members.

NTE summarized and organized these questions into topical areas. Using this information, NTE then organized topics of interest and prepared a *Frequently Asked Questions* (FAQs) document that was posted to the Project website.



In broad terms, the most common topical areas raised by the community related to quality of life impacts, particularly those related to water use, local air quality and the Project's benefits to the local community. Other collective concerns included noise, traffic, visual impact, back-up ultra-low sulfur distillate (ULSD) fuel storage and transportation, stormwater management, safety, and alternative power generation options.

Water Use. Input and questions included the proposed water source for the Project, the amount of water required, especially during rare instances when back-up ULSD fuel would be used, water use from the CWC wellfields, and alternative water sources.

Air Quality. Input and questions included the concentration of power generation facilities within a radius of the Town of Killingly, local emissions, and effects on asthma and other potential health concerns.

Project Benefits. Input and questions included the amount of property taxes the Project would pay, the services the Project would require from the community, employment, and direct and induced benefits to the Town, state and the region.

Noise. Input and questions over noise were primarily raised by those living in close proximity to the proposed Project, as well as those around Alexander Lake. Certain questions focused on how noise is measured, how noise ordinances are enforced, what noise levels might be expected during startup and commissioning through activities like steam blows, and other construction noise.

Traffic. NTE received questions related to traffic, ranging from the need for road widening and anticipated truck traffic during construction and normal operation to traffic during rare occasions when ULSD fuel might be used.

Visual Impact. Community members asked several questions related to visual impacts, including questions related to the height of the stack, buffer around the Project site, views from nearby conservation areas and around Alexander Lake.

Back-Up ULSD Fuel. Many questions from the community were posed concerning ULSD fuel. Transportation of fuel, storage of fuel, operation using fuel, protection against spills, containment options and emission impacts were all topics raised related to ULSD fuel.

Stormwater Management. The community asked questions and offered its thoughts regarding stormwater management. A number of questions considered potential effects on nearby wetlands and abutting neighbors.



Safety. NTE received many questions related to safety and emergency response. Questions related to an emergency response plan, as well as the potential for fires, explosions, spills and earthquakes.

Alternative Power Generation. The community asked many questions about renewable energy options, particularly the viability of solar as an alternative to a combined cycle generating facility.

As described in greater detail below, NTE responded to community questions through a number of media and communication vehicles.

3.0 Public Involvement Activities

NTE undertook a variety of public outreach and public participation activities to meet the goals and objectives of the EJ Plan. The Public Involvement Program activities included:

- Consultation with affected agencies, and other stakeholders
- Pre-application activities to increase Project awareness at the earliest opportunity
- Establishment of a Project website to disseminate information to the public
- Direct mail, email, newspaper and newsletter notifications of Project information,
 Project activities and opportunities for public participation
- Public meetings in the community

3.1 Project Mailing/Email List

During the pre-application phase of the project, NTE created email and mail lists to facilitate and encourage communication, public involvement and to disseminate information. NTE requested email addresses at public meetings, individual meetings, and through website contact forms, and continuously updated the email list.

Email lists included owners of property adjacent to the site; local county and state officials; individuals who attended community meetings; interested community organizations; interested environmental organizations; community members who made inquiries regarding the Project; and individuals who requested to be on the email list through the Project website. See Appendix C for "Key Contact List" and Appendix D for "Email Contact List".

On April 22, 2016, NTE submitted its first email to the original 30 email contacts. Over the following months, the email list grew to over 130 contacts (and will continue to grow throughout the life of the Project). Email was used to distribute monthly newsletters, Project updates, notifications of resources added to the website, public notices and other Project information. Please see Appendix E - Community Emails.



In addition to emailing, NTE facilitated public involvement through various direct mailings to the community. NTE created a direct mailing list which included nearby residences and businesses, churches, schools, daycares and hospitals. This list included immediate and abutting neighbors. NTE mailed letters and postcards on two occasions to this list of over 400 community members. See Appendix F - Postcards and Mailings.

Additionally, on September 23, 2016, NTE mailed a letter to the residential and commercial interests in the community. See Appendix G for a copy of the letter that was sent to over 6,000 addresses.

As required, a mailing was also made to notify abutting property owners of the submittal of the CSC Application. This mailing is provided as Appendix H – Abutting Property Owner Notification Mailing.

3.2 Regular Agency and Stakeholder Briefings, Meetings, and Updates

To provide meaningful and ongoing consultation with local community members, organizations and officials, regular briefings and meetings were held throughout the pre-application and application phases. This outreach included face-to-face meetings, presentations, phone calls, and written Project updates through a Project monthly newsletter to keep agencies and stakeholders informed and engaged in a positive and productive manner.

NTE team members were in the Town of Killingly nearly every week meeting with individuals, agencies or organizations in the community. Regular briefings and meetings were held throughout the development process. Ongoing consultations with Town staff, municipal or commission representatives, local agencies and other stakeholders occurred throughout this time.

NTE provided project briefings, updates and presentations to organizations including the Killingly-Brooklyn Rotary Club, Killingly Business Association, Danielson Lions, New England Connecticut Chamber of Commerce, Killingly Housing Authority, H.H. Ellis Technical High School, Quinebaug Valley Community College, Wyndham Land Trust, and other local organizations. Other meetings/updates included meetings with abutting neighbors, Alexander Lake Association Members, local educational institutions, local churches, and other stakeholders within the community.

A representative list of briefings, presentations, meetings and updates is included as Appendix I – Public Outreach Log.



Additionally, NTE provided regular updates to the Administrator, Environmental Justice Program, calibrating community outreach activities and EJ Plan fulfillment.

3.3 Key Message Statements, Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), News Releases, and Press
Kits

Development of key message statements early in the process was essential to ensure consistent, accurate and current messaging to the public and within all public involvement materials prepared by NTE. After conducting multiple community interviews, taking questions from community members at public meetings, and requesting feedback from community members through mailings and emails, detailed information was gathered to better understand specific concerns from community members.


NTE collected and summarized the most frequently expressed community questions into the following topics:

- NTE Experience
- Killingly Energy Center Overview Information
- Siting (Environmental Impacts, Benefits)
- Safety
- Air Emissions
- Water
- Natural Gas
- Employment
- Regional Need for Power Generation and Electricity

Questions and answers related to these topics are provided as Appendix J – Frequently Asked Questions. FAQs were valuable for the Project contact person as well as the Environmental Justice community and other Project participants. This effort enabled NTE to provide timely and accurate information when approached by the media, interested members of the public, or other stakeholders. This FAQ also served as an important document to be shared publicly, in whole or in part, depending on specific questions raised throughout the public participation process. The FAQ was provided on the Project website.

NTE participated in many interviews with media outlets, including the *Hartford Courant*, *Norwich Bulletin* and *WINY Radio*. Mark Mirabito, project representative and Vice President, NTE Connecticut, was the primary media contact for this type of outreach and interviews.

3.4 Project Website



A Project website² was professionally designed, created and maintained to promote Project awareness. The website provided information on Project details, schedule, contact information, contact forms, FAQs, reports/evaluations, applications and permits, technical information, presentations, benefits, and other news and announcements. The Project website was a valuable platform for sharing pertinent project information to interested parties. The website was user friendly, easily accessible and efficient in reaching out to the community.

NTE recognized that some members of the community did not have access to the internet, or simply preferred printed copies of Project documents. To address this, NTE representatives placed hard copies of Project documents on file with the Town at the Town Hall and Public Library and mailed or hand-delivered related reports and analyses to those community members requesting the same.

The Project website allowed for all other interested parties to stay informed and obtain instant access to key Project documents, fact sheets, and other Project-related information.

This website has been invaluable in the Project's outreach efforts. It has allowed NTE to easily share information in a timely manner. As new content was added to the website, notifications were provided through NTE's email list.

3.5 Brochures and Fact Sheets

Brochures and fact sheets were prepared to communicate information about NTE Energy and the Killingly Energy Center. These brochures were made available and distributed at the Project Open House, public meetings, individual meetings, presentations to local organizations, and as drop-off material during local business/organization visits. These materials summarized essential Project information including size and scope of Project, schedule, location, and economic benefits. The brochure also included an artist rendering of the Project.

In many cases, brochures were accompanied by Project representative business cards with key contact information, such as email, direct phone number, and cell phone number.

3.6 Notifications/Public Notices

Throughout the Environmental Justice Process, several public notices and other notifications were published in the local newspaper, on the proposed Project site through proper signage, as well as through emails and mailings³. These public notices announced the following meetings and regulatory proceedings:

- Public Meeting #1, May 4, 2016
- Public Meeting #2, July 11, 2016
- Special Joint Meeting, July 19, 2016
- CSC Application Submission, August 15 and 16, 2016
- Public Meeting #3, October 19, 2016

The Norwich Bulletin, which has a circulation of over 13,000 households, was the local newspaper used to disseminate these notices. The Norwich Bulletin serves Windham and New London

Counties, collectively making up over 389,000 residents and over 150,000 households. Average monthly website traffic includes 1.8 million views.

See Appendix M for published Public Notices in the Norwich Bulletin.

NTE also produced and published a monthly Project newsletter, providing updates, key dates for approaching meetings, and invitations to the community to meet with Project developers. These newsletters were posted on the Project website, emailed to the email contact list, and published in the Turnpike Buyer, a local newspaper with a circulation of 21,000 households.

The monthly newsletter included links to Project resources, contact information of the primary representative of the Project, community events/activities, and acted as a primary communication tool for updating community members on NTE's activity and encouraging public participation by notifying key dates and announcements of approaching meetings.

On June 7, 2016 NTE submitted its first monthly newsletter, summarizing activities and providing notices of upcoming meetings, conferences, and other community events. A newsletter has been submitted every month since June. Newsletters were submitted on July 1, 2016; August 1, 2016; August 31, 2016; October 4, 2016; October 31, 2016; and November 30, 2016.

In addition to submitting monthly newsletters to email recipients, NTE also posted these monthly newsletters on the Project website under News & Announcements. These were also published in the local Turnpike Buyer, which has a distribution to over 20,000 residents in the Killingly area. See Appendix N - Project Newsletters.

3.7 Public Meetings

Public meetings were key to providing information and engaging with community members regarding Project details. These meetings during the Project development process provided opportunities for two-way communication, and allowed community members the ability to directly discuss the Project and its potential impacts and benefits with Project representatives.

Prior to submitting the EJ Plan, NTE held a Project Open House on March 22, 2016 at the Gold Eagle Banquet Hall, 8 Tracy Road, Dayville, CT, giving community members the ability to review storyboards and discuss the Project details with Project representatives. Poster boards included the location of the Project, technology overview, renderings of the facility, schedule, and other Project information. See Appendix Y for poster boards presented during the Project Open House. See Appendix O – Open House Attendee Sign-in List.

During the Project Open House, many attendees requested a more formal presentation and question and answer (Q&A) opportunity with Project representatives. In response to this and in



accordance with EJ Plan requirements, NTE scheduled the public meeting (Public Meeting #1) with a formal presentation and opportunity for Q&A with community members.

In accordance with the approved EJ Plan, Public Meeting #1 was held during the development process to facilitate meaningful public participation, provide community members and local government officials the opportunity to directly discuss the Project and its implications with Project representatives, and to give community members the opportunity to ask questions and provide input to the Project team.

NTE scheduled Public Meeting #1 for May 4, 2016. Public Notices were provided in accordance with the communication methods outlined in the EJ Plan. The notice was a one-quarter page advertisement in the *Norwich Bulletin* issued on Monday, April 18, not less than 10 days prior to and no more than 30 days prior to the Public Meeting #1. Additionally, signs were placed on the Project site as part of the Public Notice. Beyond this, the Public Notice was provided on the Project website, and an email was distributed notifying contacts of the meeting.

Over 200 people attended Public Meeting #1 at the Gold Eagle Banquet Hall. NTE provided a presentation of the Project and answered questions and received input from the community. See Appendix P for the presentation provided to the community, and Appendix Q for the sign-in list of attendees.

Following Public Meeting #1, and as recommended by the Administrator, Environmental Justice Program, NTE scheduled a second public meeting for July 11, 2016 (Public Meeting #2). Public Meeting #2 afforded NTE another opportunity to update the community on the status of the proposed Project. This meeting afforded the community another opportunity to ask questions and provide input concerning the Project. Again, a Public Notice (in accordance with the EJ Plan requirements) was provided in the *Norwich Bulletin*, notice signs were placed on the Project site, notice was provided on the website, and notification was transmitted via email.

Public Meeting #2 was held at the Killingly High School, with over 200 community members in attendance. The presentation provided the community with information from the reports listed in Section 3.13 herein, as well as other studies and analysis prepared in furtherance of the CSC application, including:

- A. Wetlands Update
- B. Stormwater
- C. EMF
- D. Species
- E. Cultural Resources
- F. Geotechnical



To maximize the completeness of information being made available to the community, the NTE team made twelve specialists and experts available and provided detailed information on a variety of Project questions and topics at Public Meeting #2. At this Public Meeting #2, NTE fielded questions and provided answers on all aspects of the project and its potential impacts.

On July 28, 2016, the Administrator, Environmental Justice Program confirmed Public Meeting #2 met the Environmental Justice Public Meeting requirement.

On October 11, 2016, NTE presented to the Town Council a summary of economic benefits that the Project will provide to the Town of Killingly, including the highlights of its proposed Community Environmental Benefits Agreement (CEBA). NTE representatives discussed the CEBA and answered questions from Town Council Members. See Appendix T for Proposed Community Financial Benefits Presentation to the Killingly Town Council.

On October 19, 2016, NTE held a third public meeting (Public Meeting #3) which was noticed as described in Section 3.6. Over forty community members were in attendance. At Public Meeting #3, NTE first responded to the written supplemental questions from the community provided to it by the Administrator, Environmental Justice Program. The remainder of the meeting was allocated for other community questions.

Beyond the public meetings that followed public notice, NTE also participated in other public meetings, including:

- Killingly Energy Center Presentation to Town Council on March 8, 2016
- Joint Meeting of the Town of Killingly Inland Wetlands & Watercourses and Planning and zoning Commissions on July 19, 2016
- Planning and Zoning Commission Special Meeting on September 22, 2016
- Inland Wetlands & Watercourses Commission Special Meeting on September 27,
 2016

3.8 Information Repository



3.9 Project Contact Person

A direct contact person was identified early in the development process as the designated project staff to provide information, answer questions or discuss concerns from the community. A formal communication path was also in place so this contact could identify proper team experts to answer any specific questions from the community.

David Groleau, Project Developer, was identified as the designated Project staff member who was responsible for responding to questions and inquiries from the community and other stakeholders.

Mr. Groleau's e-mail and direct phone number was provided on public notices, newsletters, letters, emails, signage, website, and presentations. There were also several contact forms on the Project website that directed inquiries to Mr. Groleau's email address. This direct access further invited community input during the development process and acted as a project hotline for the Project.

3.10 Public Open House

As discussed in Section 3.7, NTE held a Project Open House on March 22, 2016 at the Gold Eagle Banquet Hall, giving community members the ability to review storyboards and discuss the Project details with Project representatives. Poster boards included the location of the Project, technology overviews, renderings of the facility, schedule, and other Project information. See Appendix V for Poster Boards used during this Open House. See Appendix O for the sign in list of attendees.

3.11 Community Interviews, Surveys and/or Focus Groups

NTE performed informal community interviews and surveys throughout the development process. On August 25, 2016, NTE representatives visited local businesses along Main Street in Killingly to bring awareness of the Project to local businesses, as well as to ask questions of local business owners about their impression of the Project. Additionally, NTE solicited feedback through a website form, titled "Tell Us What You Think."

NTE representatives conducted informal focus groups with members of Alexander Lake Association and the local legislators. These focus groups served as opportunities for smaller meetings that allowed particular stakeholder groups to ask questions specific to their questions and concerns.



3.12 Site Signage

Early in the development process, NTE installed a semi-permanent sign on the Project site. Signage was displayed to inform the surrounding community about the proposed site for the Project, as well as to provide the contact information of the direct Project contact. Appendix W is a photo of the semi-permanent signage on the Project site. This sign is expected to be in place for the entirety of the development process.

In addition to the permanent sign, NTE provided temporary signage to bring awareness of approaching Public Meetings. For Public Meetings held on May 4, 2016, July 11, 2016 and October 19, 2016, NTE displayed signs with Public Notice Information. See Appendix X for photos of the Temporary Public Notice Signs installed on the Project site.

3.13 Supplemental Activities

In addition to fulfilling activities included in the approved EJ Plan, NTE completed supplemental activities to further encourage active participation in the process:

Town Third Party Engineering Review. Prior to the submittal of its CSC Application, the Town requested that NTE provide funds for the Town to retain a 3rd party engineering consultant to provide its council members, commission members, and constituents an in-depth analysis of NTE's CSC and air permit application materials. NTE agreed to reimburse the cost of the consultant, enabling the Town to directly contract with a third-party consultant. The Town selected TRC Environmental Corporation (TRC). TRC reviewed the Project's CSC Application and Air Permit Application and then provided input to the Town and guidance to the Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commission and Inland Wetland and Watercourses Commission (IWWC) in preparation of their respective Regulate and Restrict Orders to the CSC. TRC responded to questions/input from the Commissions and the Town Council throughout the DEEP Air Permit and Connecticut Siting Council application processes.

Reports and Information Provided for Review Prior to Submission of Connecticut Siting Council Application. NTE, in advance of the July 11, 2016 Public Meeting #2, voluntarily made available to the community at the Town Hall, the Library and electronically on the KEC website, among other things, reports and information, including:

- Project Technical Report;
- Report on Need and Economic Benefits;
- Report on Visual Impacts;
- Report on Sound/Noise;
- Report on Traffic;
- Report on Wetlands;



Report on Water Resources

Online Digital Campaign. In addition to using traditional media for outreach, NTE also conducted online campaigns through digital ads on websites. These digital ads were viewable to web and

mobile users in the Killingly area and directed users to the Project website. These ads resulted in over 650,000 impressions (or views) and over 750 clicks to the website. NTE was able to collect feedback through these online ads.

Mailing Campaign. In addition to the two mailings described in Section 3.1, NTE mailed (on September 23) a letter to residents, businesses and industrial addresses in the Town of Killingly, notifying these community members of the Project and inviting them to provide feedback. See Appendix G for a copy of the letter that was sent to over 6,000 addresses.



Online Digital Ad

Call Campaign. NTE also conducted a call campaign to further inform Killingly residents of the Project, as well as to solicit feedback. Over 1,000 calls were made to community members and over 80 community members provided feedback on the Project.

4.0 Results and Conclusions

As a result of the measures presented in this EJ Report, NTE received constructive feedback from the community via website forms, questions and input from meetings, email responses, other forms of inquiries, third party (TRC) review, and the Regulate and Restrict Orders. This feedback is being and will be considered along with feedback from the CSC and DEEP as the Project progresses through the certification and air permit processes.

The community feedback received is the result of meaningful public participation cultivated through the Environmental Justice efforts as presented in this EJ Report. This process has facilitated the broad participation of community members potentially affected and has allowed those community members and local officials in the Town of Killingly to have a meaningful voice and robust opportunity to participate in the process regarding the proposed Project.

Beyond this, the Environmental Justice efforts have positioned the Town and the community for full and active participation in the CSC and other permitting efforts that will follow.




1.0 INTRODUCTION

This Environmental Justice Plan (EJ Plan) outlines the coordinated public participation activities that NTE Connecticut, LLC (NTE) will conduct to provide opportunities for early and active public involvement throughout the planning, pre-application, certification, compliance, and implementation of the proposed Killingly Energy Center in Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut (the Project). In particular, this EJ Plan emphasizes activities focused on pre-construction activities.

The activities outlined in the EJ Plan provide a variety of opportunities by which public concerns can be identified and addressed as early as possible throughout the various stages of the decision-making process and will facilitate effective and open communication between stakeholders and NTE. Updates to this information will be made as the Project's outreach activities progress.

This EJ Plan was developed consistent with the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP)'s Environmental Justice Policy, codified as section 22a-20a of the Connecticut General Statutes (CGS). The Project, as an electric generating facility with a capacity of more than ten megawatts (MW) is defined as an "affecting facility." CGS also defines an environmental justice community as including a "distressed municipality"; Killingly is currently listed by DEEP as a distressed municipality. Therefore, an EJ Plan is required to be approved and implemented, with a Final Report to DEEP's Environmental Justice Program to be submitted prior to issuance of a Notice of Tentative Determination by DEEP.

1.1 PROJECT PURPOSE AND INTENT



NTE is proposing an approximately 550-MW electric generating facility to be located on an approximately 70-acre parcel in the town of Killingly, Windham County, Connecticut. The proposed facility directly responds to the need for expanding the energy base in the region by constructing a cost-effective and environmentally responsible energy generation facility.

The proposed Project will be located in an industrial area in the northern portion of Killingly, west of Interstate 395 (I-395) and Alexander Lake; south of the Quinebaug River; and north of Lake Road and the Hartford Providence Turnpike. While some low-density residential uses are located west of the site, and more densely around Alexander Lake, the site is generally located in an area separated from Killingly's higher density residential areas to the east by I-395. The existing Lake Road Generating Facility is located within approximately one mile east of the site.

The proposed Project will utilize a single combustion turbine in a 1x1x1 configuration, with a heat recovery steam generator, steam turbine and air-cooled condensers. The Project will be fueled primarily with natural gas. Natural gas will be provided via the Algonquin Natural Gas pipeline. The Project will connect to the

existing 345-kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line located adjacent to the property's eastern boundary.

It is anticipated that the Project will receive water for process use from the Connecticut Water Company and that infrastructure to provide water exists at or near the Project site within Lake Road. It is presumed that wastewater will be discharged using nearby interconnections to existing wastewater facilities.



1.2 ANTICIPATED PERMITTING REQUIREMENTS

The Project is currently developing design details that will refine its pre-construction environmental permitting requirements, and will update the EJ Plan as additional details are known. At the present time, the following approvals are anticipated to be required at the state level:

- The Project will require approval by the Connecticut Siting Council (CSC);
- The Project will require air permitting New Source Review by DEEP;
- The Project is anticipated to require a permit from DEEP for discharge to the sanitary sewer, which could fall within the requirements of a General Permit categorical industry user (<10,000 gallons per day);
- The Project is working to avoid wetland impact, but could require review for an Inland 401 Water Quality Certification; and
- The Project will require DEEP General Permit approval associated with Stormwater & Dewatering Wastewaters during Construction Activities, as well as for Stormwater Associated with Industrial Activities.

1.3 PLAN GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The overall goal of this plan is two-fold: 1) to actively seek public participation throughout the planning, preapplication, certification, compliance, and implementation process; and 2) to encourage stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity in the review of the proposed Project so their input can be considered. This plan indicates the steps that NTE will take to inform, engage, and solicit input from the local community, general public and other stakeholders, including a schedule that indicates when the steps will be taken. Section 2 of this plan provides a description of the surrounding local community, including important demographic information, while Section 3 outlines the planned public involvement activities.



2.0 COMMUNITY INFORMATION

This section describes the town of Killingly within its context as an environmental justice community. In accordance with CGS Section 22a-20a, an environmental justice community is:

- a. A United States census block group, as determined in accordance with the most recent United States census, for which thirty percent or more of the population consists of low income persons who are not institutionalized and have an income below two hundred percent of the federal poverty level, or
- b. A distressed municipality.

Killingly is identified on the list of distressed municipalities. The following discussion provides some context for community characteristics.

2.1 COMMUNITY BACKGROUND AND HISTORY

The town of Killingly is located in Windham County in the northeastern corner of Connecticut. The town, first incorporated in 1708, began as several mill villages sited along its abundant waterways, including the Five-Mile and Quinebaug Rivers. In the early half of the 19th century, Killingly was the largest producer of cotton goods in Connecticut in the early 20th century, earning the epithet "curtain capital of the world." The town is one of the largest in the county, and includes several distinct village areas: Attawaugan, Ballouville, Dayville, East Killingly, Rogers, South Killingly, and the Borough of Danielson. The Project is located most proximate to the Dayville community.

The area surrounding the Project site has been designated for industrial development by the town, and currently includes several major businesses as well as the Lake Road Generating Plant. Alexander Lake, south and east of this economic development area, includes private residences surrounding this recreational lake.

2.2 DEMOGRAPHICS


The Connecticut Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) has identified Killingly as a distressed municipality since 1999. Identifying factors and considerations include high unemployment and poverty, aging housing stock, low or declining rates of growth in job creation, population, per capital income, and education. More specifically, the DECD weighed the following criteria in their most recent designation of distressed municipalities:

- Per capita income for 2013
- Percent of poverty in population for 2013
- Unemployment rate for 2014
- Percent change in population from 2000 to 2010
- Percent change in employment from 2004 to 2014
- Percent change in per capita income from 2000 to 2013
- Percent of house stock built before 1939 in 2013
- Percent population with high school degree and higher in 2013
- Per Capita Adjusted Equalized Net Grand List in 2015-2016

In 2014, the estimated population of Killingly was 17,172 individuals – nearly 15 percent of the Windham County population. A growth rate of 0.4 percent growth per year had been projected by the Connecticut Economic Research Center (CERC) for the period from 2012 through 2020. However, the town population dropped 1.1 percent from 2010 to 2014; in contrast, the state population during the same period increased 0.6 percent.

In 2014, the median household income in Killingly was \$57,016. While higher than the national median of \$53,482, it is notably lower than the state's median income, \$69,899. The town's per capita income was \$27,549, lower than





both the national and state averages, \$28,555 and \$38,480, respectively. Similarly, about 9.6 percent of the Killingly population lives in poverty, which is lower than the national average, 14.8 percent, as well as the state average, 10.8 percent.

Almost 88 percent of the population age 25 or older are high school graduates, while 21 percent have obtained a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Killingly is primarily Caucasian (91.3 percent), with Hispanics making up the second largest ethnicity, at 3 percent of Killingly's population.

Unemployment in Killingly is greater than the state average. In June, 2014, Killingly was at 7.7 percent unemployment, while Connecticut had an unemployment rate of 6.5 percent.

2.3 POTENTIAL COMMUNITY CONCERNS

This section summarizes community concerns typically associated with power plant siting and construction projects. Please note the concerns outlined here are those typically communicated by the public for sites undergoing construction. Note that only limited community interviews have so far been conducted; detailed information has not yet been gathered from the local community in Killingly to draw these conclusions about specific community concerns for the Project site.

This section will be updated throughout the outreach and engagement process to reflect concerns that are raised by the surrounding community and stakeholders during events such as stakeholder meetings/briefings, community meetings, and community interviews.

2.3.1 Typical Concerns During Design and Construction

- Quality of Life Impacts During construction projects, local community concerns often include quality of life considerations such as increased dust generation, truck traffic, and noise. For this Project, comprehensive construction plans, including mitigation plans for dust, traffic, and noise, will be available for public comment and consideration. NTE will take the necessary steps to ensure that quality of life impacts are appropriately addressed during design and construction.
- Health & Safety Worker and community health and safety are often key concerns at construction sites. To demonstrate its commitment to the health and safety of site workers and neighbors, NTE will implement the necessary Project controls (such as fencing, signs, security, traffic control, etc.) during all on-site construction activities. Appropriate Project control plans will be developed and finalized before construction begins.
- Project Construction Schedules The timing of Project activities at construction sites is typically a concern
 to surrounding neighborhoods. To address this potential concern, NTE will make every effort to ensure that
 work is appropriately scheduled to minimize or even eliminate disruption of normal community activities.
 NTE will also regularly inform the public of Project schedules through updates on the project website or
 other means.
- Access to the Process Additional issues tend to arise when the public is concerned that adequate public access and involvement in the regulatory review process is not accommodated, or that communication during the construction process is not clear. Power plant siting and construction projects are complex and they can take substantial time. This plan encourages all interested community members and stakeholders to become engaged early in the process, and stay engaged throughout the entire process. The activities

outlined in Section 3 to be implemented by NTE, such as providing a Project contact, hosting community meetings/open houses, developing a Project website, and preparing/disseminating fact sheets, will go a long way to providing the public and other interested stakeholders with ample opportunity to participate in the process while remaining compliant with legislated outreach requirements.

2.3.2 Typical Concerns During Operation

- Water Use Even where plentiful water is available from existing purveyors, water use can be a concern for power projects. The Project will incorporate air cooling to reduce its water demand to the greatest extent possible, and will work closely with the Connecticut Water Company and the local community to evaluate and assure that impacts to existing users and/or nearby water resources such as Alexander Lake would not occur.
- Operational Noise The Project will be designed using industry best practices to alleviate noise impacts to comply with applicable standards through the use of sound attenuation design measures. Anticipated changes in sound level will be assessed, and compliance with applicable standards demonstrated.
- Visual A common community concern with industrial development is the change in aesthetics. Although
 the Project site is in an area planned for industrial uses, with surrounding industrial uses, residences are
 also located nearby. The Project's structures and their potential visibility from surrounding areas will be
 assessed.
- Air Quality Health-based concerns associated with emissions are typical concerns for new power plant projects. This plan will engage the community in open discussions about the air quality impacts of the Project during construction and operation, including the Project's compliance with applicable health-based standards. By listening to community concerns, addressing them in an open and public forum, and accepting feedback throughout the process, NTE will proactively address air quality concerns. The Project will incorporate emission controls, such as selective catalytic reduction and an oxidation catalyst, to demonstrate that Best Available Control Technology and Lowest Achievable Emissions Rates are reflected by the Project, as appropriate.
- Greenhouse Gas/Global Warming from Fossil Fuel Combustion Greenhouse gases (GHGs) and environmental issues associated with power plants are common community concerns. NTE will utilize extremely efficient technology to comply with all regulatory requirements for GHGs, and will use the best technologies available to reduce GHG emissions. NTE will also implement practices and measures to ensure that the Project functions properly and operates efficiently.
- Ultra-low sulfur distillate (ULSD) and Chemical Storage ULSD and chemical delivery, storage, and handling could result in some level of concern among stakeholders. Detailed containment design will be reflected in the Project and spill response plans will be prepared. Although very stringent standards are required public outreach and engagement will help alleviate concerns.

2.3.3 Killingly-Specific Community Issues

Based on outreach conducted to date, including a public open house held on March 22, 2016, key issues identified to date have focused on concerns about the Project's effect on noise and water resources. As additional meetings are held and broad Project issues are discussed, key topics of local concern will continue to be identified and addressed.



3.0 PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

3.1 PLANNED PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

This section outlines the public outreach and participation activities that NTE will undertake to meet the goals and objectives of this plan. The Project's public involvement program will include:

- Consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders
- Pre-application activities to increase Project awareness at the earliest opportunity
- Establishment of a Project website to disseminate information to the public
- Notifications of Project activities and opportunities for public participation

NTE plans to implement the public involvement activities described below to fulfill these objectives and enable stakeholders and agencies to engage in a meaningful way early in the process. In addition, these activities provide many opportunities for the public, agencies, and other stakeholders to stay engaged throughout all phases of the Project, from planning and pre-application to certification and compliance, all the way to operation. The public involvement activities outlined in this section will be sequenced with the major phases of the Project, assuming a general schedule as such:

- Pre-Application (approximately 1 2 months)
- Application Review (approximately 9 12 months)
- Certification and Compliance Phase (Construction) (approximately 24 36 months)
- Operational Phase

A tentative schedule of the planned public involvement activities is described throughout this section and then summarized in Section 3.2.

3.1.1 Project Mailing/E-mail List

Description: To facilitate communication, public involvement, and dissemination of information, a Project mailing/e-mail list will be developed, and maintained for use in distributing fact sheets, notices, and other project information, as appropriate. The Project mailing/e-mail list will include, to the extent possible, owners of property adjacent to the site; local, county, state, and federal officials; individuals who attend community meetings; interested community organizations; interested environmental organizations; people who make inquiries regarding the site; and local school districts, libraries, and media outlets.

The Project mailing/e-mail list will be revised regularly so that contact information, including name, organization (as appropriate), address, phone number, and e-mail address, is kept up to date. Furthermore, the list will be updated as requests for inclusion are received from interested parties.

Timing: Developed in Pre-Application phase; updated and maintained until construction is completed; modified for maintenance throughout Project's operational life.



3.1.2 Regular Agency and Stakeholder Briefings, Meetings, and Updates

Description: In order to provide meaningful and ongoing consultation with the affected agencies and other stakeholders, regular briefings and meetings will be held throughout the Project regulatory review process and written updates prepared. These items will include face-to-face meetings, conference calls, and written Project updates to keep agencies and stakeholders informed and engaged in a positive manner and to continually request their consultation.

Timing: Initiated in the Pre-Application phase to kick off the project; continuing through the Application and Construction phases.

3.1.3 Key Message Statements, Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), News Releases, and Press Kits

Description: These items will help to proactively publicize progress or key milestones in the process. They will also serve as resources for responding to inquiries from the public for information on how to participate in the proposed Project review. Development of key message statements early in the process will be essential to ensure consistent messaging among all public involvement materials prepared. FAQs will be essential for the Project contact person, as well as Project participants, if they are approached by the media, interested members of the public, or other stakeholders. The remaining items -- news releases and press kits - would be released to the media outlets identified on the Project mailing/e-mail list as a way to proactively inform those outlets about certain aspects of the Project.

Timing: Developed for use in the Pre-Application phase, and revised as appropriate for review throughout the Project's operating life.

3.1.4 Project Website

Description: A Project website will be designed, set up, and maintained to house Project news and updates, Project schedule, contact information, key documents, etc. This will allow for all interested parties to stay informed and provide instant access to key project documents, fact sheets, and other project-related information.

At the present time, the Project website is envisioned to contain the following:

- General Project information and photos/graphics
- "News and events" feature
- Identification of and contact information for key Project personnel and agency representatives
- Method for phoning/e-mailing/sending in comments/questions to the Project contact person, including the availability of a Project hotline

As the Project progresses and more information is gathered, additional content and features will be added to the Project website to help stakeholders participate in the process.

Timing: Developed/set up to go live early in the Pre-Application phase; maintained and updated until completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.5 Brochures and Fact Sheets

Description: For up-front and ongoing communication with the public, brochures and fact sheets will be prepared to encourage the public and other interested stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity. Another objective of fact sheets and brochures is to educate the public as to the specific elements and features of the Project. These materials will summarize essential information for the public and other interested stakeholders, and include



announcements about upcoming events, summaries of current work activities or Project status, schedules for upcoming work, and contact information.

As such, fact sheets will be used to announce major milestones of the Project, explain the principal facts, and provide technical information in plain language, including such information as:

- Background and purpose of the Project
- Current status/major milestones reached
- Next steps in the Project
- Contact information for the Project contact person
- Information about how to access the Project website
- · Locations of the local information repositories

Timing: "Introductory" fact sheets developed early in the Pre-Application phase; continue to be developed and disseminated until completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.6 Notifications/Public Notices

Description: Public notices to announce public meetings, open houses, regulatory proceedings, and major Project milestones will be placed in local newspapers (such as the Norwich Bulletin), and on the Project website. For certain events or milestones, these notices can also be sent to the Project mailing/e-mail list.

Notifications will be an important part of this public involvement program as they will broadcast opportunities for the public to participate and provide input throughout the process.

In addition the notification methods listed above, other methods of notification may include:

- Placing newspaper inserts can garner additional attention when used in conjunction with a traditional public notice placed in the local paper.
- Developing a "community notification" newsletter to distribute to members of the public and other interested stakeholders is a good way to directly inform and notify about upcoming events.
- Placing notices in a newsletter distributed by a local government, a civic or community organization, or in a free publication can be a good way to target a specific audience or segment of the community.
- Placing signs and bulletin boards within the community can alert interested members of the public about upcoming events.
- Using social media outlets (Facebook, Twitter, etc.) can help promote upcoming events.
- Making telephone calls can provide a personal and immediate manner of spreading information.

Timing: To announce important Project events such as public meetings, and open houses.

3.1.7 Public Meetings

Description: Scheduling and implementing periodic public informational meetings during the Project development process will provide two-way communication, with community members able to directly discuss the Project and its implications with Project representatives. Public meetings will be held as required by the regulatory process, as well as at certain key Project milestones and to solicit public input.

Key audience members and their anticipated issues of concern will be identified ahead of time. To the extent possible, public meetings will be announced before the meeting date in local newspapers (such as the Norwich Bulletin), mailings (such as fact sheets) to the Project mailing/e-mail list, and on the Project website.



To the extent possible, the meetings will be scheduled at times and locations that will accommodate the majority of concerned members of the public. Relevant documents will be made available for public review, either via the information repository, project website, at the meeting itself, or a combination of these methods, as necessary.

A sign-up sheet will be available at each public meeting held and attendees will be encouraged to voluntarily provide their names and addresses, which will be added to the Project mail/e-mail list.

Timing: Initial public meeting held early in the Pre-Application phase to introduce the Project; additional public meetings held during the Application review phase.

3.1.8 Information Repository

Description: Information repositories will be set up at the Killingly Public Library and Killingly Town Hall. The two repositories will house hard copies of relevant Project documents. The addresses and hours of operation of these two repositories are:

The primary objectives of the information repository is to serve as a collection of documents related to the Project and make those documents readily available to people who are interested in learning about, or keeping updated on, Project activities. As such, establishing these repositories makes information accessible to the public in two convenient locations.

As with the Project website, the information repositories can serve as crucial resources for the public in accessing records relating to the Project. As such, both repositories will be initially stocked with relevant Project materials and then continually updated throughout the life of the Project. Some example materials to be included in the repositories include:

- Background information on the proposed Project and NTE
- Fact sheets, brochures, handouts, and other public involvement materials
- This EJ Plan
- Names and phone numbers of the Project contact person and appropriate agency representatives
- Any other relevant material

The repositories will be kept up-to-date by adding new documents as they are generated.

Timing: Set up early in the Pre-Application phase; maintained and updated through completion of the Construction phase.

3.1.9 Project Contact Person

Description: A Project contact person will be identified early in the process and will be a designated Project staff member who is responsible for responding to questions and inquiries from the public, the media, and stakeholders. The Project contact person will be instrumental in developing public involvement materials such as fact sheets, brochures, press kits, and talking points, among other items.

Timing: Contact person identified and ready to go early in the Pre-Application phase.



3.1.10 Public Open Houses

Description: Public open houses can be held to provide the public with an opportunity to gain more information about the Project in an open setting and discuss issues face to face with Project personnel and agency representatives. They can also be held and targeted for special interest community groups.

Open houses are informal meetings in a public location where people can talk to Project and agency personnel on a one-to-one basis. These sessions allow interested members of the public to ask questions and express their concerns directly to Project and agency staff. Open houses can also be set up to allow members of the public to talk with representatives from interested organizations in the community.

Open houses will be typically held when new Project information is available that may not be appropriate for a public meeting and/or when it is found out that members of the public have widely varying interests or levels of knowledge. The more informal setting of these sessions is appropriate to enhance direct dialog with members of the community and encourage members of the public to raise questions and be a part of the process outside of the more formal public meetings and hearings.

Open houses will typically be scheduled during evening or weekend hours, to promote a high level of attendance by all concerned members of the public. A convenient location within the community will be selected.

To provide clear, consistent messaging and information, appropriate materials, such as posters, handouts, or fact sheets, will be prepared and made available at these sessions. To the extent possible, open houses will be announced at least seven days ahead of time. Announcements will be sent to the Project mailing/e-mail list to inform all interested parties.

Timing: As dictated by Project needs.

3.1.11 Community Interviews, Surveys and/or Focus Groups

Description: During the Pre-Application phase, community surveys may be planned and conducted through invited sessions, door knocks, or other means to provide information about the Project to community members, obtain input from neighbors one-on-one, and find out about any concerns about the Project.

Timing: As dictated by Project needs.

3.1.12 Site Signage

Description: Signage will be designed and installed at the Project site to inform the surrounding community about the planned and ongoing construction at the site.

Timing: Installed early in the Construction phase before construction begins at the site and maintained throughout the Project's operational life.

3.1.13 Additional Activities for Consideration


Description: Additional items may include groundbreaking ceremony, completion ceremony, and site tours, as appropriate.

Current Site Activities

We've had several teams on the site this month conducting various studies to support permitting and development work. We recently completed a geotechnical study which examines the soil and geology on the site. Over the next several weeks, our ecologists will be on-site to conduct ecological field surveys to identify any sensitive habitats and wildlife. As with all of our studies, we will make reports on this study publically available at the Kilángly Public Library and on our project website once completed, expected to be in July.

You may have recently noticed some traffic monitors near the site. In late May, we conducted a traffic study to understand the oursent traffic volume and patterns in the vicinity of the site. Our consultants are in the process of preparing a report on any potential effects on traffic which we will make publically available when complete, expected in late June.

We've received a number of questions from the community related to water - water use sources, volumes, take tevels and many others. We're actively researching water supply options, including the use of an existing wastewater stream to provide at least a portion of our need. We're planning to release a report by the end of June that will provide detailed information on water source, use and volumes.

Also shortly we will place a large, permanent sign on the property so that anyone driving by knows who to contact with questions or comments.

Upcoming Activities

There are a few upcoming public meetings over the next few weeks that we'd like to let you about. On July 11, we will hosting a public project meeting to follow up to our Informal Public Meeting of May 4, 2016. At this project meeting, we intend to share additional project information and respond to further questions from the community. We are excited about having a more detailed discussion at the upcoming project meeting as we expect many of our project-specific studies will be available at that time.

We are also participating in a special joint meeting on July 19 with the Killingly Planning and Zoning Commission, triland Wetlands and Waterburses Commission, and the Town Council, rescheduled from a meeting that was planned for June 27. Both of these meetings will be held at the Killingly High School Auditorium at 226 Putham Pike, Killingly, CT 96241.

I. About Killingly Energy Center/NTE Energy

How much energy will KEC produce?

The project will produce 550 MW of baseload power, enough to power approximately 500,000 homes, and will be one of the cleanest, most efficient natural gas generation facilities in North America.

Will the electricity generated by KEC be sold to Connecticut homes and businesses?

Like all New England power generation facilities, KEC's electricity will be delivered to the regional grid for use across the six state region. The regional grid operator, ISO New England, determines how and where electrons flow across the electric grid. However, ISO New England has called for additional electricity generation in southern New England, including Connecticut, to ease supply constraints and meet local demand.

Will KEC lower electricity prices for Connecticut consumers?

Electricity prices are determined by a variety of factors, including fuel availability and costs, generator availability, legislative and regulatory policies, and even the weather. While KEC cannot guarantee a reduction in consumer electricity costs for local ratepayers, our market-based, economic modeling predicts cost savings of \$215 million per year for Connecticut ratepayers during the first five years of operation because KEC will displace older, costlier generation.

Has NTE ever operated a power plant before?

The NTE team includes some of most experienced engineers, developers and commercial professionals in the industry. Collectively, NTE team members have built, owned and/or operated dozens of traditional and renewable generation facilities across the country and around the world, representing



tens of thousands of megawatts of power generation. Currently, we own two projects which are under construction in Ohio and North Carolina, and both are expected to be operational in 2018.

II. Siting

Why build KEC in Killingly?

Killingly is rich in infrastructure to support power generation, including access to existing natural gas and electric transmission lines. In addition, the actual KEC site selected conforms to the Town's long term conservation and development plan and is located in an area identified for future industrial development. What's more, Connecticut and the region are in need of reliable baseload power to replace older and high-polluting oil and coal power plants, as well as aging nuclear.

Will there be opportunities for local residents to participate in the permitting and development process?

Yes, both the DEEP and CSC processes are designed to provide opportunities for public participation and input, including a local public hearing prior to their final decisions. What's more, from day one we've been meeting with people in the local community. We take a personal approach to development projects, listen closely to community members and take their concerns seriously. We invite anyone to contact us directly with questions or comments.

Will the KEC property require local zoning changes?

No. The Connecticut Siting Council (CSC) will consider Killingly's zoning regulations and preferences in the course of its decision on KEC's CSC application, but zoning changes are not required. The KEC property is within an area that conforms to the Town's established, long-term plan for future industrial development.

Will NTE pursue a tax abatement from the Town of Killingly?

NTE will be one of the largest tax payers – if not the largest taxpayer – in the community. Yes, we expect to enter into a mutually beneficial tax agreement with the Town, allowing for the delivery of consistent, sustained municipal tax revenue over the operational life of the facility. On average, we expect to pay the Town millions every year, which could help lower tax rates, or provide other important Town services or infrastructure improvements. Additionally, we will also create a community benefits package that delivers tangible benefits to the community beyond tax revenues.

Why can't NTE develop KEC on the site of a retired coal or oil plant?

We agree that re-developing a retired coal or oil facility would be ideal. However, these old sites are frequently located in geographic areas that do not have access to an interstate natural gas pipeline. For



the few sites with sufficient natural gas supply, current owners typically retain these facilities for future redevelopment, making them unavailable to NTE.

How much noise will KEC create when operating?

KEC will be a quiet neighbor. The facility's layout is intentionally designed to minimize impact to ambient noise levels. Generating units will be located in the interior of the site, housed in acoustically treated enclosures inside the turbine building to reduce noise levels significantly. State and local noise regulations require noise at the property boundaries to be no higher than 51 dBA (equivalent to a quiet office setting) and levels will drop off quickly from there.

What features will KEC incorporate to reduce light pollution?

Advances in lighting technology will allow KEC to have a very limited lighting impact. Downward-facing directional lighting will be used to project light only where it is needed. The facility will use motion-detecting lights and manual task lighting wherever possible and safe, to reduce ambient lighting. Orange sodium lights will not be employed. Additionally, the FAA has deemed our facility as having 'no hazard to air navigation', which means no markings or lighting is required on the stack for aviation safety.

How tall will the stack be and will the facility be visible?

KEC will have a single stack standing 150 feet tall, compared to the existing three, 165-foot stacks at the Lake Road Generating Facility. Our site also sits in one of the lower elevations within the wooded Quinebaug River Valley, which will reduce visual impacts considerably.

How will KEC impact property values?

Many factors determine a property's value in a community, including the quality of the public schools, the safety of local neighborhoods, the stability of the community's tax base and a healthy business and economic development climate. KEC is being sited adjacent to the industrial park and in an area designated for industrial development. Given the existing industrial businesses and infrastructure, the added jobs to the community, as well as payment of significant property taxes every year, KEC could have a positive impact on Killingly property values. KEC will also support other important Town services or infrastructure improvements. These revenues could also be used to lower the tax rate for local residents.

Will KEC construction require blasting? Will local wells be monitored?

Yes, blasting will be required. KEC will obtain all required permits and work with an experienced contractor who is familiar with the area's geology and hydrology. In addition, KEC will develop and implement a plan to monitor neighboring wells prior to the blasting and mitigate any issues resulting from it.

How much additional traffic will KEC create and will there be upgrades to Lake Road?

KEC will add some additional traffic to Lake Road during construction, but the existing roadway network and infrastructure are capable of handling these increased volumes. Once operational, KEC is expected to add a negligible amount of traffic. Vehicles exiting the facility will be directed to the east, toward the industrial park, and the existing "No Thru Trucks" sign will be moved to the west of the KEC site. To accommodate larger trucks accessing the site, widening of Lake Road may be necessary along the curve just east of the site:

During rare occasions when the ultra-low sulfur distillate tank needs to be replenished, KEC will be serviced by approximately one truck every 30 minutes, which would have no significant effect on current traffic operations.

Will neighbors feel vibrations when the KEC facility is operating?

No. The facility does not produce any vibrations that can be felt beyond the turbine pedestal.

Will ammonia be stored on the site? What will it be used for?

Yes. We will inject 19% Aqueous Ammonia (81% water / 19% ammonia) upstream of the SCR catalyst in order to reduce NO_x emissions. Aqueous Ammonia, and particularly at this low concentration, is substantially safer than Anhydrous Ammonia (which is a gas) due not only to its lower concentration, but also because it is easily contained. We will store approximately 12,000 gallons of Aqueous Ammonia on site in storage tanks with secondary containment.

III. Safety

Will the KEC facility be safe?

Yes, KEC will be safe. Safety is our highest priority. KEC will incorporate the latest technologies, employ highly trained personnel and utilize the latest industry safety procedures in order to minimize the



possibility of any accidents during construction, testing, start-up and operation. Sophisticated fire suppression systems will be integrated into the project's design. We will work closely with the fire chief and local fire district to ensure they have an intimate knowledge of the KEC facility and are equipped to quickly respond in the unlikely event of an incident.

What will NTE do to protect KEC against cyber-attacks?

Cybersecurity is a top priority for the electricity generation industry as a whole and for NTE. With that in mind, we will hire an experienced operations company with strong cyber security standards and a history of successful cyber security implementation. This operations contractors will utilize the latest technology to protect the integrity and operation of all plant equipment and systems from cybersecurity threats.

How will emergency vehicles and residential traffic traverse Lake Road during construction associated with the lateral upgrade?

NTE will work closely with Yankee Gas, Town officials, the state police and fire district to minimize any traffic disruptions for Lake Road residents and ensure unimpeded access for all emergency vehicles during the upgrade of the lateral. The short distance of the lateral within Lake Road will also minimize the duration of potential disruption.

Who will be responsible for the demolition and decommissioning of the plant?

As a condition to approving the application for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need, the CSC will require that KEC have a plan in place for the safe demolition and decommissioning of the plant.

Will KEC be protected against seismic tremors or an earthquake?

Yes, KEC will incorporate design and construction features that will allow it to safely operate in the event of any localized seismic activity. Importantly, the soils at the site are not considered to be susceptible to seismically induced liquefaction and the geographic area is not prone to significant seismic activity.

IV. Air

Shouldn't we be relying more on renewable energy sources?

Yes. Renewables will continue to play an increasingly important role in Connecticut's and New England's electric generation mix. KEC is an important source in a robust renewable energy portfolio. As an efficient and fast-ramping baseload power generation facility, KEC will back up wind and solar generation and will keep the lights on when the wind doesn't blow and the sun doesn't shine. By balancing out wind and solar intermittency, KEC will enable greater utilization and integration of renewables.



Will the proximity of other power plants in this region negatively impact air quality in Killingly?

We know there are concerns regarding the proximity of existing and potential power plants to Killingly. It's easy to imagine that these plants are collectively contributing to a decline in Killingly's air quality but, in fact, the exact opposite is true. Years of air quality data clearly demonstrate that the presence of these new, more efficient natural gas plants has contributed to continuous improvements in air quality in Killingly and the broader region. In fact, within a 100-mile radius of Killingly, over 4500 MW (seven power plants) of coal and oil generation are retiring, or at risk of retirement, thanks to cleaner, more efficient power generation sources in the region.

As each new gas-fired combined cycle plant begins operation, older oil and coal plants with higher emission levels run less frequently, creating incremental improvements in Killingly's air quality.

What's more, Killingly is not unique in the number and proximity of power plants in its immediate vicinity. Various communities throughout southern New England show similar counts of power generation units. According to Richard Pirelli, the director of planning and standards at the CT Borough of Air Management (within DEEP), the reality is that over 90% of Connecticut air pollution comes from out-of-state, from upwind coal- and oil-burning power plants in the Midwest and South, as well as mobile emissions (cars). By contrast, KEC will contribute to emissions decreases by displacing 1.5 million tons of CO2 (equivalent to planting over 35 million trees or taking over 50,000 cars off the road for five years), 3,500 tons of NOx and 1,900 tons of SO2 during the first five years of operation alone.

All of KEC's air modeling results – both single source and cumulative – demonstrate that KEC will meet all ambient air quality standards at all times and in every location in Killingly and beyond.

Will KEC protect local air quality standards?

KEC will be among the cleanest, most efficient natural gas power generation facilities in North America, utilizing state-of-the-art electric generation technology that will allow it to operate 25% more efficiently than the average electric generator in Connecticut. This means KEC will displace the operation of older, higher-emitting oil and coal-fired plants that would otherwise be needed to meet regional energy demand, helping improve overall air quality in Connecticut and New England.

Our air quality analysis was completed following Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) and United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) guidelines. The analysis is based on worst case scenario assumptions. Put another way, the analysis intentionally overstates the project's potential impacts to ensure protection of air quality. Even with these worst-case assumptions, KEC's modeled impacts are well within all applicable ambient air quality standards that have been established to protect even the most sensitive individuals.

KEC will use a continuous air emissions monitoring system which measures and records emission levels to confirm and demonstrate our ongoing compliance with all federal and state emission standards and programs. This data is reported regularly to the DEEP and is available to the public.

What is the "significant impact area" and what does it mean?

The "significant impact area" is a technical designation used by DEEP and the USEPA to determine the scope of our required air permit modeling analysis. It does <u>not</u> represent an area that will be subject to any air quality standard exceedances. All of KEC's air modeling results – both single source and cumulative – demonstrate that KEC will meet all ambient air quality standards at all times and in every location in Killingly and beyond.

Why do we need more power plants?

Over 30% -- or more than 10,000 megawatts -- of regional electricity generation could be gone by 2020 due to planned and likely facility retirements. That includes 401 megawatts of coal generation and 1,772 megawatts of oil-fired generation in Connecticut alone. So while electricity demand may increase slightly or remain flat, more generation is needed to fill the void left by the retiring coal and oil facilities. Connecticut's Integrated Resource Plan calls for reliable, clean and cost-effective electric resources, including natural gas powered generation, to ensure Connecticut has sufficient capacity to meet demand, and Killingly Energy Center provides this clean, cost-effective capacity.

V. Water

How much water will KEC use? Where will it come from? What impact will it have on Alexander's Lake and the surrounding watershed?

Because KEC will utilize air-cooled technology, water needs are reduced by 95% when compared to water-cooled facilities. KEC's average water use will be up to 50,000-100,000 gallons per day. In the rare event that natural gas is not available and KEC must operate on ultra-low sulfur distillate in order to maintain grid reliability, water requirements would be up to 400,000 gallons per day. We expect this would occur only for several hours on the order of once every 2-3 years based on historical precedents. By comparison, it takes about 312,000 gallons to water a golf course each day, 360,000 gallons to cool a data center for a day and 540,000 gallons per day to make six inches of snow at a ski resort.

The limited water needs of KEC will be provided by CT Water using their existing resources without any additional use of the Killingly Industrial Park well. CT Water's system has the capacity to sustainably provide up to 400,000 gallons per day to KEC. KEC may facilitate a connection to adjacent CT Water infrastructure, creating enhanced supply for the Killingly area.

KEC will not impact the water quality or quantity of Alexander's Lake. As stated above, CT Water will meet the KEC demand from existing infrastructure and wells that are hydrogeologically separated from Alexander's Lake and without any additional use of the industrial park well.



How will stormwater be controlled on the site and discharged to the environment?

NTE has closely examined existing and proposed surface and subsurface conditions at the site in order to identify and mitigate any potential impacts to the quality of stormwater discharges.

The project's stormwater design integrates all required mitigation measures, consistent with the Town of Killingly Inland Wetlands & Watercourses Regulations and the 2004 Connecticut Stormwater Quality Manual. These measures - as well as significant erosion and sediment control measures to be implemented during site preparation and construction - have been designed to protect existing earth resources, minimize the area of disturbed land, maximize infiltration, preserve water quality, and control drainage and runoff flowing onto, within and from the site.

Following construction of KEC, the final grading plan will be implemented and the installation of the permanent stormwater management system will be completed. The final stormwater management system will minimize the release and suspension of pollutants, effectively and safely remove water from the roadway and other critical areas, and properly treat stormwater before final discharge from the site. Further, consistent with Town of Killingly Inland Wetlands & Watercourses Regulations, KEC will not allow untreated surface drainage into any watercourse or inland wetland.

VI. Natural Gas/ULSD

How will gas from the Algonquin pipeline reach the plant?

There is an existing Yankee Gas lateral from the Algonquin pipeline currently running just west of the project site. No new right-of-way will be developed. Yankee Gas has informed us that they will replace and upgrade the existing, decades-old lateral in order to provide enhanced reliability for all end users and supply natural gas to KEC. The plant lateral will run a short distance within Lake Road from the point it intersects the road to the plant site. It is not anticipated that this upgrade will impact existing landowners or abutters. The Algonquin pipeline is also undergoing its own modernization, ensuring that it has robust capacity and reliability to safely serve homes and businesses throughout Killingly, Connecticut and the region.

Will KEC utilize fracked natural gas?

KEC's natural gas supply will come from the same interstate pipeline that provides natural gas to local homes and businesses. Some of this natural gas comes from shale fields that require hydraulic fracturing, while other sources typically include Canadian and Gulf Coast gas supplies or LNG imported through Boston Harbor. We believe that fracking should be conducted with the highest environmental integrity and oversight to eliminate methane emissions, protect local water supplies and reduce environmental impacts.



How much ultra-low sulfur distillate (ULSD) will KEC store on site?

Although KEC will have the capacity to store up to 1 million gallons of ULSD, in practice, KEC will store only a fraction of that during normal operations. ULSD is only used in the unlikely event that natural gas is temporarily unavailable and the independent grid operator requires KEC to operate to maintain system reliability. Based on historical precedents, we expect this would occur only for short periods on the order of once every 2-3 years. ULSD can be safely stored for years at a time if it is regularly agitated and mixed.

The 1-million-gallon storage capacity provides the region with an operational cushion — basically an insurance policy — to keep KEC running and providing power to the grid in times of gas supply interruptions.

VII. Employment

Will you hire local people to build KEC and work at the plant?

Yes. NTE is committed to hiring local people, service providers and subcontractors during construction and operation of the facility.







Current Site Activities

We've had several teams on the site this month conducting various studies to support permitting and development work. We recently completed a geotechnical study which examines the soil and geology on the site. Over the next several weeks, our ecologists will be on-site to conduct ecological field surveys to identify any sensitive habitats and wildlife. As with all of our studies, we will make reports on this study publically available at the Killingly Public Library and on our project website once completed, expected to be in July.

You may have recently noticed some traffic monitors near the site. In late May, we conducted a traffic study to understand the current traffic volume and patterns in the vicinity of the site. Tim, thank you for this information. I want to make you aware of one issue. The traffic monitoring device that was installed on Lake Rd. appears to be non functional. Both tubes running perpendicular to the roadway have been ripped out of the locations they were installed in. Living only six hundred feet away from the proposed plant location I drive / walk / ride through that portion of Lake Rd. at least several times each day. I can tell you the tubes running across the road were not in their originally installed locations for more than one day. Where the device and tubes were installed is far from an ideal location. Due to the steep gradient of the roadway and the proximity to the sharp curve at the base of the gradient another location should be used for traffic monitoring. I can say with quite a bit of certainty that the location greatly contributed to the demise of the tubes and would most likely happen again if reinstalled in the same location. Also please take into consideration that the location they were installed could create a possible traffic hazard during heavy rain (water building up above the tubes on the incline and also the tubes themselves can create unsafe conditions for vehicles braking while descending the grade).

Jay - Edith Pestana forwarded your e-mail to me and asked me to respond directly to you. Thanks for your inquiry. Please feel free to reach out to me directly with any additional questions.

The sufficiency letter that we received last week from DEEP confirms that we have provided the DEEP with sufficient information for it to process our air permit application. We expect that DEEP will require a number of months to review and process our permit application.

Regarding the clearing of the project site for construction of the proposed power generating facility, we will not and cannot commence until the facility is approved by the Connecticut Siting Council. We expect the processing of our Siting Council application to take a number of months following submission of the application. Some very limited tree clearing may be necessary to support some of our site due diligence activities.

With regard to the on-going due diligence activities on site:

- i. We are currently on-site completing the geotechnical survey. We expect the field work to be completed this week.
- ii. We expect to be on-site later this week to commence the ecological field survey. This survey, as with all of our field studies, will include both parcels.
- iii. Traffic monitoring, necessary for the traffic study, is in place and on-going.

As we mentioned at the May 4, 2016 public information meeting, we will make the studies and reports available for review as soon as they are completed. All information will be available at Killingly Town Hall and on the KEC Project Web Site at www.killinglyenergycenter.com

Thank you for taking the time to reach out regarding the proposed Killingly Energy Center in Killingly, CT with an offer to meet. The last presentations by your company on March 22nd and on May 4th really lacked any substantial information about your project. As you may have heard from your colleagues at NTE, I expressed this concern at both meetings and to the Killingly town officials in a follow up meeting on May 5th. I find your strategy for sharing information somewhat disingenuous and in conflict with the Killingly Energy Center Environmental Justice Plan updated April 14, 2016 ("EJ Plan").

I have reviewed your website regularly for updates on any information regarding the environmental impacts of your project. I checked following the May 4th meeting as Mark Mirabito noted the Technical Report dated May 3rd had appeared on the website and was submitted to the Towns of Killingly, Pomfret and Putnam on the same day as your public presentation. Do you really think same day submission is adequate time to review information so that we can have a meaningful dialogue about how this project will impact our community? You list under Plan Goals and Objectives of the EJ Plan that you "encourage stakeholders to participate at the earliest opportunity in the review of the proposed Project so their input can be considered." This input, it seems to us stakeholders, is a one-way conversation - you listen to our concerns, and then alter your project to address one concern without an understanding of the implications of this modification. For example, your team heard early on that visual impact from Alexander's Lake is a concern - therefore in Ambient Air Quality Analysis (Attachment L) Killingly Energy Center dated May 2016 you note "in order to minimize the visual impact, the HRSG stack height for the Project will be limited to 150 feet." What are the implications of a shorter stack height on pollutant levels within our Significant Impact Area and more importantly - who are you to make this determination? Your attempt to fragment the information and effectively spoon feed it to us is insulting.

I understand from Killingly Town Officials that you are planning two upcoming meetings on July 11th and July 19th. Do you intend to follow this same pattern of dropping information on us on the same day of the meeting? Do you think that one week in the middle of the peak summer

vacation period will be adequate time to review reports, understand the information and be able to ask intelligent questions? At this time, we have yet to receive any documents that were requested at the May 4th meeting and by Edith Pestana, the EJ administrator at DEEP via email to David Groleau dated May 12, 2016 in which she states:

As part of the EJ public outreach process- the applicant is required to provide 'meaningful public participation". There were many questions left unanswered at the May 4, 2016 meeting. Relevant information including facts that are specific to the plant and its operations were not answered such as water use and water discharge, projected air emissions, noise mitigation, traffic patterns, hours of operation, the specific technology to be installed including BACT- All these questions need to answered at the next meeting.

Although you were not at that meeting, I assume you were properly briefed by your team as to the primary issues of concern for our community. I appreciate you contacting me (although not several times) with an offer to meet however my time is valuable and I really do not need to hear again how NTE is a great 'family company' simply because the name of the entity is based on the CEO's children's initials. The canned presentation materials to date simply do not provide us with enough information to understand the effects of this enormous project. This will loom over me and my neighbors and have a significant impact on my health and the enjoyment of my home. Please treat us with the level of respect we deserve as we will have to deal with the consequences of this plant while NTE is off to another community spreading your gift of clean energy.

I hope you take these comments under consideration and please be fair to us in this process. Your company has clearly been considering this location for at least 6 months, more likely much longer. You have at your disposal a very good consulting firm and clearly a tremendous amount of capital to support this project. We have only our own initiative to review this information and understand it. We are hopeful to have support from our Killingly Town officials but we are facing an uphill battle simply due to the promised tax revenue of such a project. This is a great example of why Connecticut needs a strong Environmental Equity Policy and we are grateful to have this mechanism and the support of dedicated public officials like Edith Pestana.
