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LO	CHAIRMAN ROBIN STEIN: I'd like to call to					
L1	order this meeting of the Connecticut Siting Council					
L2	today, Thursday, January 17th at 7:00 p.m.					
L3	My name is Robin Stein and I'm Chairman					
L 4	of the Siting Council. Other members of the Council					
L5	present are Mr. Hannon, who is the designee from the					
L 6	Department of Energy and Environmental Protection no					
L7	Larry					
L8	A VOICE: Larry is not well					
L 9	CHAIRMAN STEIN: Director Caron from					
20	the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority; Mr. Ashton;					
21	Senator Murphy; Dr. Bell; and Mr. Wilensky.					
22	Member of the staff present are Linda					
23	Roberts, Executive Director; Melanie Bachman, Staff					
24	Attorney; and Robert Mercier, Siting Analyst. Gail					

1 Gregoriades the court reporter and Aaron DeMarest the 2 audio technician. This is a continuation of the public 3 4 hearing that began at 3:00 p.m. this afternoon. Copies 5 of the hearing program and the Council's Citizen Guide to 6 Siting Council Procedures are available in the rear for 7 those of you of the public. 8 This meeting is held pursuant to Title 16 9 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform 10 Administrative Procedure Act upon an Application from 11 United Illuminating Company for a Certificate of 12 Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the construction, maintenance, and operation of a 115-13.8 13 14 kilovolt substation located at 14 Old Stratford Road in 15 Shelton, Connecticut. The application was received by 16 the Council on October 3, 2012. 17 The Applicant published notices of the 18 filing of the application in the Connecticut Post on 19 September 21 and 23, 2012. The Council's legal notice of 20 the date and time of hearing was published in the 21 Connecticut Post on December 18th of 2012. And upon this 22 Council's request, the Applicant erected a sign at the 23 proposed site so as to inform the public of the 24 application.

1	This afternoon members of the Council,
2	staff, and public personally conducted a field review of
3	the proposed site.
4	This hearing session tonight is reserved
5	for the public to make short statements into the record.
6	These statements are not subject to questions from the
7	parties or the Council, and members of the public making
8	statements may not ask questions of the parties or
9	Council. Excuse me.
10	A sign-up sheet is available for those who
11	wish to who would like to participate. I thought my
12	cold would hold off. Apparently it's not.
13	And I also want to note that for those or
14	your friends who are not able to be here with us, they
15	have 30 days from now to make written statements, which
16	will be considered by the Council.
17	We ask each person making a public
18	statement to confine his or her statements to the subject
19	matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable
20	repetition so we may hear all of your concerns.
21	A verbatim transcript will be made of this
22	hearing and deposited at the Shelton City Clerk's Office
23	for the convenience of the public.
24	We will now call or I'll call from the

- 1 list for those to make -- who wish to make statements. 2 The first one on the list -- and I'm not sure I can read 3 your last name -- Tom -- is it Harbinson? From the Conservation Commission. And please come up to the 5 microphone and spell your name for the --6 MR. THOMAS HARBINSON: Not a problem. 7 Thomas Harbinson. That's H-a-r, b as in boy, i-n-s-o-n. My address is 15 Soundcrest Drive in Shelton, and I am 8 9 Chairman of the Conservation Commission of the City of 10 Shelton. 11 I believe you have correspondence from us 12 as a commission regarding the application or the proposed substation. And I would just reiterate the comments on 13 14 The Far Mill River is the primary important aspect to the site for us on the Conservation Commission. We've 15 16 spent a lot of time throughout our community identifying 17 greenway corridors that are precious to our community, 18 and the Far Mill River is one of those greenway
- 21 other means and allow passive recreational opportunities,

corridors. And our greenway corridors we look to acquire

open space or preserve open space through easements and

- such as fishing or hiking. And this parcel would be a
- 23 key opportunity for the continuity of those kind of

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24 endeavors throughout that corridor. We have a goal to

1	have a hiking trail, similar to a Blue Dot Trail that you
2	see throughout the State of Connecticut, namely the
3	Paugussett Trail in this area, that would go from the
4	Indian Wells State Park area all the way to the Roosevelt
5	Forest area of Stratford, and trying to keep in our
6	greenway corridors where we have a continuity of open
7	space and a natural landscape for the passive
8	recreational opportunities to enjoy that kind of
9	atmosphere. So I would encourage for the site
10	development, whatever maybe perhaps a pedestrian
11	easement or a fee or an in fee property dedicated to
12	the city or a land trust type entity so that the
13	preservation of the river corridor could continue in
14	perpetuity for the enjoyment of the citizenry.
15	Other than that, I also served on the
16	committee that prepared the city's plan of conservation
17	and development a few years back and the future land use
18	plan that was part of that. And this is a gateway to our
19	community as a lot of out-of-towners come to that
20	commercial corridor off of Route 8. And so aesthetically
21	the presentation of the property obviously this is
22	needed and necessary as determined through engineering
23	aspects of United Illuminating for the electric
24	infrastructure of not only Shelton but the region, but

1	rather than an industrial look, if it could be tempered
2	somewhat or buffered somewhat so that the presentation
3	for the first time person coming off the highway and into
4	our community is enjoyable or presentable a little bit
5	more presentable. Thank you very much.
6	CHAIRMAN STEIN: Thank you. The next
7	person on the list is Terrance Gallagher.
8	MR. TERRANCE GALLAGHER: Good evening.
9	That's Terrance Gallagher, G-a-l-l-a-g-h-e-r, 43 Judson
10	Street, and I'm a member of the city's Trails Committee.
11	As Tom mentioned, Shelton has had a long-
12	range project to extend pedestrian and fisherman access
13	along the Far Mill River Greenway in this area. We work
14	closely with Trout Unlimited, the Shelton Land
15	Conservation Trust, various business groups, the city's
16	Anti-Litter Committee to help clean up this stretch of
17	the river and pick up garbage every spring. One of our
18	long-range plans as Tom mentioned is to extend the
19	Paugussett Trail from where it is in Monroe and Indian
20	Wells State Park in Shelton south to Stratford, and we've
21	been working on that diligently the last several years.
22	We've gotten lots of turnout from Boy Scouts and
23	volunteers. We've spent probably hundreds, if not
24	thousands of man hours clearing this out. And we're

we are gradually working our way down from Buddington
Road through other properties that will come out to the
Far Mill Greenway on the other side of Bridgeport Avenue
from this one, and gradually work their way south. The
city has open space at Far Mill Crossing, they've gotten
open space from Cinto Development, they've gotten open
space from Health Net, it abuts large open space from
Stratford and the City of Shelton further downstream.
The nice thing about this side of the river is you can
actually get underneath Route 8 on this side of the
river. So whether this parcel is developed as a hotel or
a factory or substation, the city will be trying to get
something there for a conservation easement along the
stream banks.

When the Lord factory was there, they dumped a lot of concrete along the bank and they put a chain-link fence with barbwire right at the very top of the bank. If that chain-link fence were moved back to the edge of the traveled way where there's an asphalt path now and those existing native trees were kept, and maybe some of the invasive species were removed, maybe some of the old concrete was taken out, or we often get requests from Eagle Scouts to do volunteer projects in town, and just to get permission that we could go in

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there in the future and clean some of that up, that would be fine. Just so there's maybe a 15 or 20 foot access way along the top of the bank. And if by some reason UI wanted to do some of that work themselves as part of

4 wanted to do some of that work themserves as part of

5 their pad prep work and maybe take out some of the

6 concrete and invasive species, that would be wonderful,

7 but we're not even asking for that.

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So I have two pictures of what it shows like with a natural stream bank on left hand side of the river at Wells Hollow Farm and one of what it looks like with a chain-link fence where I'm talking about moving it back. So I'll just hand this in -- (pause) -- that's it. Thank you again.

14 CHAIRMAN STEIN: Thank you. Gil Pastore.

15 MS. GIL PASTORE: Gil Pastore, 150 Yutaka

16 Trail. G-i-l. The last name is P-a-s-t-o-r-e.

Pretty much -- Tom Harbinson covered

pretty much everything that I was looking at for

19 conservation easements along the Far Mill River.

One thing I want to bring to everybody's attention is -- I was not here for the 4:00 o'clock demonstration or whatever presentation UI submitted this afternoon -- but one of my main concerns is people coming into Shelton off of Route 8 southbound, this is going to

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1 be their first -- this will be basically their first idea 2 of what Shelton looks like. And aesthetically-wise, I 3 would like to see as much as possible it make this -this whole development look not as much as a commercial substation as possible, if -- if that is possible. 5 reason why is naturally as you come into town your first 6 7 impression is what this town is like. And you get off 8 the highway and you see this massive substation right at 9 the bottom of the exit and your first impression is that the entire town is like that, that it's like a commercial 10 11 industrial type town. And that's not what we're really 12 about. We'd really like to see something that blends in more with the environment and make Shelton look like a 13 14 decent place and not an industrial wasteland. 15

One of my main concerns is -- on the power substation is the noise being generated by it. Is there -- I wasn't here for the presentation, so I -- my main concern is is there any type of noise through either -- the transformers or whatever equipment is running there is there any type of noise? And if -- if possible to put in any type of barriers that will cancel or subdue that noise so that it's reasonable for the neighbors in that general area. Thank you.

24 CHAIRMAN STEIN: Thank you. Ruth -- is it

2	MS. RUTH PARKINS: Yes. Good evening.					
3	Ruth Parkins, 21 Meadow Lake Drive. I'm the Chairwoman					
4	of the Planning and Zoning Commission. My remarks will					
5	be very brief. I do appreciate the opportunity to speak					
6	before you.					
7	Although we do recognize there is a need					
8	to site facilities such as this, from a planning					
9	perspective this is not an ideal location to site the					
10	facility. As was mentioned before the area is the					
11	gateway to our corporate community, and there's ongoing					
12	consideration always being given to future development in					
13	that area. There's quite a bit of still undeveloped					
14	land.					
15	As we were not consulted for approval					
16	naturally prior to the acquisition of this property, we					
17	do ask that consideration be given to substantial					
18	screening and a commitment for ongoing maintenance of the					
19	facility. We'd prefer that it not become blighted and					
20	overgrown. And we would also offer consultation with our					
21	planting experts to plant the kind of trees and shrubs					
22	that we believe would be best in that location. Thank					
23	you.					

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CHAIRMAN STEIN: Thank you. That's the

1	last person I have on the list. Is there anybody else					
2	who wishes to speak? If not, before I close the hearing,					
3	there are some representatives from the Applicant here					
4	present and also after we close, for those who wish,					
5	they're all primed to give they can give a brief					
6	presentation of the of the proposed facility, which					
7	will probably be helpful.					
8	COURT REPORTER: One moment please.					
9	(pause - tape change)					
10	CHAIRMAN STEIN: We have three issues that					
11	were raised and maybe somebody, Attorney McDermott, from					
12	your team could answer one which was I don't believe					
13	raised this afternoon, but I know you have material, and					
14	that is the issue of noise and the amount of noise					
15	that would be produced and how you plan to deal with					
16	that. Is there somebody from your team who could respond					
17	to that?					
18	MR. BRUCE MCDERMOTT: Mr. Eves and Mr.					
19	Lewis can tag team on that					
20	COURT REPORTER: A microphone please.					
21	(pause)					
22	MR. CHUCK EVES: Good evening. For the					
23	record Chuck Eves. As part of our application we					
24	submitted a noise study. We had three receptors that we					

placed in various locations around the residences that surround the substation. And in general the results of that noise study was that there would be no perceptible increase in the noise volume based upon the ambient level of noise generated from Route 8 by the implementation of our substation.

CHAIRMAN STEIN: Okay. There was also a question related to any proposed screening and also the fence -- the issue of the fence that was raised.

MR. EVES: Initially during the discussion earlier this afternoon, we discussed the fence along the Far Mill River. In our application -- and I referenced this earlier, but I'll reference it again for members of the public that are here -- in our application there is a drawing set and there's a Drawing XXXX-001 that was submitted, and that -- that illustrates the fence that will be removed along the site and the fence that will remain. There is a remediation area along the edge of the site that abuts the exit ramp from Route 8 and extends maybe a third of the way into the site that we need to maintain the fencing to keep people out of the remediation area. So that fence maybe a third of the way along the Far Mill River along the site would remain.

1 the paved area is, presenting a pretty wide area for 2 anglers and other people to access the river. So as far 3 as the question around the fence, that is what would remain. We would remove the fence that's very close to 5 the river that exists today maybe two-thirds of the way, extending down the property. 6 As far as screening, UI's base standard 7 for screening is to install the substation with a chain-8 9 link fence surrounding the substation. If -- if the 10 Council was so inclined, UI would consider screening 11 along the areas, and we would work with the City to 12 determine what types of plantings would be applicable there. One of our concerns obviously would be the CL&P 13 14 right-of-way, we would need to plant plantings that would 15 not interfere with the transmission lines along that --16 along that corridor. But the company would most 17 certainly be open to those discussions. 18 CHAIRMAN STEIN: So an indirect question, 19 when did UI purchase the property? Do you have that 20 information? MR. EVES: It was 2009. 21 22 CHAIRMAN STEIN: Finally, Attorney 23 McDermott, do you have any closing statement that you 24 wish to --

1	MR. MCDERMOTT: I was thrown off a little
2	bit by the question. Are you asking for the
3	presentation? We also have there was a mention
4	Attorney Bachman, we have an answer to Dr. Bell's
5	question regarding
6	CHAIRMAN STEIN: This would be the

10	MR. MCDERMOTT: Okay. Mr. Eves, I believe

14	known to the Council, may file written statements to the					
15	Council within 30 days of today.					
16	The Council will then issue draft findings					
17	of fact. And thereafter, parties and intervenors may					
18	identify any errors or inconsistencies between the					
19	Council's draft findings of fact and the record.					
20	Again to repeat, copies of the transcript					
21	will be filed at the Shelton City Clerk's Office.					
22	And I hereby declare the hearing					
23	adjourned. Again there will be a presentation for those					
24	who want to stay. I thank you all for your
