THE CHAIRMAN: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. I'd like to call to order this meeting of the Connecticut Siting Council today, Tuesday, June 2, 2015, at approximately 7:05 p.m. My name is Robin Stein. I'm chairman of the Siting Council. Other members of the Council present are Senator Murphy, Vice Chairman; Mr. Hannon, who's designee from the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection; Mr. Levesque, designee from the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority; Mr. Ashton and Mr. Lynch. Members of the staff present are our Executive Director, Staff Attorney, Melanie Bachman; and Robert Mercier, our siting analyst.

This is a continuation of a
hearing that began at 3 p.m. this afternoon. Copies of the hearing program and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council Procedures are available for members of the public. They are available here to my right on the table. Also, there's a sign-up list there in addition.

This hearing is held pursuant to
the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon an application from Florida Tower Partners LLC d/b/a North Atlantic Towers for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the construction, maintenance and operation of a telecommunications facility at one of two locations at 62-64 Codfish Hill Road in Bethel, Connecticut. This application was received by the Council on March 19, 2015.

This application is also governed by the Telecommunications Act of 1996, which is administered by the Federal

Communications Commission. This Act prohibits this Council from considering the health effects of radio frequency emissions on human health and wildlife to the extent the emissions from towers are within the federal acceptable safe limits standard, which standard is also followed by the State Department of Public Health. The Federal Act also prohibits this Council from discriminating between and amongst providers
of functionally equivalent services. This means that if one carrier already provides service for the area, other carriers have the right to compete and provide service in the same area.

The applicant published notice of the filing of the application to the Council in the News Times on March 4 and 5, 2015. The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this hearing was published in the News Times on April 21, 2015.

Upon this Council's request, the applicant erected a sign on the property so as to inform the public of the name of the applicant, the type of facility, hearing date and location, and contact information for the Council. This afternoon members of the Council, staff and public personally conducted a field review of both sites in order to observe firsthand the potential effects of the proposal.

This hearing session tonight has been reserved first for the public to make short statements into the record. These public statements are not subject to
questions from the parties or the Council, and members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council. These statements will become part of the record for Council consideration.

As I mentioned before, there's a sign-up sheet available on that table to my right.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council staff upon the merits of this application is prohibited by law.

I wish to note that parties and intervenors, including their representatives and witnesses, are not allowed to participate in the public comment session. I'd also wish to note for those who are here and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for the public comment session that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof, and such written statements will be given the same weight as if spoken at the hearing.

We ask each person making a public statement in the proceedings to confine his or her statements to subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all of your concerns that you and your neighbors may have. Please be advised the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal. A verbatim transcript will be made of the hearing and deposited at the Bethel Town Clerk's Office for the convenience of the public.

Since we have a large group of people, in fairness to everybody, we're going to limit public statements to three minutes. We have a stop-clock mechanism which will begin to count down from three minutes, and when your time limit has expired, the tone will sound.

Before I call on members of the public to make statements, I'd like to request that the applicant make a very brief presentation to the public describing the facility and why it's necessary and what alternatives were investigated.

CARLO F. CENTORE, having been previously duly sworn, testified further on his oath as follows:

THE WITNESS (Centore): Good
evening, my name is Carlo Centore, and I'm a civil structural engineer with Centek

Engineering. Our responsibility on this project is the actual design of the infrastructure required for the communication facility.

What's being proposed this
evening at 62-64 Codfish Hill Road is a wireless communication facility. First, I'll explain the two facilities that are being proposed -- there are two options -and then the commonalities between both sites in terms of what's required for a wireless communication facility.

Site No. 1 is located on the easterly portion of this 50-acre parcel, and there's about 1,700 feet of road off of Codfish Road. It's utilizing the existing driveway and an existing dirt road that is going to be improved to be able to locate
the site here.
Option 2 takes that same tower site but more centrally locates it within that 50-acre parcel. That cuts down the road to about 860 feet.

A VOICE: Option 3. No.
THE WITNESS (Centore): I'd appreciate it if I can finish my presentation and then you guys can chime in.
$A$ VOICE: We don't want to hear it. No.

THE CHAIRMAN: ExCuse me, we'd like to hear from everybody and wait your turn.

THE AUDIENCE: No. No. No. No.
THE CHAIRMAN: We're going to have to clear the building. We won't be able to hold the hearing. Be courteous for a few minutes and let the gentleman finish his presentation, and then we'll take the people from the list. And we hope everybody will be courteous and respectful. Thank you.

THE WITNESS (Centore): The two options both propose a monopole-type
structure. Site No. 1 is a 150-foot steel monopole. Its grade elevation is about 30 feet higher than the Option No. 2 location or Site No. 2 location, and that particular tower is a 170-foot monopole. The overall height of the taller tower above mean sea level is actually 10 feet lower than the tower at option or Site No. 1.

The site that North Atlantic Towers is proposing to build here is a multi-carrier communication facility. What that means is that it's going to be designed with a 75-by-75-foot fenced in area at the base of the pole that can accommodate at this point four carriers and possibly a fifth. They are currently working and have applicants of AT\&T and Verizon Wireless to co-locate on this tower. The tower itself is designed to handle the antennas of four carriers. The first position would be AT\&T, the second position would be Verizon, and future expansion for two other carriers below that. Typical separation on the tower is 10 feet between each carrier. You'll see anywhere
from 12 to 15 antennas at each level on a typical installation.

A VOICE: Excuse me, sir, can I interrupt? Can you speak closer to the microphone?

THE WITNESS (Centore): Sure.
At the base of the facility are the equipment shelters. Within those shelters are the radio equipment that's utilized for transmitting the cell phone signal from the antenna out to the telephone system or to fiber lines on land. At the entrance of the facility there are utilities which consist of power and telephone. There's no water typically required at these types of sites. The access drive along with the compound area is gravel surfaced. It has an 8-foot chain-link fence around the base of the site to protect it. Both designs incorporate the various measures for drainage control to maintain the flow of water to its current design.

A VOICE: We can't hear.
THE WITNESS (Centore): Okay,
I'll try my best to speak closer to the
microphone.
I'll just summarize. What's being proposed here by North Atlantic Towers are two facilities of which one will be hopefully selected for a tower site. Both have the same design type. It's a monopole steel structure, varying heights. One is 150, one is 170 feet. Both have a 75-by-75 fenced-in compound area which is constructed of gravel surfacing. There's shelters that are located at the ground. Those shelters that house the equipment are AT\&T's is 12 by 16 and Verizon's is 12 by 26. That's the footprint of their equipment shelter. The access road is gravel surfaced. The utilities are run underground from the street all the way up to the site, depending on which side will govern the length of that utility run. The basic installation is pretty straightforward from that point.

I'll turn it over to the Council.
THE CHAIRMAN: Yes. Thank you.
I would first like to hear from
the First Selectman, Matt Knickerbocker.
MATTHEW KNICKERBOCKER: Good
evening, Chairman Stein, and members of the Commission. And I'm late. And let me be not the first, but welcome to Bethel. And I understand that you had a nice dinner in one of our restaurants, and we thank you for visiting our town and supporting our businesses.

I'm also aware that you had the opportunity to do a site walk today. It's unfortunate that the weather wasn't more conducive, but I'm sure you noticed that the area in question is a beautiful, bucolic scenic area. I mention this because it is one of the last wide open spaces, not only in our town, but it's the type of area that's disappearing from Western Connecticut in general as the population increases and development proceeds forward.

So you can see that there's a great deal of passion in the room tonight on behalf of people who wish to preserve that property as it is. It is a link to Bethel's historic farming past. It is the reason that the people gathered here today, purchased homes and purchased property in
that area, and for that reason I stand before you this evening to speak on their behalf and respectfully request that the Commission deny the applicant's request. Thank you.

Let me add that the letter I received from the Council in March invited me to propose alternative locations. And I just want the Council to know that I took that charge very seriously. I gave that a great deal of thought. I ultimately rejected proposing alternate locations because in my view that just moved the problem from one location to another, and from your perspective it would simply replace this roomful of people with a different roomful of people and maybe a different mayor or different first selectman. I'm aware that in this age right now there are already technologies emerging that within a very short time could make cell towers, traditional cell towers, absolute. So for that reason, again, I respectfully request that the applicant be denied and to explore those technologies in
the future. And again, thank you for your time.

THE CHAIRMAN: The next speaker
is Selectman Paul Szatkowski.
PAUL SZATKOWSKI: Thank YOu,
Chairman Stein. I'm Paul Szatkowski, Selectman here in Bethel. I reside at 24 Winthrop Road.

You know, I'm completely in agreement with this group right here. Let me tell you the reason why I came here tonight. Government should be, and is nothing but of the people, for the people, by the people. And I look around here tonight and I see the message very well.

A VOICE: What's the message?
THE AUDIENCE: No. No.
MR. SZATKOWSKI: However, let me just tell you living up on Winthrop Road we have a cell tower, and what happened we all got together and said no too. And I would like this Siting Council to consider what these people are requesting. Our request is denied, but you know what, we are a people here. We are living in our town. We should
decide what government should be and what government should impose upon us. We don't want it. I'd like you to seriously consider and look at this crowd, what they're saying. They're saying no. There are other technologies, as Matt had said earlier. Let's not rush into this and spoil the futures of Connecticut, especially when we have such a pristine area. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: I'm now going to start with the list.

A couple of things in addition to please keep your comments concise and within the three-minute limit. When you come up, please spell out your name, because we have a stenographer, and we want to be sure we get it, and give your address. I'm going to apologize for probably mispronouncing a number of your names. I'll do the best I can. Some of you have printed very nicely; some it will be a challenge, but we'll do our best.

And also, $I$ would encourage you to refrain from manifestations. You can waive your signs all you want but, you know,
lengthy applause is just going to prolong the hearing and may force us not -- or not enable us to hear everybody. So I would really encourage you, and also obviously to be courteous just in case there happens to be someone who wants to speak and doesn't represent your views.

Okay. The first individual on the list is Vince DiGrandi.

VINCE DIGRANDI: Chairman, I want
to apologize ahead of time as well. I didn't know we were under a three-minute time frame. And I'm always a tad verbose, but I'll talk pretty fast.

My name is Vince DiGrandi. I
reside at 5 Twin Maple Drive in Bethel.
I've been there for 15 years. First let me take this moment to thank the great people of Bethel who have turned out here tonight in droves to make a statement. Amongst us are mothers, fathers, husbands, wives, entire families, and most of all my neighbors who have galvanized for one cause with one mission.

For the record, all those opposed
to the cell phone tower just please hold up your sign.

Let the record show that, as far as I can tell, that's the entire audience.

I also realize that the
Connecticut Siting Council does not have an easy job, and you must balance the corporate desires versus the local neighborhood desires.

When I first heard about the proposal for a cell phone tower on Codfish Hill I scratched my head. I couldn't understand the need, as cell service in my house and at my neighbors' homes is excellent. Then $I$ attended the initial meeting with AT\&T and North Atlantic Towers back in December of 2013 and discovered there was more to the proposal than first stated. I did my research, and come to find out that the Codfish Hill site is an alternative site to the Dodgingtown Tower whose lessee backed out mainly due to its proximity to a school. An aggressive campaign on behalf of a Florida-based company, North Atlantic Towers, a tower
speculator, led to the 62-64 Codfish Hill Road after many many reviews by other neighbors in the area.

More research, and I find out there is a Connecticut Siting Council which exists truly in only one other state in the entire nation, which has in effect removed local control of this process. The Siting Council is responsible to approve these telecommunications towers as long as the basic guidelines are followed. Citizens are not even allowed to argue based on health-related issues, as a 20-year-old 1996 Federal Telecommunications Act saw to that. Ironic, I say, as the owner of the land, Stone, is a nurse by trade.

As I continue to unpeel the
layers to this process, more and more became clear. Multi-billion-dollar corporation desires are once again being put ahead of local citizen needs. AT\&T is a company with 1.34 billion dollars in revenue last year alone. It would make it approximately the 80th largest country in the world by revenue. They must have a need for this
tower because cell towers do not belong in residential neighborhoods.

From AT\&T's own salespeople, there is no need. At the AT\&T store in Danbury a neighbor of mine was told there is excellent 4G coverage all over Codfish Hill currently. Even by their own coverage maps on their own web site, AT\&T's coverage is excellent, but AT\&T markets their 4G as the "best in the business." So either AT\&T is lying or AT\&T does not need a tower to provide coverage. What this really is, to be crystal clear, is a need based on their own definition of coverage. Ironically the same story was given to us at the Verizon store in Bethel.

So I ask again is there a need
for this tower? By all accounts, the residents in this area have good service, and there are no dropped calls. I would be interested in the 911 dropped call data from the town and ask that that be publicized.

AT\&T's own web site states that "fast, secure and mobile connectivity to everything on the internet, everywhere at every moment
and on every device, is what drives us at AT\&T." That, and I'm sure a little thing called profit. "It is why we build wireless networks engineered to handle massive volumes, and the more capacity and speed we build into our networks, the more intensively our customers use them. Today our customers are taking advantage of these networks streaming video to all their devices at unprecedented levels. In fact, today more than 50 percent of our network traffic is video. All of this is changing how people live." No kidding. The byproduct is also cell towers in residential neighborhoods. Cell towers do not belong in residential neighborhoods.

AT\&T's need to provide video streaming apparently trumps the need of my neighbors not to have a 170-foot monstrosity destroy the neighborhood we call home. I would argue that my neighbors and I get lower property values. Cell towers are a real estate negative effect. You know it, and I know it.

THE CHAIRMAN: ExCuse me, are you
about finished?
MR. DIGRANDI: Almost finished, yes.

THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Please.
MR. DIGRANDI: I would hope that the 15 years in this town bringing up a family would allow me a little bit more time than three minutes.

However, I chose not to purchase a house near power lines, and in this instance $I$ have no choice. The choice is being made for me. As a matter of fact, our town selectman, Mr. Nickerbocker, was called by several realtors because the new cell towers in Bethel neighborhood signs were being blamed for no traffic at our open houses as they are scaring people away.

I was asked to share an e-mail that Michael sent to me unable to be here tonight.
"I came across your web site as I was investigating a property for sale at 25 Codfish Hill. Do not believe property values are not affected by cell towers. We will not even be considering purchasing the
property due to the proposed cell tower.
"I will be out of town for your public meeting, but feel free to include my e-mail in your submissions."

Houses will sell for less, and they will be on the market longer negatively impacting lives, my family's lives, my life, and the lives of my neighbors. I am sure creative thinkers could figure out a much better way to develop revenue for 49 acres in this town. Forgive me if $I$ sound angry or frustrated, but when a lopsided system is put in place that removes all local control from what should be a local decision, well, we have a serious problem. Ironically the owner of Codfish Hill is employed as a nurse, yet we can't argue about health-related issues that cell phone towers may have. I can't imagine with over 205,000 cell towers in the U.S. that we don't also have a group that is responsible to ensure that the emission levels are what they are supposed to be. Who from the Federal or State Government is responsible for monthly, bimonthly, quarterly or even
yearly EMF testing to ensure that the levels stated in the proposal are the levels actually being adhered to. Please don't tell me that we entrust the cell tower cell phone companies to police themselves. We see how well corporate oversight and ethics work in our banking industry.

When AT\&T says their need requirements will have to move to the newer 5G, how will that change the emissions from the tower? What's the consequence of AT\&T's disregard for RF levels if they're even checked?

For those of you not from Bethel, let me tell you a little bit about our great town. We have been referred to as a quaint small town USA. Many people know us for our awesome downtown shops. We have great schools. We have great hardworking citizens. Many of our children are members of Girl Scouts or Boy Scouts. In a recent article our town selectman has stated that this area of Bethel is a very pastoral site, undisturbed, peaceful, quiet. The neighbors are adamant that they want to maintain that
character. Many of us move to Bethel for these settings and these neighborhoods. Last paragraph. It's a little long. Fight, yes we've tried, but we are not using rocks and a sling, as David did versus Goliath. Again, we are up against a company whose consolidated revenues total $\$ 132$ billion. As a matter of fact, they are the second largest donor in the United States political campaigns, and during the period of 1998 to 2010, AT\&T expended $\$ 130$ million on lobbying in the United States alone.

I would ask that the members of the Siting Council ponder the minimum height requirements for these carriers to accomplish their coverage issues or for a stealth-like design of some sort, pine tree, white monopole tower. But simply I say this: Cell phone towers do not belong in residential neighborhoods. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Art Gow.
ARTHUR GOW: I'm Arthur Gow,
Ph.D. I'm an 11-and-a-half-year resident of 58 Codfish Hill Road, just two doors down
from where the proposed site is. I'm professor of chemical engineering and physical chemistry at the University of New Haven. I've been there 25 years. I have two six-year-old sons, so I'm probably planning on staying around there for a while.

I picked this town to move to 11 and a half years ago with my wife Sherry to raise a family, and obviously we're well on our way to that. But I've obviously, being a technically literate person, have some serious concerns about having a cell tower located 1,300 feet, if it's Site No. 2, and about 1,650 feet $I$ guess or so from my house if it's Site No. 1.

I came prepared with questions for the gentleman that gave the technical presentation. I don't know if that's allowed or not.

## Is that allowed?

THE CHAIRMAN: I think I already -- I told you this is to hear from you. This is not a question and answer --

MR. GOW: Okay. So I'm not
allowed to see if he knows the answers to some of the more important calculations?

THE CHAIRMAN: If you want to submit things in writing, you are certainly free to do that.

MR. GOW: I just thought I'd ask to see his knowledge of it.

THE CHAIRMAN: I'm trying to keep everybody to a few minutes, so let's --

MR. GOW: I did some
calculations. You know, I'm referring to Exhibit K. Are you familiar with Exhibit K?

THE CHAIRMAN: I told you, sir,
you can talk, you know, if you have some statement to make --

MR. GOW: I understand. I didn't
know when I came here. I thought that I would be able to cross-examine the --

THE CHAIRMAN: Look behind you.
You think if everybody is going to cross-examine, we'll be here --

MR. GOW: I have very brief questions. But anyway, I understand. I understand.

So I did the calculation. I used
the formula in the 1997 FCC OET Bulletin 65, okay. It's a very simple formula, an R-squared formula for electromagnetic radiation, which is well-known. And I did the worst-case calculations, of course, from the two sites to my house, and I got this very perplexing minuscule number for the power flux, the milliwatts per centimeter squared.

So, what I'm seeing here, it's okay, if I go out with a meter basically what I'm going to measure after this tower gets constructed and operated, is what I measure this morning in my yard. And I'm in fact going to take measurements, and I'm going to make sure that if anything happens here that -- I don't believe -- I've read a lot of the scientific literature, other studies. It seems like a lot of towers are not in compliance. They're over the limit, the FCC limit, which is kind of strange anyway because it has a range, .2 to 1 milliwatt per centimeter squared. So what is it? Is it . 2 , or is it 1? And there's no calculation in the application of the
specific absorption rate that one might have, and I find that quite perplexing. I just think 1997 Bulletin, I think we need to update that to 2015.

THE CHAIRMAN: Tom Ajello. And again, please spell your name.

THOMAS AJELLO: Hi there, Council Members, fellow residents of Bethel. Thank you so much everyone for coming, and thank you so much for holding this hearing.

My name is Tom Ajello. It's A-J, as in jack, $E-L-L-O$. I apologize, I'm probably one of the people that scribbled my name. I live on 65 Codfish Hill Road in Bethel. My wife, Sally, and I put our entire life savings into a home there a little over two years ago. And we and our three small children moved out of Bridgeport to find ourselves a life in the country, a life that exists a lot like the people and a lot like the town that you see here. And I'm not exactly sure, but I suspect that you don't come across people like us very often, and we're very proud of that.

And as I think back about why we
joined this community, it's because we were overwhelmingly blown away by the fabric of this community. And when we originally were approached by the possibility of this tower, I immediately thought about what my potential super powers are, and one of the things that I'm very -- I think very good at is pulling compassionate passionate
like-minded people together. And so I attempted to do just that. And I wanted to see if I can get some people to support us and to support our cause and to support sending a message to you guys about just how much we love this town and how we don't want the town to change, as you heard Matt Nickerbocker say to you directly.

I just wanted to reach out for some comments, and I got a few. Actually 20 feet of them. I'm not going to bother you with them tonight because I didn't realize we have a timer, but we have quite a timer, and I want to move quickly. But I will offer this to you, and I would ask that you read some of them.

Tonight, like the 2,000 people
who have commented on the document in front of you, and the nearly 1,000 people who have liked our Facebook page and signed the petition, like the 26,000 people, 26,000 people who have liked, commented, shared and engaged in some small way our story, Bethel's story, the story of this tiny small town who loves each other and wants to keep it that way. Excuse me, I'm sorry. And like the 360 residents who took signs and put them in their yards and then brought those signs here tonight, I too have a message, and that message is that there should be no cell towers in family neighborhoods, Bethel or otherwise.

In our very first meeting almost two years ago I remember walking into a well organized and slick presentation, not a lot unlike the one we just saw a moment ago, and what $I$ saw and what we continue to see are these positive thinly-veiled comments about how this is going to be a good thing. Bear with me. I'm going to go longer. And these really positive forward-looking comments are not true. In fact, as I looked on at this
first meeting and people were listening, I was shocked. A roomful of people, mainly abutters very early on, uneducated about the facts -- and I know that you guys only want to talk about facts -- and they were being fed these silver linings from AT\&T reps, and I was furious. And I looked at a woman by the name of Julie Kohler, and I asked her directly to her face if she had kids and would she live under a cell tower herself. The silence was deafening. The answer wasn't yes.

You know who said yes? The AT\&T guy. Shocker. Truth be told, since that night almost two years ago I have yet to hear a positive comment about this tower. These people have yet to hear a positive comment about this tower. Oh, except, you know, the property owner is going to make roughly $\$ 60,000$ a year, or Redding and Newtown might get better service or, truth be told, some people on one side of Codfish Hill might get less dropped calls. That's right, there's about five houses. I've been in a couple of them.

But we've come a long way since two years ago. We've read countless Siting Council proceedings. I bet I've read more of the proceedings and more of the documents than many members of this room have personally. We've met with dozens of experts, we've talked to landowners, we've met with real estate agencies, appraisers, RF engineers, historians, and we've even been e-mailing the CEO of AT\&T directly. And guess what? We've learned a few things. We've learned about ambiguous health risks. We've learned about property value risks. We've learned that Bethel has a great voice; and guess what, we're not asking for better service. We've learned that this tower helps Newtown and Redding more than us, and we've learned about the difference between capacity and coverage. You know what another word for capacity is? Gluttony. The carriers get bandwidth, more simultaneous streams of video. Fantastic.

A capacity argument is not an argument to threaten 100-plus direct families, if not hundreds, if not thousands or hundreds of
children.
I suspect you guys have driven around today. Maybe you drove around the parcel that encapsulates this land. Houses all around it, families all around it. Did you notice the circle and how many homes that the tower threatens? To many families you might say, well, it's a big parcel, and so centrally locating it perhaps on that big parcel is, you know, that seems like a reasonable opportunity, a reasonable solution. Well, the pendulum swings both ways because that giant parcel affects more families than most small parcels that lots of towers sit on today.

So let's talk about risk.
THE CHAIRMAN: Can you wrap it up, please?

MR. AJELLO: I cannot.
THE CHAIRMAN: Because other people I think also want to speak.

MR. AJELLO: I'd like to ask that

if anybody else --
```

A VOICE: I'm next. He can have my three minutes.

MR. AJELLO: Thanks, Steve. I'm told that we cannot mention --

A VOICE: Turn the microphone back on. We want to hear him.

MR. AJELLO: I'd also appreciate the microphone too. Yeah, I think that's pretty rude to lose the microphone. If somebody could please turn that back on? I promise $I$ won't shout. Thank you so much.

I'm told I can't mention health, and I'm told that legally you can't listen. I'm told that you get that, right, because of the Telecommunications Act of 1996 when cell phones were the size of a shoe. In 1996 if you had 100 people in a room, two, maybe two of them would have cell phones. If you polled this room, more than 100 people, maybe even 200, thank God, right now, you would find more than 200 cell phones. But with time and usage comes research, and at this point in time the research doesn't support -- at this point in time the research does not come with long-term data, and that long-term data
leaves us with only one thing: Risk. But there is data that we do have. Thousands of people have come out in opposition for all kinds of reasons. There are alternative sites that do not affect families. AT\&T and Verizon have great coverage. This is irrefutable. Cell phone and tower radiation is closest in composition to that of a microwave, also a fact. Microwaves cook things, also a fact. Your cell phone slowly cooks your head; this is proven. Your cell phone is dangerous. In fact, iPhone and BlackBerry manuals tell you to keep your phone at least a half an inch from your ear, also a fact. The electromagnetic fields produced by normal phones are classified by many scientific agencies and institutions, including the prestigious Weizmann Institute of Science, as carcinogenic to humans. Towers are dangerous at close range, and cell phones are not toys. Particularly, towers are dangerous to the workers who work in close proximity to them, also a fact. So work groups are growing to support them, also a
fact. Tower antennas are most dangerous in direct line of sight, and the radiation therein reduces at a distance exponentially. These are all facts that we know today. But without anymore study we are left with risk. And until then, until we know just how dangerous this tower is to my life and my three children who in our bedroom at 1,000 feet as the crow flies from the tower, we don't know. Or Mark and Jillian, several hundred feet from it, we don't know. Or Mary with a disgraceful number of feet from the tower, we don't know. We don't know what risk they're taking. And even though early on unrecognized studies have been done, we don't know how the cell towers will affect our children and our families. Thousands of us on the hill. We don't know and you don't know. Yet, AT\&T and Verizon and North Atlantic Tower and even the Siting Council gets to decide what risk these families get to take. You decide if we take that risk. But if we don't know, why aren't there stricter guidelines until we know. It's happened in Los Angeles.

Los Angeles Firemen's Union has stopped cell phone towers from going on firehouses until we know. Heck, Dodgingtown, the first life of this cell phone tower that appears to have nine lives, the Dodgingtown site was declined by the applicant's own admission. It was declined in part because it was near a school. It's written in the application. So if that's the case, why are our kids okay. Our kids don't want to be guinea pigs.

Are our children worth less? How do we explain that? How do I explain to my son, age six, who says with all the common sense in the world, "Dad, if towers might be harmful, why put them near us in the first place." My six-year-old. His name is Gino. So what do I say to Gino that AT\&T's got more money? Is that what I say? Is that my answer? Gino and his friends, Nina and John and Ben, and my daughter Gia and Enzo, his brother and sister, Steven, Catherine, Anna, Joseph, Alyssa, some of which are here tonight, they're asking the same question. We don't want to be your guinea pigs.

And so with that I'm going to close with a question. If we don't know, when do we stand up and say no? When do you join us and stand up and help us say no?

When do you look at these applications near all of these residents and families and say there must be a better place? And in fact there is. And AT\&T, with your billions of dollars, please, you go find it.

The Siting Council rubber stamps these things. Oh, yeah, once it's gotten to the Siting Council, you're toast. Give up. It's over. They approve 96 percent of what goes in front of them. This is what they tell us. This is what they tell us. You guys heard of social media? I've heard from more than one person who stood in the same position $I$ have that the guys on the left side of the table, oh, they just approve every one of these things. You two gentlemen sitting on that end of the table, I hear that directly. This is traveling around the internet where millions of people see this.

Don't you want to stand for
something else? Couldn't we? Couldn't we? Ninety-six percent is the fun little comment that floats around on line about the Connecticut Siting Council.

And at this time I'd like to call our collective attention to the excerpt of the mission statement of the Council to objectively balance public need for adequate and reliable services with the need to protect the environment and ecology and to avoid the unnecessary proliferation of cell towers. So if we don't have a need, and this is only for capacity, and there are property owners who are willing and able to take the tower that affect far less families, and our families might be in danger, when will you vote and take a stand? Because we can't vote; you can. I can't vote. I can just suck up time and make you angry because I'm doing it, and I apologize for that. When will it be for the families of Codfish Hill? Ninety-six percent of the Council dockets get rubber stamped. Ninety-six percent of the Council dockets get rubber stamped. This is what I'm told.

I want your and our heads to rest easy tonight. I want to be a 4 percenter. Thank you.

## THE CHAIRMAN: Geraldine Mills.

GERALDINE MILLS: Geraldine F.
Mills, 4 Colonial Drive, Bethel,
Connecticut. Town of Bethel, total town of Bethel. I'm on the Stony Hill side. Commissioner Stein, members, as Mr. Nickerbocker said, welcome to Bethel.

I am or will be a forty-year resident on 12/7/15. I have served the Town of Bethel by appointment 27 years, permanent building committee, jury commission, library board, and I have been a founding member of many organizations. I have a degree in construction management, and I only say that because it makes me a little more familiar with what you're intending to vote on. There are a few other degrees. I won't mention them. I worked hard.

I'm very familiar with electric and telephone lines. I learned to splice wires in the manholes of Brooklyn when $I$ married a New York Tel guy who became the
first selectman here. Try going into those manholes today. That's just a little window about my background and why I'm here tonight, simply because $I$ love the Town of Bethel. The people, hard working, dedicated to family life and community protection. It's an arduous task to take on major corporations, one right now who basically controls us because we use their product. Electricity, wireless or otherwise, goes all the way back to the Greeks. It's a fundamental form of energy, a positive and a negative that occurs. It's in us ourselves. Try to touch the carpet in dry weather or dry and try the countertop, and you get that electric shock. But we don't kill anyone.

It's called an EMF, electromagnetic field.
I realize that your commission
was here 15 years ago on the case of Northeast Utilities, CL\&P, and I was an intervenor on buried power lines. You decided for us to bury the power lines because of electromagnetic fields. The proof of the dangerous EMF fields was proven. I gave to you not only 3,000
signatures here in Bethel but as an intervenor $I$ fought you from the Town of Bethel to the City of Norwalk. I'm happy to say I won. I hope that occurs tonight. I'm here now no longer that vibrant woman in her sixties but a lady of eighty-four years no longer able to go out and get 3,000 signatures, but hopefully I still have the respect of the Town of Bethel.

Cell towers emit the same dangerous dangers as power lines, and that is your electromagnetic fields. And if you are within a 29-mile radius, you will feel the effects. Bethel is only 17 square miles. You're looking at 150 or 170-foot high tower and its devastating effects. The area for this cell tower will not only affect the residents but our school area and everything else within its range. The cell tower is being placed in an area we consider to be our own state park with its beautiful trees, its woods, its wildlife. There are not too many sections of Bethel left with greenery. We have one at the other end of
the town. It's called Terre Haute.
You came here ten years ago to put a cell tower there, but in the end you voted not to. Why? Because we have an endangered species there. It's called a salamander. The salamander won. Well, guess what? We have an endangered species on Codfish Hill and its surrounding area that the EMF fields will affect, and that species is called human.

The Town of Bethel with its P\&Z commission allows buildings to a height of 35 feet. You are being requested to put a tower 150 to 170 feet. That's a lot of stories. P\&Z would never approve it, and the EMF fields will spread further. AT\&T and American Towers are not interested in the health, safety and welfare of the people of Bethel. This is sheer greed and monetary gain for George Soros and his cell towers. If you want cell towers, I will give you a solution to your problem. Put them on the existing highways and stick phoney limbs on them and they can look like trees, and then Governor Malloy can collect
the taxes and payment from AT\&T and other companies, and it will help save our infrastructure and give us money to do that.

I don't know what security will be in place for this monstrosity, if you approve it. Due to terrorism almost every day an act is coming forth. What about our treasured land trusts, properties where people walk and see nature at its best? And what about the dangers -- and I know you're not allowed to address health issues, but I do have lymphomas and other things -- and you look at the dangers of brain cancers, lymphomas, leukemia, which are caused by EMF fields and cellular use, as addressed by the British Medical Journal and the World Health Organization. In Europe you must prove the safety before you build, but here in America we put it up first and 15, 30 or 50 years later we learn that the road was not the one we should have gone down. Remember cigarettes? Remember asbestos? We enjoyed them and we felt safety, and look what they have done to us.

We are a changing society
surrounded by new electronic equipment but still by EMF fields. This cell tower is meant to benefit Newtown and Redding, not Bethel. We ourselves are creating and have all those electric cells. Are we abusing what God has given us? I know I should have addressed real estate values, but I leave that to the professionals. I did not bring documents from the British Medical Journal or the World Health Organization. That is your responsibility to research and your responsibility to protect the health, safety and welfare of the people of the Town of Bethel, especially the residents of Codfish Hill, like you did when addressing buried power lines and a little salamander. Thank you. I was much more vibrant 15 years ago, guys.

THE CHAIRMAN: The next person on the list is Mary Susan -- and I'm afraid I can't read your last name, if you could spell it, please?

MARY SUSAN WEINKAUF: I'm Mary
Susan Weinkauf, $W-e-i-n-k-a-u-f, 29$ Adams Drive, Bethel, Connecticut. I'm giving most
of my time to Gerry Mills, so we can all go home tonight. What I would like to say is I have a deep concern for the children in the Codfish Hill area but also all the children at St. Mary's and the children that attend school in the Bethel Public School District, which is a very short distance from where this tower will be. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Tim Beeble. TIMOTHY BEEBLE: My name is Tim

Beeble, 63 Grassy Plain Street, Bethel. I've lived here for 33 years. I want to thank Chairman Stein and the Commission for holding this right here in Bethel. It helps the residents. I will try to stay within my three-minute time frame.

In recent months we've had applications for affordable housing on large acreage in Hickock, and defensively the town purchased 60 acres of land for 675,000 to protect the views and the neighborhood. And there's ongoing complaints about the development of 26 units on Grand Street. People drive around town thinking we've got this beautiful open space, but the reality
is for the most part it's privately-owned land that just hasn't been developed yet. Right now property taxes pressure owners to develop land. Owners can't afford to pay. I don't know the owner of 62 to 64 Codfish, but I looked it up, and she's paying 18,000 a year in property taxes; 14,000 of that is just for the land. Other owners just can't afford to keep land undeveloped. It's just very expensive.

So we all need to understand that if this cell tower doesn't go up, then the property owner will be pressured to do other things, subdivide or do whatever. And if the town is against the cell tower, will the town also be against subdivision. You can't have it both ways. You charge 18,000 a year in property taxes and then not let an owner develop their property or use their property.

So again, just keep that in mind.
I'm hoping that if this does go down that the town won't fight the owner in doing something else to be able to afford to keep it, or maybe the town can figure out another
way to ease up the pressure on tax assessments on large acreage. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Ken Parsons.
KENNETH PARSONS: Ken Parsons, 14
Twin Maple Drive. I've lived on the hill for half a century now. It's never occurred to me that we would have any kind of a monstrosity such as this going up there. But what's really alarming is one homeowner is holding this entire part of town hostage, and you hold in the palm of your hands, us, what we can do. I mean, you've taken our rights completely away. We don't have a say other than our voice and our noise right here. We really want this tower gone, completely gone. That's all I've got to say.

THE CHAIRMAN: Sandy
Narcisco-Owen.
SANDY NARCISO-OWEN: The proposed cell phone tower not only affect wildlife in the area but families' health, property values, as well as ruin our beautiful picturesque views. I am a resident of Codfish Hill Road. My name is Sandy

Narciso-Owen, $\mathrm{N}-\mathrm{a}-\mathrm{r}-\mathrm{c}-\mathrm{i}-\mathrm{s}-0, \mathrm{hyphen}$, o-w-e-n.

My husband and I knew we wanted to build a home to live in throughout our lives together. We were especially blessed to have built our home in Bethel with the hands of my father, cousin, uncles, friends on a tree farm. The birth of our sweet daughter, Madeline, in 2013 has made a house a home, and I would do anything to absolutely protect her.

My whole career as a pediatric hospitalist is to care for the children in the community and to abide by and do no harm, and here $I$ stand as a concerned mother, community member, and practitioner and ask you to reconsider putting a cell phone tower in our town. If a cell phone tower is built on our street, my husband and I have decided to move away from our family and our friends and away from the community I tirelessly work to care for and protect. Please do not allow a tower to be constructed as it will have the aforementioned consequences that has allowed
greed to invade what we built with our loving hands. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Jim Anderson. JAMES ANDERSON: Good evening,

Jim Anderson, $A-n-d-e-r-s-0-n, 1$ Summit Lane. That's the next street over from Twin Maples, so in a straight line it's maybe a couple hundred yards away from the proposed tower. I'll make my three minutes. I wasn't planning on talking tonight. But more importantly, it's a much lower elevation than those cell tower proposed sites. Cell towers in the past year, like everyone else, we lost our power and our communications, Sandy, Irene, and that Halloween storm. We kept our communication with our utility suppliers and the outside world with our cell phones. Most recently last week when a lightening strike zapped all our stuff again, all our land communications, our outside communications with the world and Frontier and arranging to fix this was with our cell phones. Again, we're at a lower elevation. You've heard lots of good reasons to not to put the cell
towers here. Here's the bottom line practical one. It's not necessary. Our cell service is fine. If there are other beneficiaries of enhanced cell service somewhere, great, put them where it will maximize the benefit to those folks, but it isn't necessarily at Codfish. THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Judy Serfilippi. JUDITH SERFILIPPI: Good evening, my name is Judy Serfilippi. Last name, S-e-r-f-i-l-i-p-p-i. I live at 10 Country Way. I am a life-long Bethel resident. My parents, the house I grew up in, is located at 8 Twin Maple Drive. One of the proposed locations will be about 400 feet from their living room window. So obviously that is a huge concern to me. But the bigger concern is all of the people in this room, our entire community.

I spent the day driving through the various neighborhoods in our town and spotting those balloons from one neighborhood after another, and that's with all of the leaves on the trees. I just
think about what it will look like, what it will do to our beautiful landscape, to our beautiful community, when all those leaves are down. I was at our school complex. All of our schools are in one very nice location, and you can see those balloons from the football field, from the high school parking lot, from the playing fields. It's like 1.3 miles from our school complex where all of our children spend every day all day.

I thank you for coming tonight and hearing our concerns. I implore you to think about the impact on the people in this room, on our community, on what it will do to their property values. People like my parents who live in their home 50 years, their home is their life savings. The location of this tower in this community will potentially impact their property value and their life savings by 20,30 percent by some estimates. I just ask you to really think about the impact on us.

And again, we really appreciate you coming and hearing our concerns tonight.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
Meredith Binder.
MEREDITH BINDER: I'm Meredith
Binder, 39 Codfish Hill Road. I live there with my husband, Todd, and my two boys, ages eleven and nearly seven, and our dog Dakota.

We moved to Bethel from London, England, and we specifically chose this community in 2007 for its great community feel, its wonderful downtown, its great schools and the landscape in the Codfish Hill area. Both my husband and I work in Norwalk, Connecticut, and we had the opportunity to relocate down there, and we chose not to relocate to Southern Fairfield County because this community offered us a rural and pastoral landscape that we just could not get in the congested Southern Fairfield area.

It goes without saying that this giant tower will be a burden on that landscape and a blight to our neighborhood. The tower will ruin the aesthetics of our family neighborhood and devalue our home

prices. Like families around the country,
we suffered a decline in our housing prices
during the recession. Now, just as we're
starting to rebuild equity in our home, a
corporation can threaten that with an
unnecessary, unhealthy and unsightly tower.
    In our home on Codfish Hill we do
not have a landline. For three years we've
relied on our cell service. We've been a
mobile-only home, and we have never lost
service. Multiple carriers, including AT&T,
as it has been said, show that our area has
strong full coverage. This tower will not
benefit our family neighborhood in any way.
    I'm really appalled that a person
can lease their land for a profit to the
harm of their community. This tower will
emit radiation. This tower will be a blight
to our community. This tower will not
enhance cell service to those in the
community. This tower will drive down the
home prices. This tower will exist for
years, a blight on our community, even if
cell phone technology changes. We do not
need the cell tower in our family
```

neighborhood of Codfish Hill, and I implore you to deny North Atlantic Tower's application. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
Lori Mott.
LORI MOTT: Good evening, my name is Lori Mott, L-o-r-i, M-o-t-t, and I live at 3 Vining Road here in Bethel. I'm actually reading into this comments by Steve Suriano, the gentleman who needed to leave with the babies. And that's Steve Suriano, S-u-r-i-a-n-o, at 121 Codfish Hill Road. So when I talk about "my wife and I," you will understand.

Anyway. "So I'm here tonight to let you know that this is the wrong location for the proposed cell tower at both Site 1 and Site 2. I know it, so does my family, my neighbors, the Codfish Hill community, and the Town of Bethel. Our voices must be heard starting now.
"What is unfolding here in the Town of Bethel is a true injustice. It must be stopped. You have a pair of giant corporations with a combined market
capitalization of over $\$ 400$ billion trying to impose their will on the small Codfish Hill community. This is being done without regard for the many concerns of our residents. The applicant, along with AT\&T and Verizon, are utilizing their combined resources and seemingly endless sums of money to push forward a project that does not address the true need in our community; rather, it's an obvious case of corporate greed. While I have little doubt these corporations working together could easily sell us the Brooklyn Bridge, the reality is the Codfish Hill community does not need improved cell service.
"Like so many others we have spoken with in our community, my wife and I have no problems with our current cell service in and around our home. Unbelievably, AT\&T itself is currently advertising full coverage for both HD Voice and 4G LTE data, not only in the Codfish Hill area but the entire Town of Bethel. This information can be verified by their own coverage maps at att.com and

Verizonwireless.com. Paint a similar picture with the overwhelming majority of Codfish Hill showing full coverage. The most obvious coverage gaps are well to the east and south into the Towns of Newtown and Redding.
"I know that the Siting Council is bound to act by Federal and State Laws, but at the same time we ask that they do not suspend common sense when making this decision. This is the wrong location for this tower, primarily because it is not needed in our community. I think we can all agree that cell towers belong within the communities and towns that are being most serviced by them, in this case that would be Newtown and Redding, not Codfish Hill. By doing this, the negative impacts of the cell tower can be offset and be tolerated to some extent due to fulfilling an unmet need in those communities.
"I urge you to carefully consider how the proposed tower location would unnecessarily and negatively impact the scenic beauty and natural character of

Codfish Hill. This is one of the most pristine communities in all of Bethel and Connecticut, and we would like to keep it that way. We cannot allow these companies to deceive us by claiming to be addressing a lack of coverage in the Codfish Hill community."

So that was Mr. Suriano. Just a brief comment from me. I live here in Bethel; however, $I$ just purchased a house in the Codfish Hill area without knowing of this cell tower. I was surprised at the lower and fantastic value I got on this house. Now I know why. Had I known about this, I would not have purchased this property. If the property owner is here tonight, I'm sorry, but if I had known that, I would not have purchased the property. So if anybody has questions about whether values are impacted by this tower, I do believe they are. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Again, I'm not
sure, Holly, is it Cambra?
HOLLY CAMBRA: Holly Cambra.
THE CHAIRMAN: If you could spell
out your last name too, I'd appreciate it. MS. CAMBRA: My name is Holly

Cambra, and I'm at 110 Codfish Hill Road.
Cambra is $\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{a}-\mathrm{m}-\mathrm{b}-\mathrm{r}-\mathrm{a}$.
I run a child care called Just
Like Home Day Care. I've been in business for 25 years, and I've been on Codfish this July 4th for 11 years. This will deeply impact my business, not to mention property values, as everybody has said. But I take care of children, and people who are looking for child care may say, "Ooh, she's near Codfish. It's got a cell tower. Well, maybe I won't use her."

So I just wanted to express my feelings about that. I agree with what everybody else has said too. So please reconsider. Put it someplace else, not in our backyard. Thank you.

THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. That's
the last person who signed up, so the Council will now close the public comment session of this hearing.

I'd like to announce that it will continue, or we will continue the
evidentiary portion of the hearing in New Britain on Tuesday, July 14th of this year at $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Please note that anyone who has not become a party or intervenor but who desires to make his or her views known for the Council, may file written statements with the Council until the record closes. Copies of the transcript of this hearing will be filed with the Bethel Town Clerk's Office. And I hereby declare this hearing adjourned. And thank you all for your participation.
(Whereupon, the witness was excused and the above proceedings were adjourned at 8:20 p.m.)
