This responds to your recent correspondence requesting information on the presence of federally listed and/or proposed endangered or threatened species in relation to a proposed telecommunications facility at 15 Great Pasture Road, Danbury, Connecticut. These comments are provided in accordance with the Endangered Species Act (ESA) (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531, et seq.).

Verizon Wireless proposes to construct a new telecommunications facility that will consist of a 123-foot-tall monopole tower and related infrastructure. The facility will be located within a cleared storage yard and no trees will be removed.

Based on information currently available to us, the federally threatened bog turtle (*Clemmys muhlenbergii*) and northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*) are known to occur in the vicinity of the proposed project area. However, since the project will occur within a developed industrial area that is paved and trees will not be cut, we do not anticipate that either species will be impacted by the project as proposed.

Preparation of a Biological Assessment or further consultation with us under section 7 of the Endangered Species Act is not required. No further Endangered Species Act coordination is necessary for a period of one year from the date of this letter, unless additional information on listed or proposed species becomes available.
