The proposed project(s) is located north of Fairfield Beach Road and south of the Fairfield Wastewater Treatment Plant at 183 Richard White Way in the Town of Fairfield, Fairfield County. The proposed project includes replacing the existing 48-inch corrugated metal pipe (CMP) culvert under Pine Creek Dike with two 60-inch high density polyethylene (HDPE) culverts and two 48-inch HDPE culverts, with headwalls at the culvert inlets and an endwall and tide gates at the culvert outlets. The existing culvert does not have sufficient capacity to convey a major storm surge event. During Superstorm Sandy, the culvert became obstructed and caused severe flooding in the Pine Creek area for several days. Self-regulating tide gates will be installed on the two 48-inch culverts to allow muted tidal flushing. Manually operated sluice gates will be installed on the outlet side of the 60-inch culverts. These gates will normally be in a closed position but will be opened at the onset of a large storm surge event. The total floodplain area affected is anticipated to be approximately 0.06 Acres.

DOH has considered the following alternatives to the proposed action: Alternative 1: Relocate the proposed action outside of the 100-year floodplain - Executive Order 11998 states that "agencies... shall take action to reduce the risk of flood loss, to minimize the impact of floods on human safety, health and welfare...". As the intent of this project is to reduce the impact of coastal storms on areas and

upgrade project outside of the floodplain are not available and would conflict with the purpose and function of the proposed upgrade project. Based on this, there are no alternatives which could be located outside of the floodplain and meet the project purpose and intent. Alternative 2A: Locate the Project within the Floodplain: Single 60" Culvert - This alternative includes upgrading of a culvert through the addition of a single 60" culvert rather than the twin 60" culverts proposed. The drainage time for this alternative is approximately 30 hours (more than two full tide cycles) longer than the chosen alternative and the excavation, backfill, concrete and foundation work is not substantially reduced by only installing one new culvert. It was determined that this alternative does not provide an increased level of protection over the selected alternative and does not adequately reduce future flood risk and associated human health, safety and welfare impacts. Alternative 2B: Locate the Project within the Floodplain: 8' X 4' Box Culvert - This alternative includes installation of an 8' x 4' box culvert in lieu of adding twin 60" round culverts as proposed. There is a significant increase in foundation work in this alternative as piles would be needed to support the box culvert and bridge over the existing sanitary outfall. The installation of piles would result in additional impacts to coastal wetland resource areas. Selection of this alternative would also result in a longer construction timeframe due to the additional foundation work. It was determined that this alternative does not provide an increased level of protection over the selected alternative and thus no benefit is gained from the potential increase in environmental impacts and the increase in cost and construction schedule. The widespread prolonged flooding caused by the inability of this culvert to drain a large storm surge event associated with Superstorm Sandy caused substantial demolition and reconstruction costs within the watershed drained by this culvert. Additionally, the prolonged flooding in this area also isolated the area from access by emergency vehicles for nearly a week increasing the risk of personal injury, property damage and possibly loss of life in the event of a fire or other emergency. The Pine Creek Culvert Replacement Project is an important improvement needed to both recover from Superstorm Sandy and to protect human health

Mitigation Measures to be Taken to Minimize Adverse Impacts and Preserve Natural and Beneficial Values; The project design includes the installation of manually operated sluice gates on the outlet side of the 60-inch culverts. These gates will normally be in a closed position but will be opened at the onset of a large storm surge event. The 48-inch culverts will be utilized for typical storm events. The project also includes the installation of self-regulating tide gates on the 48-inch culverts. These tide gates will allow muted tidal flushing and return a limited amount of saltwater to the marshes upstream of the Pine Creek outfall. The "trip elevation" of the tide gates will be set to maintain the existing inundation level in the upstream salt marsh until a detailed hydrologic and hydraulic study is done to determine the maximum water surface elevation that will not impact adjacent residences and properties

safety, and welfare. The no-action alternative would limit community recovery efforts and would not minimize or reduce future flood risk

The sluice gates and tide gates will facilitate upstream tidal flushing and will re-establish tidal hydrodynamics, thus restoring the upstream salt marsh and preserving its beneficial value. The salt marsh within the floodplain may serve to attenuate smaller, more frequent storms/waves in addition to larger storm surges by reducing erosion and promoting sediment deposition. The upstream coastal marsh within the floodplain also serves to reduce flood peaks and stores flood waters during coastal storm events

The project would result in approximately 75 square feet of permanent impacts to Sparting alterniflora and 25 square feet of permanent impact to Iva frutescens communities in close proximity to the proposed activities. Mitigation is proposed which would replace these communities at a ratio of 2:1. The plantings would occur in close proximity to, and at similar elevations to the affected communities. In addition, once constructed the project would improve tidal flushing upstream of the dike that will likely result in the expansion of existing

Based on the above information, the proposed action is the best option for providing necessary coastal storm protection while maximizing retention of natural floodplain values.

In accordance with the process at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C, DOH has reevaluated the alternatives to building in the floodplain and has determined that it has no practicable alternative to locating the proposed activities in the 100-yr floodplain as summarized in this notice. Environmental files that document compliance with steps 3 through 6 of Executive Order 11988 are available for public inspection, review and copying upon request at the times and location delineated in the last paragraph of this notice for receipt of comments. This notice hereby satisfies 24 CFR Part 55.20 (g), Step 7 of the 8 Step Decision process.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in wetlands/floodplains and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information about wetlands can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in wetlands/floodplains, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk

Pursuant to section 22a-174(k) of the Connecticut General Statutes, the Commissioner of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) hereby provides notice of the issuance of the General Permit to Limit Potential to Emit from Major Stationary Sources of Air Pollution (general permit).

The general permit limits emissions from major stationary sources by including permit restrictions on potential emissions for major stationary sources. The restrictions in the general permit are designed in accordance with the US Environmental Protection Agency's guidance on federally enforceable state operating permits (FESOPs) and Section 112(I) of the Act. Numerous stationary source requirements under the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 (the Act) apply only to major stationary sources. 


