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THE VICE CHAIRMAN: Ladies and gentlemen, I'd like to call this meeting to order of the Connecticut Siting Council this Tuesday,
May 1, 2018 approximately 6:30 p.m.

My name is James J. Murphy, Jr., and I'm Vice Chairman of the Connecticut Siting Council.

Other members present are Robert Hannon, designee of Commissioner Robert Klee of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection; and Larry Levesque, designee of Chairman Katie Dykes of the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority; Robert Silvestri; Edward Edelson; Michael Harder; and Daniel P. Lynch, Jr.

Melanie Bachman, our Executive Director and Staff Attorney; and Robert Mercier, our siting analyst on the staff with us.

This is a continuation of the public hearing that began at three this afternoon.

Copies of the program and the Council's citizen's guide to Council procedures are available for members of the public.

And as of right now we have no one signed up from the public to sign up. So if members of the public are interested in signing

up, the sign-up sheet is over on the table.

This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes, and the Uniform Administrative Procedures Act upon an application from Cellco Partnership d/b/a Verizon Wireless for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need for the construction, maintenance and operation of a telecommunications facility located at 917 Exeter Road, Lebanon, Connecticut. This application was received by the Council on March the 12th, 2018.

This application is also governed by the Telecommunications Act of 1996 which is administered by the Federal Communications

Commission. This act prohibits this Council from considering the health effects of radiofrequency emissions on human health and wildlife to the extent the emissions run powers are within the federal acceptable safe limits standards, which standard is followed by the State Department of Public Health.

The federal act also prohibits this

Council from discriminating between and amongst

providers of functionally equivalent services.

This means that if one carrier is already providing service in an area, other carriers have the right to provide that service in the same area.

The applicant published a notice of filing of this application to the Council in the Norwich Bulletin on March the 8th and March 9, 2018. The Council's legal notice of the date and time of the hearing was published in the bulletin on March 30, 2018.

Upon the Council's request the applicant erected a sign at the proposed site on April 17, 2018, to inform the public of the name of the applicant and the type of facility, the hearing date and location, the contact information for the Council.

This afternoon members of this Council, staff and the public personally conducted a field review of the proposed site in order to observe firsthand the potential effects of the proposal.

The hearing session tonight has been reserved for the public to make these statements into the record. These public statements are not subject to questions from the applicant or the Council, and members of the public making

statements may not ask questions of the applicant or the Council. These statements will become part of the record for the Council's consideration.

The sign-up sheet, as I mentioned before, is available for those who would like to speak.

I understand -- who is giving your
presentation, Mr. Baldwin?

MR. BALDWIN: Bob Burns with APT will be doing the presentation.

THE VICE CHAIRMAN: Okay. Before we turn matters over and ask for comments, we usually ask the applicant to have one or more members of their panel to give a brief presentation as to their proposal.

And go ahead, Mr. Burns. I think there's a microphone up there for you.

ROBERT BURNS: Thank you. My name is
Bob Burns. I'm a licensed professional engineer
licensed in the State of Connecticut. I work for
APT engineering.

What we're proposing today is a proposed telecommunication facility that will be located behind Lyman Memorial High School. The proposed improvements will begin in the rear of the high

school, in the southeast corner of the driveway.

We will construct a 12-foot wide gravel access drive approximately 325 feet into the wooded area behind the school. In addition to the driveway we will be pulling utilities, and those will go underground and follow the path of the driveway.

Our electric service will begin at the existing transformer that's outside the school in the rear. And the telephone will continue along the side the existing parking to the street and pull from an existing pole on the street.

The access drive will terminate at a 50 by 50-foot fenced-in compound. In the compound it will be a 50-by-50 fence, eight foot high with a 12-foot wide gate.

Inside the fenced in area in the rear corner will be 150-foot monopole. There will be a 9 and a half foot by 16-foot steel platform with Verizon Wireless' radio equipment on it, a thousand-gallon propane tank and a 35-kW generator that will be shared between the Town and Verizon.

In addition, there will be an eight-foot by eight-foot concrete pad for the Town's radio equipment. The tower itself, like I said, will be

150 feet tall. The top of the tower will have two of the whips, whip antennas from the existing tower that's on site relocated to this, to this tower.

Verizon Wireless will have a platform with 12 panel antennas and the appurtenances that go with it at the 140-foot mark. Once the tower is complete the existing tower on site will be dismantled and taken down.

Thank you.

THE VICE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

Now turning to the public sector, the first item is to call upon any public officials who would like to be heard. And I understand we'll be heard by the First Selectman.

Betsy?

BETSY PETRIE: Thank you all very much.

My name is Betsy Petrie. I am the First Selectman
here for the Town of Lebanon. I appreciate you
providing me an opportunity this evening. I was
unable to attend earlier due to other commitments
here.

So I've listened to the presentation and I've been involved in this project for slightly over two years. This project and this location

came to be a realization for the Town as a result of many boards and commissions reviewing the extensive information provided.

This information was reviewed by almost 20 elected officials over the last two and a half or three years, and they all supported the project. The need for public communications here in our town from a safety perspective is very important, as well as from a DPW standpoint, and my fire agency and our Police Department.

Additionally, we have a struggle receiving communications here in our town by cellphone. We have many residents who have complained about that. This would be an opportunity for us to improve those communications.

The site itself, of course, is concerned because of the location. And if you notice in this room tonight you have -- I don't know -- three people from the fire department here to talk about the benefits of this tower. I don't see any other resident here other than a reporter and another gentleman.

But the reason the project is so important for us was that we actually identified

the location on the property where it wouldn't interfere with the educational processes that are going on at the school.

By having it located in the back of the building in the woods actually removes it from visibility from our residents, as well as our kids in our school system. And we have met the needs of our students and our academic professionals by making certain that we have taken into consideration their needs, and not have this be in the minds of our students every day.

Additionally, we are a very strong farming community. You likely experienced it tonight and during the day today when you were at the site walk. We felt that by putting the property in the location that it is -- that it detracts -- it won't detract from the location of our ag students and their use of the facilities at the ag department up at the high school. So again, something very important to us.

From an earlier question, I was informed today there was a question about the lack of power in that area due to when we lose power. And there was some question about the propane things.

The high school is our designated

emergency operations center for Eversource. It is one of the first areas of our town that are turned back on should we have a power outage. So the need for a tank of propane larger than what is recommended wouldn't be necessary, because very rarely have we gone multiple days without electricity at that location.

And again, it is our EOC for our Town.

Having the tower adjacent to the property is

beneficial for that purpose as well from our

Town's standpoint.

We encourage the Siting Council on the board of selectmen side to adopt the proposal that was presented. We have worked with the folks very well from Verizon, and we would encourage you in your roles to support this project as well.

THE VICE CHAIRMAN: Thank you very much, First Selectman.

Turning to the public sign-up list, we have Robert Cady.

ROBERT CADY: Good evening. I was here this afternoon, but I had a previous appointment I had to keep later on.

And I have some concerns. I had a phonecall this afternoon about the number of

antennas at the top of the tower. I was involved with this project before our first selectman was, with our previous first selectman. We talked with Verizon and at that time it was discussed that they would put four antennas at the top. They would supply new antennas. As a matter of fact, I gave them an equipment list of the antennas that were needed.

We currently have four antennas on the tower over at the existing site, two for fire departments and one for public works, and one auxillary antenna in case something happens to one of the other ones. So we still need that in the lease, in the agreement.

So I would like to bring that to

Verizon's attention. I know they have had a lot

of personnel changes and probably some of these

fell through the cracks.

Thank you.

THE VICE CHAIRMAN: Thank you.

That exhausts the list of public speaking sign-ups. Is there anyone else who would care to -- yes?

Before you start, give us your name and spell your last name for us.

MARK ELLIOTT: My name is Mark Elliott,

E-1-1-i-o-t-t, and I'm Deputy Chief of the Lebanon

Volunteer Fire Department in town. The fire

Volunteer Fire Department in town. The fire department has been involved somewhat in this endeavor for a number of years. The department as

a whole supports it.

Lebanon is a difficult town terrain-wise to cover with radio communications. We were instrumental in putting the regional tower next to the high school to try to improve our coverage. The opportunity to extend our antennas to get some more height -- it would serve our ability to cover the town.

It would also enhance the ability of the town public works department to reach their five trucks and other personnel in the areas of town which are now shadowed. So the fire department endorses the project.

There was discussion about where we would be located on the tower, and how many antennas space-wise we could be afforded. I do not have the particulars to the lease, but I would hope that we would have a sufficient space to at least duplicate what we have now with room for possible expansion.

But overall the fire department, which also runs the EMS in town, endorses the going forward of this project.

THE VICE CHAIRMAN: Thank you,
Mr. Elliott.

Is there anyone else who cares to speak?

(No response.)

THE VICE CHAIRMAN: If not, I'm going to close this meeting of the Siting Council. Before closing this evidentiary record of this matter, the Connecticut Siting Council announces that briefs and proposed findings of fact may be filed with the Council no later than May the 31, 2018.

The submission of briefs or proposed findings of fact are not required by the Council. Rather, we leave it to the choice of the applicant. Anyone who has not become a party or intervener, but who desires to make his or her views known to the Council may file written statements with the Council within 30 days of the date hereof.

The Council will issue draft findings of fact and thereafter the applicant may identify

errors or inconsistencies between the Council's draft findings of fact and the record, however no new information, no new evidence, no argument and no reply briefs without permission from the Council will be considered by the Council in determining this matter. Copies of the transcript of this hearing will be filed with the Lebanon Town Clerk's office. I hereby declare this hearing adjourned and thank you for your participation. And drive carefully. (Whereupon, the above proceedings were concluded at 6:49 p.m.)
