THE HEARING OFFICER: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. This hearing is called to order this Thursday, September 19, 2019, at approximately 6:33 p.m. My name is Robert Silvestri, member and presiding officer of the Connecticut Siting Council.

Other members of the Council are Mr. Robert Hannon, designee for Commissioner Katie Dykes of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection; Mr. Daniel P. Lynch Jr; , Mr. Edward Edelson; Mr. Michael Harder.

Members of the staff are Ms. Melanie Bachman, Executive Director and Staff Attorney; and Mr. Robert Mercier, siting analyst.

This is a continuation of a public hearing that began at 3 p.m. this afternoon. Copies of the hearing program and the Council's citizen guide to Siting Council procedures are available for members of the public, and you can find them over there near the speaker on the table.

This hearing is held pursuant to the provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon an application from Tarpon

Towers II, LLC, for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need for the construction, maintenance and operation of a telecommunications facility located at 796 Woodin Street, Hamden, Connecticut.

This application was received by the Council on July 15, 2019. This application is also governed by the Telecommunications Act of 1996 which is administered by the Federal Communications Commission. This act prohibits this Council from considering the health effects of radiofrequency emissions on human health and wildlife to the extent the emissions from towers are within the federal acceptable safe limits standards, which standard is also followed by the State Department of Public Health.

The federal act also prohibits this Council from discriminating between and amongst providers of functionally equivalent services. This means that if one carrier already provides service for an area other carriers have a right to compete and provide service in the same area. The applicant published notice of the filing of the application to the Council in the New Haven Register on June 7, 2019. The Council's
legal notice of the date and time of this hearing was published in the New Haven Register on August 20, 2019.

Upon this Council's request the applicant erected a sign at the proposed site so as to inform the public of the name of the applicant, the type of facility, the hearing date and location, and contact information for the Council.

This afternoon members of the Council, staff and public personally conducted a field review of the proposed site in order to observe firsthand the potential effects of the proposal.

This hearing session tonight has been reserved for the public to make short statements into the record. These public statements are not subject to questions from the applicant or parties and interveners, or the Council. And members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the applicant or parties and interveners, or the Council. These statements will become part of the record for council consideration.

A sign-up sheet is available for those who would like to participate, and again that's over to my left near the speaker on the table.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council's staff upon the merits of this application are prohibited by law.

I wish to note that the applicant or parties and interveners including their representatives and witnesses are not allowed to participate in the public comment session. I also wish to note for those who are here and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for the public comment session, that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof and such written statements will be given the same weight as if spoken at the hearing tonight.

We ask each person making a public statement in this proceeding to confine his or her statements to the subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all of the comments you and your neighbors may have. Please be advised that the Council cannot answer any questions about from the public about the proposal.

A verbatim transcript will be made of this hearing and deposited at the Town of Hamden
and the City of New Haven Clerks' offices for the convenience of the public.

Before $I$ call on members of the public to make statements I request that the applicant make a very brief presentation to the public describing where the facility is proposed to be located and why it is necessary, and what alternatives were investigated.

MR. MARINO: Mr. Chairman, Vincent Marino of Cohen and Wolf for the applicant, Tarpon Towers II. Doug Roberts is going to be giving a short presentation this evening.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Counselor.

Mr. Roberts, please proceed.
THE WITNESS (Roberts): Thank you.
Again, my name is Doug Roberts. I'll go briefly over the site. We have the application drawings here. We presented an alternate location for the compound, and that's on this set of drawings here.

But in a brief statement, what we're proposing is to run along the Wilbur Cross Parkway an access road and go down into a wooded area between two wetland fingers in an area that's
really just woods.
We'll have underground utilities running from the utility pole on Woodin Street along this access road to the site.

The site itself is 70 by 40 feet, in a 75 by 75 lease area.

And we have a monopole tower and foundation, an electrical meter and a transformer and telco demark.

And the gravel access ride.
The compound itself will consist of radio equipment with a backup generator with a propane tank. Pretty straightforward.

The tower itself and equipment on the tower, like I said it's a 120-foot monopole with antennas centered at 120 feet. Our equipment is in a fenced compound with security fencing around it to prevent anyone from entering it unauthorized. And the radios and antennas are going to be located on the tower platform at 120-foot centerline.

These are some details of a generator, radio equipment as well as the antennas themselves. The only change different from the docket application was we did move the compound,
kept it the same size, but we moved it 22 feet up closer towards the parkway so that we would give a little additional buffer area to the existing wetland resource.

Thank you.
THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank YOu,
Mr. Roberts.
Ladies and gentlemen, when we call your name I'd ask that you come up to the podium to my right, and to use the microphone. I will apologize up front if I mispronounce your name. So with that I'd also ask you to spell your last name so we can have that clearly in the record.

Our first speaker is Sarah
Nazario-Messineo -- if I said that correctly.
SARAH NAZARIO-MESSINEO: Hello.
THE HEARING OFFICER: Did I get your name right?

SARAH NAZARIO-MESSINEO: It's Sarah Nazario-Messineo, and I live -- we live on 784 Woodin Street, next door. And we pay taxes, first of all.

There's an antiquated cellphone tower on Wintergreen and my understanding is that one is going to be removed and is going to be replaced by
this one. So my question is, why can't you just place this cellphone tower there, and it should be able to provide the same coverage?

I had to cut some of this because there were certain things that you weren't -- I don't have to discuss as far as health and everything else.

There's not enough long-term information to prove that this is not going to affect us and wildlife. We have the preserve that's adjacent to the property. This cellphone tower will be -- if I can see -- if I can see that, it's going to be up against the preserve that we have there.

And the nature preserve there, you have beautiful wildlife from the bees to the butterflies, to wild, exotic -- to birds to -there's so much beauty there and we don't know if this is going to affect it.

There's been a problem now with bees that nobody knows why bees are dying, and we don't know if this is what's causing it. We don't know, and we need that for our future and the future of everybody.

So you know, it's something that I want all of you to take into consideration because this
is not just for our neighborhood. These people, this is not going to benefit our neighborhood in any way. We all have different cellphone providers that we have that we use it, and nobody has dropped coverage. We have public coverage. So if it's to compete against other cellphone carriers then use the other phone, the other carrier, the other cellphone towers that are there. But if there's an antiquated one there on Wintergreen then use that one. Replace that one with a brand-new 5G if that's what you want to do. Thank you. THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you for your comments.

Paul Messineo, please.
PAUL MESSINEO: I also live at 784 Woodin Street, which I am adjacent to the property in question. Also the New Haven nature preserve is behind.

You see a lot of neighbors behind us. That was to our own doing because we were the only people that were given a notice, besides the City of New Haven because of -- because they had chased the property behind. So we had to go out and actually bring our neighbors here to let you know
because they're going to be affected by this as well.

And to another point that $I$ have is that we need to have more time to look at this as a public because some of the things that are listed on the documents that were handed out today sort of state that some of this stuff is from 1993, '83, '86. We need to further look into this ourselves.

I mean, I know that we're not supposed to talk about health and everything else, but that's something that when I bought this property it was because it was out there and there was nothing else around me. I want to be able to keep that peace of mind for myself, for my children and I want to be able to pass that down to them.

So if I can ask everybody that's on this panel, we would like to have more time to be able to look into things since we were given all of these -- how do we say it? All these statutes. I see them across in different years. We'd like to be able to further -- and look into that. Okay?

And that's all I have. Thank you.
THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you for your comments. Ladies and gentlemen, $I$ only have one
other person signed up to speak. If there's anybody else that would like to, please put your name there.

And the person that $I$ have is Cheryl Williams.

CHERYL WILLIAMS: Hello. My name is Cheryl Williams and I live at 772 Woodin Street. I am the first house at the dead end next to Sarah and Paul, and then the 796 is the third house on the dead end of our street.

When $I$ first heard of this cell tower it was a document that my mayor sent to me to look at to read what the New Haven Register had said, and I do believe that was sometime in August. And I went next door to my neighbors' and I asked them, what is this? You know, what's going on?

And they explained that they received a registered letter to attend a meeting back in March or April, and I was not invited. So that shocked me, but not only was I not invited, you have a slew of people in that neighborhood that had no clue of what was going on with the cell tower.

I called Michelle maybe three, four times, as she knows. And my question was, when
they put up the sign they put it up at the end of the dead end so people still wasn't aware. So I created a petition -- I don't know if I can submit it or what $I$ do with it, but $I$ created a petition and went around to my neighbors, as many as I could reach within the last couple of weeks and asked them to sign it.

And these are the neighbors that are against having the cell tower in the neighborhood. I've lived in my residence for 19 years, lived there peacefully. Now my residence is being disrupted with the cell tower.

Can I submit this petition?
THE HEARING OFFICER: Absolutely.
CHERYL WILLIAMS: Thank you.
THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. And
thank you for your comments.
Linda Danaher -- if I pronounced that correctly.

LINDA DANAHER: I'm sorry. I'm not totally prepared. I just heard this on the news and I knew there was talk of this happening.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Please use the microphone. Thank you.

LINDA DANAHER: Sorry. I have to
apologize. I'm not totally prepared. I heard it on the news today and I knew where there was talk of this happening, and I have a number of concerns about this antenna.

Number one, it's near the Merit Parkway which in the 'fifties was built as a scenic highway. That was not supposed to be any type of construction in terms of commercial buildings, et cetera, and $I$ kind of consider an antenna a business.

So I'm kind of confused why this would be allowed to occur because that is a beautiful area of our town. I walk around Lake Wintergreen frequently. It's an absolutely lovely part of town. I live at 915 Benham Street, and I have to tell you the amount of wildlife we have that come through our yard is absolutely wonderful.

I live in a wooded section. We see bear. I had a bear in my yard. I have bobcats. I have all sorts of wildlife. And I just think of the antenna as not really kind of going along with that type of environment. I worry about the town of Hamden. We've got antennas up, WELI down at the bottom of our road. We have antennas on Denslow Hill Road. We have antennas up West

Woods.
This town has become a city and it's very discouraging to people like myself who love this town. I love the diversity. I love the different neighborhoods. This is very sad. I find that this is sad, that you're going to put an antenna in a rural part of our town.

I think we have to really think about preserving the character of our towns. These antennas are not very attractive, and we don't know the health problems with this. West Rock has antennas on the top of it. I don't know why the State of Connecticut allowed that. East Rock has towers.

We have to kind of say, wait a minute. What is this about? Is this about making money? Who's making money here? Is it the Town of Hamden? Is it the private property owners?

I am really concerned about the character of our town. These poor people who live near them, they bought their property in the understanding that they had a lovely neighborhood. Now they're going to have an antenna next door?

I find it very sad, and I think our legislative council here needs to stand up for the
people of this town.
We pay a ton of taxes. And you know what? People will say, why do you live in Hamden? The taxes are through the roof. Well, you know why I live in Hamden? Because I love it.

I love the people of our town. I love the people of our town. I love the fact that I can come here and speak to you, and hope that you hear us, but enough is enough. We have antennas all over this town. It's really sad.

And I have to tell you another thing. I read an article that this antenna is supposed to help Verizon. I have Verizon. I have to tell you I've never had a problem with service in my home at 915 Benham Street. I don't know. Have you?

THE HEARING OFFICER: Ma'am, just direct your comments to us, please?

LINDA DANAHER: I'm sorry. I don't know that anyone else has in Southern Hamden. I read an article -- I don't know if it's true. It may not be accurate. I read an article that this antenna is supposed to help Northern Hamden. I don't get it.

Why should the people in Southern Hamden have this antenna to look at, to watch the lights?

I don't get it. I just feel like enough is enough. There's plenty of antennas in this town of Hamden. I wish people would stop with allowing this to occur.

To the property owners, I understand you're paying high taxes. I don't know where you are if you're here, but $I$ understand that. We're all paying high taxes and we're all trying to eke out a living, but it shouldn't be at the backs of your neighbors.

I just have a couple of notes I jotted down before $I$ stop. Wintergreen is a scenic park. We have a few antennas over there that we have to look at. And to be surrounded, that lake be surrounded by antennas, it's very, very sad.

And that's pretty much the gist of what I have to say. And I again, I apologize. I should have been better prepared. Thank you.

THE HEARING OFFICER: No apology necessary. Thank you for your comments.

Dahlia Grace, which might be the last person to come up to offer comments.

DAHLIA GRACE: Good evening. I stand in support of my neighbors, Woodin and all over Hamden who are in opposition to this antenna being
installed on the property on Woodin Street.
I reside at 852 Wintergreen Avenue. So we are directly on the hill above that antenna. So this is our perspective. We get a little view of the sound. We get a little view kind of off of the Merit Parkway. We get a view, kind of, of this broad outlook on the hill below us, because this is a pretty steep hill.

And so our new view will be a giant antenna with a light on top of it, and various, various little satellites on top of it to add to the lovely green stuff that we see right now. And it's going to help us to see another perspective of our town that we really don't need to add to our existence there.

There was a reason why we moved to that spot, that spot itself and it has to do with the fact that we can get a little piece of beauty and enjoyment when we come home and we sit on our deck. We can see this expanse that should not include an antenna.

And so that's just a little perspective in addition to the wildlife issues, and we know that there's going to be great disruption from this construction that is going to take place
starting from the Merit Parkway digging into this property that is already currently a preserve and is next to a preserve in the city of New Haven.

So I ask you to consider these, that it's a blight on the southern area of Hamden that is already getting challenged with being built up. And we are trying to preserve the green and just the lovely more rural nature of that part of our town.

Thank you.
THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you for your comments.

Ladies and gentlemen, I don't have anybody else on the list. Is there anyone else that would like to offer public comment?

Going once, twice.
(No response.)

THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. At this time, ladies and gentlemen, the Council will close the public comment session of this hearing.

The Council announces that it will continue the evidentiary session of this hearing at its office in New Britain on Tuesday,

October 22, 2019, at 1 p.m. Please note that anyone who has not become a party or intervener, but who desires to make his or her views known to the Council may file written statements with the Council until the public comment record closes.

Copies of the transcript of this hearing will be filed at the Town of Hamden and the City of New Haven Clerks' offices.

I hereby declare this hearing adjourned.
