2	before the State of Connecticut Siting Council in the
3	matter of a Petition by New Cingular Wireless PCS LLC
4	(AT&T) for a Declaratory Ruling, held at the Greenwich
5	Town Hall, 101 Field Point Road, Greenwich, Connecticut,
6	on February 9, 2012 at 7:00 p.m., at which time the
7	parties were represented as hereinbefore set forth

10	ACTING CHAIRMAN COLIN C. TAIT: Ladies and
11	gentlemen, this hearing is called to order this Thursday,
12	February 9, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.
13	My name is Colin Tait, Vice Chairman of
14	the Connecticut Siting Council.
15	VOICES: We can't hear you
16	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: I'll I'll try
17	again. Ladies and gentlemen, this hearing is called to
18	order this Thursday, February 9, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.
19	My name is Colin Tait, Vice Chairman of
20	the Siting Council. Is that adequate?
21	VOICES: No.
22	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Louder?
23	VOICES: Yes. Yes, please.
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: We'll try again.

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1	Ladies and gentlemen
2	VOICES: Yes (applause)
3	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: my name is Colin
4	Tait, Vice Chairman of the Connecticut Siting Council.
5	Other members of the Council are Brian
6	Golembiewski, the designee of Commissioner Dan Estey, the
7	Department of Environmental of Energy and
8	Environmental Protection; Larry P. Levesque, the designee
9	for Commissioner Kevin M. DelGobbo, the Public Utilities
10	Regulatory Authority; Edward S. Wilensky; James J.
11	Murphy, Jr., and Dr. Barbara C. Bell.
12	Members of the staff are Linda Roberts,
13	our Executive Director; Melanie Bachman, our staff
14	attorney; Christina Walsh, our Siting Analyst.
15	The court reporter is Gail Gregoriades and
16	our audio technician is Aaron DeMarest. There you go.
17	This is a continuation of a public hearing
18	that began at 3:00 p.m. this afternoon. Copies of the
19	hearing program and the Council's Citizens Guide to
20	Siting Council Procedures are available for members of
21	the public.
22	This hearing is held pursuant to the
23	provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General
24	Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedures Act

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1 on a Petition from New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, for a 2 Declaratory Ruling that no Certificate of Environmental 3 Compatibility and Public Need is required for the 4 proposed installation of a concealed tower on a water 5 tank and associated equipment at a water treatment plant located at 455 Valley Road, Greenwich, Connecticut. 6 7 This petition was received by the Council on October 5, 8 2011. 9 On December 19, 2011 a legal notice was 10 published in the Connecticut Post and the Greenwich 11 Times announcing the time, date, and place for this 12 hearing. Upon this Council's request, the 13 14 Petitioner erected a sign at the proposed boundary on 15 January 26, 2012 so as to inform the public of the name of the petitioner, the type of facility, the hearing 16 date and location, and contact information for the 17 18 Council. 19 Also upon the Council's request, the 20 Petitioner flew a balloon at the site today between the 21 hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. to simulate the height 22 of the proposed facility. 23 This afternoon members of the Council,

staff, and public personally conducted a field review of

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1 the site where the Petitioner seeks to develop the 2 proposed facility in order to observe firsthand the 3 potential effects of the proposal. 4 This petition is governed by the 5 Telecommunications Act of 1996, which is administered by 6 the Federal Communications Commission, which prohibits 7 the Council from considering the health effects of radio frequency emissions on human health and wildlife to the 8 9 extent that the emissions from towers are within the 10 federal acceptable safe limit standard, which standard is 11 also followed by the State Department of Public Health. 12 The federal act also prohibits the Council from 13 discriminating between and amongst providers of functionally equivalent services. So that if one carrier 14 15 already provides service for an area, other carriers have 16 the right to compete and provide services in the same 17 area. 18 The hearing tonight has been reserved for 19 the public first to make short statements into the These public statements are not subject to 20 record. 21 questions from the parties or the Council, and the 22 members of the public making statements may not ask 23 questions of the parties or the Council. These statements will become part of the record for Council 24

1	consideration. A sign-up sheet is a sign-up sheet is
2	available for those who would like to participate.
3	Now the decisions the Council needs to
4	make include, but are not limited to, whether the
5	Petitioner has met its burden of proof that there's a
6	gap in cell coverage that would be resolved by the
7	proposed facility, and whether the proposed facility will
8	have a substantial adverse effect environmental
9	effect.
10	As a reminder to all, off-the-record
11	communications with a member of the Council or a member
12	of the Council staff upon the merits of this petition is
13	prohibited by law.
14	I wish to note that parties and
15	intervenors, including their representatives and
16	witnesses, are not allowed to participate in the public
17	comment session because they have their own proceedings.
18	I also wish to note for those who are here
19	and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are
20	unable to join us for the comment session tonight, that
21	you or they may send written comments to the Council
22	within 30 days of the date hereof. And such written
23	statements will be given the same weight as if spoken at
24	the hearing tonight.

1	We ask each person making a public
2	statement in this proceeding to confine his or her
3	statements to the subject matter before the Council and
4	to avoid unreasonable repetition so we may all hear the
5	concerns that you and your neighbors may have.
6	Please be advised that the Council cannot
7	answer questions from the public about the proposal.
8	However, once everybody has had an opportunity to make a
9	statement, the Council will ask members of the Petitioner
LO	to directly address the questions and concerns expressed
L1	by you and your neighbors.
L2	A verbatim transcript will be made of the
L3	hearing and deposited in the Town Clerk's Office of
L 4	Greenwich for the convenience of the public.
L5	Is Senator Frantz here?
L 6	A VOICE: He spoke earlier, but he's not -
L7	_
L8	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Yes, he did, that's
L 9	right. Is Representative Carmillo here?
20	A VOICE: He's in transit.
21	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Okay. Before I
22	call on members of the public to make statements, I would
23	ask the Petitioner to make a very brief presentation to
24	the public describing where the facility is proposed to

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1 be located, why it is necessary, and what alternatives 2 were investigated. 3 MR. CHRISTOPHER B. FISHER: Good evening. 4 My name is Chris Fisher. I represent AT&T. 5 As Vice Chairman Tait mentioned, this is a 6 proposal by AT&T in a petition pending before the Council 7 principally to improve wireless service in the area around Valley Road and Westover Road in Greenwich and 8 9 Stamford. 10 The proposal itself involves the Aquarion 11 Water Treatment Facility, as most of you know I'm sure, 12 located on Valley Road. The details of the facility are included in a number of the submissions that AT&T has 13 14 made to the Council, but just to briefly describe it --15 Peter, if you could just help -- Peter, could you help me 16 just for a second -- thanks -- we've got some photos --17 (pause) 18 MR. FISHER: The easiest way to describe 19 this is by using the photosimulations that are included in what the Council has received. What you see on the 20 21 left is the existing water tank. This shot was taken in 22 close proximity to the water tank along Valley Road. 23 What you see on the right is the actual 24 proposed facility. AT&T would propose to install a tower

1 structure on top of the water tank. It would extend 2 approximately 17 and a half feet above the water tank. 3 It would be enclosed within a stealth material enclosure and painted green to match the water tank. The overall 5 height as extended would go to 64 feet above grade at the 6 location of the water tank itself. The additional 7 details for the facility are included on the plans that have been submitted. 8 9 Immediately adjacent to the water tank 10 there would be a 150 square foot shelter. It would have 11 a brick façade and a pitched roof; it would look like a 12 Within that shelter would be the equipment and 13 other components of the facility itself to make it 14 operate and be able to provide service in the area. These are some additional details that are 15 16 included in the drawings. As you can see, all of the 17 tower work, antennas, and other components of the 18 facility on the water tank would be enclosed within that 19 structure. 20 Chairman, I believe that's our 21 presentation. 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you. now call on members of the public from the list that I 23 24 have before me. There's a list to be signed by the

1	microphone if you haven't signed up and would like to
2	speak. Mr. Peter Moss, followed by Sam Romeo. Would you
3	spell your
4	MR. PETER MOSS: I am Peter Moss
5	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Spell your name and
6	give us your address so the court reporter can get it.
7	MR. MOSS: M-o-s-s
8	A VOICE: I'm not sure that microphone
9	COURT REPORTER: Your microphone is not -
10	_
11	AUDIO TECHNICIAN: The microphone is not
12	on.
13	MR. MOSS: Oh, I'm sorry. Can you hear me
14	now (audio feedback)
15	A VOICE: Yes, we can.
16	MR. MOSS: Hi
17	COURT REPORTER: Spell your last name
18	MR. MOSS: how is this?
19	VOICE: Yes.
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: It sounds okay.
21	MR. MOSS: I live at 690 River Road in Cos
22	Cob. I have been involved for several decades in trying
23	to protect the Mianus River in various ways, including
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being deeply involved in the establishment of what's

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I think this is a really lousy proposal.

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called the Mianus River Greenway, which this is in, which
is an official state greenway. In fact, the first
official state greenway. I am also on the Board of the
Mianus River Watershed Council, and in the past have been
on the DEP Rivers Advisory Committee and the Connecticut
Greenways Council.

In fact, I would call it abusive. Abusive to the neighbors who live so close to it, abusive to the public because it adds an ugly projection to the view of a lovely pond that many people appreciate by various views and even boating on the pond, but most of all abusive to just about every concept we have of watershed protection and water supply protection. It violates Greenwich's setback requirements from drinking water sources. It

violates every idea of water company land protection.

I am absolutely dismayed that AT&T has provided you apparently with maps that indicate, falsely in my opinion, that this site is not Class 1 watershed land. They somehow have found someone to draw, from what I saw, a little yellow dashed line between the water tank and the river and said that Class 1 is only on the river side of that line. But you can just look at that picture and know that -- that it, for one thing, drains into the

1 Probably they were -- they were saying it doesn't river. 2 drain into the river, but in fact if you look at the 3 statute defining Class 1 land, it simply says land -- all land owned by a water company which is within 250 feet of high water or reservoir. It actually doesn't even say 5 6 anything about drainage. But in fact, this water tank --7 (audio failure) -- unrelated to water supply on Class 1 water company land. It would be hard pressed even on 8 9 Class 2 water company land. 10 I should also point out that even 11 drainage below it drains -- that the river goes 12 eventually into something called Mianus Pond, which is about a mile downstream and formed by a different dam 13 14 that has an official status as an emergency backup water 15 supply in case of a drought emergency. The idea being 16 presumably that that water could be pumped back up to the 17 filter plant and treated if -- if there was that serious 18 a drought. 19

o'clock and I think there were just many unanswered questions. For example, exactly what is going to be in this equipment shed, what kind of chemicals are going to be there, is it going to be a bank of batteries, are they lead acid batteries, is there going to be the possibility

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of sulfuric acid leaks of batteries exploding? This 1 2 whole idea of a backup generator with probably gasoline 3 or diesel fuel supply, the Applicant wants you to believe that in a blizzard with no power, with panic, that people 5 are always going to put this in exactly the right place 6 and if there's a leak, nothing will end up in the river. 7 I find that hard to believe. And I think the neighbors really need more time to dig into these things. People 8 9 haven't known about this very long and there are a lot of 10 unanswered questions. They -- they didn't even know what 11 the water tank is used for. I think that could be an 12 issue. And what would happen if there's a hurricane or a hundred mile per hour wind that knocks this over and 13 14 damages the facility? 15 There area a couple of other issues that 16 I'd like to raise. The signal -- the electromagnetic 17 signals coming off of this right on the edge of a water 18 body, my understanding is they will bounce off the 19 water. My question is does that raise the possibility 20 that the bouncing signals combined with the direct 21 signals could cause a magnitude of field that would 22 exceed federal standards for those houses right across 23 the river from it? I -- I think you should get that 24 answered.

1 The same is actually true of noise. 2 I heard them talk about some noise emanating from the 3 backup facilities. This pond is an incredible amplifier or at least carrier of noise. In my experience if people 5 are having a conversation there, you can hear it houses 6 across the pond, like 400 yards up the pond, as if 7 they're talking right in your backyard. And if there's a 8 constant noise from there, that's going to be an issue 9 for people who live there. 10 I -- I'd like to make a general comment 11 and I hope it's not out of line. I -- I hope it won't 12 shock you if I say that for anyone who's been observing this cell tower business around here, the process is out 13 14 of control. It sort of reminds me of the bank branch 15 issue -- (laughter) -- where they seem to try to build 16 things anywhere they can, anywhere it's easy to do it, and maybe for similar kind of reasons, to preclude a 17 18 competitor for doing it or just because it is the 19 easiest and cheapest site. If this process were working 20 properly, people would be identifying the best possible 21 sites, the least intrusive sites, and make all of them 22 share them. Now this area already has AT&T signals --23 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: We -- we have a lot 24 of people here tonight, sir, that would like to speak, so

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2	MR. MOSS: Yeah. Well I just wanted to
3	make the point there are alternatives, there are other
4	I know of other sites that would be better than this
5	though I won't go into that. There are AT&T signals,
6	there are even better Verizon signals. Why aren't they
7	sharing the source of those signals. Or the idea of more
8	expensive technology, they should be paying the cost.
9	The neighbors and the public should not be paying the
10	cost. The users of the services should be paying the
11	cost.
12	But but most of all, this is a bad idea
13	because of the water supply issues. To me it would be
14	unbelievable to approve something with the potential
15	dangers this has literally 50 feet from the entrance to a
16	major public water supply. It it would just be an
17	astonishingly bad precedent. Thank you.
18	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you, sir.
19	(applause)
20	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Mr. Romeo, followed
21	by Mr. Harris. Is Sam Romeo here?
22	A VOICE: He's late.
23	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Is Mr. Harris here?
24	Followed by Scott Coffrey.

1	A VOICE:	Caffrey.

- 2 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Caffrey. I'm
- 3 sorry. Give -- spell your name for the court reporter
- 4 and give your address, sir.
- 5 MR. RICK HARRIS: Yes, sir. My name is
- 6 Rick Harris, H-a-r-r-i-s. And my address is 664 River
- 7 Road in Cos Cob.
- 8 You know, Peter did a good job of
- 9 basically sharing I think all of our neighbors' and
- 10 citizens' sentiments and concerns. To just maybe take
- 11 that one extra level -- and you guys, the members of the
- 12 Siting Council here, you have a really difficult task at
- 13 hand. I mean how do you weigh out whether one extra bar
- of service on someone's cell phone is worth all of this?
- 15 Imagine a bunch of neighbors just kind of going against a
- big conglomerate like AT&T to say no and to find a better
- 17 location. It's like -- as Peter said, it's almost
- impossible.
- And you know, this is the wrong site.
- 20 This affects peoples' houses visually, a neighborhood, a
- 21 pond. And then there's the environmental concerns. I'm
- not smart enough to know about the waves and if it
- 23 bounces off the water and if it hurts and all that stuff,
- 24 but it just seems wrong. It seems like there could be

- better locations. It seems like there's alternatives
- 2 here. And we are not getting the time to discuss it.
- 3 We're not getting a chance -- it's like everything is
- 4 happening one, two, three.
- 5 I'm sure most of the citizens here and
- 6 neighbors are aware of what happened with Verizon last
- 7 week. Their cell tower site on King Street and a diesel
- 8 tank leaked almost 900 gallons of diesel fuel into a
- 9 stream that was almost 800 plus feet away. It wasn't
- supposed to happen, there was containments, there was
- 11 failsafes, there was everything in place. And guess
- what? It happened. Today one of the attorneys for AT&T
- 13 -- and I don't want to misquote it, but I believe they
- said that there's no plans for a generator right now,
- 15 which means that maybe there are later. And you know
- 16 what, thinking of that, 50 feet away from a drinking
- water supply that Aquarion supplies 130,000 plus people,
- 18 households with that water.
- 19 And I get it guys. We live in a day and
- age of cell phones. We live in a day and age where cell
- 21 phones are necessary. I have one. But guess what, the
- 22 Titanic wasn't supposed to sink, the space shuttle wasn't
- 23 supposed to blow up. Stuff happens. And god forbid if
- any of that happened right here on our drinking water, it

- 1 would just be horrific.
- 2 So I just implore you people to say no to
- 3 this, work together and let's find another location, and
- 4 there has to be better places. Thank you.
- 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you, sir.
- 6 (applause)
- 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Mr. Caffrey,
- 8 followed by Tom Aggresta -- I'm sorry if I mispronounced
- 9 your name, sir. I can't quite read the name. Tom -- A-
- 10 g-g --
- 11 A VOICE: That's okay, I got it.
- 12 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: You got it. I'm
- sorry, sir. My handwriting is terrible, so I sympathize.
- Okay, Mr. Caffrey.
- 15 MR. SCOTT CAFFREY: Hi. My name is Scott
- 16 Caffrey, spelled C-a, f as in Frank, f as in Frank, r-e-
- 17 y. I live on 4 North Street in Cos Cob, Connecticut.
- 18 Well thank you first for the opportunity
- this evening to present to you and to voice my concern
- 20 over this issue.
- Just to give you a brief background of my
- 22 relationship with the community of Greenwich, I grew up
- 23 here in Greenwich. I moved away for about 12 years for
- 24 school. I -- I did some service for a year where I --

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1 through a Catholic program and taught English in 2 Thailand, and I worked for a few years prior to deciding 3 to come back to Greenwich with my wife to raise a family. We looked at over 30 houses in the area and -- before 5 finding our current home in North Mianus, where we have 6 been for now -- for two years now, and we're raising a 7 son who's a little bit less than a year old. attracted us to North Mianus was the neighborhood, as 8 9 well as the proximity to a nursery school, as well as an 10 elementary school which is in walking distance of your 11 home and where I hope to send my son when he's of proper 12 age. We live at the top of the hill on North 13 14 Street and have direct sight to the water tank. With the 15 cell tower, it's going to be an obvious obstruction of 16 our view, of our beautiful area, which was a major 17 attraction for us to come to North Mianus. The height of 18 this structure as you know is going to increase by about 19 33 percent, from 46 to 64 feet. And simply, it's going 20 to look ridiculous in an area where the only thing else 21 you see are the tops of rooftops, as well as the tops of 22 trees. 23 On one hand the water tower is necessary for the safety of the community. This proposed cell 24

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1 tower is not necessary. We live in a neighborhood where 2 it's all commercialized and simply do not need, nor do we 3 want a cell tower in our neighborhood. Now from AT&T's perspective this is simply a business issue. 5 trying to build as many towers wherever they can to make as much money as they can. They're trying to take the 6 human element out of this decision. And I think that's 7 simply wrong. 8 9 You know, from my perspective this is a 10 quality of life issue and I just do not see any benefit 11 at all that this cell tower brings to our neighborhood. 12 So in summary, just to reiterate, as a 13 concerned parent, property owner and resident, I do not 14 believe that this cell tower will bring any benefit to 15 our community. And once again, I thank you for your 16 time, and I encourage you to consider what you would do 17 in our shoes to protect your family and your quality of 18 life. Thank you. 19 (applause) 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you. Tom --21 MR. TOM AGRESTA: Tom Agresta. That's all 22 right. It's a good American name. A-g-r-e-s-t-a. I 23 live at 674 River Road, which is directly -- is that all right -- directly across from -- from this tank. We've 24

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been there since '93, so I've seen everything on this
river for the past 20 years.

And I was at the 3:00 o'clock earlier today and there were a couple of things that I wanted to talk about that was kind of wrong. First, it was a mild day on the river. It was not a windy day. That wind whips. It whips so much that we have a canoe that was not tied down one day and it took it and blew it across the river to the other bank. So that was a very mild day today. So we were talking about the balloons floating away, it — it was a mild wind.

The other thing is we talked about dropped calls, I work in the city and I take the train, I work 14 hours, but today I came in and I stayed here and I was on my cell phone the entire day, and not one dropped call. So that tells me that there are current towers, current service not being used by this company. So when it comes to that point, I don't know if I can trust much of what I heard at 3:00 o'clock.

But what I really want to talk about is the value that it's going to affect the property in the neighborhood. Part of it -- it's -- it's going to, obviously we all know, reduce the value of our properties. And to me that's very important because I've

1 taken my life there very seriously. I had a sewer -- I 2 mean I had a septic tank, which I cleaned out yearly. In 3 fact, my septic guy said I do it too often. But I did not want any spill from my septic into that river. 5 have never used fertilizers and I've never used 6 pesticides. The town was asked by I think some state 7 department to clean up these rivers and they forced us to connect to a sewer system. The sewer system -- just to 8 9 be part of the program was \$20,000.00 out of my taxes, 10 personal taxes. And then for me to connect from where I live because it was through rock ledge, three days of 11 12 blasting, it was over \$20,000.00. I am \$40,000.00 in hock to keep this river clean. And now we're being 13 14 presented with this Frankenstein tower. I -- so -- I 15 know people sacrifice a lot more than I do, but at the 16 same time sometimes enough is enough. 17 I've cleaned -- I've crossed the river and 18 I've cleaned the banks. Aquarion, look at the mess that 19 they leave on their yard. I call them every year, please 20 clean up. They think that's clean. There's a propane 21 tank there and there's two empty cases I believe of chlorine sitting there, those two white boxes. I mean 22 23 I'm losing my motivation to take care of this river. this is just going to be the nail in the coffin. 24

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1 So I think we have to ask more questions 2 of why this is necessary. I don't believe it is. 3 biggest question is -- I had service all day. Why aren't they on those same towers that already exist? That's 5 about it. Thank you. 6 (applause) 7 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you, sir. 8 (pause - tape change) 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Mr. Luzzi -- Robert 10 Luzzi, followed by Liz Menten. 11 MR. ROBERT LUZZI: Good evening. I'm 12 Robert Luzzi. That's L-u-z-z-i. Those are z's like I live at 16 Chestnut Street in Cos Cob with my 13 14 wife Yasuko, who is sitting right here with my two young 15 kids, Darren who's four and Matthew who's eight. Our 16 house is 125 meters from the proposed tower. When we 17 bought this house only eight months ago, our only major 18 concern was that the Aquarion water facility exists in 19 this otherwise residential neighborhood. 20 We were okay with the way the facility is 21 currently built and used for water use, but we were worried about what other commercial use this land might 22 23 be used for in the future. So my wife was very diligent 24 and she went down to town hall, she got a copy of the

1 deed provided by the town to Aquarion, and we were 2 comforted by the restrictive covenant in the deed, which 3 says very succinctly -- and I'll read it to you because it's very short and very clear -- the premises hereby 5 conveyed shall be used for water works purposes and shall 6 revert to the town herein if successor and assigns in the 7 event the premises cease to be used for water works purposes. To lay folks like us, this unambiguous 8 9 language seemed very clear to very clearly limit the land 10 to water use. But just in case, we had our real estate 11 attorney review the deed, and he came to the very same 12 conclusion. As you can imagine, my wife and I are now horrified that AT&T and Aquarion are considering a cell 13 14 tower on this site, because no reasonable person can 15 conclude that a cell tower has any connection whatsoever 16 with water use. 17 How can such a clear and undisputable 18 restrictive covenant be so clearly disregarded? In fact, 19 if land was restricted to water use -- that was 20 restricted to water use can now be used for cell phone 21 transmissions, what other non-water use can it be used 22 for next? Where do we draw the line? What, if any, 23 rights do neighboring property owners have against such a violation of a deed restriction we relied upon in 24

purchasing this property. This is a very big -- this is 1 2 perhaps the biggest investment most or all of us make. 3 As my tall house stands at the top of the 4 steep hill where North Street meets Chestnut far above 5 the Mianus River Valley base of the proposed tower, part 6 of my house is now -- will be level with the tip of the tower. My wife looked out of our house today and smack 7 level with our house she was looking at that balloon 8 9 only 125 meters away. This means that not only will I be 10 able to clearly see the tower from my house, but my home, 11 like countless other homes in this hilly neighborhood, 12 will receive the direct impact of the RH emissions from the proposed tower. In fact, my children's bedrooms and 13 14 those of many other kids in the neighborhood may be 15 directly or nearly level with the tip of that tower and 16 getting hit directly by that -- by those emissions. 17 Additionally, this residential area will 18 now have to endure the construction noise and traffic, 19 and subsequently the AT&T employees coming in and out of 20 the area to maintain and service the facility. 21 For all of these reasons, in addition to 22 the others mentioned by my fellow peers before me, I 23 respectfully beseech the CSC to reject this cell tower proposal and find a less harmful location for it. 24

2	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you.
3	(applause)
4	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Miss Menten,
5	followed by Steve Dolan.
6	MS. ELIZABETH MENTEN: Thank you for this
7	opportunity to speak as a member of this community. My
8	name is Elizabeth Menten, M-e-n-t-e-n, and I own a home
9	directly across from the water from Aquarion at 656
10	River Road in Cos Cob. My family has been in town for 40
11	years, and I've raised three children in this
12	neighborhood. It's a great neighborhood and it's filled
13	with wonderful families.
14	Simply put, this is such a bad idea, that
15	it frightens me that it has gotten this far. We are
16	talking about compromising a scarce and precious
17	resource, drinking water, for the sake of AT&T's bottom
18	line.
19	I think most of us know and are fully
20	aware of the variety of alternatives to this tower that
21	are available and in use today, DAS being the primary
22	among them, and microcells, and it goes on and on. For
23	so many reasons, but the most obvious being our new
24	climate of weather extremes, it's not it is not safe

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- 1 as proposed, nor can I envision an adaptation which could
- 2 make the erection of such a structure immediately
- 3 adjacent to a water supply safe. No. The answer must be
- 4 no.
- 5 Senator Frantz clearly outlined the
- issues this afternoon, and I would second that statement.
- 7 He -- he spoke briefly about driving down Valley Road and
- 8 losing coverage for a moment. I think that it's come to
- 9 be understood that using your cell phone in the car, with
- or without your hands, is unadvised. So if AT&T is
- 11 trying to help us to have opportunities to do that,
- they're not doing anybody a service. If there is an
- issue for somebody in particular with AT&T in their home,
- 14 they can buy a booster, which I have, and there's no
- problem. So we don't need this cell tower.
- 16 Despite the unseemly maneuver by AT&T to
- 17 circumvent our town's commissions, a further indication
- 18 of how bad a concept this is, the answer must still be
- 19 no. Thank you.
- 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you.
- 21 (applause)
- 22 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Steve Dolan,
- followed by Elizabeth Agresta.
- 24 MR. STEVEN DOLAN: Hi, good evening.

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Steven Dolan, D-o-l-a-n. I reside at 2 Palmer Terrace, 1 2 Riverside, with my wife and three children, and I'm a 3 friend of the neighbors and intervenors. 4 As a citizen, taxpayer, and voter of the State of Connecticut, there's something that really 5 6 concerns me. I find it very troubling that when these 7 neighbors asked for a 30-day delay in these proceedings, 8 AT&T made zero concession. In addition to that, they 9 were unable to come up with any reason why a reasonable 10 delay would cause them any grief. 11 An extension would allow -- would have 12 allowed for additional time to review the application, as well as potential risks; for example, environmental 13 14 risks. And I think we all understand what happened with 15 Verizon Wireless as they demonstrated last week in Rye 16 Brook. 17 In addition to that, it was brought to my 18 attention that after today's survey, there could be some 19 questions about the structural integrity of the water 20 tower. 21 Greenwich neighbors of the two previous cell tower applications had many, many months and time to 22 23 prepare for the action needed to take to make these important decisions. In addition to their everyday 24

1 family work and commitments, these guys, these neighbors 2 had less than 90 days to research -- to do the research 3 necessary to confront a multi-national company that is 4 AT&T Wireless. 5 From their action it's very clear that AT&T has absolutely no intention to consider the public 6 7 input, nor consider alternative designs that would be in 8 less conflict with this residential area. 9 It scares me as a resident of Greenwich to 10 think that a company like AT&T can come on in and 11 steamroll a neighborhood for their own commercial gain. 12 Thanks for your time tonight. 13 (applause) 14 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Elizabeth Agresta. 15 MS. ELIZABETH AGRESTA: My name is 16 Elizabeth Agresta, A-q-r-e-s-t-a. My husband, Thomas, my 17 three children and I live at 674 River Road in Cos Cob, 18 across the river from the proposed cell tower. 19 The Aquarion Water Company is located on a 20 property rich in historical value and interests. I would 21 like to give you a brief sampling of this. According to 22 information taken from an article by Susan Nova of News 23 Times and the Historical Society of the Town of 24 Greenwich, this site in North Mianus was the first

1	business center in Greenwich with activities centering
2	around John Hayes Saw and Gristmill of 1688, some 324
3	years ago. It remained a sawmill for 125 years and
4	throughout the remainder of the 1600's all the way
5	through the 1700's until in 1815 when it became a paper
6	mill. From then on the mill changed ownership and
7	purpose throughout the 1800's. There was once again a
8	sawmill, but then an iron works, a woolen mill, a metal
9	works, rolling mill, and a wire mill. This site
10	witnessed history in the manufacture of ax handles,
11	hickory spikes for carriage wheels, metal railroad
12	spikes, wire hoops for hoop skirts, and shoddy, an
13	inexpensive woolen yard which later came into high demand
14	for use in horse blankets during the Civil War.
15	In the last year of the 1800's, Frederick
16	Springer, Chairman of the Board of Ed, a board member of
17	the Bruce Museum, the Director of Greenwich Trust Company
18	and so much more, founded the Mianus Manufacturing
19	Company, producing carriage robes, imitation furs, and
20	the ever popular teddy bear. Then almost 40 years later
21	in 1938 the mill burned to the ground.
22	The water filtration plant stands on the
23	old mill site and it remains surrounded by what was at
24	one time inexpensive housing built for the workers.

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1 Susan Nova in her research with Cleveland Dublin Arnolds 2 notes that where possible original details have been 3 preserved. The old stairways and doors, the doorframes, the nine-foot first floor ceilings and the wide board 5 floors, effort has been made by the homeowners to 6 acknowledge and preserve historic value. This area has 7 played quite a role in the Greenwich community for 8 hundreds of years. Prior to the water filtration plant, 9 which is supposed to be used for water purposes only, there once was a mill. 10 11 My husband and -- my husband and I bought 12 our home almost 20 years ago because we fell in love with the charm and respectful nature of the area. The water 13 14 tank is of course an anomalous structure in the 15 neighborhood. Adding on to such a structure lacks 16 respect for the heritage and nature of this community. 17 Thank you. 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you. 19 (applause) 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Christopher Von 21 Keyserling, followed by Sam Romeo. 22 MR. CHRISTOPHER VON KEYSERLING: ladies and gentlemen of the commission. 23 24 I didn't realize I was that fast up on the

- 2 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Could you -- could
- 3 you spell --
- 4 MR. VON KEYSERLING: I am --
- 5 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Spell your name,
- 6 sir --

- 10 MR. VON KEYSERLING: It's Christopher Von
- 11 Keyserling, V-o-n, space, K-e-y-s-e-r-l-i-n-g. I am
- officially at 400 East Putnam Avenue. I'm on the RTM
- from District 8. I've been there for some 25 years
- 14 representing this district.
- I did want to say before I start that Mr.
- 16 Sam Romeo is on his way. I didn't mean to put him up
- 17 right away. I just wanted to -- usually we have a long a
- speaker list, and it's good to get, you know, into the
- 19 pipeline, so he should be here shortly. He represents
- 20 both as president of the Mianus Valley Association, which
- is the neighborhood association for that whole upper
- 22 valley that we're talking about on both sides, but also
- 23 many years on the RTM, and has been a commissioner of
- 24 many offices in the Town of Greenwich. I, on the other

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1 hand, have been busy in planning and zoning all my life.

2 That's been my -- my forte with the communities and the

3 neighborhoods.

when I first looked at the deed that was presented to me by some of our neighbors here in District 8, I'm concerned about the process of how the water company got this property and for what uses. It looked to me like it was not exclusively for water use. What they're more concerned is that the water use would continue. It didn't necessarily specify or exclude other kind of uses or ancillary uses. So I thought, boy, that looks pretty dark, you know, given what's at stake and the parsing that's going to go on. I have since found out that there has been a letter from the Planning and Zoning back where the town claimed exclusive use for the water company use, and if it was not maintained exclusively, it should revert to the town's property.

It's something which we even today are concerned about in Greenwich. When you have a municipal use or a quasi-municipal use -- and certainly your commission is more sensitive to this than others would be -- this is a use that oftentimes intrudes into residential areas and causes a conflict in peoples'

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comfort purpose. To put in a firehouse, a school, a 2 recycling center, or any large municipal thing, which the 3 community has to have, there's always a problem of where it goes. And this is what you're dealing with. 5 was very careful about this. We have to have a water 6 company, we have to have this, you know, primary, you 7 know, important supply, but we don't want it to be 8 exceeded, and we certainly don't want it to be the 9 grounds of profit. There have been lately in some of the 10 issues of water companies where they've sold off their 11 reservoir lands or watershed lands for housing 12 development and other things and made profit on it, not 13 from their water company business, but from their real 14 estate business if you like. 15 This is somewhat the same idea. We have a 16 situation where the water company is dealing with a 17 vantage to them that has nothing to do with their water 18 processing or supplying of public water. The town did 19 not want that. We don't want to do something that we did 20 for the public good and then have it converted into 21 something for the private good of the beneficiary. So we 22 put a clause in saying that it shall not be used -- to be 23 used for the specific public purpose which is essential.

But there shouldn't be any ancillary benefit or

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profiteering, if you want, for any other purpose from this. And if it's converted from water company use to any other uses, you're breaching the purpose for which we sold you this land.

I'm sure you'll get more legal papers on this and the black and white on it. But if you take that and if that condition holds, as I think it should because it was a statement by the Planning and Zoning back in the '50s, an agent for the Town of Greenwich, then I would say that this water company does not -- is not a valid landlord or does not have the valid ability to supply the residency for this tower in the first place and it contravenes the good faith between the town and the water company, and it certainly does not give access to this property site by AT&T, whatever their meritorious reasons are.

So I hope you will consider that. And I and certainly other representatives of the town are going to urge the town to join the neighbors in opposition to this on the basis of that deed restriction. Thank you.

23 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Wanda Read -- is

Wanda Read here? Good to see you again.

POST REPORTING SERVICE

1 MS. WANDA READ: Hello. My name is Wanda 2 Read, R-e-a-d. My husband and I own property right 3 across from the tank at 460 Valley Road. Our home is, as I said, immediately opposite to the water tank of 5 Aquarion at 450 -- 455 Valley Road. 6 When we purchase our house in 1998, our 7 understanding was that 455 Valley Road was used for water 8 supply only. And at that time the tank was screened by 9 shrubs and trees, which since then fell or been cut. 10 Also we -- our understanding was that when the sale of 11 the land to -- to the water company was approved, it was 12 based exclusively for water use, as well as the tank should have been screened. And I guess the first owner 13 14 really screen the tank because the trees that are old, 15 you can see they are above the tank, but anything below 16 it's been cut. 17 Since acquiring the place, Aquarion has 18 been very poor neighbors -- neighbor to those of us 19 living or using Valley Road. Traffic in and out of the 20 plant has increased. Heavy and noisy trucks come and go 21 in ungodly hours, later in the evening and early in the 22 morning, as well as the landscaping company tends to mow 23 the grass or cut the grass in hours that we usually do on weekends and things like that, which is not good for our 24

1 neighborhood. 2 Aquarion also has removed and cut many 3 trees and -- which of course is a greater view of the water tank. We made personal appeal actually to the 5 staff of the water company to do something about planting new trees which might shield the water tank view. 6 7 return, they planted two small evergreens, which after 8 several years of growth they're not more than five feet 9 tall. And which nothing -- they do nothing to block the view from the water tank -- of the water tank. 10 11 In addition, Aquarion has -- and cemented 12 roadway in -- in -- within the plant. This has led to environmental concern regarding the runoff from those 13 14 roadways into Mianus. And as other neighbor mentioned, 15 we all very concern about the environment. We don't use 16 any chemicals on our plants and things like that. this is very difficult issue for us to see that Aquarion 17 18 is doing nothing but actually worsening the environmental 19 impact. 20 Total disregard by Aquarion to its 21 neighbors strongly suggests that we cannot expect

anything better if on the top of the water tank -- if the

we strongly believe that it will get worse. If the owner

top of this water tank is leased out to AT&T.

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display disregard for the neighbors, we can expect -- we can expect to hold their tenants to the highest standard?

I don't think so.

We fear that adding another company to the water plant site will at least increase traffic flow, noise, and in likelihood will result in farther uglification of the area in the coming years as changes are made. If this cell tower is put in place, there appear to be no restricting hand to prevent changes which future scar the landscape.

As Council Members are aware, the top of the water tank is proposed -- is the proposed site for the new cell tower. The water tank has a height above -- around 47 feet. Additional 17 feet of structure resulting from the cell tower proposed -- by quick reference of what 17 feet may look like because the balloon didn't picture that very well today, if you could look at this yellow school bus, which is around 11 feet, and then you put another SUV on the top of it, then can you imagine how high that tank is going to be, what kind of eyesore it's going to be for our neighborhood. If this tower is installed, the combined height of the water tank and the cell tower structure would extend to 64 feet. So that would be around 36 percent increase from

1 the existing height.

My husband and I fully support, echo and endorse our friends and neighbors' concerns about the arguments against the proposed cell tower. However, we feel that the Federal Communication Act and Connecticut General Statutes work in favor of the telecommunication industry and against residents' interests. Therefore, I speak to you today to request that should this cell tower be given the all clear, modifications to the plant be required. And furthermore, requirements be placed upon AT&T and Aquarion to the visual screening of the new combined water tank and cell tower structure and installation of the equipment shelter.

eyesore to the surrounding homes and general public's view. Back in 2001 when SNET proposed a cell tower on top of the water tank, the water company employee described the water tank to us as a flushing tank. She told us that it was used to flush sediment out of the filter of other tanks. She also said that the water tank or flushing tank was old, defunct technology and would likely be replaced within a few years. She further said that the new flushing technology would be smaller, lower, and less obtrusive. This gives us hope that the green

1 monster's days are numbered. Regrettably, this has not 2 yet come to pass. But since SNET's cell tower was never 3 constructed and up to now the proposed AT&T cell tower become known to us, we remained hopeful. It nows -- it 5 now appears to us that should new flushing technology be in place by Aquarion and the current water tank no longer 6 7 needed, the water tank would remain on site as nothing 8 more than supporting structure for the new cell tower. 9 And as we heard today, it could be problem with 10 supporting the tower because the tank is old. Therefore, 11 AT&T positioning of the cell tower on existing tank would 12 mean that the water tank, the green monster, would never 13 go away. 14 Studies in AT&T's petition will have, 15 among others, year-round view of the tank, which is 16 accurate. The study also claimed that existing evergreen will shield the new combined water tank and cell tower 17 18 structure. As Council Members have witnessed today at 19 their site visit this statement is inaccurate. There are 20 very few evergreens which currently block the view of the water tank or in turn will block the view of the proposed 21 22 cell tower. The few evergreens that do exist have very

little, if any, foliage upon the top of the tank.

foliage above the height of the tank is sparse.

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1 There used to be a very large evergreen 2 that stood in the front of the water tank which partially 3 blocked the view from our home, our Valley Road neighbors, and from folks walking, jogging, and traveling 5 on Valley Road. The evergreen would have partially, if inadequately, blocked the view of the proposed cell 6 7 tower. Unfortunately, this evergreen fell in a storm years back. It was never replaced. Aquarion has made no 8 9 effort to screen the public's view of the water tank ever 10 since. Our neighbors on the -- on the other side of 11 Mianus River have an unobstructed view of the water tank and therefore will have an unobstructed view of combined 12 water tank plus cell tower structure. 13 14 Photographs of the plant contained in AT&T 15 petition were taken during the summer when trees in full 16 foliage. They were also taken from limited number of 17 angles. I respectfully submit that the limited number of 18 angles from which the photographs were taken, combined 19 with limited time of when the photographs were taken, 20 over-emphasize the partial coverage these deciduous trees 21 provides in the summer. 22 The petition also used these photographs 23 to create simulation of how the new cell tower would look once in place. Once again, I respectfully submit that 24

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the limited number of angles from which photographs were
taken, combined with the timing, have been used to create
simulation of how this cell tower will look, overemphasize the coverage and -- the cell tower will have.

It goes without saying that once the deciduous trees
drops their leaves, the limited screening they provide of
the water tank is farther greatly reduced. The Council

site visit today would have confirmed this.

Furthermore, anyone taking a look at the current water tank from lower story, front or backyard of those homes close to the water tank and proposed cell site will readily acknowledge photographs contained in AT&T's petition fell short of providing the full picture of how water tower looks, and more importantly how the proposed new cell tower will look to local residents and Valley Road users.

ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Okay --

MS. READ: There's also concern about noise. The Aquarion plant contains generator which creates considerable noise in use -- when it's in use. We are concerned that noise emission from the proposed equipment shelter and the backup generator would impact the well-being of the local residents. As we experienced over the last few years, eight hour battery generator,

which AT&T proposes, will not last too long, it will be not sufficient when we get the blackouts for sometimes a week or so.

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- With the above points in mind, we respectfully request that the Council make the following measures if AT&T petition is approved: Review the use of the land. It is to be used exclusively for the water purposes; AT&T proposal of how they would make sure that the water tank is truly screened by shrubbery and trees and will not impair the natural beauty of this area, as well as shield the proposed cell tower from view from all angles; also the proposed height, in 2001 SNET proposes cell tower not exceeding five feet, which is only 10 percent above the water tank structure. Technology made a huge jump over the last 10 years. We using smaller phones, we using smaller laptops. How come we have to use higher and bigger cell towers? Also a proposal how AT&T to be able to fully insulate the proposed equipment shelter to eliminate any noise emission.
- 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Can you conclude,
  21 ma'am?
- MS. READ: Yes. And that's my last point
  now. And also AT&T -- we have to make sure that AT&T
  will not increase the size of the water tank or cell

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- 1 tower in the future if they get permission because today
- 2 we were talking about putting extra structure to support
- 3 those antennas on the top.
- Those are the concerns that we have and
- 5 thank you for listening.

- In the last three years since I've been in the
- 24 legislature, I've gotten to know a lot about cell tower

1 applications. Not that I wanted to, but I've had to. 2 And I did serve on the cell tower task force three years 3 ago. I was a member of a group of legislators who had a bill passed a few years ago out of the House, it died in 5 the Senate. And then again last year we had a bill 6 passed to limit these structures within fifteen hundred 7 feet of a school, day care center, a house of worship. That passed both the House and Senate, but of course was 8 9 vetoed on a technical measure I quess, but it's going to 10 be back again. 11 Having worked on these issues before, 12 particularly the T-Mobile application a few years ago for North -- near North Mianus School -- what struck me about 13 14 this one is the speed at which it's come at everybody. I 15 received an e-mail a day before the first event down 16 there at the -- at the site. And it wasn't that well 17 attended. And the speed of it is -- you know, we had 18 time to prepare in North Mianus. The neighborhood here 19 has had very very little time to prepare. 20 And I can't for the life of me understand 21 why it has to go here because forgetting the fact that 22 it's right across the street from houses, it's in a 23 There are not that many houses there. valley.

about think 200. It's not a major thoroughfare the road.

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1 It's a cut-through. It is right on the road, which again I know the fall zone issue, I know these things don't 2 3 come down every day, but they can. You know, we had snow last year before -- before Halloween. So it certainly should be a consideration. But you know, I had AT&T for 5 a while and I don't remember ever having a problem over 6 7 there. I'm not saying it's the best reception, but I 8 don't know why this would be a target for an area where 9 really, you know, not that many people served. 10 Also, we debate every year bills. We had 11 one last year, and it's going to come back I'm sure again 12 this year, to prohibit and exclude activities and structures being sited within a hundred feet of 13 14 watercourses. This one here is in -- within about 50 15 feet. It's also a backup source for drinking water. 16 That should really raise some alarms. Again, god forbid 17 -- you know, is it likely to happen? No. But it could. And I'd rather error on the side of caution. It's better 18 19 to be safe than sorry. 20 The -- you know, the environmental aspect 21 alone I think should be enough to -- to deny it. Again, 22 everybody likes their cell phones. They don't obviously 23 want the towers. But this area here, as, you know, we saw a few years ago, really the reception wasn't that 24

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- 1 And I just think there are better places it could 2 T-Mobile did bring this up as a possible site at the one meeting I was at a few years ago. And the first 3 thing I thought was right across the street there were 5 houses. And you know, they dropped it. They didn't --6 they didn't go forward with it. 7 So again, I would just ask you all to please consider, you know, the neighbors, the fact of 8 9 where it's going, is it really needed, and the fact that 10 it's -- you know, the fall zone right on the road, and 11 also within 50 feet of a river that is a backup source of 12 drinking water. Those are all very legitimate issues. And again, I -- you know, I thank you all 13 14 for coming down here tonight. I appreciate the chance to
  - And again, I -- you know, I thank you all for coming down here tonight. I appreciate the chance to speak before you and I hope you consider these arguments very seriously. Thank you so much.
- 17 (applause)

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- 18 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you, sir.
- 19 (pause tape change)
- 20 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Mr. Cameron. If
- 21 anybody would like to speak, could you come up here and
- talk to Linda Roberts and get your name on the list.
- MR. BILL CAMERON: Good evening everyone.
- 24 My name is Bill Cameron. I live in Cos Cob. I have

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moved five times in my life, all within a mile in Cos

Cob. My people go back to the founders of the town, the

Ferrises. We've been here a long time.

Unlike my speaking predecessors tonight,

Unlike my speaking predecessors tonight,

I'm going to propose a totally ridiculous proposal. This

proposal is -- just imagine for a moment that this tower

was scheduled or proposed to go up in the front lawn of

the Holly House. What would be the outcry in the town?

There would be torchlight marches going up and down

Greenwich Avenue if such a thing was ever proposed -
(applause). Now many people don't realize in the late

50's when the plans for the Mianus throughway I-95 bridge

was originally proposed, it was supposed to go through or

over top of the Holly House. The State changed it to

save one small historic location. My point to you is

that the Mianus River is just as important as an

historical site, as the Holly House or any other area in

this town -- (applause).

You people know that 2,000 years ago native American tribes, different tribes, met at the mouth of the river to harvest the herring runs and they met in peace, and their tribes coincided without warfare on this river over 2,000 years ago. This river was fished by Teddy Roosevelt and named a particular trout

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fly after it called the Mickey Fenn. It has vast

historical important not only for the industries that

were on it, but for the river itself.

The next thing you know they're going to put barricades up alongside so that nobody can even see the river any more. There has been three changes in that river. Just above the filter plant and that pond there used to be what was called an oxbow. It was a beautiful trout stretch that woved back on itself. Long before the days of the EPA, that was bulldozed over and now you have a canal going through there. Years later when they built the lower dam beside the water plant dam, they flooded the water that day, I was there, with cement and lime. They killed every fish in the river. They paid for that.

Also, when the power plant was in business, the law was that they had to -- the water company had to supply one million gallons of water coming down that river every day to supply the power plant. The power plant is no longer there, they don't have to supply that kind of volume any more. In the dead of summertime, the trout stream is as dry as a bone.

Please don't put anything more that will destroy the view or the beauty or the historical

1 significance of the Mianus River. Thank you.

2 (applause)

3 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Mr. Roman Gotfred.

4 MR. ROMAN GOTFRED: Good afternoon. My

5 name is Roman Gotfred. I used to live in Cos Cob on

6 North Street. Now I'm working mainly with dogs. It's

7 not much of importance, but I think they have also voice

8 a little bit. And being exposed in this kind of

9 radiation, especially dogs and cats are home animals and

10 they are very sensitive to this kind of energy, I would

11 suggest not to have them near this kind of exposure.

12 Even we have a lot of electric -- electrical appliances

in our house or WiFi, everything emits to the dogs and

they are very sensitive. They can sense you coming in

15 the house and you being not there yet. So imagine what

16 kind of energy these dogs will get hit from this kind of

exposure.

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I don't want to get too far into my previous work as installer for industry, manufacturing industry. I was involved in installations of these kind of cell towers in Greece. There was a lot of protection if this -- if electrical appliances were on duty. So you couldn't go near them because you got burned. So it may

be low wattage as a system, but the emission is very

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1 strong. And for those who had once upon a time the first 2 cell phone like the box -- the big box cell phone and you 3 ever touch the container while the phone was ringing, you got burn on your hand because the emission of this WiFi -5 - or excuse me, of this frequency, it's actually 6 microwave. 7 And the same thing that we cooking our water -- going a little bit deeper from the dogs, this 8 9 kind of radiation affects water. It's proven. There are 10 -- there are -- sorry, my English is not very well --11 there studies on water and effect of energies into the 12 water, and we have this kind of energy affecting exactly a water plant. So microwave is vibrating water and it 13

faucet. We don't want to kill it more than necessary.

So (a) my opinion as experience with dogs,

I would keep them away from this kind of energy, and
because I search a little bit deeper with water, this is

changes its energy structure, not just the structure as

the atoms, but the energy structure, so you actually

killing the water you're drinking. So there's enough

chemicals in there the water comes already dead to our

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24 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Ann Palitz,

something I do not want to drink. Thank you.

- followed by Genevieve Krob.
- MS. ANN PALITZ: I live on the corner of
- 3 Shelter and Benninson Drive --
- 4 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Could you spell
- 5 your name, ma'am, please?
- MS. PALITZ: Sure. P-a-l-i-t-z. We use
- 7 AT&T cellular. My phone service is more than adequate
- 8 and I do not need any better coverage.
- 9 I will also tell you that I just drove
- 10 down from New Britain General Hospital where my mother-
- in-law went to the emergency room today. There are a lot
- of cell phone towers all along the major arteries, Route
- 9, etcetera, but I don't see them where there is a large
- density of homes. And where you are considering
- 15 approving the petition for a cell phone tower to be
- 16 erected there's a very dense population there. It's
- dense enough that we were sewered several years ago to
- 18 protect the very water supply that now potentially could
- 19 be threatened by the erection of the cell tower. There
- is a shed that is proposed to be constructed on the
- 21 property. I would ask you what is in that shed to
- 22 maintain the cell tower? I would also ask you about the
- 23 backup generator that is required by the FCC? And if you
- 24 were told it is not required for this specific cell

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1 tower, I would ask you about the directive of co-location 2 and if you are not opening up for additional towers to be 3 located and then a generator to be put on that land that supplies drinking water to over a hundred thousand people in this area -- (applause). 5 I will also tell you that my son fly 6 7 fishes there and he -- and he has been fly fishing there 8 since he was seven years old, along with many other 9 residents and non-residents of this town. And I will 10 admit to having been ticketed by the park ranger for not 11 having a fishing license. But so there is also a 12 consideration that while it is water company property, it is located in what is considered to be the Mianus 13 14 Greenway. And there has been a lot done to try and 15 preserve this environment, the natural environment, the 16 trout, etcetera. And it is a very special and unique 17 place. I see absolutely no need that is greater than 18 other considerations when you are considering balance in 19 assessing a spot to locate a cell phone tower. 20 And I guess that's about it -- (laughter) 21 -- oh, one other -- one other thing, and I don't know if 22 anyone has ever brought this up -- I will say that my 23 family is an academic family with a scientific background

and so we have been most involved in stream quality. My

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1 daughter did a study for her high school when she was a 2 junior taking samplings. And as part of her submission 3 to the Connecticut State Science Fair, which she attended up in Storrs, she collected -- you know, did a study on 5 the Mianus River. And Christmas Day, I think it was 2003 6 or -- 2004 -- after collecting samples from the Mianus 7 River, we stopped off to take a photograph of her in front of the water processing plant -- and we live less 8 9 than a third of a mile direct route from the plant, it's 10 maybe a five-minute at the most car drive -- three-minute 11 car drive -- my house was surrounded by police before my 12 daughter and my husband was back home because of Homeland 13 Security. 14 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you, ma'am. 15 MS. PALITZ: You're welcome. 16 (applause) 17 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Genevieve Krob, 18 followed by Yasuko Luzzi. 19 MS. GENEVIEVE KROB: My name is Genevieve 20 Krob, K-r-o-b, 44 Valleywood Road in Cos Cob. To echo some of the comments made 21 22 previously, this proposal seems to be moving along 23 quickly and quietly. Many people are surprised to find out the stage that it is at. I am the district leader 24

for RTM, District 8, and we have not even had an 1 2 opportunity to discuss this proposal. And I ask that you 3 continue the hearing to give us an opportunity to provide you our input in writing prior to making a decision. certainly would also like to hear from our conservation 5 6 commission about the impact on the environment. Thank 7 you. 8 (applause) 9 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Yasuko Luzzi. 10 MS. YASUKO LUZZI: Hello ladies and 11 gentlemen. My name is Yasuko Luzzi, Y-a-s-u-k-o. The 12 last name is L-u-z-z-y -- L-u-z-z-i, excuse me. I'm from 13 Japan, so excuse me, I make mistake. 14 Thank you for this opportunity I really 15 wanted to speak about. My biggest concern is radiation, 16 nothing else. And when I purchase this house eight 17 months ago, I came to town hall and then get the deed and 18 make sure that, you know, this building, Aquarion, was 19 built for water use only. And then I also spoke to 20 Aquarion, the company's manager, that any plan for the 21 future to build something else, he said no, nothing else, 22 just five years later maybe under the ground course of 23 action is planned. And then this, I was shocked.

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And we are living just within 200 feet

1 away, and we are not even informed. Thank god our nice 2 neighbors inform us and we found that -- this proposed 3 cell. And so -- anyway, you know what happened to Japan, the radiation is a big issue. Of course it's not -- and 5 there not enough study, but some company -- or country 6 already found a study that how dangerous that the 7 radiation, especially, you know, that those small 8 children or needs, you know, medical attention, those are 9 most affect people. And also in Japan we have a big 10 argument about how -- cell tower, you know, radiation 11 issue. And so I was -- I -- at least have to e 400 feet 12 away or some study says fifteen hundred feet away. And even this is not the right place. 13 14 This is a valley, it's not a flat land. And even you 15 build higher, still the same height, and then we -- we 16 are receiving radiation, unnecessary radiation any 17 moment, any second. And just for business use only. 18 It's not necessary. And please consider the other 19 location. This is not the right place. It's so 20 dangerous. Water versus electrical things, it's 21 completely opposite. You know what happens. And you know, if it's not built, it's not happen. But if it's 22 23 built, the dangers always happen. That's all I wanted to 24 say. Thank you so much.

1	(applause)
2	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: That's the end of
3	the sign-up list. Is there anybody else that would like
4	to speak?
5	MR. FRANK INTRIERI: Yes. My name is
6	Frank, the last name is Intrieri, I-n-t-r-i-e-r-i. I
7	currently reside at 29 Daffodil Lane in Cos Cob. I was
8	born and raised at 66 Valley Road and lived there for 26
9	years.
10	I think this is just not the right site
11	for the cell tower. It's a residential area, there's
12	families with young children in the neighborhood. If you
13	just were to take a ride through that area of Valley Road
14	any Saturday morning, any Sunday morning, people are
15	running, jogging, just enjoying nature and the area,
16	fishing on the river. This cell tower would not only be
17	a safety hazard for the area, but it would be an
18	additional eyesore on top of the water tower that's
19	existing. I just think it's the wrong place for it.
20	Thank you.
21	(applause)
22	MR. SAM ROMEO: Good evening. My name is
23	Sam Romeo
24	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: You're on the list?

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1 MR. ROMEO: Yeah. Well, I was at another 2 event. 3 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Yes, I understand, 4 sir. MR. ROMEO: So I'm -- I'm -- I'm thankful 5 6 that the residents had the opportunity to speak before 7 the Siting Council. However, as you can see, it's an 8 emotional issue. 9 And I'm a long lifetime resident of the 10 Town of Greenwich, former Chairman of the District 12 RTM 11 for 20 years, and former Land Use Chairman in the RTM, 12 and most recently I was -- had the pleasure of representing 535 families in a class action lawsuit 13 14 concerning sewers in the area, District 8 and District 15 12, because of pollution. The families were just as 16 passionate about saving the river and having clean 17 drinking water and the environment as they are now 18 fighting another environmental fight on a different 19 level. I don't think that the -- that AT&T has 20 21 shown the need to have another tower put in that area. 22 At best they could probably pick up another 60 customers 23 based on our own website. They had an advertisement on 24 AOL saying how great their service was and how they were

getting new customers because the service was so great.

And I think it's wrong to really impact our town with

application after application for cell towers.

And I also think it's -- I take personal

And I also think it's -- I take personal offense that it's really taken out of the hands of our town. Our planning and zoning commission -- and I worked on zoning regulations for a good number of years -- it really has no say on where these towers can and can't go, and it's given upon to you. And I'm sure each and every one of you if you had a cell tower proposal proposed in your neighborhood, you probably would feel just as passionate as we do about what's going on. So take that into consideration when you come to your decision about this application.

I remember the Mianus River long before the water company even was built there. I grew up on that river as a boy. I fished there. I almost drowned there twice because of the rapids. And when the water company did come in, it was the Connecticut American Water Company, and they opened those floodgates up, they destroyed all of the wildlife in that river. I saw hundreds and hundreds of carp that were dead at the bottom of the upper dam, and just silt and mud that floated down the Mianus River that was once great

swimming holes no longer existed because of the silt and what they did to the river. So I really didn't have too much love for the water company, but that was then and this is now.

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I think what I would like to see, and all my friends and neighbors, the only way I think we can really get the attention of Aquarion and AT&T is to hit them in the pocketbook. If -- I have two AT&T lines in my house, I plan on canceling those lines -- (applause). Anybody who has AT&T service mobile phones, cancel them, because the only way we're going to get their attention is through their pocketbooks. And the Aquarion Water Company, well they have to do business in this town. Aquarion needs to go before Planning and Zoning for application for whatever, expansions, anything they want to do on their property, and then maybe we should get more aggressive against Aquarion. We can't stop buying their water because we're locked into them, but we certainly can make their life miserable. And I think that I would rather go after them that way because I think our voices aren't really going to be heard because -- I know you've -- you've attended many, many hearings, you've listened to a lot of people come out to the Siting Council -- and I don't know how many -- how many

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1 applications you've denied, but I'm certain there's more 2 you've approved than denied over the years that you've 3 been sitting on this council, but I -- for one, I think that we have to take a stand as residents. We were 5 successful on the sewer lawsuit against the Town of 6 Greenwich. And I think each and every one of you 7 participated in that. And I quess we'll have to do the same thing moving forward. 8 9 But I -- I don't think again AT&T has 10 shown the need to have this tower put in. I don't know 11 how many customers they think they're going to be picking 12 up or improving their service for, but we certainly can eliminate some of their business by canceling our service 13 14 with them. Thank you. 15 (applause) 16 MS. ELAINE EGENCARELLI: Hi --17 ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Yes, ma'am --18 MS. EGENCARELLI: -- my name is Elaine 19 Egencarelli. It's -- the last name is Egencarelli. And 20 I've lived in Cos Cob my whole life for 42 years -- 43 21 years. 22 And I just want to say that I know that 23 AT&T has put in their little brochure or their pamphlet 24 that they're following government regulations about the

health -- being health conscious and about the radiation.

But I just want to point out that there's actually no -
you can spin that any way that you want, but there's no

healthy amount of radiation. There just isn't. So

whatever radiation comes off that cell tower, it doesn't

matter what kind of regulation you're in, it's -- there's

no healthy amount.

We have North Mianus School, which I went to as a kid, we have back then the Civic Center and now there's a really nice preschool there. We -- it's a community that's always been filled with kids. We should be thinking about -- and I'm a teacher -- so we should be thinking about our students. I teach at Hamilton Avenue, so I'm a teacher in the area. We should be thinking about our kids, we should be thinking about the animal life, we should be thinking about the plant life, and there's no amount of radiation that's good for fish, rabbits, children, the elderly, or whoever lives in that area.

So you can spin it any way that you want, you say that you're using governmental guidelines, and those are always in flux and changing because one day one set of rules is good and then another day another set of rules is good, but what you really just need to say is

- there's no amount of radiation that's good. So the
  little that I might have to be under -- and I only use my
  cell phone in an emergency, so I keep it turned off, and
  I've actually never had a call dropped from AT&T. And
  like Sam said, I would be not opposed to canceling my
  phone and never getting a cell phone again if that's what
  it takes to keep a cell tower outside of my area.

  (applause)
- 9 MR. BENJAMIN SALEEBY: Good evening. My
  10 name is Benjamin Saleeby, S-a-l-e-e-b-y. I'm at 14
  11 Serenity Lane.

I just want to say that everyone that has stood up here tonight has talked about, you know, environmental and residential and community issues, and we won't go through that again. I just want to say that this cell phone issue in our town has been kicked around from over at Pine Needam, down at North Mianus School, and here tonight, and who knows where it might end up in the future. I think the Siting Committee should listen to the residents of the town and understand that we just don't want it period. And no matter what neighborhood it's going to go in, if it every does, that there's a lot of people in this town that are objections to it. Thank you.

1	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you.
2	(applause)
3	MR. JESSE SHULTIS: My name is Jesse
4	Shultis, S-h-u-l-t-i-s. I live on 6 Chestnut Street,
5	just above the filtering plant.
6	I know that some of you and some of you
7	with your back towards me today have seen me demonstrate
8	that I was able to get several cell phone calls and
9	called out several times from the front door of the
10	filtering plant. There's no need for this. There was no
11	problem with any of my cell phone conversations. Thank
12	you.
13	ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: Thank you.
14	(applause)
15	MR. NICK EDWARDS: My name is Nick
16	Edwards, E-d-w-a-r-d-s. I'm a resident of 111 Bible
17	Street in Cos Cob. I'm a District 8 for the RTM, the
18	town of Greenwich. I also work for the Town of
19	Greenwich.
20	I am confused. I understand what's before
21	you is a mission that you're given as a siting council,
22	but where have we seen where the customers stand up and
23	say we don't want this, that somehow we as customers have
24	no choice. How many people have gotten up and said I

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1 have cell contact, I'm able to get a signal. I don't 2 hear the evidence to say, oh, there's major problems here 3 that we have to solve. We have a biased interest on the part of AT&T saying, oh, we need -- oh, no, you need 5 this. Well we are them and we're saying we don't need 6 this. So that's the one issue. 7 I really think this thing will not fly if indeed the legalities of the deed covenants are honored. 8 9 Also, the structure of the water tower itself perhaps --10 there's no engineering studies that are presented to 11 show that it's going to actually hold the weight or the

sway in the wind, which we're getting more and more, especially coming down that valley area over there on Valley Road.

So, I -- I do encourage you, even though you have a mission to try and say what's best for the community, but we as the customers are saying no thank you.

19 (applause)

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ACTING CHAIRMAN TAIT: The Council will now close the public comment session of this hearing. We thank you very much for your comments and thoughts. You have 30 days from the filing of the -- from the end of this thing to send us written comments and thoughts that

1	you have if you haven't expressed them tonight or if your
