THE HEARING OFFICER: Good evening, everyone. This remote public comment session is called to order this Tuesday, November 17, 2020, at 6:30 p.m. My name is John Morissette, Member and Presiding Officer of the Connecticut Siting council.

Other members of the Council are Robert
Hannon, designee for Commissioner Katie Dykes,
Department of Energy and Environmental Protection;

Members of the council staff are Melanie Bachman, Executive Director and Staff Attorney; Fred Cunliffe, Supervising Siting Analyst; Lisa Fontaine, Fiscal Administrator Officer.

As you are aware, there is currently a statewide effort to prevent the spread of the coronavirus. This is why the Council is holding this remote public hearing, and we ask for your patience.

If you haven't done so already, I ask that everyone please mute their computer audio and/or telephones now.

This is a continuation of the remote public

hearing that began at 2 p.m. this afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's Petition Number 1425 webpage along with a record of this matter, the public hearing notice and instructions for public access to this remote public hearing and the Council's citizens guide to Siting Council procedures.

This hearing is being held through the provision of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedure Act upon a petition from Gaylord Mountain Solar Project 2019, LLC, for a declaratory ruling pursuant to Connecticut General Statute Section 4-176, and Section 16-50K for the proposed construction, maintenance and operation of a 1.9-megawatt AC solar photovoltaic electric generating facility located at 360 Gaylord Mountain Road in Hamden, Connecticut.

This petition was received by the Council on August 7, 2020. The Council's legal notice of the date and time of this remote public hearing was published in the New Haven Register on October 2, 2020. Upon this Council's request the petitioner erected a sign at the proposed permanent access drive to the site of Gaylord Mountain Road so as

to inform the public of the name of the Petitioner, the type of facility, the remote public hearing date and contact information for the Council, the website and phone number.

This remote public comment session is reserved for members of the public who signed up in advance to make brief statements into the record. These public statements are not subject to questions from the parties or the Council, and members of the public making statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council.

Public statements will become part of the record for the Council's consideration. Please be advised that written comments may be submitted by any person within 30 days of this public hearing.

As a reminder to all, off-the-record communication with a member of the Council or a member of the Council's staff upon the merits of this petition is prohibited by law.

I wish to note that parties and interveners including their representatives and witnesses are not allowed to participate in the public comment session. I also wish to note for those who are here and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for this

public comment session that you or they may send written comments to the Council within 30 days hereof. Such written comments will be given the same weight as spoken here at the hearing. 4 Please be advised that any person may be

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removed from the remote public comment session at the discretion of the Council. Please be aware of We will remove folks if it's unruly. that. Please be advised that the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal.

The written verbatim transcript of this remote public hearing will be posted on the Council's Petition Number 1425 webpage and deposited at the Hamden and Bethany town clerk's office for the convenience of the public.

At this time I request that the petitioner make a brief presentation to the public describing the proposed facility.

Mr. Gustafson, please proceed? MATTHEW GUSTAFSON: Thank you.

Can everyone hear me all right?

Yes. THE CHAIR: Thank you.

MATTHEW GUSTAFSON: All right. Thank you.

For introduction, again my name is Matthew I'm an environmental consultant with Gustafson.

All Points Technology working on behalf of Gaylord Mountain Solar Project 2019, LLC, for the Petition Number 1425, a declaratory ruling for the proposed construction, maintenance and operation of the 1.9-megawatt AC solar photovoltaic electric generating facility located at 360 Gaylord Mountain Road in Hamden, Connecticut.

The proposed project, as stated is located at 360 Gaylord Mountain Road. The site consists of an irregular shaped parcel totaling approximately 33.6 acres consisting primarily of undeveloped forest land; to develop portions of the property to the west consisting of an electrical transmission corridor and power facility.

The proposed project as it stands will be entirely located within the eastern portions of the site consisting of mature upland forest with small areas of wetland included. A total of five wetland areas were identified on or near. The site's general topography ranges from moderate to steeply sloping, west to east facing slopes.

The facility itself will consist of approximately 6,290 400-watt photovoltaic modules. These modules will be mounted to a racking system and mounted to the ground using a ground screw

mounted racking system.

The facility is surrounded by a proposed seven-foot tall farm fence with a gravel, a permanent gravel access proposed off Gaylord Mountain Road at the far southeast site corner extending west into the project area.

The proposed electrical interconnection will tie into an existing distribution pole along the right-of-way, and a permanent site entrance off Gaylord Mountain Road. A temporary construction access road is proposed to the northwest of the facility to limit construction traffic through the main access. This proposed construction access will generally follow existing topography across the slope to limit impact with existing gravel access road currently servicing the telecommunication facility off Gaylord Mountain Road to the north.

The proposed facility will occupy an approximate 8.6 acres of the site and an additional 3.7 acres of disturbance beyond the fence limits, totaling an approximate 12.3 acres of the site.

Construction activities associated with the project will include tree clearing, installing

1 stormwater controls, installation with a 2 vegetative earthen berm for aesthetical screening, 3 racking and module installation, electrical trenching and new and temporary access road 5 development. The removal of trees beyond the fenced are 7 requires to facilitate construction and for 8 shading purposes. 9 As is mentioned previously all trees removed 10 will be flush cut and stumped to minimize ground 11 disturbance. Existing grades in the proposed 12 solar array will remain to the extent feasible. 13 With that said, I think that covers generally 14 what the project will entail as well as generally 15 where the site is located. So I'll keep it brief 16 and hand it back over to the Council. 17 Thank you for your time. Thank you, Mr. Gustafson. 18 THE CHAIR: 19 At this time I will now call for statements 20 by public officials. Mayor Leng? 21 22 (No response.) 23 24 THE CHAIR: Mr. Sharkey, would you like to address the 25 Council as well?

(No response.)

THE CHAIR: Okay. We'll move on.

We will now call Diane Hoffman to make a public statement. Diane Hoffman?

DIANE HOFFMAN: Thank you, yes. Can you hear me?

THE CHAIR: Yes, I can. Thank you.

DIANE HOFFMAN: Okay. Thank you. Honorable members of the Connecticut Siting Council, as residents of Hamden, Elizabeth Langhorne and I greatly appreciate this opportunity to speak. We have been able to review the petition and the environmental assessment for this project and have attended public working group meetings, the GC3.

We heartily support solar projects to produce energy, but oppose this project because it entails clearcutting twelve acres of forest.

As we all know, forests sequester carbon and mitigate the growing effects of climate change. The report from the GC3 forest subgroup presents as a top priority the adoption of a state policy of no net loss of forests.

In the case of this proposed facility the Hamden Tree Commission writes, this proposal to clearcut and chip over 12 acres of mature mesic

hardwood forest that is on steep slopes and contains wetlands will have substantial adverse permanent environmental impacts.

According to the regional water authority letter, the soils at this site are highly erodable. The petitioner's environmental report suggests that the developers can easily control erosion and stormwater on site, but that has not been the case with solar.

Indeed, DEEP has recently updated guidance specifically for solar and we believe that as more is learned DEEP guidance will likely be updated again regarding the amount of impervious surface that is of concern for solar projects.

The value of forest ecosystem services must also must be considered. The forest is not just a bunch of trees, but a biological community of interacting organisms and their physical environment.

One of the most important ecosystem services provided by a forest is the protection of drinking water supplies. The forest and its wetlands filter runoff that helps clean the water we drink. This solar project is in a drinking water supply watershed.

The watershed of Eaton Brook, which flows to the Mill River which flows downstream to the Lake Whitney reservoir, this reservoir is an active drinking water source for RWA customers including myself and Elizabeth.

The best way to protect drinking water is to protect forest. The environmental report for this solar project does not even mention what watershed the project is located in, or that it is in a source water protection area. This is a huge omission.

As the RWA wrote in their testimony, this solar project will result in an irretrievable loss of forestland that protects the affected RWA sources of supply in the Mill River watershed.

In addition, the Trade Commission testimony addressed countless other ecosystem services and made the point that this parcel is a critical component of a forested corridor that connects the Naugatuck State Forest and adjacent regional water authority watershed with Sleeping Giant State Park and Mill River watershed.

The entire discussion this afternoon focused on how to get approval for a, quote, challenging site, unquote, which is in fact an inappropriate

site for solar. The Q and A ignored the importance of value of the benefits of trees being removed and the goals of the state and local community in the face of an existing climate crisis.

This project does not belong in a forest. As stated by Mr. Kops, there exists appropriate sites that would be acceptable to the Town of Hamden and residents and would not involve sacrificing twelve acres of trees. So very local, statewide, and indeed global reasons we oppose the solar project and call upon you to reject the petitioner's request.

Thank you.

I'd also like to make just one other comment if I could?

THE CHAIR: Yes, Ms. Hoffman. Please continue.

DIANE HOFFMAN: Thank you. I received a message that the lack of information on the signage means some people who were, you know, and wanted to speak tonight and are most interested in speaking were not aware of the cutoff, and thus will not have an opportunity to speak, and they're wondering if this can be addressed? They would like to actually speak orally -- so you can hear her.

THE CHAIR: That's unfortunate -- but unfortunately
they missed the deadline, and the sign does comply
with the regulations of the Council. And it was
posted where the Council actually had requested it
and had the words and information that is acquired
by statute.

However, please note that anybody can file written comments within 30 days of this hearing and will be accepted and given the same weight as verbal testimony.

DIANE HOFFMAN: Okay. Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Ms. Hoffman.

That concludes the public statement section of this public comment session. The Council announces that it will continue the evidentiary session of this public hearing on Tuesday,

December 15, 2020 and 2:00 p.m. via Zoom remote conferencing. A copy of the agenda for the continued remote evidentiary hearing session will be available on the Council's Petition Number 1425 webpage along with the record in this matter, the public hearing notice, instructions for public access to the remote evidentiary hearing session and the Council's citizens guide to Siting Council procedures.

Please note that anyone who has not become a party or intervenor, but who desires to make his or her views known to the Council may file written statements with the Council until the public comment record closes.
