3 THE HEARING OFFICER: Good evening, ladies and
4 gentlemen. Can everyone hear me okay?

5 VOICES: Yes.

6 THE HEARING OFFICER: Great. Thank you.

7 This hearing is called to order this
8 Thursday, May 18, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. My name is
9 John Morissette, member and presiding officer of
10 the Connecticut Siting Council.

11 Other members of the Council are Brian
12 Golembiewski, designee for Commissioner Katie
13 Dykes of the Department of Energy and
14 Environmental Protection; Quat Nguyen, designee
15 for Chairman Marissa Paslick Gillett of the Public
16 Utilities Regulatory Authority; and Robert
17 Silvestri.

18 Members of the staff are Melanie Bachman,
19 Executive Director and Staff Attorney; Robert
20 Mercier, siting analyst; and Lisa Fontaine, fiscal
21 administrative officer.

22 If you haven't done so already, I ask that
23 everyone please mute their phones and computer
24 audios now. This is a continuation of the remote
25 public hearing that began today at 2 p.m., this

1 afternoon.

2 A copy of the prepared agenda is available on
3 the Council's Petition 1558 webpage, along with a
4 record of this matter, the public hearing notice,
5 instructions for public access to this remote
6 public hearing, and the Council's citizens' guide
7 to Siting Council procedures.

8 This hearing is held pursuant to the
9 provisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General
10 Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative
11 Procedure Act upon a petition from Community Power
12 Group, LLC, for a declaratory ruling pursuant to
13 the Connecticut General Statute Section 4-176 and
14 Section 1650k for the proposed construction,
15 maintenance, and operation of a four-megawatt AC
16 solar-voltaic electric generating facility located
17 at 24 Middle Road in Ellington, Connecticut, and
18 its electrical interconnection.

19 This petition was received by the Council on
20 January 30, 2023. The Council's legal notice of
21 the date and time of this remote public hearing
22 was published in the Journal Inquirer on April 2,
23 2023.

24 Upon this Council's request, the Petitioner
25 erected a sign in the vicinity of the proposed

1 site so as to inform the public of the name of the
2 Petitioner, the type of facility, the remote
3 public hearing date, and contact information for
4 the Council, including website and phone number.

5 Please be advised that the Council does not
6 issue permits for stormwater management. If the
7 proposed project is approved by the Council, a
8 Department of Energy and Environmental Protection
9 stormwater permit is independently required. DEEP
10 could hold public hearings on any stormwater
11 permit application.

12 Please be advised that the Council's project
13 evaluation criteria under the statute does not
14 include the consideration of property value.

15 As a reminder to all, off-the-record
16 communications with a member of the Council or a
17 member of the Council's staff upon the merits of
18 this petition is prohibited by law.

19 This remote comment session is reserved for
20 members of the public who have signed in, in
21 advance to make brief statements. These
22 limited-appearance statements are not subject to
23 questions from the parties or the Council, and
24 members of the public making statements may not
25 ask questions of the parties or the Council.

1 In accordance with the public hearing notice,
2 and in fairness to everyone who has signed up to
3 speak, these public statements will be limited to
4 three minutes. Please be advised that written
5 comments may be submitted by any person within 30
6 days of this public hearing.

7 I wish to note that parties and interveners,
8 including their representatives and witnesses, are
9 not allowed to participate in the public comment
10 session.

11 I also wish to note for those who are here
12 and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors
13 who are unable to attend to join us for this
14 public comment session, that you or they may send
15 written statements to the Council within 30 days
16 of the date hereof by mail or by e-mail.

17 Please be advised that any person may be
18 removed from the remote public comment session at
19 the discretion of the Council.

20 We ask that each person making a
21 limited-appearance statement in this proceeding to
22 confine his or her statements to the subject
23 matter before the Council, and to avoid
24 unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all
25 the concerns that you and your neighbors may have.

1 Please be advised the Council cannot answer
2 questions from the public about the proposal.

3 A verbatim transcript will be made of this
4 hearing and deposited in the Ellington Town
5 Clerk's Office for the convenience of the public.

6 At this time, I request the Petitioner make a
7 very brief presentation to the public describing
8 the proposed facility. I believe that's
9 Mr. Borkowski who's going to do that.

10 THE WITNESS (Borkowski): Yes. That would be

11 Mr. Borkowski, from Community Power Group.

12 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Please continue.

13 THE WITNESS (Borkowski): Yes, my name is

14 Mr. Borkowski, Michael Borkowski from Community
15 Power Group. I am the President of Community
16 Power Group.

17 Community Power Group has more than 250
18 megawatts of operating solar and more than 500
19 megawatts of solar in development in the states of
20 New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Delaware,
21 Maryland, Virginia, Illinois, and Colorado.

22 Projects range in size from 2 acres to a
23 thousand acres, with the majority of those
24 projects being 10 to 30 acres. We focus on
25 environmentally prudent practices including

1 pollinator-friendly ground cover, agrovoltaics,
2 game fencing, and other items that make a project
3 work in its environment.

4 This project is a four-megawatt project off
5 Middle Road. It's been selected by the State of
6 Connecticut already for the shared clean energy
7 facility, the SCEF program, which will be
8 providing energy to low- to moderate-income
9 families as well as small businesses.

10 Interconnection was explored for both Pinney
11 Street as well as Middle Road. Due to certain
12 constraints noted by the utility, the utility
13 instructed us to have the interconnection and
14 access off of Middle Road.

15 Based on certain feedback from community
16 members earlier during this year, we pushed back
17 the interconnect, the first pole of the
18 interconnect, which was previously at
19 approximately 25 feet off the side of the road, to
20 more than 120 feet. So the first pole would be
21 that much further away.

22 For reference, the project up the road from
23 this one in East Windsor, those poles are less
24 than 50 feet off the road, and all of its
25 transformer and other equipment are approximately

1 80 feet off the road.

2 The transformers for this project will be
3 more than 400 feet from the road, and more than
4 250 feet from the nearest property line. The
5 inverters are more than 300 feet from the nearest
6 resident, where again the East Windsor was only 80
7 feet from the road.

8 Landscape is being proposed. This plan
9 that's currently being shown on the presentation
10 is much more of just a solar placement plan. I
11 believe there is one more slide here that shows
12 where the landscaping would be, which are those
13 green lines. And so that, that is the expected
14 landscaping. It would be with evergreen trees
15 that will grow to 20 to 25 feet high.

16 Traffic during the construction of the
17 project is expected -- the construction of the
18 project is expected to last approximately four
19 months. The majority of traffic will be
20 approximately four to eight small personal
21 vehicles. The -- there will be approximately
22 eight large truck deliveries throughout the
23 construction period.

24 The panels that are being used on this
25 facility are made of polycrystalline panels and do

1 not contain the heavy metals that have been
2 identified with thin film panels, and we would not
3 be using those panels.

4 This is a high-level overview of our project.
5 There is more information available through
6 publicly available information.

7 Thank you.

8 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Borkowski.

9 We'll now call on Mary Cardin and Michael
10 Taft to make a public statement, followed by Seth
11 Bahler.

12 Mary Cardin and Michael Taft.

13 MARY CARDIN: Hi, my name is Mary Cardin.

14 Can you hear me?

15 THE HEARING OFFICER: Yes, I can hear you fine.

16 Thank you.

17 MARY CARDIN: Okay. I'm going to be speaking on behalf
18 of my husband. We live at 32 Middle Road. I
19 think that our house is the closest to the solar
20 panels. It's about 230 feet -- 38 feet from our
21 back property.

22 We're very concerned that this is not an
23 appropriate location for a solar facility. It's
24 in the middle of a residential neighborhood, and
25 in the field or plot of property that it's being

1 placed it's being placed very close to the houses,
2 as opposed to further into the whole property
3 where it would be further away from the houses.

4 Obviously, this property is going to benefit
5 the developer because they're going to make a lot
6 of money selling this, the solar energy from this
7 property. And we're supportive of solar
8 development, but just not in a location that's so
9 close to where people live.

10 The impact of this development, both to the
11 neighborhood and the town, the abutters, the
12 people who live across from the entrance road that
13 will be made to go into this facility property is
14 going to last for at least a generation. It's
15 going to alter, you know, the way that people live
16 here.

17 And I know that there have been reports about
18 the environmental impact, but there's definitely
19 going to be an environmental impact. There's
20 wildlife that uses that property all the time.
21 We've lived here for 30 years, and it's going to
22 alter that definitively from our experience.

23 A couple of comments. I listened to almost
24 all of the hearing and got feedback on the small
25 portion that I couldn't be at this afternoon.

1 And a couple of things -- one of the comments
2 about the noise. This is something that concerns
3 our neighborhood very much, seeing what's
4 happening on the East Windsor end of our road.
5 Our neighbors down there are in distress, and they
6 have to live with horrible noise.

7 And I know today the comments were that this
8 isn't going to be any more noise than you hear in
9 night nature, but the fact is that this isn't
10 natural noise that we're going to hear, and nobody
11 wants to hear machines.

12 Six months out of the year there aren't
13 leaves on the trees that are currently in between
14 our houses in this property, and we're going to
15 see this solar facility for six months of the
16 year, and we're probably going to hear it more
17 during those times because there's going to be no
18 foliage on the trees. There's no guarantee
19 that -- that those trees will stay there either,
20 because they're owned by the property owners, so
21 that's another huge concern.

22 I think that the screening that is being
23 proposed sounds great, but again, if you look at
24 what's happening in East Windsor at the other end
25 of our road, they are living very close to a row

1 of dead evergreen trees. They're brown.

2 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mary Cardin, for
3 coming out this evening. Unfortunately, your time
4 ran out.

5 We'll now continue with the public comments
6 with Seth Bahler followed by Paul Gilbert.

7 Seth Bahler, please?

8 SETH BAHLER: Hi. Can you hear me?

9 THE HEARING OFFICER: Yes, you're breaking up a little
10 bit, but we can hear you. Let's give it a shot.

11 SETH BAHLER: Yeah -- (unintelligible) --

12 THE HEARING OFFICER: Sorry, Mr. Bahler, you are not
13 coming in well at all.

14 SETH BAHLER: (Unintelligible) -- almost up to the
15 (unintelligible). Can you skip me by two people
16 and then I'll speak again? Is that a possibility?

17 THE HEARING OFFICER: Sure, certainly. We'll come back
18 to you. We're going to continue and see if you
19 can get into a spot where you get better
20 reception.

21 Okay. We're going to move on to Mr. Paul
22 Gilbert, followed by --

23 SETH BAHLER: Can you skip me and I'll speak next? Is
24 that a possibility?

25 THE HEARING OFFICER: Absolutely.

1 SETH BAHLER: Okay. Yeah, I'll get --

2 THE HEARING OFFICER: Very good.

3 Mr. Gilbert, are you there?

4 PAUL GILBERT: Yes. Good evening, Mr. Morissette and
5 Council. Can you hear me all right?

6 THE HEARING OFFICER: We can hear you perfectly.

7 Thank you.

8 PAUL GILBERT: Fine. Thank you. I have two brief
9 comments, and they'll be brief. This is regarding
10 prime farmland. I'd like to just begin my
11 comments by sharing a quote from the Connecticut
12 Agriculture Commissioner, Steve Reviczky.

13 Quote, Ellington has considerable working
14 lands that contribute greatly to Connecticut
15 agriculture. Since the proposed facility is being
16 located in prime farmland, a request is being made
17 to place a temporary -- just a temporary
18 moratorium on such sitings, while the legislature
19 is proposing to raise financial caps to pay
20 farmers for farmland preservation.

21 Ellington farmers, again, contribute greatly
22 to the Connecticut agriculture, therefore the
23 prime farmland needs to be preserved. Please
24 consider this request for a moratorium.

25 Secondly, the solar facility operation and

1 maintenance requires oversight and enforcement by
2 an independent agency. In the discussions this
3 afternoon, I didn't pick up on much of that. For
4 example, DEEP requires, from what I understand,
5 like, a one-year inspection now. But I think
6 these facilities need more oversight and
7 maintenance.

8 That's the end of my comments, and thank you.

9 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Gilbert. We
10 appreciate you coming out this evening.

11 Let's go back to Mr. Bahler to see if he's
12 got a better connection.

13 Mr. Bahler, are you there?

14 SETH BAHLER: Can you give me one more, one more person
15 and then I'll speak? I'm almost off to the farm.

16 THE HEARING OFFICER: Sounds great.

17 We'll now move on to Mr. Jim Dixon.

18 Mr. Dixon, are you with us?

19 JAMES DIXON: Yes, I'm here. Can you hear me?

20 THE HEARING OFFICER: We can hear you. Thank you.

21 JAMES DIXON: Yes. I've been a resident of 38 middle
22 road with my wife for 37 years. We raised our
23 children here and have done extensive upgrades on
24 our house.

25 In the past we've had an attempted siting of

1 a nuclear waste dump across the street from us,
2 and were told that it would be low level, no more
3 than the sun. We all know that's not true.

4 And we've had tobacco grown across the street
5 also with overspray onto our property. We find
6 that the soft cell that's trying to be made by a
7 community solar -- we just can't believe what's
8 advertised.

9 The reason for moving out here on Middle Road
10 was because of the country atmosphere. We've got
11 deer in the spring and summer and fall across the
12 street from us, and behind us. The geese are into
13 the fields both in front and behind us in the fall
14 of the year, and also the turkeys. So there's
15 quite a bit of wildlife here.

16 We feel that there's a, a better location for
17 a facility such as this. If you look at the
18 community solar website under their current
19 projects, they show they're all out in rural
20 areas, not with neighbors. They don't have houses
21 near them. And it's just -- it's not a good
22 location.

23 We feel that if you go into new developments,
24 all the power, the power lines and everything are
25 underground. People want to live their lives and

1 they want to have quality of life, and having an
2 industrial facility such as a solar farm behind
3 them, that belongs in either an industrial park or
4 away from homes, away from people.

5 I hope you'll take these things into
6 consideration; take a look, come down our road and
7 say to yourself, would I really want to live there
8 and have something such as this behind my house
9 for the next 25 years?

10 THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Well, thank you, Mr.

11 Dixon. Does that conclude your comments?

12 JAMES DIXON: Pretty much. Yeah. We're, we're not
13 opposed to solar, and we're not opposed to solar
14 projects such as this, but they need to be in the
15 right place.

16 I'm not opposed to people putting it on top
17 of their house, but as far as being an abutter,
18 you know, we are opposed to that because it does
19 impact the quality of life.

20 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you so much.

21 Now we'll move on to Mr. Bahler. Mr. Bahler,
22 did you find a spot? We see you.

23 SETH BAHLER: Hi. Can you hear me?

24 Sorry for all the troubles.

25 THE HEARING OFFICER: No problem. Yes, we can hear you

1 fine. Go ahead.

2 SETH BAHLER: Sorry. I'm a fifth-generation farmer.
3 I'm actually driving a truck right now, hauling
4 hay. So you've got to make hay when the sun
5 shines. So sorry I'm a little -- couldn't hear me
6 earlier.

7 But -- yeah, I'm just calling -- or thank you
8 for the opportunity for letting me testify. I'm
9 in opposition of this. I'm in opposition of all
10 solar on prime ag soils, like Mr. Gilbert said.

11 Putting it -- we don't have extra land in
12 Connecticut for farms, and putting solar on that
13 and taking away farmland is wrong. We already
14 struggle to find land to produce safe and healthy
15 food for Connecticut, and so we're in opposition
16 to this.

17 And I think -- I think it's important to note
18 that, you know, we're trading farmland for solar
19 to think we're doing a great thing to produce
20 clean energy, but Connecticut is a food deficit
21 state. I think if we didn't ship in food from out
22 of state, we would -- Connecticut residents would
23 be out of food within a week.

24 So I think we have to really consider, you
25 know, keeping farmland, the farmland that we have

1 left to the farmers that are already farming it,
2 and really trying to focus on rooftops and
3 brownfields.

4 But we -- we're not opposed to solar. We
5 have solar on a roof and I think solar is a good
6 thing in the right spots, but not on prime ag
7 soil. So that's all I have to say. Thank you.

8 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Bahler.

9 Now continuing with public statements by
10 Steven Schubert, followed by Gabriel Garza.

11 Steven Schubert, please?

12 STEVEN SCHUBERT: Yes, thank you very much. I'd like
13 to make some comments on your Siting Council
14 decision criteria, and factors addressing in the
15 application. And one of them is justification of
16 the chosen site or route in comparison with other
17 alternatives.

18 My question is, did Community Solar give you
19 other alternatives instead of this site?

20 Also, I'd like to compare, they're building a
21 big solar farm in East Windsor, and it's 485 acres
22 compared to just 20. And if you do the math, it's
23 not even a half a percent, the acreage, and you're
24 doing 120 megawatts to 4, and it's -- it's even
25 less. So it's like, why are you even bothering?

1 It's not that much output.

2 Also on your council decision criteria, it
3 says environmental impact including public health
4 and safety, and scenic, historic and recreational
5 values. Well, you have to consider that, the
6 health issues, et cetera.

7 Also, my last comment is your
8 responsibilities. And item number two on your
9 responsibilities is to assure the welfare and
10 protection of the people of Connecticut, and
11 that's your -- what you guys should be siting this
12 on.

13 So those are my comments. And I thank you
14 very much.

15 **THE HEARING OFFICER:** Thank you, Mr. Schubert.

16 The next public statements would be Gabriel
17 Garza, followed by Arlo Hoffman.

18 **GABRIEL GARZA:** Thank you. Can you hear me?

19 **THE HEARING OFFICER:** Yes, I can hear you. Thank you.

20 **GABRIEL GARZA:** Perfect. So good evening, everybody.

21 My name is Gabe Garza. I own a home near Crystal
22 Lake. And I'm in opposition, not only for the
23 reasons brought up by others, but also for the
24 hidden cost that we would be responsible for.

25 So a brief background on me. I work in

1 transmission operations, and I was a transmission
2 operator for several years. So I feel well versed
3 in the pros and cons that solar has as an energy
4 source, as well as the effects that we're
5 currently seeing on our electric grid here in
6 Connecticut.

7 I'll start off by pointing out two statements
8 in the Eversource distribution impact study that I
9 found worth noting. Also, I'd like to say that
10 after looking into that study, it was performed by
11 a very junior engineer who no longer works at that
12 company.

13 So that study states that the need for an
14 additional capacitor bank to correct power factor
15 will be at the discretion of the circuit owner,
16 with Eversource being that circuit owner. It's
17 not a matter of if, but when an additional
18 capacitor bank will be required, that cost will
19 come out of our pockets.

20 Additionally, the report states reverse power
21 flow at a Rockville breaker was substantial during
22 that minimum load, but does not feed into the
23 transmission system.

24 Well, reverse power flow is not good. It's
25 not how we designed our transmission distribution

1 system. And with loading levels becoming lower
2 and lower due to solar, you know, being installed
3 more and solar expecting to rise triple the size
4 by 2031, addressing reverse power flow will be an
5 expensive issue that us Connecticut residents will
6 be expected to cover as well.

7 And I'm going to end this with a rhetorical
8 question for the Council pertaining to
9 accountability. It was brought up by -- I saw
10 another member as well. But there are currently
11 no processes, or a lack of process in place to
12 perform -- or to verify that solar farm is
13 performing the required preventative maintenance,
14 on-site safety, relays after installation.

15 Additionally, the DEEP report talked about a
16 nearby solar farm in East Windsor not honoring
17 their end of the agreement in performing required
18 follow-up maintenance for keeping their vegetation
19 screen alive. And then vegetation screen, you
20 know, as we talked about is vital for helping
21 screen out inverter noises for nearby residents.

22 So I just ask to seriously think about this
23 and how we're going to hold CPG accountable, you
24 know, if passed, in performing these vital
25 maintenance items so that we can keep our town

1 safe, beautiful, and our residents' lives
2 unaffected. Thank you.

3 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Garza.

4 We'll now continue with public statements by
5 Arlo Hoffman. Mr. Hoffman?

6 ARLO HOFFMAN: Yes. I'd like to thank the Council for
7 making the time to take your public hearing. I'm
8 a lifelong resident of Ellington. I've been a
9 member of the Ellington Planning and Zoning
10 Commission for over 20 years, many of those years
11 as chairman, and I implore the Siting Council to
12 reject this site.

13 Based on what I've -- already comments were
14 already made, but I want to reiterate it's an
15 extremely short sighted policy to allow solar
16 arrays on prime farmland. We need farm, prime
17 farmland in Connecticut. We need it in Ellington,
18 and it's just a really poor, poor policy.

19 Also I'd like to address the Applicant has
20 stated in the past that they support farming, and
21 that sheep grazing is a great thing to do around
22 panels. And I just want the Siting Council to
23 know, this does not happen in the real world.
24 It's certainly not at the scale that they suggest.

25 I don't think you could find 50 sheep in the

1 whole town of Ellington, but you can find
2 thousands upon thousands of cows -- and they need
3 feed. And this is corn ground, it's prime ag
4 land, and it's just -- again, it shouldn't be used
5 for solar.

6 That's what I have to say. And I want to
7 thank you again for the time. Thank you.

8 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. Hoffman.

9 Appreciate it.

10 Well, that concludes the public statements
11 for this evening, but before closing this hearing
12 the Connecticut Siting Council announces that
13 briefs and proposed findings of fact may be filed
14 with the Council by any party or intervener no
15 later than June 17, 2023.

16 The submission of briefs or proposed findings
17 of fact are not required by this Council. Rather,
18 we leave it to the choice of the parties and
19 interveners.

20 Anyone who has not become a party or
21 intervener, but who desires to make his or her
22 views known to the Council may file written
23 statements with the Council within 30 days of the
24 date hereof. The council issues draft finding of
25 facts, and thereafter parties and interveners may

1 identify errors or inconsistencies between the
2 Council's draft finding of fact and the record.
3 However, no new evidence, no information or no
4 arguments and no reply briefs without permission
5 will be considered by the Council.

6 A copy of the transcript of this hearing will
7 be filed at the Ellington Town Clerk's Office.


