The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) has reviewed the referenced project in response to your request for our comments regarding potential effects to historic properties. SHPO understands that the proposed project consists of the construction of a 4.9-MW battery energy storage system (BESS) with associated site improvements. The project will require approval from the Connecticut Siting Council. As a result, it is subject to review by this office pursuant to the Connecticut Environmental Policy Act.

There are no previously recorded archaeological sites or properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places located in the vicinity of the project area. Further, readily available historic imagery suggests that much of the proposed project area has undergone significant previous disturbances. Therefore, it is unlikely that intact archaeological deposits will be impacted by the proposed activities. Based on the information submitted to this office, it is the opinion of SHPO that no historic properties will be affected by the proposed BESS development.
