MR. MORISSETTE: Good evening, ladies and gentleman. This public comment session is called to order this Thursday, February 8th, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. My name is
John Morissette, member and presiding officer of the Connecticut Siting Council.
Other members of the Council are
Bryan Golembiewski, designee for
Commissioner Katie Dykes of the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection; with

Ouat Nguyen, chairman for Marissa Paslick

Gillett for the public utilities regulatory

authority; Robertson Silvestri, Dr. Thomas

Near, and Chance Carter.

Members of the staff are Executive
Director, Melanie Bachman; Siting Analyst
Robert Mercier; and Administrative Support
Lisa Fontaine and Dakota Lafountain. If you
haven't done so already, I ask that everyone
please mute their computer audio and
telephones now.

This is a continuation of the public

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hearing that began at 2:00 p.m. this afternoon. A copy of the prepared agenda is available on the Council's Petition 1598 web page along with the record in this matter, the public hearing notice, and instructions for public access to this remote public hearing, and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council's Procedures. This hearing is held pursuant to divisions of Title 16 of the Connecticut General Statutes and of the Uniform Administrative Procedures Act upon a petition from Windsor Solar One, LLC, for a declaratory ruling pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes 4-176 and 1650k for the proposed construction, maintenance, and operation of 3-megawatt AC solar photovoltaic electric generating facility located at 445 River Street, Windsor, Connecticut and associated electrical interconnection.

The petition was received on

November 13th, 2023, the Council legal

notice and the date -- of the date and time

of this public hearing was published in the

Hartford Courant on January 9th, 2024. On

this Council's request, the petitioner erected a sign in the vicinity of the proposed site as to inform the public of the name of the petitioner, the type of facility, the public hearing date, and contact information for the Council, including the website and phone number.

Please be advised that the Council does not issue permits for stormwater management. If the proposed project is approved by the Council, the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, also known as DEEP, stormwater permit is independently required. DEEP could hold public hearings for any stormwater permit applications. Please also be advised that the Council evaluation criteria under the statute does not include the consideration of property value.

This public comment session is reserved for members of the public who have signed up in advance to make brief statements. These limited appearance statements are not subject to questions from the parties or the Council. And members of the public making

statements may not ask questions of the parties or the Council.

In accordance with the public hearing notice and in fairness to everyone who signed up to speak, these public statements will be limited to three minutes. Please be advised that written comments may be submitted by any person within the 30 days of this public hearing.

I wish to note for those who are here and for the benefit of your friends and neighbors who are unable to join us for this public comment session, that you or they may send written statements to the Council within 30 days of the date hereof by mail or by email. Please be advised that any person may be removed from the comment -- public comment session at the discretion of the Council.

We ask each person making a limited appearance statement in this proceeding to confine his or her statements to the subject matter before the Council and to avoid unreasonable repetition so that we may hear all the concerns you and your neighbors may

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have. Please be advised that the Council cannot answer questions from the public about the proposal. A verbatim transcript will be made of this hearing and deposited in the Windsor Town Clerk's Office for the convenience of the public.

At this time I request the petitioner make a brief, very brief presentation to the public describing the proposed facility, and I understand Bryan Fitzgerald will be making that presentation. Mr. Fitzgerald, please.

MR. FITZGERALD: Yes, Mr. Morisette, and thank you. On the screen should be displayed figure 5, site plan. Good evening, members of the Siting Council, Town of Windsor, residents, and neighbors. My name is Bryan Fitzgerald. I'm the Director of Development for Verogy and the Windsor Solar One project. Thanks for your time this evening and earlier today.

Windsor Solar One is a proposed

3-megawatt solar photovoltaic array located
at 445 River Street. The parcel bounded to
the south by River Street, to the west by
Old River Street.

The proposed project would be installed across approximately thirteen and half acres of land formerly used to grow tobacco and hay. Access to the proposed project would originate off of River Street as identified in the plan, here, as you can see about two thirds of the way up the page there is a pink/red maroon line that bisects the blue figures, which represent the solar panels on the plan. That access road, again, originates off of River Street.

The proposed project would consist of about 7,280 solar modules with 24 string level invertors. The panels will be mounted on single access tracker racking systems at about 9 feet above grade of their maximum height. The proposed project is anticipated to produce about 5,513,000 kilowatt hours of electricity each year. That's enough to power about 760 homes annually. The proposed project would also include a landscape buffer to be planted running north and south along River Street. To orientate yourself on the page here, the western extent of the property along River Street is marked by a

red property boundary. In the green space indicated between that property boundary moving east before you reach the blue panels, is where the landscaping buffer would be planted. This proposed landscaping planting would consistent of Eastern Red Cedars, White Oaks, Evergreens, a mix of Serviceberry and other Holly Evergreen species type bushes. These evergreens, these Red Cedars would be about 6 to 7 feet at the time of planting.

The solar projects like
Windsor Solar One do not create any air
emissions and are commonly referred to as
zero carbon resource energy systems. Again,
that means they just don't produce any air
emissions when in operation. The project
would not use any water nor would it create
any wastewater as a result of operations.

In 2023 the proposed project was awarded a 20-year contract through a competitive auction administered by CTDEEP and Eversource energy. The proposed project will sell electricity and renewable energy certificates to Eversource through the

shared clean energy program. For the SCEF program, 2.5 cents of every kilowatt hour produced is allocated to the bills of participating subscribers of which 60 percent need to be low to moderate income customers. That results in \$137,000 a year of approximate net benefit to subscribing customers.

The proposed project will also incorporate a co-use agricultural plan consisting of sheep grazing throughout the proposed project area. This insures agricultural productivity will continue across the entire parcel. This plan was approved by the Department of Agriculture in their letter on November 27, 2023. Again, thank you all for your time this evening. We appreciate your feedback.

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you Mr. Fitzgerald.

MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you.

MR. MORISSETTE: I'd like to make a correction to my opening statement. The petition was filed by Windsor Solar One. That's a correction, please, for the record.

We will now call upon Gracie Maine to make a public statement followed by Diane Lehan. Gracie Maine, please, good evening.

MS. MAINE: Hi, it's D'Arcy Maine.

MR. MORISSETTE: D'Arcy, thank you.

MS. MAINE: Hi, thank you so much for letting me speak today. I live at 418 River Street, so right across the road from the proposed site. Again, I appreciate the opportunity to speak today and also for the chance to publicly voice my opposition.

While I'm in favor of developing and using alternative energy sources, I'm incredibly disturbed at the idea of placing a solar farm in the middle of a residential area. When my husband and I first received the letter informing us of this proposal, we did as many did, and began to research the company behind this plan and became aware of the solar farm that they developed on Middle Road in East Windsor.

From there we read complaint after complaint about the experiences of the residences there and surrounding area. One near-by resident described it as a very

high-pitched ringing noise in a Journal
Inquirer story, another called it a whining
noise that travels. So as others, I'm sure
in this meeting did, we drove out for
ourselves on a sunny day to that site in
East Windsor and we can confirm those
complaints to be accurate. The noise was
shockingly unbearable. Those same residents
have said they are no longer able to have
their windows open on a nice day or sit on
their porches because of the sound.
When we moved to Windsor in 2021 it was

When we moved to Windsor in 2021 it was a large park so we can enjoy being outside, and we've loved being able to do that with with our one-year-old daughter and our dog, who you might hear in the background currently. The idea of not even be able to open our windows is devastating.

While I know Bryan just said, or I've seen the company say, there will be minimal impacts on those around the River Street location, the company did say that to those in East Windsor as well. So we don't -- from my standpoint we don't have a reason to trust that will be true. Those in

East Windsor have been dealing with this now for years and it seems like there have been minimal solutions.

Aside from the noise, I also have many questions about the potential health risk such a development poses. I know because of the relative newness of such developments in residential areas, there doesn't seem to be much reputable evidence either way just yet. But I can safely say I don't want my family nor my neighbors to be the guinea pigs when it comes to our safety and health. There are simply too many unknowns.

On a personal note, I am 100 percent dependent on a pacemaker device. It keeps me alive, it keeps me functioning, and the idea of living so close to an electric magnetic field is concerning. And it's not a choice I ever would have made and I worry I no longer have a choice. This decision is being made, not by me, nor by my neighbors, but by those who do not live in our community nor share our concerns.

So with that I would just ask those tasked with making this decision before you

do so I just hope you take a moment to honestly ask yourself if you would want to live directly next to or across from the proposed site and use that to guide your decision-making. Thank you so much for your time.

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, D'Arcy Maine. We will now continue with Diane Lehan, followed by Donna Grossman. Diane.

MS. LEHAN: Okay.

MR. MORISSETTE: There you go.

MS. LEHAN: Oh, there we go. I actually agree with just about everything that
Ms. Maine said. I truly oppose the installation of the utility scale on farmland. There are many other locations of unused farmland within Windsor that are not located in a residential area. I am a retired 30-year resident of Strawberry Hills Association. When I was purchasing my home, I selected this particular one as the backyard faces woods, wetlands, and the Farmington River, and the front yard has bucolic serene view of farmland.

The proposed location of this utility

scale solar power plant is less than

400 feet from my front yard, 100 feet from
other homes in the area. I use the term
utility scale solar power plant as it is the
correct term, rather than the most commonly
used term of solar farm, which is blatantly
deceptive. Webster's dictionary defines
farm as an area of land and its buildings
used for growing crops and rearing animals.

There were many references in this afternoon's conversation of the Amazon facility. Interesting that that facility necessitated a zoning change, why not this location? What are the plans to somewhat obscure the view from the homeowners? was a comment during this afternoon session and I will have to paraphrase, they can see Amazon, they'll see this. The Amazon facility is only visible during the winter months as it is completely obscured by foliage during the rest of the year. I also visited East Windsor's East Road facility on a very sunny Sunday. There is an extremely loud constant whirring sound, which will preclude us from having windows open during

the summer.

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But more importantly, are you aware that less than one third of a mile away is the CREC River Street School which provides, and I'm quoting, comprehensive academic and life skills curriculum for students ages 3 to 22 who present with a variety of behavioral, communicative, and neurological disorders including autism spectrum disorder, seizure disorders, et cetera. Many of these students are particularly sensitive to noise. This would --

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, Diane, for coming out this evening. Unfortunately your time is expired. We will now move on to Donna Grossman. Donna are you with us this afternoon? There you are.

MS. GROSSMAN: Hi.

MR. MORISSETTE: Good evening.

MS. GROSSMAN: Hi, I'm Donna Grossman.

I live on 781 Kennedy Road. I'm going to read an excerpt from the World Health

Organization website. Climate change is impacting human lives and health in a variety of ways. It threatens the essential

ingredients of good health, clean air, safe drinking water, nutritious food supply, and safe shelter, and has the potential to undermine decades of progress in global health.

Between 2030 and 2050, climate change is expected to cause approximately 250,000 additional deaths per year from malnutrition, malaria, diarrhea and heat stress along. The direct damage costs to health are estimated to be between \$2 and \$4 billion per year by 2030.

Greenhouse gas emissions that result from the extraction and burning of fossil fuels are a major contributors to both climate change and air pollution. Many policies and individual measures such as transport food and energy use choices have the potential to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and produce major health co-benefits, particularly by abating air pollution. The phaseout of polluting energy systems could lower both carbon emissions and cut the burden of household and ambient air pollution, which cause 7 million

premature death per year, end quote.

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Ideally, every home and business would have their own solar panels on their roofs. I have two sets of solar panels, and I will add, with no negative health impact. Because of the costs, however, that is just not feasible. And that is why solar farms like the proposed one in Windsor are so important. I understand that there are some people who don't want solar farms near them, and all efforts should be made to reduce the negative effects of this farm on them. But I would argue that the lives of my grandchildren out weigh that want. Thank you.

And I will add that I went out to that solar farm in East Windsor, I couldn't hear a thing. But I think that's from being old so, you know, I'm going to give everybody else the benefit that they really did hear it. Thank you.

MR. MORISSETTE: Thank you, Donna. Thank you everyone for coming out this evening and providing us with your comments. So the Council announces that it will continue the

evidentiary session of this public hearing on Thursday, no, excuse me, it's Tuesday March 19th, 2024, at 2:00 p.m. via Zoom conferencing.

A copy of the agenda for the continued evidentiary hearing session will be available on the Council's Petition,

Number 1598 web page, along with the record in this matter, the public hearing notice, instructions for public access to this evidentiary hearing session, and the Council's Citizens Guide to Siting Council's Procedures.

Please note that anyone who has not become a party or intervenor, but who desires to make his or her views known to the Council, they may file written statements with the Council until the public comment record is closed. Copies of the transcript of this hearing will be filed with the Windsor Town Clerk's Office. I hereby declare this hearing adjourned. Thank you, everyone, for participating. Have a good evening. Thank you.
